Parade Theme Is Announced; Entries Sought for All Activities

The theme for the 1981 Christmas parade was selected Thursday by the Chamber of Commerce. 'Christmas in Fantasyland' will be used in floats and decorated windows this year, with cash prizes to be given winning entries in several contests.

In the 2:30 p.m. parade Friday, December 4, prizes of \$75, \$50 and \$35 will be given the winning floats. Those eligible for the awards must be entered prior to the parade by contacting Clint Day or Charles Wetsel.

In the decorated window contest, prizes will be \$35, \$25 and \$15, with all others to be given \$5. A drawing for window assignments will be held Monday, November 23, and all entries

must be listed by that date to draw for windows in the downtown area.

The yard and home decorating contest will also be held, with residents asked to contact Mr. Day with their address so they may be included in the judging. The winners of that contest will receive \$50, \$30 and \$20, with the winners selected at a later date in December.

All clubs and organizations planning to enter floats in the parade are asked to contact the C of C leaders as soon as possible to qualify for the judging December 4.

Also planned that day will be the Lions Club Pancake Sale and several other activities by local clubs and organizations.

City Sales Tax Is Reported For Month of October

The City Sales Tax for Santa Anna has shown an increase again the past month. The City has received a total of \$3,081.87 from the office of State Comptroller Bob Bullock, with the total for the year now at \$19,995.20.

The Santa Anna total is a 29 percent increase over the same time last year when the October tax amounted to \$2,747 and the total for the year was \$15,431.

Comanche Resources Inc. of Odessa will drill four projects five miles south of Trickham on the Clude Haynes 325-acre lease in the regular field. Permit depths applied for are 1,800 feet.

No. 1 Houston, No. 2 Houston and No. 3 Houston are in the William Winningham Survey 13, and the No. 3 Haynes is in the J. T. Tindell Survey 79.

A proposed 1,995-foot wildcat will be drilled two miles west of

Trickham in the Proler Field. It is Proler Energy Inc. of Houston No. 33 Vaughn, located on a 937-acre lease in the Thomas Labor Survey 18.

Proler Energy Inc. of Houston will drill another well in the same survey, the No. 34 Vaughn, that will also be drilled to 1,995 feet. It is in the Proler (Breneke and Cross Cut) Field two miles west of Trickham.

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Directors Are Elected For Tax District Board

Directors of the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District have been elected recently, with results announced Monday by County Clerk Glenn Thomas.

Members elected to serve two-year terms beginning on January 1 are Harold Bragg, James Isenhower, Barbara Kingsbery, Harold Pittard and Bill Sneed. The organizational meeting will be held in January. The board will set policy for the

district, which beginning in 1982 will provide tax appraisal functions and handle taxpayer exemption applications and appeals for all taxing entities in the county.

All but Isenhower have served on the board the past two years. He replaces Cliff Drinkard of Coleman who was not re-elected.

Harold Pittard of Novice is current chairman, and Barbara Kingsbery is secretary of the group.

Field Appraisals Continue For County Tax District

The Coleman County Tax Appraisal District Board met Monday, November 9, at the district office in Coleman. Members present were Harold Pittard, chairman, Bill Sneed, Harold Bragg and Cliff Drinkard.

A progress report on appraisals in the city of Coleman was given, and it was estimated that all field appraisal work will be completed

by mid-December, with some paper work to be completed after that date.

Upon a motion by Mr. Drinkard, the group voted to take \$25,000 from the current bank balance that is not needed at this time and place it in a six-month Certificate of Deposit.

Bills and accounts were approved for payment, and the 1982 budget was approved unanimously by the group with a few revisions from the original proposed budget.

The Chief Appraiser was given authority to purchase a postage meter at a cost of approximately \$1,500. Purchase of a fire-resistant filing cabinet was postponed.

Contract forms for all tax entities except Coleman School District (which has elected to collect its own taxes) were discussed for use for 1982 taxes.

The next regular meeting of the Tax Appraisal District group will be Monday, December 14.

Electricity tenderizes Texas beef

COLLEGE STATION — The tender steaks you've been buying at the meat counter or ordering in restaurants probably got that way because they were jolted with more than 500 volts of electricity, says a Texas A&M University researcher.

Meat packing plants across the country now routinely stimulate beef carcasses electrically, a procedure developed at Texas A&M that produces tender meat without chemicals.

"The process of electrical stimulation to tenderize steaks and make them more tasty has gained rapid popularity among meat packing plants," said Dr. Jeff Savell, an animal scientist in Texas A&M's College of Agriculture.

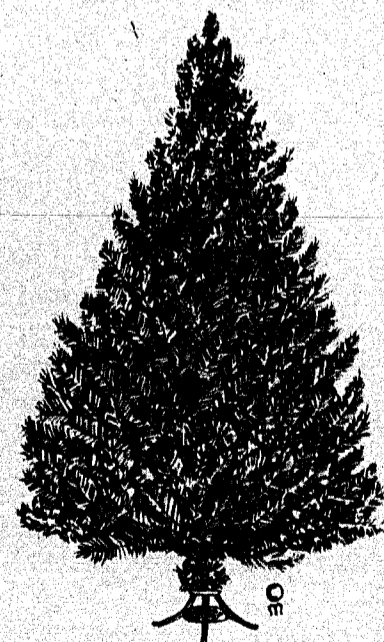

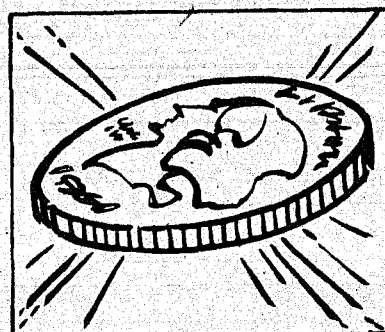
The Santa Anna team lost 61-39 in their first outing, with Kenneth Terrell scoring nine points, Mike Simmons and Randy Casey each scoring eight.

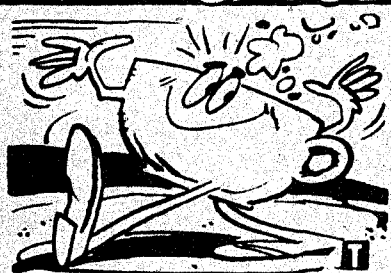
The Junior High basketball teams opened the season Monday night with games with the Blanket teams at Perry Gym.

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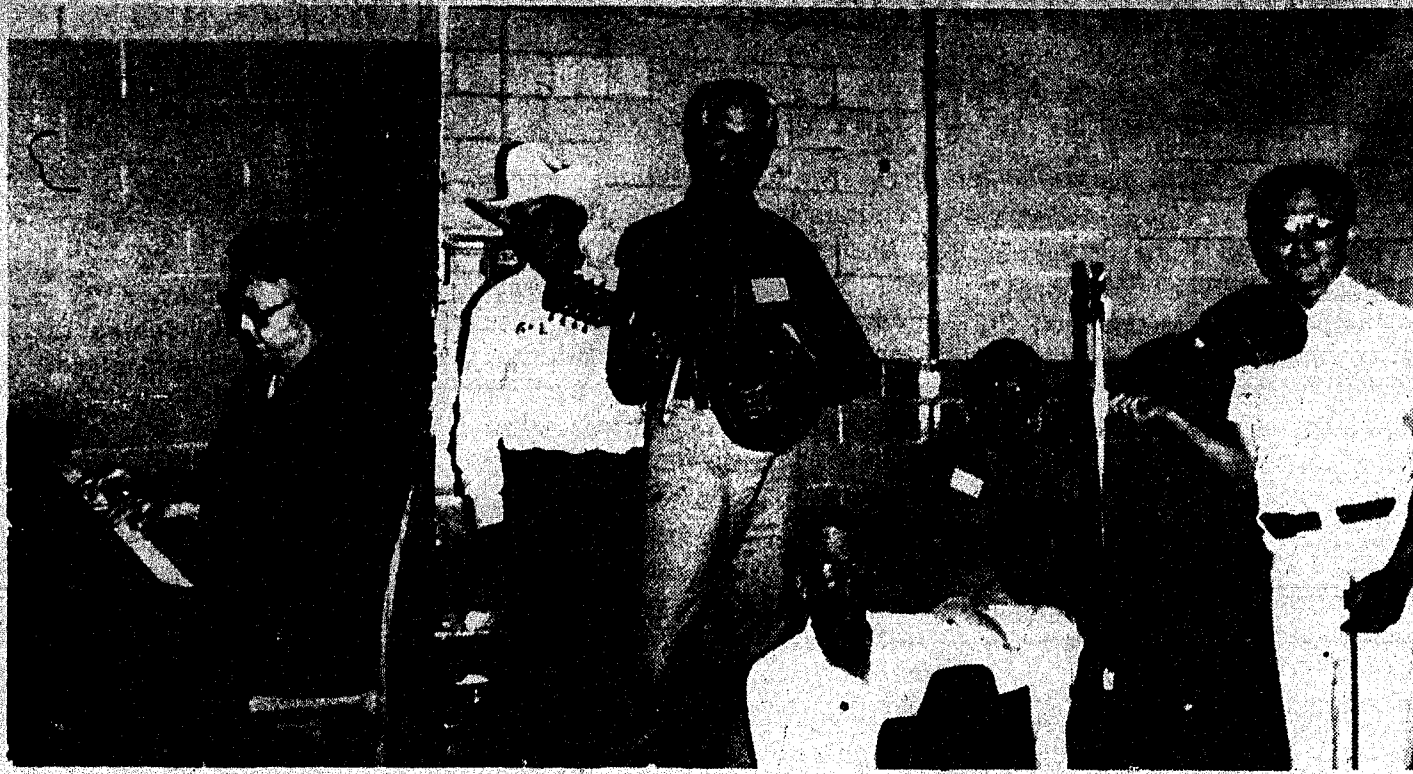

Farm-City Week Observance To Be Held November 20-26

COLLEGE STATION— Farm-City Week, November 20 - 26, focuses on the involvement of farm and city people as partners in growing, processing, marketing and consuming food and fiber.

'In Texas, movement of food and fiber from field to factory to the family table provides jobs and income for about a fourth of the working force,' points out Dr. Carl Anderson, marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

One of every 30 Texans is a farmer or rancher, and 30 percent of the states retail trade business is directly is directly associated with agricultural production and

selling of food and fiber products. Many businesses, financial institutions and individuals are involved in providing supplies, credit and services to farmers and ranchers and in processing and marketing agricultural commodities.

While the overall cost of living has increased about 11 percent from a year ago, food prices in the grocery store have increased 6.4 percent and apparel has risen less than 5 percent, notes the economist. This compares with an increase of nearly 13 percent in housing, 16 percent in fuels and 11.5 percent in medical care and 25 percent in public transportation.

Americans spend far less of their take-home pay on food than people in other countries of the world, according to Anderson.

'Together, farm and city people make the best food and fiber team in the world,' he believes. This gives the country the capacity to feed its own people and to export for economic gain as well as for humanitarian purposes.

With more than \$3 billion in farm exports last year, Texas is one of the leading states in shipment of agricultural products abroad. Texas led the nation in shipments of cotton, cottonseed and animal fats; was second in meats and meat products, hides and skins; and third in rice, peanuts and peanut oil.

On a national scale, farm exports total about \$44 billion. Anderson estimates that production from about one of every three acres of cropland is exported. Leading customers are Japan, Netherlands, Mexico, China, Canada, Germany and Korea.

Farm exports support more than a million jobs, and the added business stemming from agricultural exports about equals the value of products shipped, according to Anderson. Exports help both farm and city people make a living. At the same time, they boost the economy and offset some of the cost of imported oil.

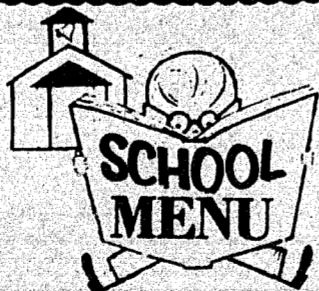

Drugs, Older Texans: A Special Need for Safety (Part II)

Final in a two-part series.

Coping with special risks that drugs pose for older adults takes care and understanding, cautions Judith Warren, a family life education specialist-aging.

Older people themselves need to assume greater responsibility in their own health care and drug management, the specialist urges.

Warren is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

To help older people cope with their special risks, the National Institute on Drug Abuse has recommended several steps they can take:

TALK TO YOUR DOCTOR

Give clear information to your doctor.

Tell your doctor(s) about all the medicines you are taking.

Also, alert him or her to any allergies or known drug sensitivity you have.

Consider making a written list of you medicines before you visit the doctor.

ASK YOUR DOCTOR

Get clear information from your doctor.

It is your right to ask for—and your doctor's responsibility to give you—information about prescribed medications.

Make a list of any questions you have—such as those below—and ask them. The information you get could save you "headaches" and dollars.

- 1) What is the drug's name?
Why am I taking it? What's it for?
- 3) When and how often should I take it?
- 4) Under what conditions and why should I take it? at meals, with certain foods or drinks?
- 5) Should I avoid certain things, such as

driving?

We can usually carry out instructions better when we know why.

6) How long should I take the medicine?

7) What are the possible side effects?

8) When should I report any problems?

For example, one side effect may be a headache, but if the headache is a very bad one, the doctor probably needs to know.

9) How should the drug be stored? In the refrigerator or away from heat, for example.

STOP: FINISH NOTES

If you don't get all the information written down while you're with the doctor, STOP in the waiting room and finish up the answers before you leave.

That way, they will still be fresh in your mind.

OTHER SAFETY STEPS

Other safety steps to take are just as important as giving and getting clear information, Warren reminds.

Don't stop taking a drug without asking your doctor—even if you feel OK.

Don't take drugs prescribed for anyone else, and don't share your medications with others.

Keep you medicines in their original bottles.

Throw out old or expired medicines.

PLAY IT SAFE

Finally, remember these "musts" above all: follow the doctor's instructions and alert your doctor to any problems you have. When in doubt, ASK.

With medicines, it's better to play it safe, Warren stresses.

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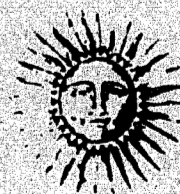

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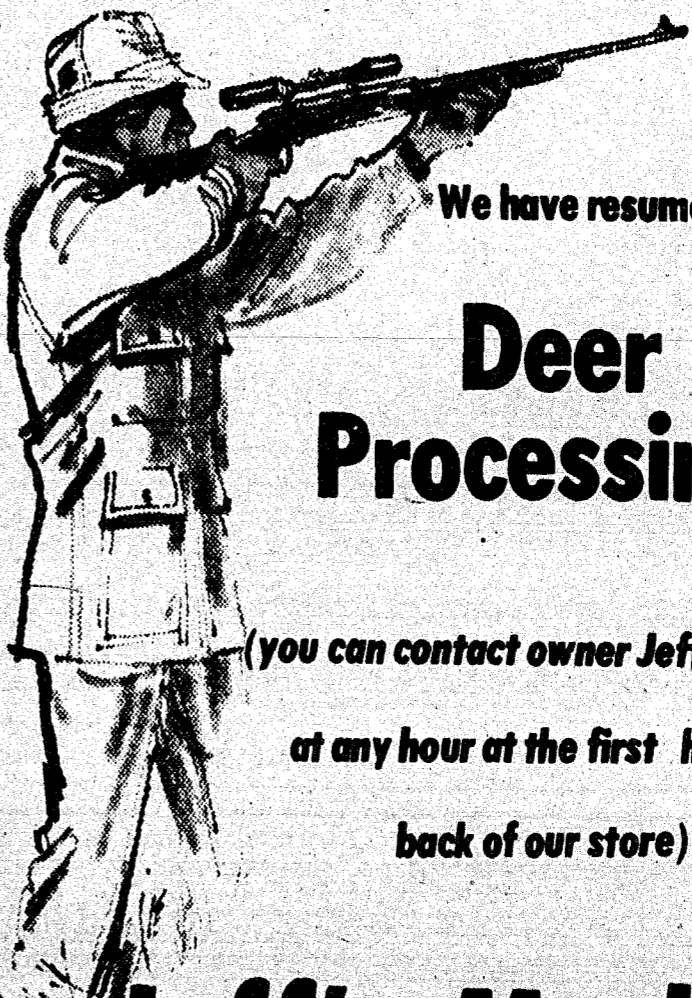
