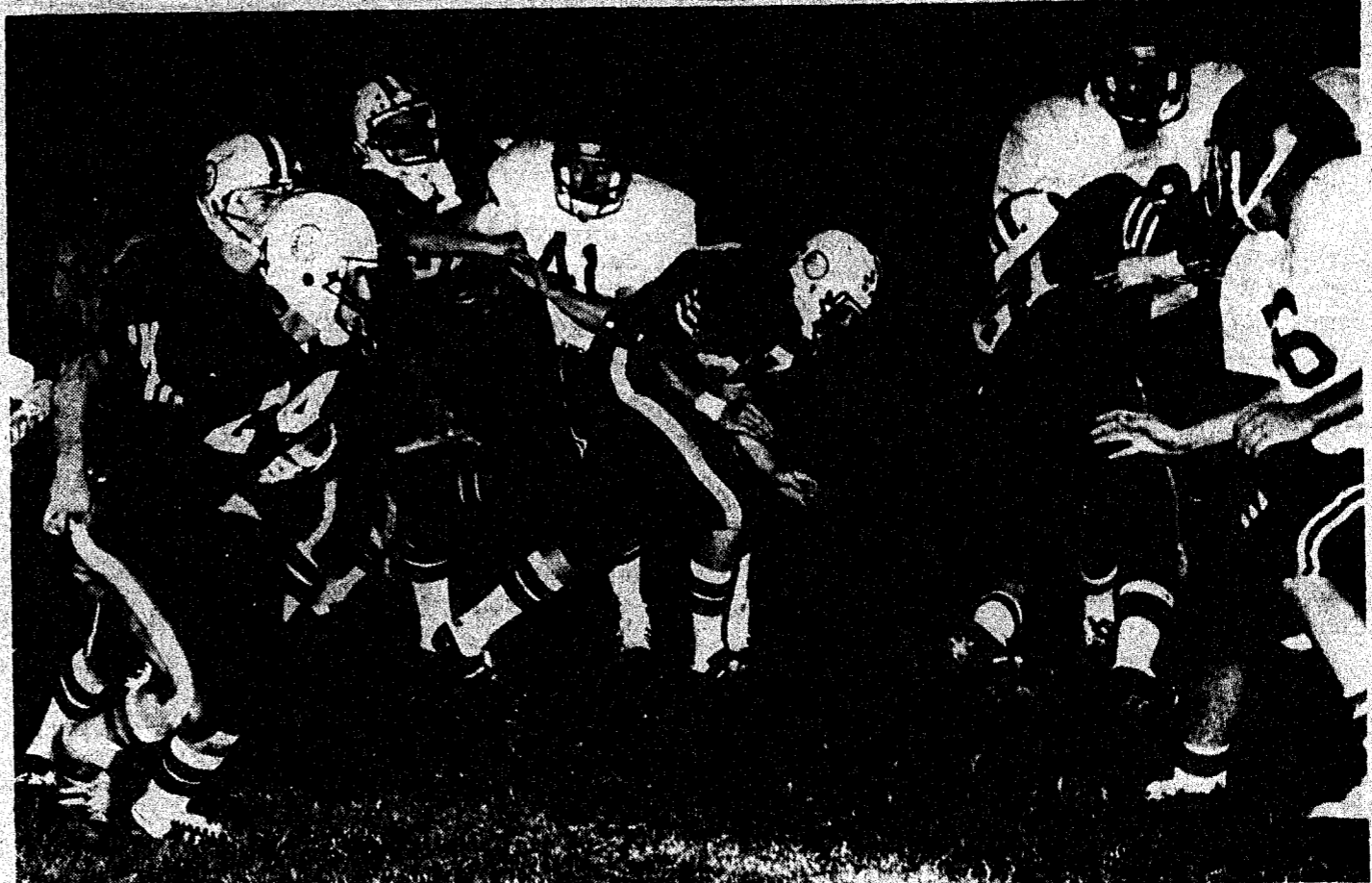
Community Choir Starts Rehearsals For Cantata

New Ownership Announced For Bailey Machine Shop

The Bailey Machine Shop in Santa Anna has recently reopened after being closed since early this year. The shop was sold by Mrs. Preston Bailey to Norman Pautsky, Don Hatfield, Tommy Hudson and Sammie Powers.

Joel Hamlin, a former employee of the business, is now the shop manager and machinist, with two other employees.

Although the shop is open for any kind of oil field work, production is underway on manufacture of burner parts for an Odessa firm.

The late Preston Bailey owned the shop for 35 years, and during that time patented several things, including the Bailey Gas Burner for the oil industry. The shop, located at South First and Santa Fe, has been in the same location for most of the 35 years of operation.

Besides the machine shop, the Bailey family has also recently sold the stock at Bailey Lumber and Hardware Co. to the Bradley Hardware store, and the downtown building has sold to Dr. J. P. Jones of Coleman.

Santa Anna led Miles in first downs 9 - 8, and in total yardage with 163 to 135 for the Bulldogs. Thirty-four yards was gained by passing, with Miles having only

five in that category.

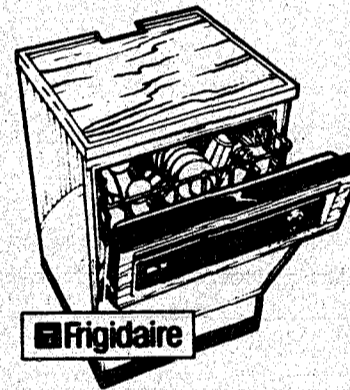

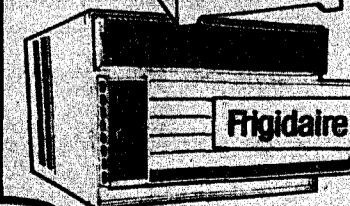

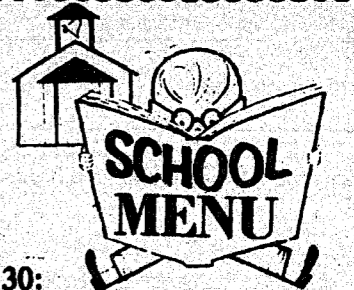
