Garbage Pick-up

Has Requirements

City Sanitation workers will be passing some local homes without picking up their garbage if certain regulations are not met.

Although the City now has a garbage truck in operation, all garbage and trash must be placed in cans, and if possible in plastic bags. No trash will be picked up from paper sacks or boxes.

City officials have also stated that the sanitation workers cannot go onto private property, so garbage cans must be placed at the edge of the street or alley before they can be emptied.

City Sales Tax Shows Increase

The City of Santa Anna has received a payment of \$872.08 in City Sales Tax for the month ending October 9. The tax receipts for Santa Anna total \$16,913.33 for the ten-month period of 1981, a substantial 33 percent increase over the previous year.

The City Sales Tax is collected by local merchants with the State Sales Tax, then computed and returned to the city each month. The ten-month total in 1980 was \$12,684.12.

Proposed Amendments On Ballot Tuesday

Texas voters will go the polls Tuesday, November 3, to vote on seven proposed constitutional amendments. The three most important proposals are those dealing with residential homestead exemptions, the creation of a water trust fund and state fiscal management.

Santa Anna voters will cast their ballots at the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative building from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Glen Copeland is election judge, with clerks to be Della Wristen, Udell Copeland, Montie Les Guthrie III, and Oma Dean Horner.

The proposed amendments, in order of appearance, are as follows:

1. Authorizing cities, towns and other taxing units to encourage the improvement, development, or redevelopment of certain areas through property tax relief and the issuance of bonds and notes.
2. Authorizing the Commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years.
3. Allowing the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to

manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds.

4. Authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; authorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed \$500 million, to guarantee the bonds of local governments in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved but unissued state bonds; and authorizing a program to retire state bonds. Santa Anna Native Retires From N-Guard

Charles Wristen, a Santa Anna native, was one of three National Guard officers honored recently on their retirement in Brownwood. Wristen ended his long career with the National Guard this month, serving most recently as Command Sergeant Major of the 3rd Battalion, 112th Armor Division in Brownwood.

The son of the late Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Wristen Sr., he is a graduate of Santa Anna High School and entered the Santa Anna National Guard unit in 1938. He served until 1940, and in April 1941 he entered the U. S. Air Force for active duty during World War II.

He participated in eight military campaigns including Algeria, Tunisia, Sicily, Naples, Rome, North Appenines, Po Valley and Southern France. His decorations included Bronze Star, Army Commendation, American Defense Service medal, American Campaign medal, European, African, Middle Eastern Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal, Armed Forces Reserve Medal, Presidential Unit Citation, 12 service stripes, and others.

5. Providing for the inclusion of livestock and poultry with farm products as exempt from taxation.

6. Authorizing a political subdivision to provide property tax relief for owners of residence homesteads and changing certain property tax administrative procedures.

7. Authorizing the issuance of additional bonds to finance the veterans' aid program and to increase the maximum interest rate allowable on veterans land fund bonds.

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Mountaineers Win 14-0 For First Zone Victory

The Santa Anna Mountaineers changed their luck last week when they won their game over the Irion County team Friday night at Mertzon. It was Santa Anna's second victory of the season and their first conference win.

The Mountaineers scored once in each of the first two quarters, holding the Irion County team scoreless for the 14-0 victory.

Santa Anna turned in a solid defensive performance, with Charlie Lewis named as outstanding on defense.

Albert Collins scored the first touchdown on a 52-yard drive, adding the extra point with his

kick. The team scored in the second quarter when Ernest DeLeon went over from the five. Collins added the extra point.

Collins led the team with 128 yards on 19 carries, while DeLeon had 92 yards on 23 carries. Santa Anna led 17-4 in first downs, and held the Mertzon team to only 32 yards rushing. The Mountaineers had only one penalty for five yards, and lost one fumble.

The Mountaineers will host the strong Cross Plains team Friday night at Mountaineer Stadium at 7:30 p.m. for the last home game of the season.

WTU Seeks Rate Increase For Rural Electric Co-ops

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for a change in wholesale rates for electric service it supplies to 14 rural electric cooperatives, one municipality and one investor-owned

distribution company.

In its filing Friday, October 16, with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in Washington, WTU estimated the new rates will produce about \$4.3 million in additional revenue for the company during the 1982 calendar year. This amounts to an increase of approximately 10 percent from these wholesale customers.

WTU requested that the new rates become effective on December 15. The present rates have been in effect since June 1980. WTU also proposes to change to a fuel adjustment clause similar to the one applied to its retail customers. No other major changes were proposed.

WTU officials said the rate change is necessary to bring the Company's earnings on sales to wholesale customers to a level that will help WTU maintain a sound financial condition and attract new capital for growth required to meet future needs of electric customers. The previous wholesale rate increase proved insufficient because of inflation, higher than anticipated interest rates, and the delay in making the rates effective.

Wholesale customers to be affected by the filing include Coleman County Electric Cooperative, Inc. that serves Coleman County and parts of several surrounding counties. Others are Concho Valley Electric Cooperative, Inc. to the west, McCulloch Electric Cooperative, Inc. to the south, and others in the farther reaches of the WTU service area.

The Santa Anna School Board of Trustees had a long agenda for the Tuesday, October 13, meeting. Jay Weathers, president, led the session at the school business office.

The monthly financial report was presented, and bills and accounts for the month were reviewed and approved for payment.

Three teachers, Joan Jones, Gail Loyd and Becky Martin, met with the board to present recommendations for a new curriculum plan to be used in Texas Schools starting next year. The program for continuity of curriculum was the topic of a recent workshop attended by the local teachers.

Supt. R. C. Smith distributed copies of Senate Bill 314 concerning term contract renewals for teachers that has been approved.

The Board voted to have the roof of the elementary school repaired, and to select a new contractor for the paving project at the gymnasium and new tennis courts.

Also approved were repairs for the air conditioning - heating units in the high school building and purchase and installation of a new door for the storage area at the show barn.

The 1981 tax roll was approved by the Board.

The next meeting of the group will be Tuesday, November 10.

El Paso Elementary School Named for S-Anna Native

A Santa Anna native who started a career in education in 1940, was honored October 15 in El Paso when an elementary school was named in his honor.

Hibbard G. Polk, who retired this year as associate superintendent of the El Paso Independent School District, was honored by trustees of the district at the recent program. He was cited for his 41 years of service to the district as one of the most loved and respected educators.

Mr. Polk, the son of the late E. E. and Mayme Baxter Polk, was born in Santa Anna and lived here with the family who were in business. The late E. E. Polk was a former Mayor of Santa Anna.

A graduate of Hardin Simmons University, Polk began his teaching career in El Paso in 1940. After returning from service in World War II, Polk resumed teaching and became a

counselor. He was named principal of an elementary school in 1948, and was named personnel director for the entire school district, holding that position until 1964.

He also served as the director of secondary education, assistant superintendent for instruction, and associate superintendent, administration. He had held the deputy superintendent post since 1978. He was honored as administrator of the year in 1975.

Mr. Polk was sitting in the audience with his family during the presentation, and received a standing ovation. He was also presented a portable typewriter as a retirement present from the district.

His son, Barnard, spoke for his father, who cannot speak because of throat cancer.

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Texas Farms Increasing As Nation's Total Drops

COLLEGE STATION— While the total number of farms in the United States continues to decline, Texas is bucking the trend.

The most significant reason for the increasing number of farms in Texas is the division of medium-sized farms in East Texas, according to Dr. William E. Black, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A relatively small portion of the total number of farms are now producing an increasingly larger share of agricultural products, according to Black.

According to the 1978 Census of Agriculture, about 2.8 percent of the Texas farms produced 60 percent of the value of farm cash receipts. This compares with about 2.8 percent of the U. S. farms producing about 36 percent of the nation's cash receipts from agriculture.

The U. S. Census Bureau defines a farm as 'any place from which \$1,000 or more worth of agricultural products were sold or normally would have been sold in the previous year.'

This general definition of a farm, which has been changed since the 1974 Census of Agriculture, is part of the reason for an increasing number of farms in Texas, adds Black. Along with this is the disappearance of medium-sized farms.

In West Texas, medium farms are being consolidated to form bigger, more profitable farms, Black said. But in East Texas, medium farms are being sub-

divided into smaller farms to be used as weekend retreats for folks who have to live and work in the city during the week.

In 1974 there were about 174,000 farms in Texas, and in 1978 the number had increased to 194,253, according to Census Bureau figures. During the same period, the number of U. S. farms declined.

Technical advances since the 50s, market pressures and growth in nonfarm employment in rural communities are three reasons for the overall decline of the nation's farms.

Hunting Prospects Bright This Year

AUSTIN— Prospects are excellent across most of Texas for the upcoming hunting seasons, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists.

Favorable weather conditions with plenty of rain during the first half of 1981 boosted populations of deer, turkey and quail. Biologists said turkey and quail made the most immediate progress, with reproduction and survival rates good enough to prompt rosy predictions for the hunting seasons. Deer also are in excellent shape, but herds in some areas still are down somewhat in population after last year's severe drought, particularly in western portions of South Texas. The deer and turkey season in most Texas counties opens November 14.

Throughout most of the traditional deer range, hunters may see slightly fewer bucks than in recent years, but there should be higher percentage of trophy-quality racks than normal in the herds.

One of the most outstanding production years for wild turkey occurred in 1981, and the 1982 season should also be a great one.

In the Rolling Plains area centered around Abilene, San Angelo and Big Spring, the deer counts are up this year. Range conditions were dry during August but are now very good. Turkey and quail hunters should also do well.

Hosch Furniture Donates Chair To S.A. Library

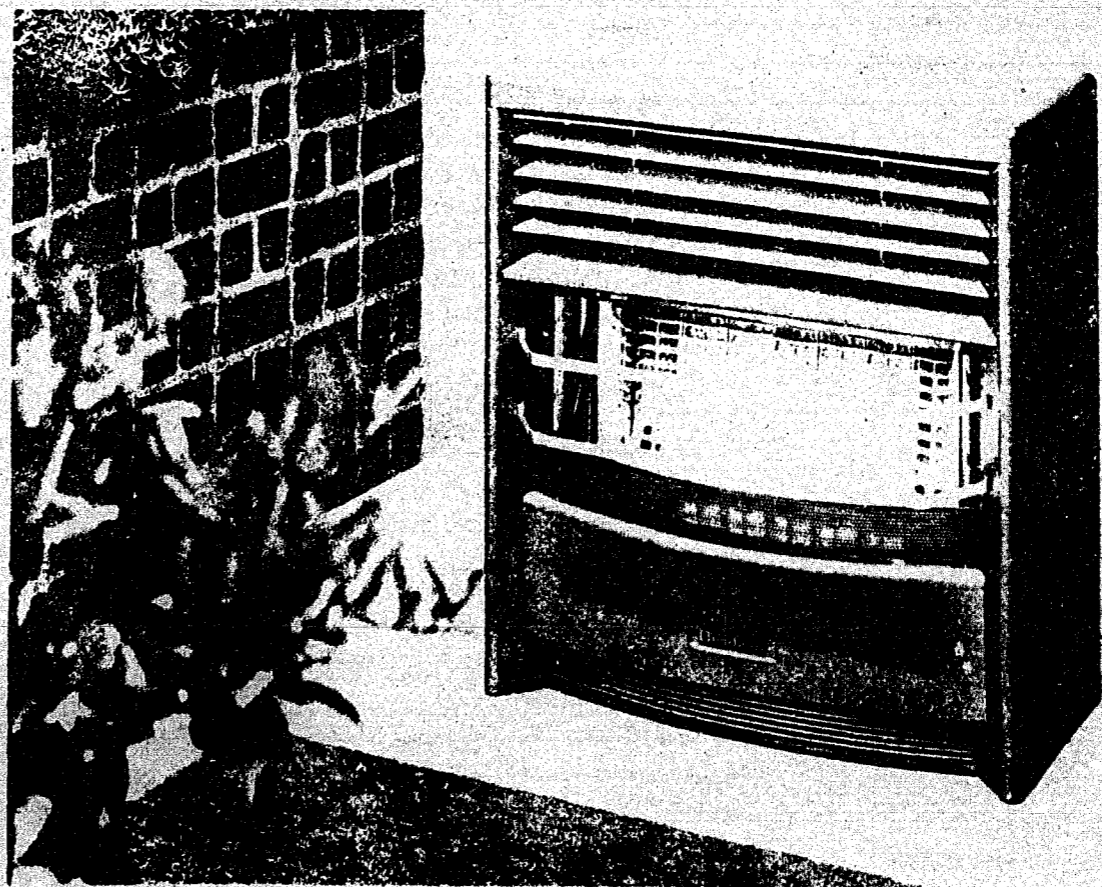

Rockwood School Closed After 80 Years of Service

The Rockwood Schools were of importance to the community for over 80 years, but as many other community schools, they have ceased operation.

Students from the Rockwood area now arrive by bus at the Santa Anna Schools, the arrangement since 1955.

The Rockwood School District consolidated with Santa Anna in 1957.

The Rockwood Schools were started in the 1880s, according to Gladys Hunter in her book, (Discord, Texas on Camp Creek.) At their peak, there were 225 students in the school and a faculty of eight.

For some time students attended through the tenth grade at Rockwood, then attended their final year in Santa Anna. Later the entire high school education was available at Rockwood, with classes graduating through the early 1940s. At that time high school students transferred to Santa Anna. For 13 years only the elementary school was in operation there.

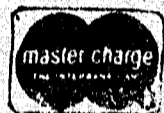

Dawson is a former student at Santa Anna High School, entering the Army early last summer.

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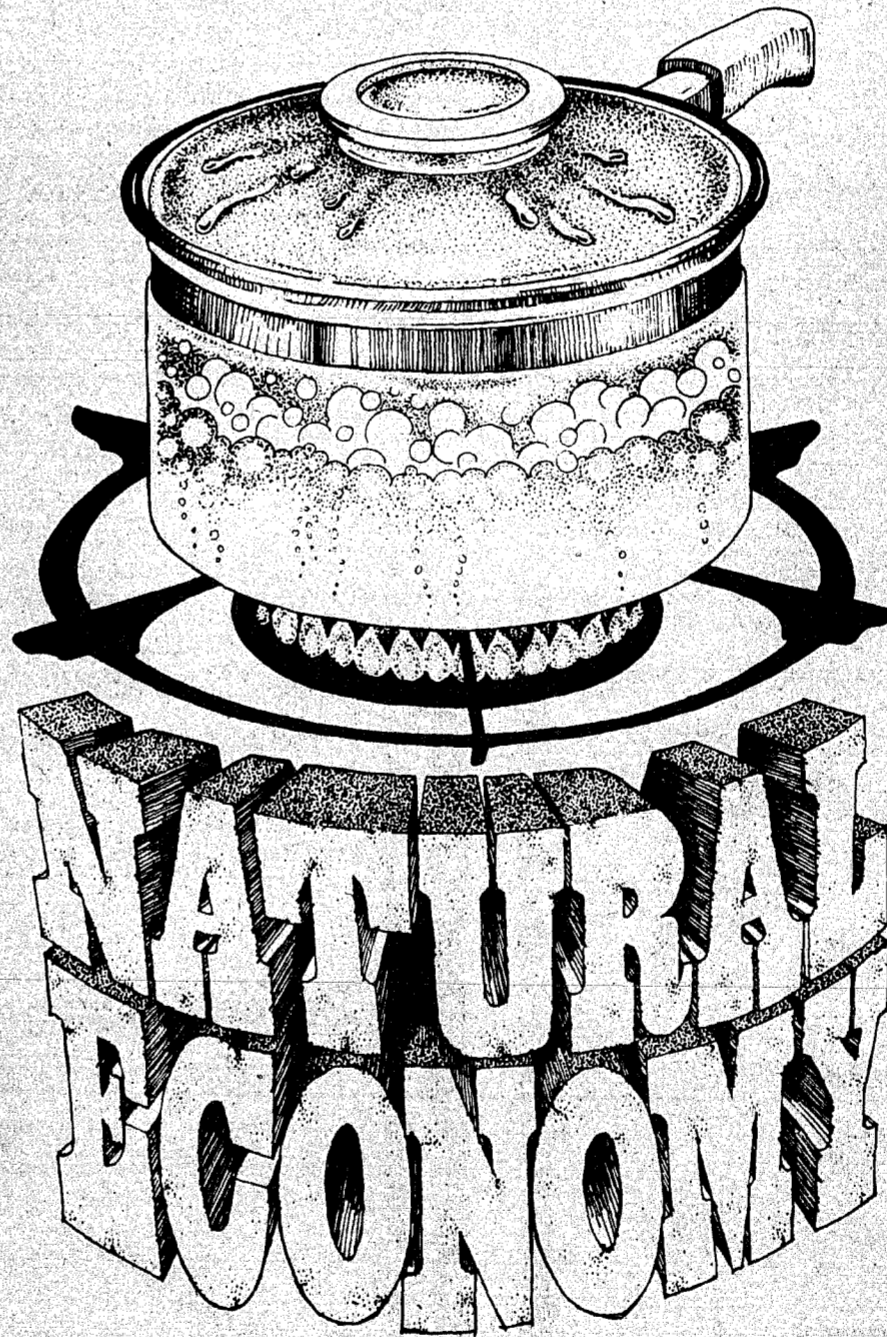
