Surplus Cheese Available Here

Five-pound Packages Available To Lower Income Families

Surplus government cheese, packaged in five pound packages, will be distributed in Santa Anna Friday, January 8, at the Chamber of Commerce office. Short, simple application forms will be signed at the time the cheese is picked up.

The cheese was released for distribution by the Human Resources Agency in Fort Worth and is a surplus from the school lunch programs and other institutions that use the American processed cheese.

Gladys Barnes, chairman of the Agency on Aging in Santa Anna, will be in charge of the distribution tomorrow from 9 to 12 a.m. The cheese will be handed out on the basis of one package per family.

Families with an income of \$750 per month or less will be eligible, as well as large families

who have food stamp eligibility or aid to dependent children. This also includes Social Security recipients in the lower income brackets and others of low income.

Persons who are unable to get to the local office Friday morning

may send a representative to pick it up and sign the application form.

As many as 50 five-pound packages will be available here, the allocation being part of the cheese received in Coleman for county distribution.

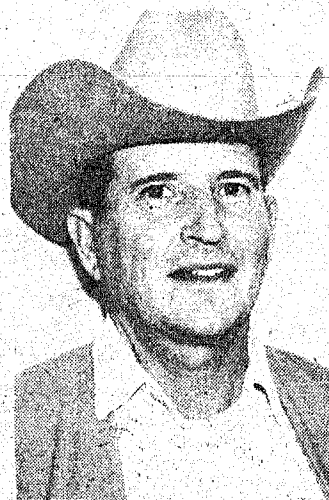
County Incumbents Seek Re-election

SAHS Student Selected For National Band Group

Teresa L. Rolfe, a senior at Santa Anna High School, has been accepted for membership in the United States Collegiate Wind Band, a highly selective musical organization which will make a concert tour of England and seven European countries next July and August. Teresa is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Rolfe Jr. and plays trumpet in the Santa Anna Mountaineer Band, directed by Denise Wiltrip.

The invitation to tour with the group was received from Prof. A. G. Wright, director of bands emeritus at Purdue University at Lafayette, Indiana, and conductor of all eleven of the previous United States Collegiate Wind Band tours since they started in 1977. Associate conductor of the group is Gladys Sime Wright, founding president of the Women Band Directors National Association.

The honor band will travel three weeks in England, France, Germany, Austria, Italy, Holland and Switzerland. Among the cities in which concerts will be performed are London, Lugano, Salzburg, Innsbruck, Lugano, Berchtesgarden, Chaux-de-Fonds, Munich, Andermatt, Verona, Cologne, Milan and Heidelberg.

The group will assemble in New York City for rehearsals prior to their departure on July 13. While in New York City the band will play invitational concerts there.

Members of the 100-piece band are chosen from over the entire United States, with students from 47 of the 50 states participating in last year's tour. Acceptance for membership in the highly talented group of student musicians is considered a musical honor of national importance.

In order to make the trip, Teresa will have to raise \$1,700 for her share of expenses, and she plans to conduct bake sales and other fund-raising events to make the money. Directors of the sponsoring group have suggested townspeople assist by donating money in any amount to make the trip possible. Donations of any size will be welcomed, with a fund to be set up at Santa Anna National Bank. \$45 is needed by February 15 as a deposit in the trip.

If the trip is canceled or Teresa cannot go on the tour, all funds will be returned to the donors.

All members of the chapter are urged to attend the Monday night meeting.

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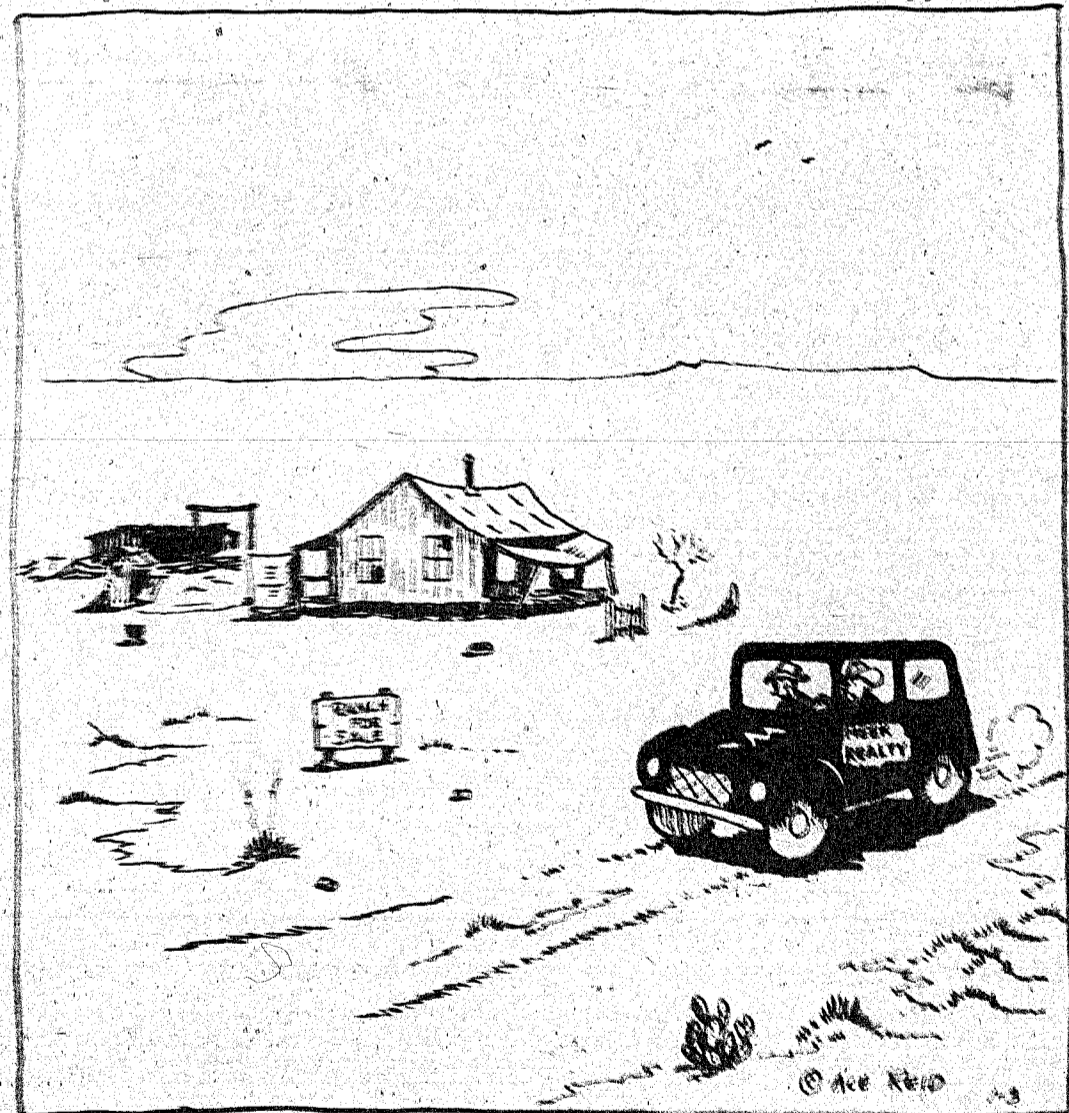

U.S. Department of Agriculture

Farm land values continue to rise. Last year they moved up from \$525 to \$609 per acre nationally. When you consider they were averaging only \$469 per acre two years ago, that's a 16 percent increase in just one year, 30 percent over two years. Ten years ago, that national average was \$188 per acre.

year earlier, a nearly 50 percent increase over two years ago. West Virginia farm land prices averaged \$555 by the end of last year. That's up 17 percent from just a year earlier.

Ten years earlier the price of farm land averaged \$221 per acre in Mississippi, \$168 per acre in Idaho, \$67 in Arizona, \$302 in Louisiana and \$127 in West Virginia.

Cut The Cost of Colds



The common cold not only has a tremendous impact on the national economy but on the individual consumer's pocketbook as well, says Dr. George Goldstein, medical director of Winthrop Laboratories, Div. of Sterling Drug Inc., here. Citing data developed by government agencies, epidemiological scientists, and medical and pharmaceutical associations, he points out that in the average year some 90 million men, women, and children — nearly half the total U.S. population — come down with about 90 million colds.

time and to the consumer in cold remedies and medical expense amounts to a huge \$5 billion a year, Dr. Goldstein noted. Of this amount, consumers spent \$735 million, in 1980 alone, on nonprescription drugs for the temporary relief of cold symptoms.

"Many physicians favor initial home treatment of mild to moderate colds and advise seeking professional help when high fever persists or the cold seems to be getting worse (i.e., fever has returned after a normal period) instead of better," Dr. Goldstein said.

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At a called meeting of the Board of Education October 4, the following plan was adopted by which delinquent school taxes in the Santa Anna Independent school district may be paid. The plan has a two-fold purpose, first to encourage payment of delinquent taxes so that our schools will be able to meet their obligations, and second, to make the burden as light upon those indebted to the school district as possible.

Those paying as much as 20 percent of the total delinquency by November 15, 1933, will have all penalties and interest waived. The second installment of the total delinquency will be due July

1, 1934, and the third installment will be payable November 15, 1934. Not less than 20 percent can be paid at each time, with the final installments in July and November of 1935.

Treatment Eases Pain Of Crippling Arthritis

Arthritis is a general word that includes several different but related illnesses. It comes from "arthros," meaning joint, and "itis," meaning inflammation.

The American Medical Association reminds that the most common forms are rheumatoid arthritis and osteoarthritis. They are different ailments, but each produces painful, deformed joints.

Rheumatoid arthritis is a disease of the whole body. Three times more common in women than in men, it usually begins between the years of 20 and 35. Early symptoms may include weakness, fever, loss of appetite and loss of weight. The skin, especially the hands, may be cold and clammy. Mental depression is common, and the patient both feels and looks below par. One or more joints become inflamed and swollen.

An attack may begin with a gradually increasing discomfort, or a sudden, dramatic, confining illness. Or anything in between. Attacks may come and go for no apparent reason.

Treatment reduces the pain of an acute attack and usually increases the range of motion. But treatment does not cure. There is no cure. Often an attack of pain in the joint will subside by itself. It usually returns. The quack capitalizes on this tendency of the disease to fluctuate. He claims credit for the treatment



being used at the time of natural remission.

Osteoarthritis is a quieter, less dramatic illness. However, when it does develop in a joint it is less likely to go away. Eventually the joint is injured, the smooth lining membrane and the cartilage pads are damaged and permanent changes within the joint limit its motion and make any motion painful.

Everyone will develop osteoarthritis if he or she lives long enough. It begins in middle age, usually in a hip, knee, shoulder or in the back. Often it is first noticed after an injury to a joint.

Management of arthritis involves skilled medical supervision over a lifetime. The physician individualizes the treatment. Drugs may be prescribed to reduce pain and inflammation. Exercise and physical therapy may be recommended. Weight control may be necessary. An arthritic patient often must learn new ways to do common daily tasks. Rest is essential at all times.

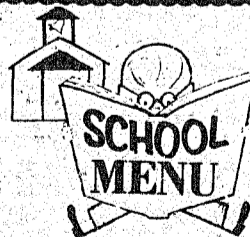

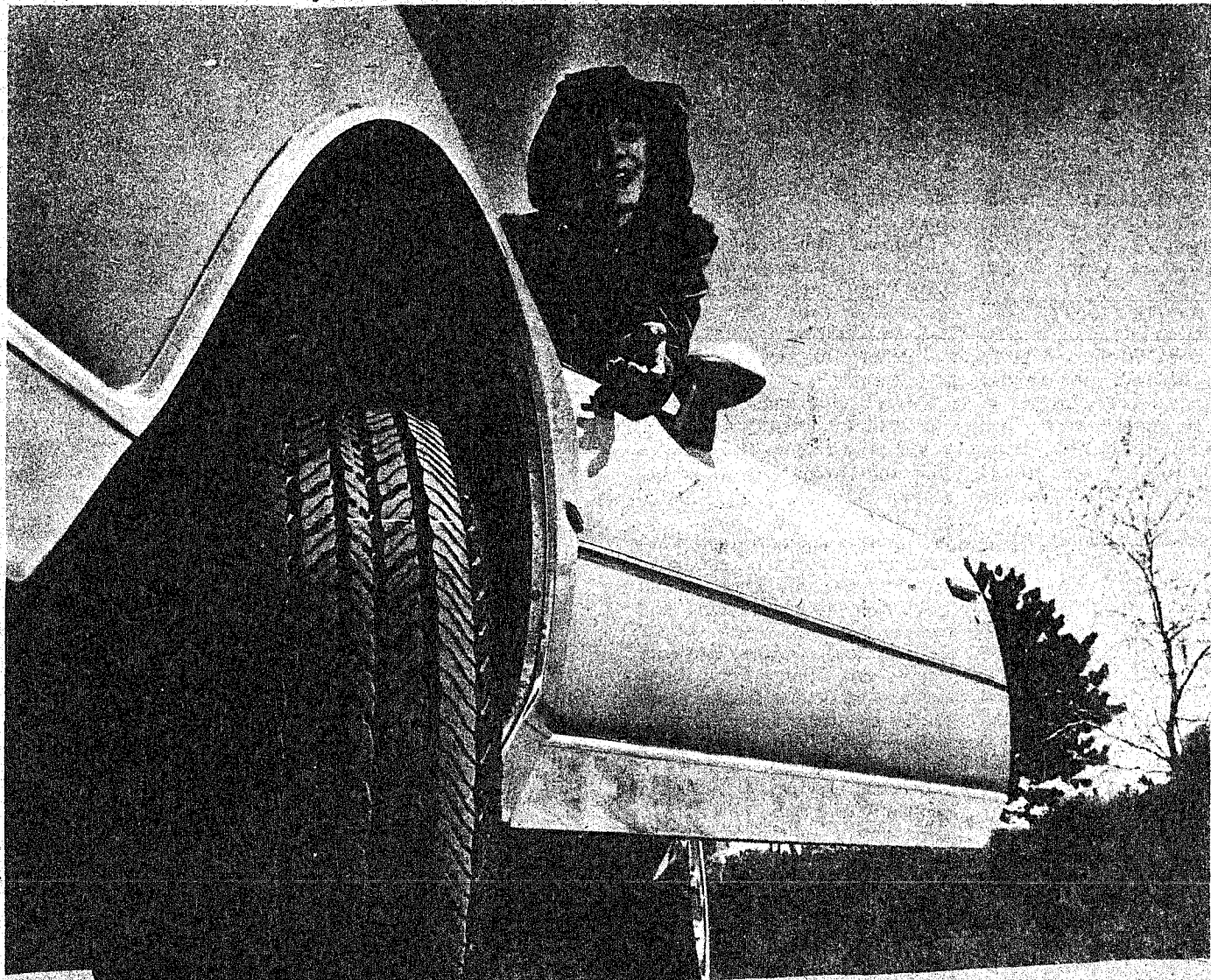

Medicare Deductible Up From 1981 Requirement

The Medicare hospital insurance deductible, the amount a Medicare patient is responsible for when he or she first received hospital inpatient services in a benefit period, will increase to \$260 in 1982, Priscilla Tercero Social Security branch manager in Brownwood, said recently. The 1981 deductible was \$204.

Also scheduled to increase are the per-day amounts patients are responsible for after specified lengths of stay in a hospital or skilled nursing facility, Tercero said.

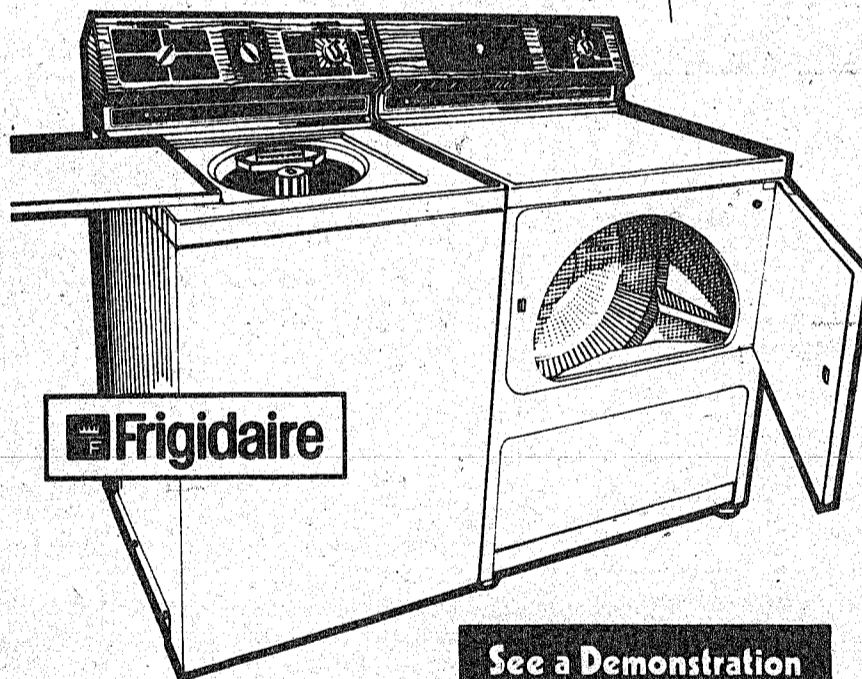
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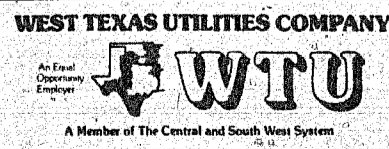

Accent On Health

Texas Department of Health

The increase of 17 and 18-year-old girls smoking cigarettes coupled with the increase of teenage pregnancies, could lead to more health problems in Texas since smoking presents increased risks for pregnant women.

That's the opinion of Dr. Walter P. Peter Jr., Chief of the Bureau of Maternal and Child Health, Texas Department of Health.

According to information from the American Cancer Society, smoking is increasing faster among teenage girls than among teenage boys. Dr. Peter said. More boys actually smoke, but their percentage has remained fairly constant at around 30 percent, whereas 27 percent of the girls now smoke as compared to 22 percent in 1969.

Dr. Peter said approximately 1.5 million teenagers live in Texas. He said it is estimated from national surveys that 180,000 of these teenagers are unmarried, sexually active 15 to 19-year-olds at risk of pregnancy. In 1979 Texas teenagers gave birth to 47,764 infants, compared to 50,097 in 1980.

"Teenage mothers give birth to a high percentage of premature and low weight babies," Dr. Peter explained. "Smoking during pregnancy is associated with low birth weight babies, shortened gestations, and more frequent spontaneous abortions. So, we really have a compounded health problem."

Dr. Peter said the carbon monoxide in cigarette smoke not only gets into mother's blood, but travels across the placenta to limit the amount of oxygen available to the developing fetus.

He said chances are increased that a child will come down with pneumonia or bronchitis in the first year of life if the mother smokes. Nicotine, a known toxic substance, is also

found in the breast milk of nursing mothers who smoke, he said.

In recent years, the proportion of female and male smokers has been declining. From 1970 to 1978, adult male smokers declined from 43.5 percent of the population to 37.4 percent, while women smokers decreased from 31.1 percent to 30.4 percent, an average decline of 3.2 percent for both sexes.

The Texas Department of Health's LIFE Program addresses the need to stop smoking. "We focus on smoking as a major risk factor in chronic disease," says Roger Diamond, administrator of the LIFE Program.

"After completing Selected Risk Factor Questionnaires, smokers are referred to smoking cessation programs to help them kick the habit," says Diamond.

Lawsuit Filed On Brady Creek After Fish Kill

BRADY—A Brady area firm has been cited in State District Court here for a pollution incident last April that killed 55,000 fish in Brady Creek.

Chemists of the Texas Parks and wildlife Department and Texas Department of Water Resources officials investigated the kill and determined it was caused by a pipeline leak.

Parks and Wildlife Department chemists estimated the value of fish lost was \$14,562. Species and estimated numbers of fish killed were shad - 42,000; sunfish 12,000; crappie 500; channel catfish 300; carp 250; and bass 100.
