The 1982 school trustee election has been set Saturday, April 3, with Rose Bass to serve as election judge. Two trustees, Jay Weathers and Max Eubank, have terms that expire this year. Neither has indicated if they plan

to seek re-election.

At the Monday, February 8. meeting of the School Board, Weathers presided and all other members were present.

Bills and accounts for the month were reviewed for payment, with the largest items being utilities.

Phase 3 of the five-year accreditation process was approved. The local school district is in its third year of the curriculum

improvement project, emphasizing math and reading.

Contracts of High School Principal Gerald Brister and Elementary School Principal Charles Brewster were extended another year, giving them a two-year contract with the local school system. Also approved were contracts for the athletic coaches, Roger Goodwin, head coach, and Dean Bass and Barry Miles. Other faculty and staff contracts will be reviewed at the next meeting slated in March.

Leash Law To Be Enforced To Control Stray Dogs

After trying other methods of controlling stray dogs in town, the City Council voted Thursday, February 4, in regular session to enforce a leash law in the town.

All dogs in town must be secured by a leash or confined within a penned yard. In addition to the leash law, all dogs must have a city tag and a rabies vaccination tag.

Dogs found running loose in town after March 3 will be impounded, with owners charged \$10 plus \$1 per day the animal is impounded. The dogs must also get their city tag and rabies vaccination before being released.

Dogs with city licenses will be held six days before being disposed of. Unlicensed dogs will be held only three days before being destroyed.

City residents are subject to up to \$200 fine for failure to observe the leash law.

The new regulation was made after the current method of controlling strays was found to be ineffective.





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Farm Bureau Week To Be Observed Here

February 15 - 20 has been designated as "Farm Bureau Week" in Coleman County by County Judge W. W. Skelton.

The week is part of a statewide observance during which county Farm Bureau groups will make a special effort to enroll new members, according to Victor Cardinas of Coleman, president of the Coleman County group.

The official county proclamation calls American agriculture "the producing marvel of the world," and adds that one farm worker now produces enough food for 68 people. "Because of this," the proclamation said, 'the average American family spends less than one-fifth of its income for food."

The proclamation continues by saying that "four out of five producers are voluntary members of Farm Bureau" and through that organization, they "work to build a better social and economic life for themselves.'

Cardinas said that Farm Bureau will continue to represent interests of farmers and ranchers in Austin and in Washington, D. C. Among Farm Bureau policies implemented last year was the state constitutional amendment exempting livestock and poultry from ad valorem taxation.

The county leader said the organization also favored spending and tax cuts that were passed by Congress last year.

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

FmHA Assists Farmers With Financial Problems

(Temple, T. xas), Feb. 3 --Although many farmers are facing financial. fficulty because of today's cost-price squeeze, the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) intends to do all it can to help its borrowers stay in farming, FmHA tate Director J. Lynn Futch said oday.

"We recognize there are problems, problems with high interest rates, inflation, a grain embargo, adverse weather and other causes," Futch said. "And these have been intensified by overall bumper crops that have affected prices."

"As Secretary of Agriculture John Block said recently, our farm economy is in a valley right now and needs some help to move on up the hill on the other side."

Futch said Block had instructed FmHA to explore the use of private credit to supplement its own lending resources whenever possible. In addition, existing legal authority to reschedule or defer payments is to be used


where practicable.

"We intend to be reasonable, just as Secretary Block ordered.' Futch said. "Our objective is to keep farmers in business. That isn't to say there won't be some who go out of business, because there will be, but we are going to use the best judgement we can and reasonable criteria in making our loan decisions."

Secretary Block said that borrowers who have made good faith efforts to pay their loans, who have maintained their loan security in good condition, who follow sound, recognized management practices, and who have a resonable chance to succeed can reasonably expect FmHA to stay with them.

"We will be working with our Beef Producers borrowers and with the commercial lending institutions to overcome these temporary prob. Program Set lems," Futch said. "Agriculture is basically healthy, just as the Secretary said; there is no question about it. We just have to move out of the present situation and dig in for the long run."

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Former Area Pastor Feted In San Angelo Recently

A former Coleman County minister, Ray M. Sparks, was honored January 17 in San Angelo on his 70 years in the ministry. The special service was held at Lindell Avenue Baptist Church where Sparks is now an active member.

Friends and family members were also on hand for a reception in his honor following the evening service at which he was speaker.

Born near Talpa October 21, 1893, he was the son of John R. and Mary Berta (Keeling) Sparks. His maternal grand-father, John Crumpler Averitt, was an early-day preacher and educator, founding a number of area Baptist churches including Santa Anna First Baptist Church.

Sparks entered the ministry in 1912 while still in high school, serving at times as supply pastor at Gouldbusk and Valera. Other churches in which he preached were Grape Creek, Herring and Spring Creek. He taught school to supplement the small income from the ministry, with his first school located at Duck Creek, between Millersview and Paint Rock in 1913-14.

He married Lillian Pauline Matthews of Talpa in 1915.

While attending college in 1917, he assumed the pastorate of the Eureka Baptist Church, northeast of Santa Anna, serving as pastor for eight months. He also pastored churches at Camp Colorado, Voss, Rocky Creek and Burkett.

He was pastor of Central Baptist Church in Coleman in 1926, then moved with his family to Blanket where he taught school and preached.

Among his other pastorates, he was supply pastor at Rockwood for awhile.

In 1945 Sparks became pastor at Hillcrest Baptist Church in San Angelo, moving to Silver in 1949 where he was pastor until his retirement in 1958. Not content with complete retirement, Sparks continued to serve as supply pastor and interim pastor at a number of churches in the San Angelo area.

In a recent story in San Angelo Standard Times, Sparks recalled some incidents during his early ministry. "They's pay me just three or four dollars, but sometimes they'd just give me a sack of oats for my horse," he recalled.

Sparks, now 89, preached his first sermon at Immanuel Baptist Church at Talpa. His memories of the rural congregations contrast sharply with today's "electronic" churches. Some are on the right track, but a lot don't tie people to an organization. They detract from the glory of the Lord, Sparks thinks, in reference

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

They are easy to identify as they are all quite beautiful. I don't know any who chew tobacco. Should you lose one, don't worry, come soap opera time she will show up.



If you want a job done right just ask a farm wife. Each is equipped

with a typical set of tools, such as a hammer with one claw broken off, a pair of pliers with the jaws worn smooth, a screw driver with a rounded head, one very dull pair of wire cutters, and an unlimited supply of washers, screws, nails and bolts that she found in the washing machine after she did the laundry. One fellow told me his wife could take a tube of calking compound and a roll of tape and stop Niagara

Being married to a farmer is one of the most rewarding jobs found anywhere, and along with the hard work goes a lot of fun. Sure, we tell it pretty bad about all the jobs we have to help do. you know we wouldn't dream of stretching the truth any. As for spoiling our men by taking snacks to the field, we really have an ulterior motive. When they plow fourteen or fifteen hours a day, that's the only time we get to see them. Are you wondering why they work fourteen and fifteen hours a day? For us!

Misuse of S-Security Cards Now Considered a Felony

Stricter laws regarding the misuse of Social Security numbers and cards are now in effect, according to Priscilla Tercero, manager of the Brownwood Social Security office.

A law signed by President Reagan in late December 1981 provides criminal penalties for (1.) using a Social Security card obtained with false information, (2.) using someone else's Social Security number, (3.) buying, selling or counterfeiting Social Security cards, or (4.) possessing a regular or counterfeit card with intent to sell or alter it.

An unlawful act affecting the Social Security card or number is now considered a felony, rather than a misdeameanor, added Tercero.

Beat cholesterol by exercising instead of dieting

COLLEGE STATION —
The author of a controversial scientific study on heart disease suggests that Americans "get off their butts, out from in front of the television and exercise" rather than worry about limiting the intake of fat in their diets.

In a guest lecture at Texas A&M University, Dr. Robert Olson, chairman of the medical school at St. Louis University and president of the American Institute of Nutrition, said the amount of fatty cholesterol eaten by Americans was not an important factor in controlling the levels of cholesterol in the blood, believed to be the cause of clogged arteries.

Olson said the causes of cardiovascular disease, the nation's leading killer, are not clearly known "despite what appears in ladies' magazines and the utterances of the American Heart Association." a fine of up to \$5,000 or a prison term of up to five years or both.

An 18-year-old man from San Angelo died Wednesday, February 3, as a result of injuries he received in an accident near Santa Anna.
