Funeral services were held at Bangs First Baptist Church Monday for W. T. Hays Jr., 67, former publisher of The Santa Anna News and a long-time civic leader of Bangs. Mr. Hays died in Brownwood Regional Hospital

Broken Water Line Disrupts Service

Residents in most of the town were without water Wednesday when a break near the pump station at Lake Brownwood caused all the water to drain from the storage tank on top of the east mountain. The break occurred during the night Tuesday, and residents arose to find only air in their water lines.

Although work is still underway to repair the break in a concrete line at Lake Brownwood, an emergency system went into operation to pump water from the Santa Anna City Lake for town consumption.

Dispite the inconvenience of the day, there were no fires or other major mishaps .

Funeral services were held at early Sunday, January 24, after a angs First Baptist Church five-month illness.

A native of Montague, he was born February 26, 1914 and attended school in Saint Jo and Bowie. He moved to Bangs in 1964 where he purchased an interest in the Brown County Gazette from the late Forrest Kyle, later becoming the sole owner of the publication. In 1969 he bought The Santa Anna News, operating both publications until July 1979 when he sold them to Woodson Newspapers, Inc. of Brownwood. He continued in business here with Hays Printing Co.

A veteran of the newspaper business, he had worked with publications in Texas and Oklahoma and from 1950 to 1962 was superintendent of the composing room for the student publications at the University of Texas at Austin. He was a U. S. Army veteran.

Besides his active business career, Hays was a former member of Bangs City Council and director of First State Bank of Bangs. He was serving as a Trustee of Bangs Independent School District at the time of his death, and was a member of the Bangs Masonic Lodge and Bangs Lions Club.



County Stock Show Auction Sets Another Record in '82

An all-time record was set at the Coleman Livestock Show auction last week, with a total of \$78,625.66 paid to Coleman County 4-H and FFA members for their livestock. The sale figure was \$16,000 above the 1981 total for the lambs, hogs, steers, rabbits and chickens.

The annual sale was held at Coleman Livestock Auction Co. to climax the county show, with hogs averaging \$1.51 per pound; steers averaging \$1.00 per pound; lambs averaging \$3.04; rabbits averaging over \$99 per pen; and chickens averaging over \$97 for each pen.

Wayne McClure was sale chairman, serving on the stock show committee of the Breeder-Feeder Association which sponssors the show each year.

Granddaughter of Former S-Annan **Dies in Plane Crash**


Word was received here this week of the death of Sheila Tarrant, 36, the granddaughter of Mrs. H. L. Zachary, formerly of Santa Anna.





The Mountaineers, coached by Charles Brewster, have a 19 - 4 record and are seeking the District Championship again this


season.

A total of \$30,000 was awarded to Mrs. Ruth Jones of Brownwood last week in a jury trial in Judge Gordon Griffin's 35th District Court in Brownwood. The suit involved selling brucellosis-infected cattle to Mrs. Jones. She specified she wanted brucellosis-free cattle.

The suit was brought by Mrs. Jones against Bill Stewart of Brownwood as well as Steve Kemp, Fort Worth, Virgil Mitchell and Dr. Bill Stevens of Palestine.

Mrs. Jones requested Stewart to buy the brucellosis free cattle. Kemp and Mitchell entered into contract to buy the cattle for Stewart to go to Mrs. Jones. The. cattle were purchased and tested at a sale in Palestine by Dr.

Jones received \$15,000 in damages, \$5,000 in court costs, and \$10,000 in punitive damages.

In testimony during the trial, it

was shown the cattle for Mrs. Jones had been exposed to cattle which were infected with brucellosis, and that additional testing revealed the cattle for Mrs. Jones were also infected with the disease

Brucellosis is a highly contagious disease of livestock which results in abortions and loss of milk. There is a cooperative federal-state program for control and eventual eradication of the disease in effect. The Texas Animal Health Commission administers the Texas Brucellosis program.

Of the \$20,000 in damages and court costs, Dr. Stevens was ordered to pay 15 percent or \$3,000. Kemp and Mitchell were ordered to pay 42.5 percent each of the \$20,000 as well as the \$10,000 in punitive damages.
