Cold Weather Postpones Last Week's Contests

The Santa Anna High School track meet was postponed last Saturday due to cold weather, and the meet has been rescheduled for Saturday of this week.

The track meet will be the first events on the newly completed Donham Memorial Track, a hard-surface track built with funds from the Booster Club and the school.

Teams from most of the

schools included in last week's events are expected to participate this week, and a few additional schools may take part. Coaches will meet at 8:30 a.m. for the "scratch meeting," with field events to begin at 9 a.m. Preliminaries in running events will start at 11 a.m.

There will be a one-hour break between the preliminaries and the finals, according to Roger Goodwin,

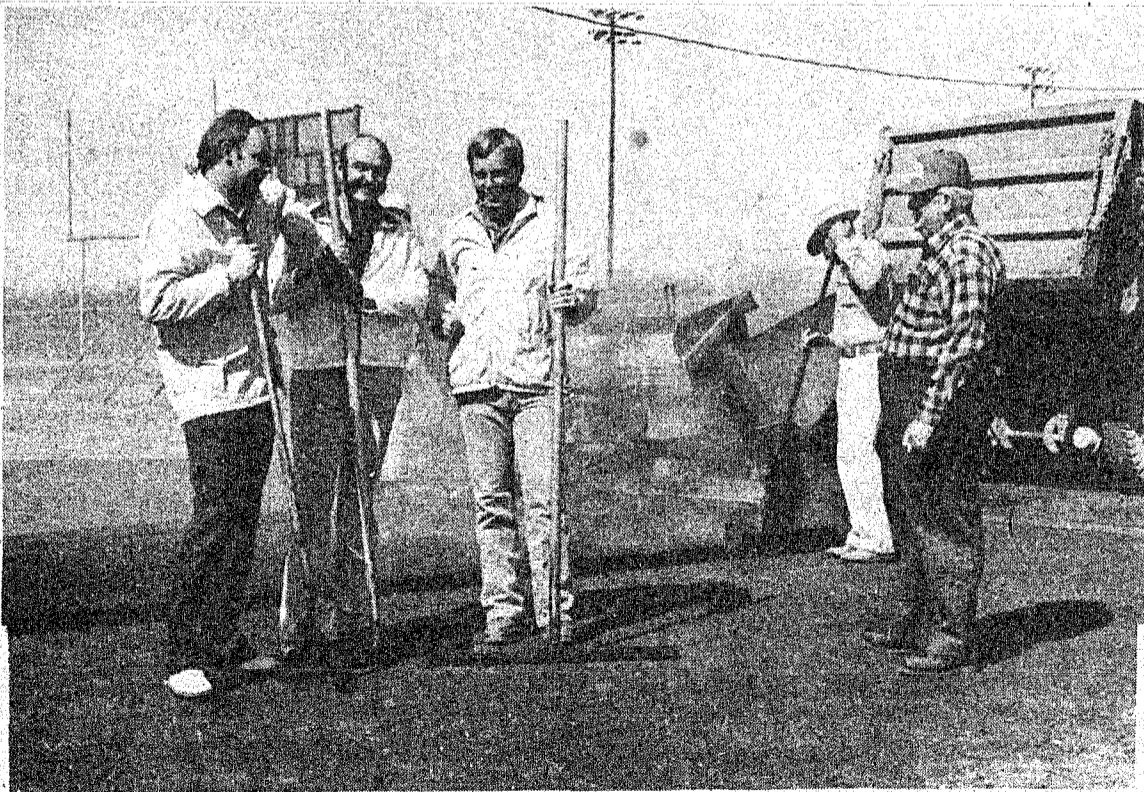
The ISD trustee election will be Saturday, April 3.

The dog leash law approved by City Council at the last session went into effect this week. Many local dogs were still running loose this week, ignoring their owners and not yet confined their animals as

A resident of Coleman County since 1955, he attended the Red Bank school and was a stock farmer and maintenance supervisor for the Santa Anna Housing Authority.

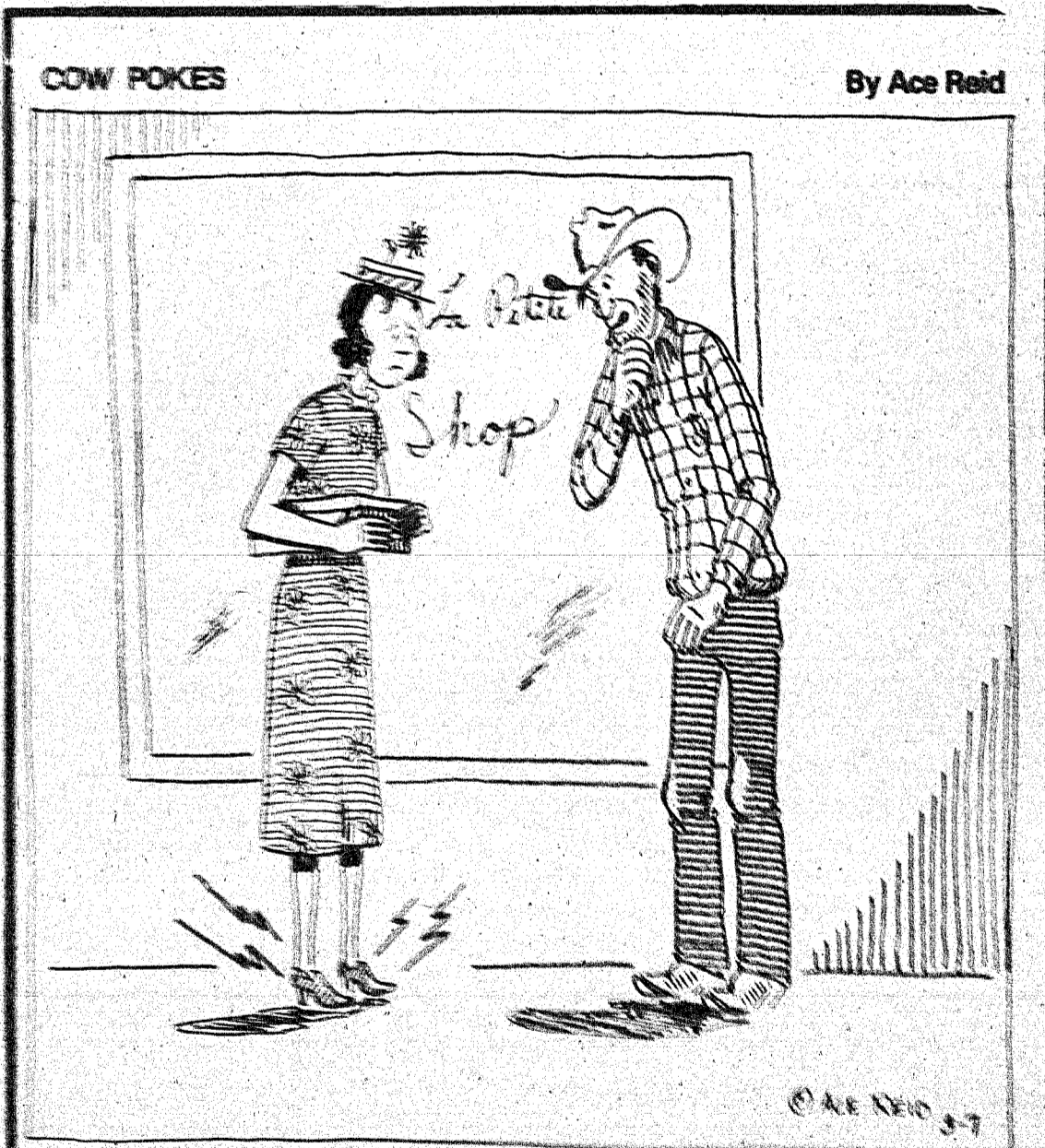

**Coleman County People Attend Abilene Meeting**

Several Coleman County people were in Abilene last week to meet with Congressman Charles Stenholm and other legislators concerning the agricultural situation. Also on hand for the breakfast meeting were Congressmen Pat Roberts of Kansas and Ed Jones of Tennessee.

Farmers and ranchers from District 17 discussed with the legislators the need to improve current prices for agricultural goods. The consensus at the close of the meeting was the need to reduce production.

Following the early session, about 300 people went to the

Abilene Civic Center for a hearing on agricultural credit. Another Texas legislator at the hearing was Rep. Kent Hance of Lubbock. Among the speakers at the hearing was Bill Sneed of First Coleman National Bank.

The meeting emphasized the seriousness of the agricultural credit situation and other problems relating to financing agriculture.

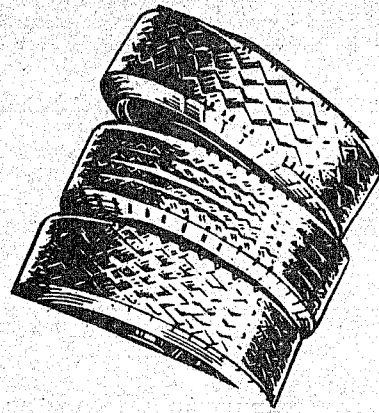

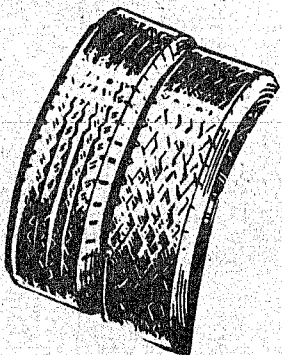

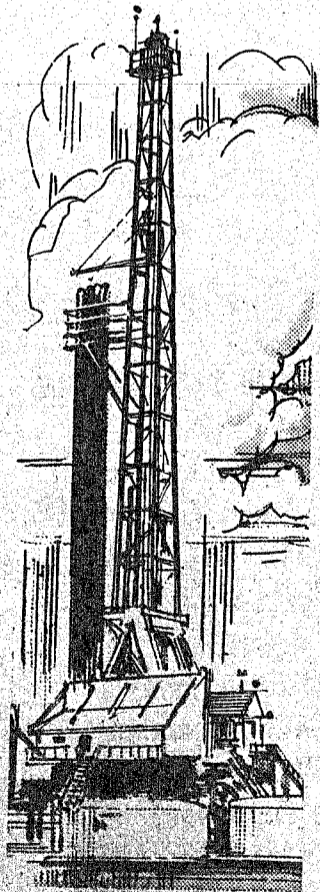

## Property Tax Board Assists With Information

AUSTIN—Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, announced a statewide effort to inform property owners in Texas of their rights and remedies as taxpayers.

"Major changes in the state's tax laws were effective January 1 with implementation of the new Texas Property Tax Code," Graeber said. Among the more significant provisions are those which:

- Establish a central appraisal district in each county which will value all property for tax purposes and provide that value to each taxing unit in the district;
- Provide a single board of equalization - which will be empowered to hear taxpayer appeals on a wide range of matters rather than just questions of value;
- Make it possible for taxpayers to file all exemption applications and property renditions with one office in a county rather than with multiple tax offices;
- Permit one-time applications

for homestead exemptions and open-space land valuation, rather than annual applications as previously required;

-Provide, for the first time in Texas, a method for taxpayers to limit property tax increase to eight percent annually through an initiative and referendum process applicable to all taxing units.

Coleman County is one of the state's 237 counties where the new appraisal district has been implemented. Seventeen counties have been granted delays until 1983 or 1984.

Renditions and exemption applications should be filed with the appraisal district's chief appraiser prior to May 1, Graeber said.

To call attention to available exemptions and tax administration procedures, Graeber noted that the State Board will be working with appraisal districts, local tax offices and the news media to help make Texans aware of changes in the law.

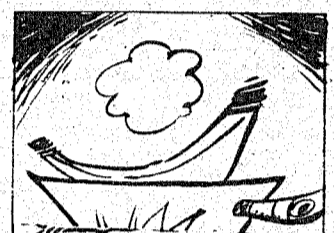
## Donations Sought For Viet Nam Memorial

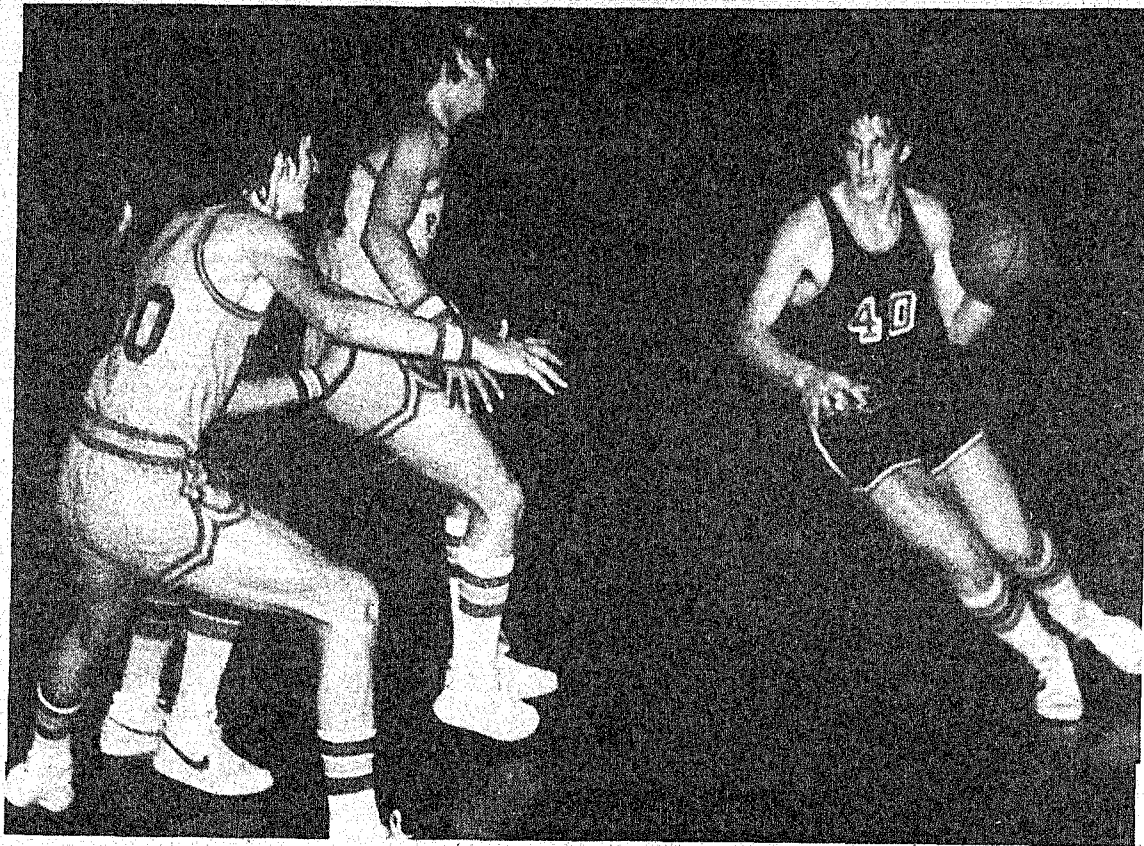

## Hunting Deaths, Former S.A. Coach Accidents Rise In Play-offs Again During 1981

AUSTIN— Fatal hunting accidents increased significantly during 1981 over the year before, according to hunter safety education officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Hunting mishaps took the lives of 19 persons, an increase of six over 1980. Officials recorded 72 accidents in 1981, three more than were reported in 1980.

Hunter Safety Education Coordinator Darrell Holt said 83 percent of the accidents involved persons between nine and 29 years of age.

Deer hunters were the most accident-prone during 1981, with 20 cases reported, seven of which involved self-inflicted injuries.

Only three of the victims of hunting accidents were wearing prominent bright colors in their clothing, and none had taken the department's hunter education safety course.

A total of 27 accidents was caused by errors in hunter judg-

# Visit to the Holy Land Related By Mrs. Hunter

Having just returned from a tour of the Holy Land, I'd like to give you some of the highlights of this most rewarding tour, if I may.

The theme of the whole tour was "Jesus, His Life, His Time, His Land, His Hebrew Faith." I feel the Bible doctrines, people, places, history, geography, life and society are among the most important background informations to enable readers to understand the Bible, in its cultural and geographical setting. All of this really makes the Bible come alive for you. It was a wonderful spiritual experience to walk where Jesus walked and lived with family and friends.

I joined the group at Fort Worth for the educational tour of the Holy Land, January 21, 1982. Our local guides were Dr. and Mrs. Henry Radde of the Arlington Heights Methodist Church. We visited Jordan, Israel and Egypt.

We spent the first night in Flushing, Long Island, New York due to weather conditions. We went to Brussels, Belgium for refueling, and landed at Amman, Jordan shortly after noon Saturday.

Amman, known earlier as the ancient city of Philadelphia, is a very large, busy city said to cover seven hills. It is an International airport.

On the complete tour we were taken to the best 5-star hotels, and the food was excellent, with Israeli breakfast in Tiberias and Jerusalem and continental breakfasts in other countries.

My first impression was a dry, hill country, with hills covered with small rocks and terraced with rocks. The countryside was covered with small, square, flat-topped houses, white, built of rock or concrete, no wood. The houses were built on the tops of the hills and down the hillsides to the very bottom. No spot was too small to be cultivated, growing vegetables.

Due to the delay in New York, we did not visit Paris, as we had looked forward to doing, but drove some 30 miles north into the hills of Gilead to visit the ruins of Jerash, an ancient city founded by Alexander the Great in 300 B.C. It is now the

best preserved of all the ruins. This region is in a volcanic area and excavations have revealed magnificent temples, large buildings and colonnaded streets.

We had no direct contact with the people as we left the hotel at 6:30 Sunday morning to drive to Mt. Nebo, in the mountains, where Moses saw the Promised Land, but was forbidden to enter it.

It was very cold and windy at the early hour. A chapel has been erected over the place, as with all important in Bible history..

As we left Amman, the ancient capitol of the Hashmite Kingdom of Jordan, a country ruled by a monarch who is a direct descendent of Mohammed the Prophet, we drove to Allen by Bridge to enter Israel. We saw lots of cultivated farm land.

In the time of Jesus there were no bridges on the Jordan River, and it is said He was baptised near this site.

After exchanging busses and guides, we went through customs and security checks. We saw but few soldiers, and they were very polite.

As we drove across the Jordan Valley, we saw acres of cultivated farms, fruit trees in bloom, banana plantations, avocados and oranges.

As we left the Moslem nation and enter Israel, I would like to tell you about the size of Palestine.

The name Palestine was applied early in the Christian era, derived from Philistines, who occupied the land before the Israelites were there.

The length of the country on west of Jordan, from Dan, in the extreme north to Beer-sheba in the south, is 144 miles. Breadth of the western division is 90 miles at Beer-sheba, becoming more narrow as you go north, 55 miles at Jerusalem, 40 miles at the Sea of Gallilee, and 25 miles farther north.

Eastern Palestine, across the Jordan, is about 150 miles in

length, north and south, and varies in breadth from 80 to 30 miles in the south. The West Bank is mainly Moslems with Jordan type houses. The Israelites are building big houses around Jerusalem to help keep it from being divided.

It was so exciting to be in Israel, to be where Jesus lived with his family and friends. I think the highlight of the tour was having communion services in the Garden of Gethsemane, conducted by our members, Dr. Henry Radde and Rev. Don Scott, and learning that Jesus taught so many places on the "other side of Jordan."

The story of Israel next.
