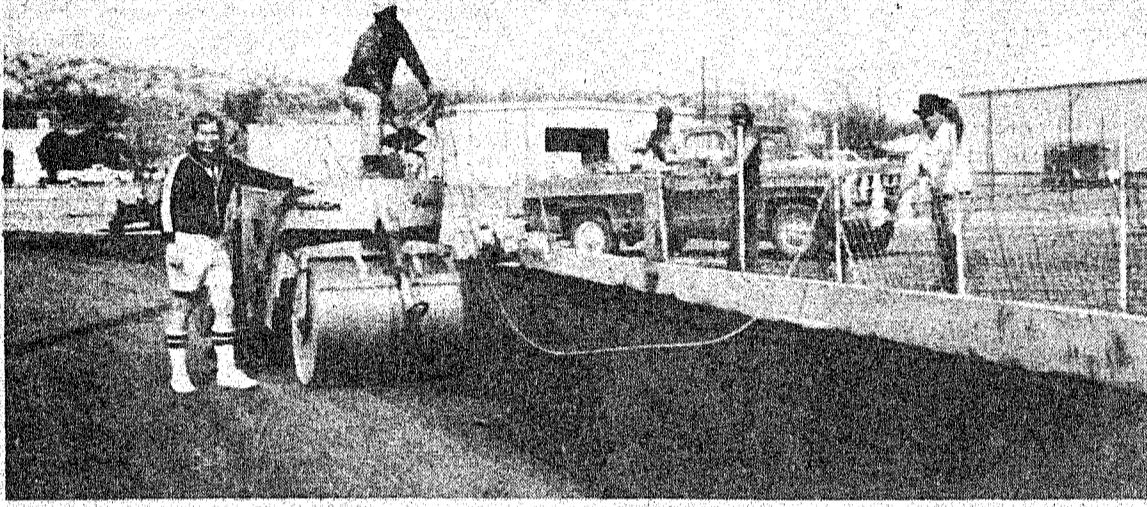

The Booster Club will operate the concession stand during the day, and members of the club and other volunteers will assist with the events.

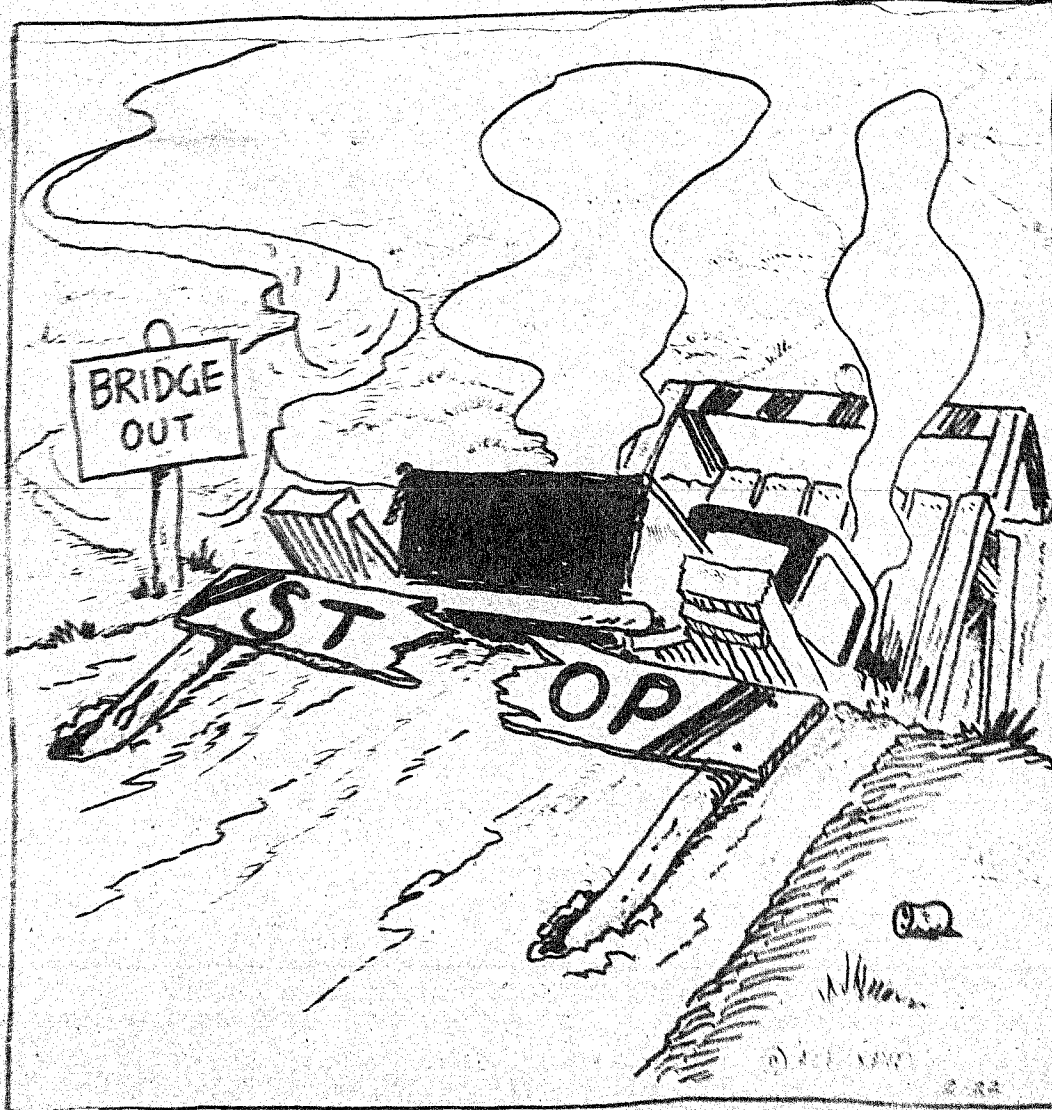

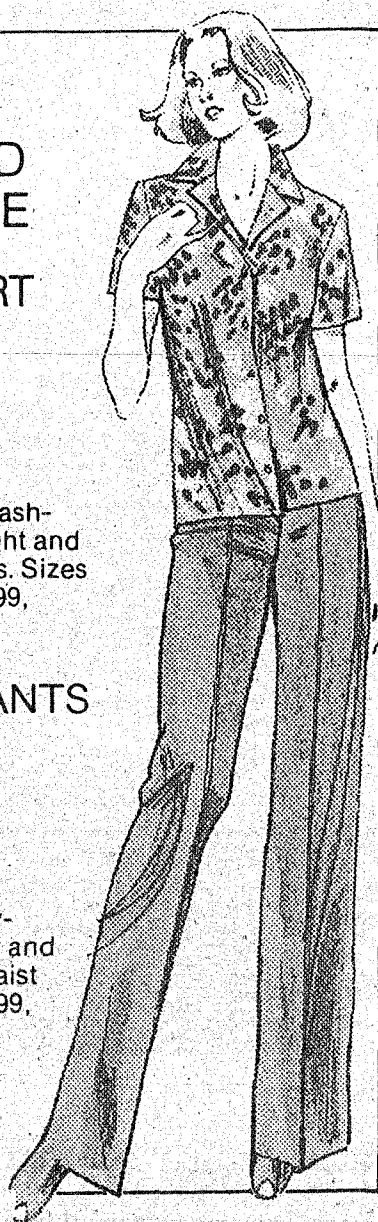

Donham Memorial Track Completed

Named to Honor
Former JHS Coach

Deriel Warnock, Booster Club Instrumental
In Planning, Constructing Hard-surface Track

In recent action by the Santa Anna Independent School District Board of Trustees, the school track was named the A. D. Donham Memorial Track in memory of a former school teacher and coach.

A. D. Donham Jr. taught in the local schools a total of 12 years, serving the last ten years as coach of the Junior High teams, winning eight district championships in football and having successful seasons with track and basketball.

Donham had the ability to inspire and encourage his young athletes, making winning teams from the boys who are usually less than well coordinated at that age.

Born in Itasca in 1906, Donham came to Santa Anna in 1923 with his parents and sister, Margaret, now Mrs. Calvin Campbell. After graduation from Santa Anna High School, he attended Southwestern State University in Weatherford, Oklahoma, receiving his degree in natural science with a minor in mathematics in 1936.

While attending college, he taught and coached in several schools in Oklahoma, and at Cordell, Oklahoma met and married Carmen Souffard.

Returning to Santa Anna in 1941, he taught in the local schools two years, resigning to assist his mother operate the Service Cafe. He returned to his career in education in 1952. Besides teaching and coaching, he served most of the time as official scout for the high school football team.

With his vital interest in sports and youth, Donham spent many hours working with the Quarterback Club and the summer program for boys in the community.

He was active in the Masonic

The completion of the hard surface track at the Santa Anna school stadium is a realization of a several-year project by the Santa Anna Booster Club. Deriel Warnock, president of the organization, is perhaps most responsible for the completion of the project.

Warnock, who has served several terms as president of the athletic booster group, has been instrumental in the planning of the track improvement, starting at least five years ago as a club project. Curbing and preliminary work toward the project have been done in slow stages as funds were available.

Although the track improvement is being financed jointly by the school and the Booster Club, Warnock has spent many hours working at the track and

using his own equipment at no charge to the school or club.

Many others have also assisted with the project, donating labor and equipment, making possible the asphalt-surface track that would cost from \$60,000 to \$80,000 if contracted from start to finish.

Santa Anna is one of only a few schools in the area with a hard surface track, and the new addition will help the track program become more effective.

The first track meet of the season will be held in Santa Anna this weekend, with teams from about 20 area high schools to be here to participate in the events.

Booster Club members, and especially the president, Deriel Warnock, may well be proud of the new track and the im-

provement to the school's athletic program.

provement to the school's athletic program.

Coach Roger Goodwin has expressed his appreciation to Warnock and other club members for making the project possible. The track program for years to come will benefit from the improved facilities.
