# Snowfall, Ice Cause Mishaps

## Schools Closed Two Days Last Week

Several inches of snow fell in the central Texas area last Wednesday, leaving packed ice on the highways and streets for

several days and causing the local school to close two days.

Highway 283 from Santa Anna to Brady was closed due to heavy snowfall and hazardous conditions Wednesday afternoon, with Highway 183 from Brownwood to Brady also closed. The heaviest snowfall was in area along the Colorado River, with Winchell in south Brown County reporting 18 inches.

Very little moisture was recorded as a result of the snow,

with .45 inch in the gauge when it melted several days later.

Thursday night about 9 p.m. a tractor-trailer carrying 4500 pounds of cotton bales went out of control across from the Dariy Queen and overturned. George Gale of Anaheim, California was driver of the truck and uninjured in the mishap.

Traffic was blocked for a short time before winch trucks could move the vehicle off the highway. The rig belonged to Great Western Trucking Co.

On Friday morning, an accident occurred at the intersection of Farm Road 1176 and Bowie Avenue when the automobile driven by Jackie Morris skidded on the icy street and collided with the vehicle driven by Ricky Anderson.

Highway Patrolman Jay Moses investigated both accidents.

Another vehicle mishap earlier last week occurred Monday, January 11, when a truck tractor - semi trailer, driven by Ricky Curl of Clyde, jack-knifed at the Highway 67 intersection at the old Truck Harbor location. A car pulled in front of the rig, and it went out of control when the brakes were applied. There were no injuries in the mishap. LakeSteel Co. of Abilene is owner of the truck, according to Jay Moses, investigating officer.

## City Sales Tax

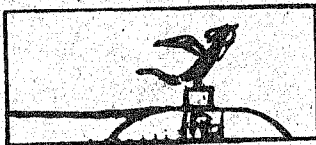
### Shows Decrease

The 1981 receipts were \$2,272.47 for the same period.

The City Sales Tax is collected by merchants with the State Sales Tax and returned to the cities by the State Comptroller's Office.

Although there was an increase in the total city sales taxes collected, many smaller cities showed a decrease for the period.

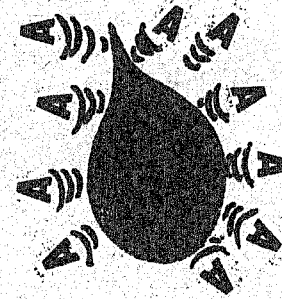

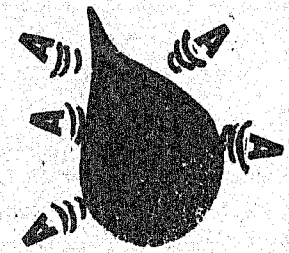

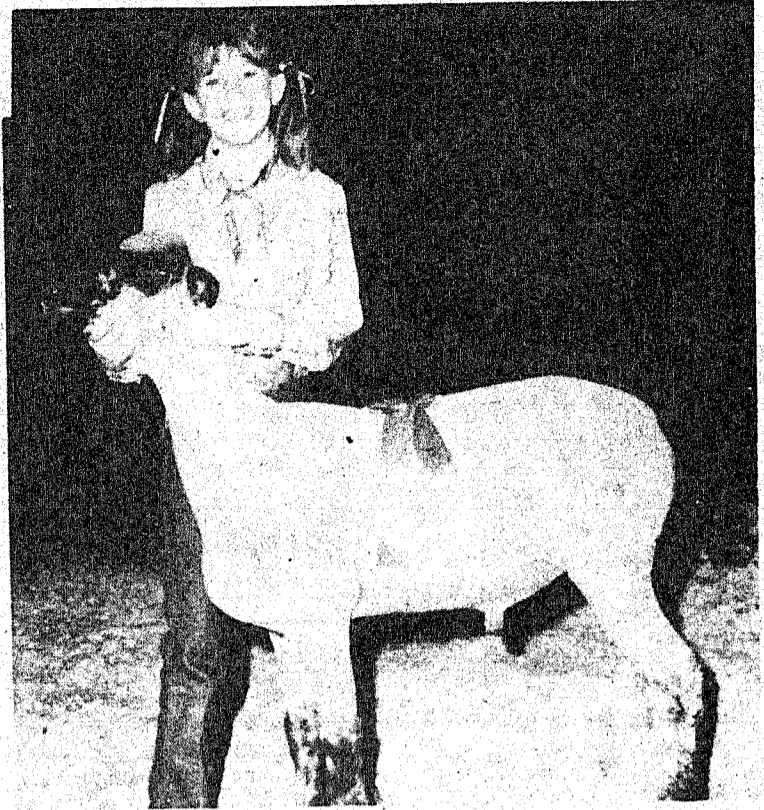

## DRIVELINE

Oh, Well, Back To The Old Drawing Board... The idea of motorized transport fascinated but baffled inventors for centuries. Even the great Isaac Newton couldn't solve the problem. Sometime in the late 1600's, after figuring out the mathematics of the Law of Gravity, Sir Isaac designed a jet-propelled steam carriage. Unfortunately, it would have required operating speeds in excess of 700 miles an hour, somewhat impractical for the muddy roads of the time, so the idea was shelved.

The government claims the 55 mph limit saves gasoline. Does it really make much of a difference?

— O.R., Pampa

Yes, it does, both to the individual and the nation. As your car's speed increases, so does its wind resistance — a big factor in gas mileage. Most cars can get about 28 percent more miles to the gallon at 50 mph than at 70. At 55 mph your mileage is 21 percent better than at 70. (That's a saving of four out of every twenty gallons!)

If consumers used less gas, demand wouldn't be so great and (hopefully) prices wouldn't rise as high. And we might avoid California style rationing and gas station waiting lines. The Federal Highway Administration says that if everyone went 55 mph, we could save three billion gallons of gas a year. That ain't no drop in the bucket... or tank!

### Lock Your Car and Take the Keys!

It's that simple because last year 80 percent of all stolen cars had unlocked doors. 40 percent had their keys in the ignition! No wonder one million cars are stolen in America every year. And one-third of them are never recovered.

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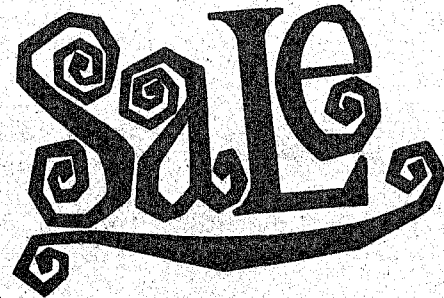
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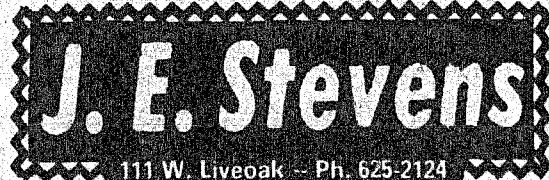

If you or your physician filed a Medicare claim over two months ago and you have not heard from Medicare, you should contact

Medicare -- toll free -- 112-800-442-2620, and report the problem.

It is helpful to have all the information handy such as your Medicare card and copies of the bills, so that the operator can locate your claim on the computer. If there is no computer record of the claim, then it will be necessary to send it in again in order to be paid.

### Assassin bug can be fatal

The blood-sucking assassin bug in Texas is infected with a sometime fatal parasitic disease that is passed on to its human victims, and vacationers this summer should take measures to avoid the night-feeding insect, say Texas A&M University researchers.

The infection, known as Chagas' disease, or American trypanosomiasis, is often fatal to infants and young animals. The disease causes enlargement of the esophagus, colon and heart, hinders digestion and results in the thinning of the walls of the heart.

# NOTICE To All Property Owners

On January 1st, 1982 the new property tax code becomes fully operational, and all special assessments, Homestead and Disabled Veterans exemptions, open spaced land valuations, along with the valuation of all property will be administered by the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District. The proper forms as approved by the State Property Tax Board are available at the appraisal office at 105 Commercial, and you may come by the office as early as possible and sign these forms for any exemptions, or special assessments you may qualify for.

## HOMESTEAD

If you qualify for a Residence Homestead exemption, you are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the assessed value of your home for school tax purposes, and a \$3,000 exemption for the portion of county taxes levied for Farm to Market Roads or Flood Control. If you are 65 as of Jan. 1st, 1982 or disabled you may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption. Your SCHOOL TAX BILL cannot be increased on your home for over 65 qualifiers.

## FARMERS AND RANCHERS

If you qualify, your agriculture open-space land may be taxed at its productive value instead of market value. All these exemptions require an application for 1982 and will not require annual applications in future years. Your farm and ranch implements, and equipment are also exempt, if individually owned and used for the production of crops or livestock. This exemption requires annual application. Livestock and poultry is automatically exempt and requires no application.

If you qualified for any of these exemptions in 1981, the proper forms will be mailed to you the latter part of January. However, to avoid errors you may want to come by the office and give us any information you may have, and to be sure your property is correctly rendered for 1982.

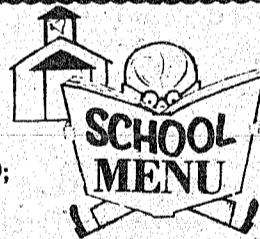

**Coupons, Refunding Class On HPU Continuing Ed. List**

**BROWNWOOD**- Everyone wants to save money, and now Howard Payne University can help area residents save hundreds of dollars on groceries and household items through two couponing and refunding classes to be held January 30 on the HPU campus.

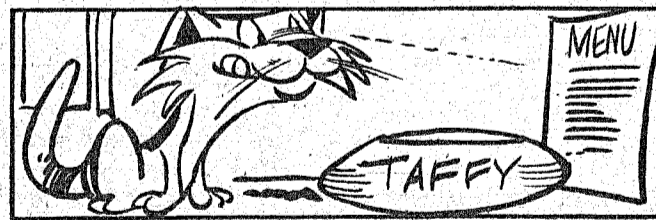
Teaching the classes will be Mitzi Eades, a Lake Dallas housewife who had developed a talent for couponing and refunding. In preparation for one of her refunding classes, Mrs. Eades, 36, bought \$292.87 worth of groceries for only \$1.87 and a fistful of coupons. When she finished she had two shopping carts loaded down and a long cash register tape, but her wallet was still intact. She bought enough coffee to last a year, enough soap to supply an army, and \$20 worth of hamburger meat.

Mrs. Eades now spends much of her time showing others how they can save money through couponing and refunding. She

has a nationally syndicated newspaper column, "Aunt Trash," and her national refunding newsletter, "Mitzi's Mad Money," which has large circulation. She also makes personal appearances and does television shows explaining her expertise.

The two couponing and refunding classes will be offered January 30 through the Division of Continuing Education at HPU. The first session will be from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. and the second session will be from 1:30 until 3:30 p.m. Both classes will meet in Newman Hall, room 136. Cost for the class will be \$6, a price which could well be recovered with the expertise learned from Mrs. Eades' class.

# Overpayment Collection By S-Security

Social Security is conducting an aggressive campaign to collect the nearly \$1.9 billion in outstanding overpayments -- the money owed to Social Security by those who receive monthly Social Security retirement, survivors, and disability benefits as well as supplemental security income (SSI) payments. In most instances, these overpayments came about because a person failed to report an event that affected his or her right to benefits.

It's much easier to prevent an overpayment than it is to lose part or all of one or more monthly checks, money that most people need for day to day living.

And, the easiest way to prevent overpayments is to report every event that could affect the right to or the amount of a person's monthly benefit. I cannot emphasize strongly enough the necessity of proper reporting.

Prompt reporting of the following events will go far to prevent a possible overpayment. People who get green Social Security checks should report:

\* Earnings above the annual limit -- the 1982 annual limits are \$6,000 for people over 65 and over

any part of 1982 and \$4,440 for people under 65 all of 1982. Generally, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the annual limit. Notify Social Security as soon as you think your earnings will exceed the annual limit. Don't wait until your earnings have already gone above the limit. And remember, it's gross pay that counts, not just take home pay.

\* Any plans to go outside the U. S. for 30 days or more. Absence from the country may affect the receipt of checks.

\* Any work outside the U. S., no matter how little you earn.

\* Divorce or annulment of marriage. Benefits to wives or husbands generally end unless the marriage lasted 10 years or longer.

\* Marriage. Any person who gets benefits as a child, widow, widower, divorced spouse, or parent of a worker, should report if he or she marries.

\* Child leaves the care of a mother or father. A mother or father who receives benefits because she or he is caring for a child, must report if the child leaves her or his care.

\* Change in school attendance for a child over 18. A child over 18 can get checks as a student only while he or she attends school full time. Any change in attendance must be reported. Also, the child must report if he or she is paid to attend school by an employer, or if he or she is convicted of a felony.

\* Death. Benefits stop at death. Someone should report if a person getting benefits dies. No check is payable for the month of death.

A person getting benefits because of disability should report the following:

\* The person's condition improves.

\* A return to work, no matter how little is earned.

\* Application for, the receipt of, or any change in the amount of any public disability benefit provided by Federal, State, and local programs, including workers' compensation payments.

People getting gold SSI checks should report:

\* A move or change of address.

\* A change in the household -- a person moves into or out of a home or a husband and wife

separate. Or, there is a change in the way expenses are paid.

\* A person enters or leaves an institution.

\* A person leaves the U. S.

\* A person marries or a marriage ends.

\* Any change in income

\* Any change in resources owned.

\* Any improvement in condition for a blind or disabled person or if the person takes a job.

\* Any change in school attendance for a student under 22.

\* If a drug addict or alcoholic stops treatment.

\* If a person can't manage funds.

\* If a person dies.

It is very important that these reports be made as soon as possible after the person learns of one of these events. The quicker the report is made, the more likely that an overpayment will be prevented.

The required reports can be made by telephone, mail, or in person at any Social Security office. A report should include the following information: name of person about whom the report is being made; what is being reported; date it happened; signature if report is by mail or in person; address; and the correct claim number under which benefits are being paid. The claim number is shown on all correspondence and appears on all checks.

Any help you need can be obtained at all Social Security offices. Remember, it is a lot easier to prevent an overpayment than it is to repay it.

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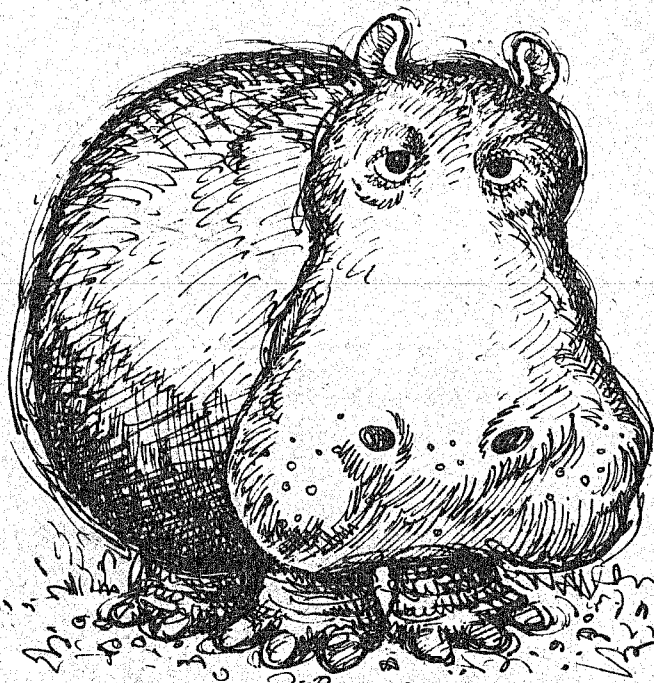

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
