Track Meet Slated Saturday

A.D. Donham Memorial Relays
Slated for High School, JHS Teams

High school and junior high students from a number of area schools will be in Santa Anna Saturday for the A. D. Donham Memorial Relays at the athletic stadium. The meet will be the first at the new A. D. Donham Memorial Track, sponsored by the Booster Club.

The junior high meet which is scheduled for Saturday, will have boys and girls teams from

R. C. Smith is director of the meet, and Janice Donham Cozart will be bookkeeper.

Gerald Brister will be announcer for the meet, and Terry McIver is starter. Barry Miles will serve as starting clerk, and Donald Strickland is in charge of timers and catchers, a group of local adults and club members who will volunteer their time to help at the meet.

Fort Worth Lawsuit Recessed 'Til Next Week

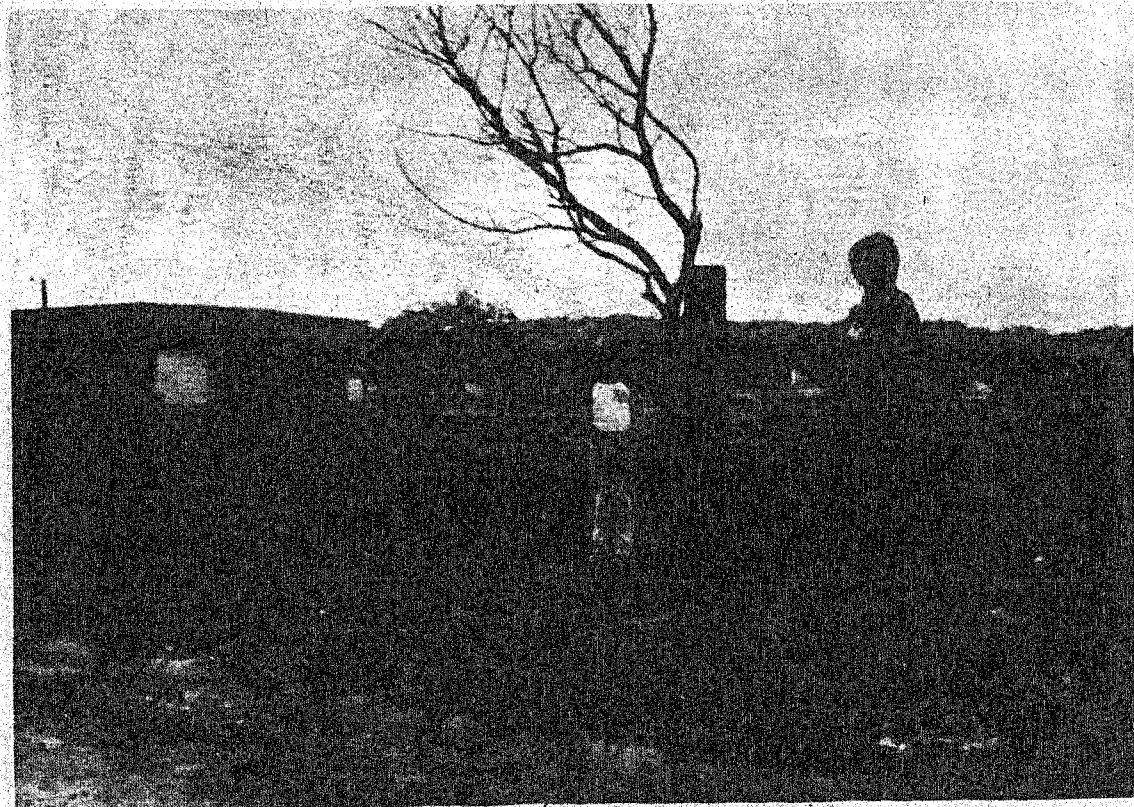
The lawsuit of Tom Stearns and Carl Benton et al against the City of Santa Anna will continue next week, according to Mayor Edd Hartman. Testimony was heard in Federal Court in Fort Worth Monday and Tuesday, but the session was recessed until next week. The Judge had allowed only one day for the case and had other cases scheduled on the docket and could not continue this week.

In the suit, the landowners downstream from the city sewage treatment plant southwest of Santa Anna are seeking the court to assess a penalty on the City of up to \$1,000 per day for violation when discharge is released into a unnamed creek

that flows through their property. The suit was filed in late 1979 and has been postponed since that time.

Testifying for the plaintiffs were Tom and Mary Stearns, Carl Benton and a Midland resident who has purchased the Stearns property since the suit was filed. Defense testimony was from Kenneth Cruger of the Texas Water Quality Board and a representative from S&K Engineering Co. of San Angelo who has worked with the city.

Representing the City of Santa Anna were Hartman and Councilmen Patrick Hosch, M. L. Guthrie Jr. and Dickie Horner.

Other members of the Santa Anna cast are Teresa Rolfe, Tammy Stanislaw and Charlie Lewis.

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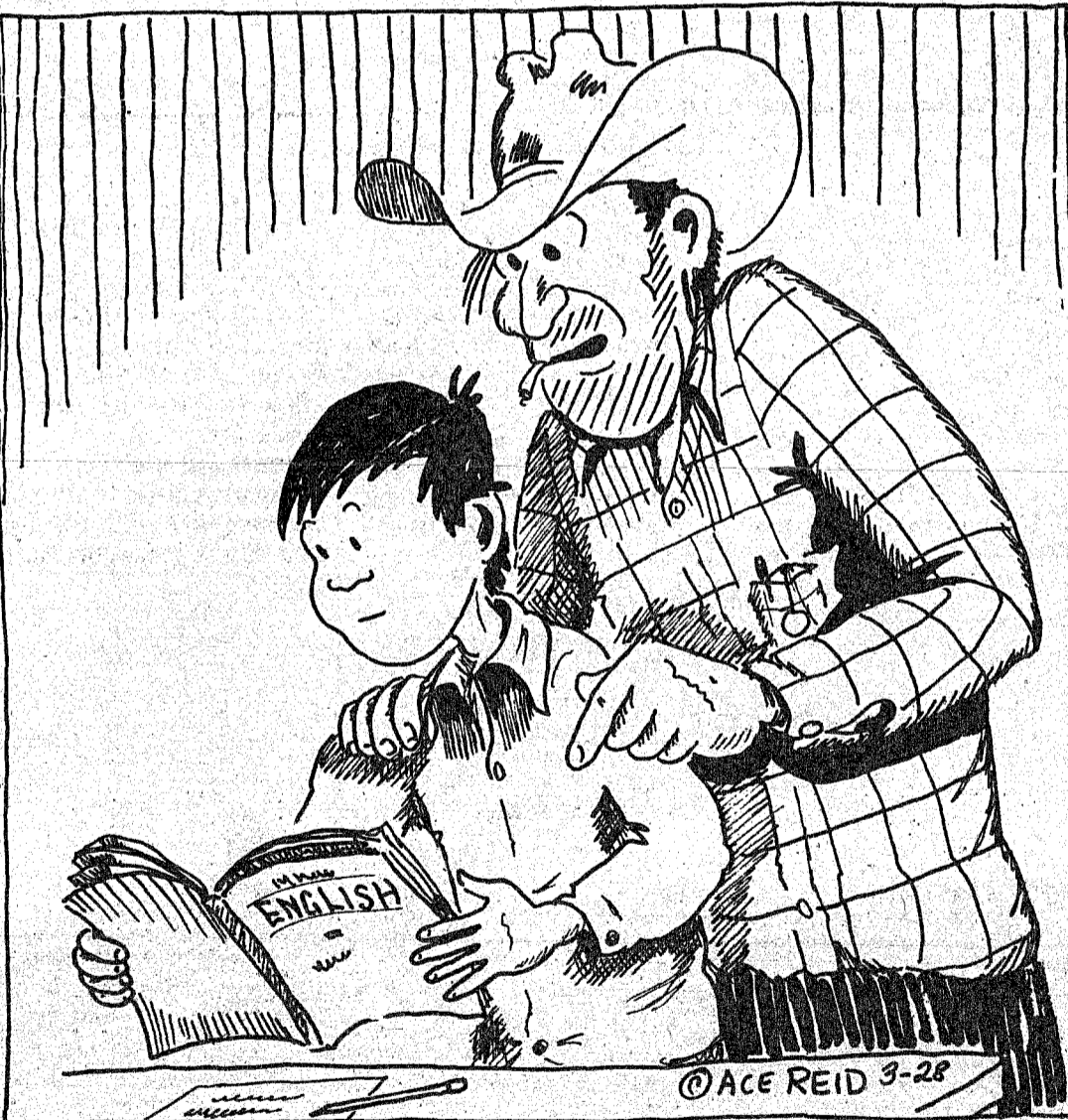

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Meet the Candidates

City Council Seats Sought By Eight Local Residents

As the Saturday, April 3, City Council election approaches, interest is running high in the contests as eight candidates are vying for the three places on the Council.

Patrick Hosch is seeking a second term on the Council, and Donald Hosch, another incumbent, has announced as a write-in candidate for his first full term. He was unaware before the deadline that his term was expiring, and was too late to be placed on the ballot. Last year he was elected for a one-year unexpired term.

Scott Patterson, the other incumbent, is not seeking re-election.

Other candidates on the ballot are Carmen Donham, Joe Bertoni, Norman Asher, Glenda Cook, John Pearce and Jim Laubhan.

This week and next we will have reports of interviews with the candidates, making them more familiar with the voters of the City.

Carmen Donham has made her home in Santa Anna for over 40 years, except for a brief period when she cared for her late parents in Oklahoma. The licensed vocational nurse is now retired and has time to devote to the city government.

The widow of the late A. D. Donham Jr., Mrs. Donham expressed great interest in the well-being of the town and the people who live here. She would most like to see the city become financially stable so that improvements may be made and needed improvements made.

Mrs. Donham has two children living in Santa Anna, Janice Cozart and Marty Donham. She is an active member of the Eastern Star chapter and of First Baptist Church.

John Pearce has been a resident of Santa Anna since 1979. A native of Santa Anna, John graduated from Coleman High School, received a B.S. degree from Tarleton State University and a M.S. degree from Texas A&M University, studying resource economics. Pearce and his wife, Dr. Kathy Pearce, operate Pearce Veterinary Clinic here.

"Having worked closely with the city water line and understanding the financial and legal troubles the city is in, I feel I can help represent the best interest of the majority of the people of the city of Santa Anna. I am deeply concerned with the condition of the streets and the water system as they are the major items affecting everyone who pays taxes in the city. I will work to improve these and other areas of the city considering the financial restraints the city is faced with at this time," Pearce said.

The Pearces are parents of two young daughters and are members of United Methodist Church.

Joe Bertoni has lived in Santa Anna for nine years and is owner of B&B Enterprises that is involved in construction, plumbing and electrical work.

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FRIDAY TRUCK MISHAP severely damaged the truck tractor belonging to Associated Milk Producers Inc. of San Angelo. The truck was in collision with a refrigerated truck belonging to Keith's Produce in Abilene at the entrance to Ranger Park Medical Center. There were no injuries in the accident.

Friday Truck Accident Causes Heavy Damage

A two-truck accident early Friday morning blocked traffic at the Ranger Park entrance for awhile, and major damage was done to one vehicle.

A truck tractor with tank truck belonging to Associated Milk Producers, Inc. of San Angelo collided with the rear of a refrigerated truck from Keith Produce of Abilene as the

Abilene truck was turning into the road leading to Ranger Park Hospital.

According to Highway Patrolman Jay Moses, the San Angelo milk truck struck the rear of the other vehicle to avoid other traffic in the on-coming lane. The driver, Bobby Kelley of San Angelo, was charged with failure to control speed.

Jesse Magana of Abilene, driver of the Keith truck, was making a legal left turn at the time of the mishap.

Although the tank truck was heavily damaged in the collision, there were no injuries and the Keith truck received only minor damage.

Traffic on the west bound lane at the accident site was blocked for about an hour until the tank truck could be pulled from the highway. Another tank truck was sent to Santa Anna later that morning and the tank trailer filled with milk continued on its route.

Boating Safety Is Encouraged

"Don't overload the boat," the specialist emphasizes. Most stern plates indicate the maximum safe load. If in doubt, don't go out. If the boat overturns, stay with the boat. It is usually farther to shore than it appears.

Around the farm pond or near the fishing dock, a safety station should be established. A post set about 15 feet from the water and near the dock serves as a place to hang a rope, doughnut life preserver, inner-tube, pole or board. A 12 to 15-foot long fishing pole is very effective for rescuing someone who falls in the water near the shore.

For rescuing someone slightly farther from shore, a rope that can be easily thrown works best.

A "doughnut" life preserver can be thrown 30 to 40 feet by most people. An inflated inner-tube can also be used but is difficult to throw any long distance. As an emergency measure, a dry wood board about six to eight inches wide and six feet long can be scooted across the surface of the water for someone to hold onto until help arrives.

Whatever rescue method is used, all persons should be familiar with the equipment available and how to effectively use the equipment. Davis says the objective is to rescue the person in trouble and any delay can be tragic.

Pallbearers for the services were Danny Armstrong, Bob Busby, Richard Cook, John Riley Dobbins, Chester Sides and Wesley Smith.



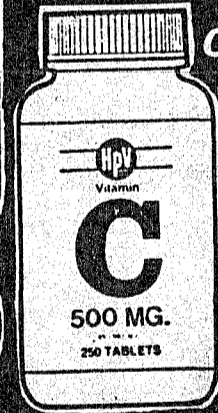
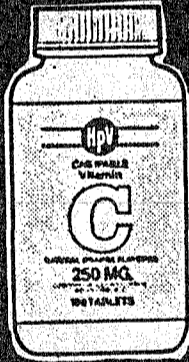
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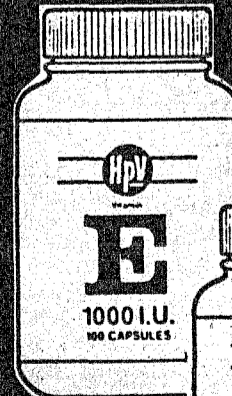
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Trickham News

The Santa Anna Junior High girls track Team was in Goldthwaite Saturday, March 13, where they took the second place award with a total of 91 points in their division.

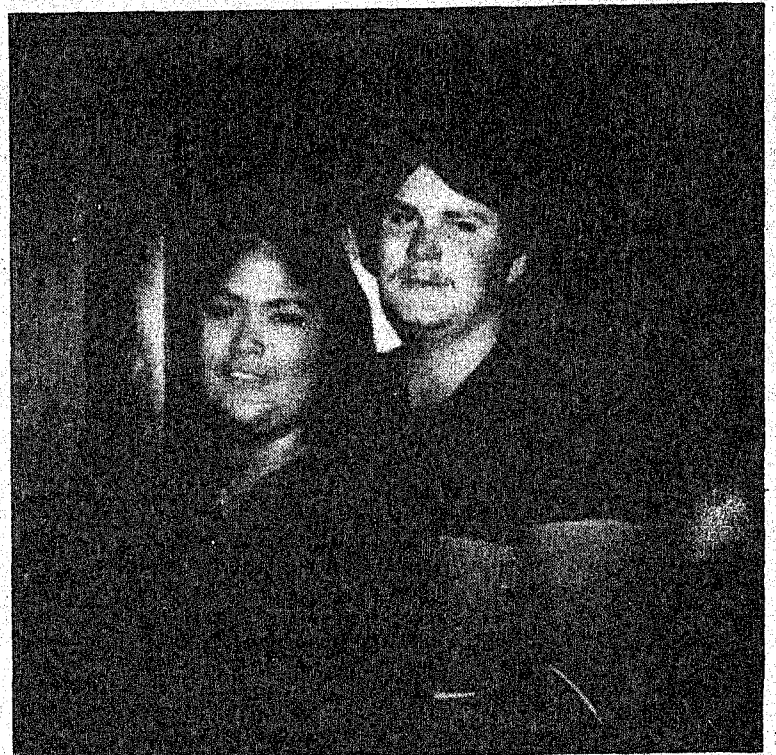
Comanche was winner of the team trophy with 98 points.

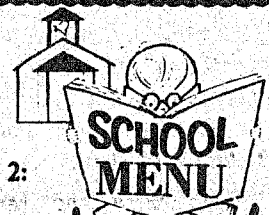

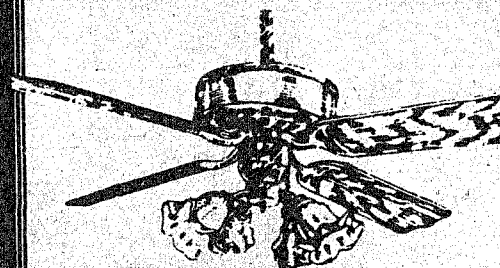

Good Seasons For Deer, Turkey

The harvest by hunters of white-tailed deer in Texas increased by approximately 15 percent in 1981-82 over the previous year, while the turkey harvest set an all-time record.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said hunters took an estimated 300,050 deer, comprised of 76 percent bucks and 24 percent antlerless deer during the past season.

Harvest surveys showed a total turkey harvest estimated at 53,500, which was almost 40 percent higher than the previous record high of 38,300

set in 1979-80.

Favorable weather conditions in early 1981 helped deer reproduction and survival, and for the second year in succession the weather has helped wild turkeys have an outstanding hatch.

Officials said an estimated 533,000 hunters went afield after white-tailed deer during the season, an increase of five percent over the previous year. The estimated success rate increased from 44 percent in 1980-81 to 47 percent this season. Projected hunter days were up three percent.

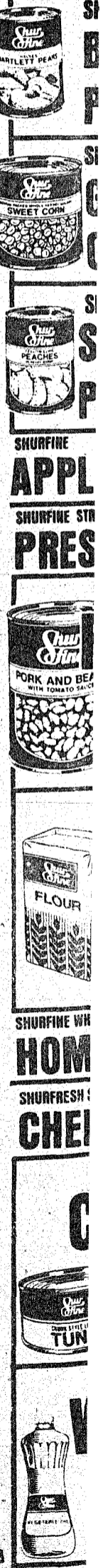

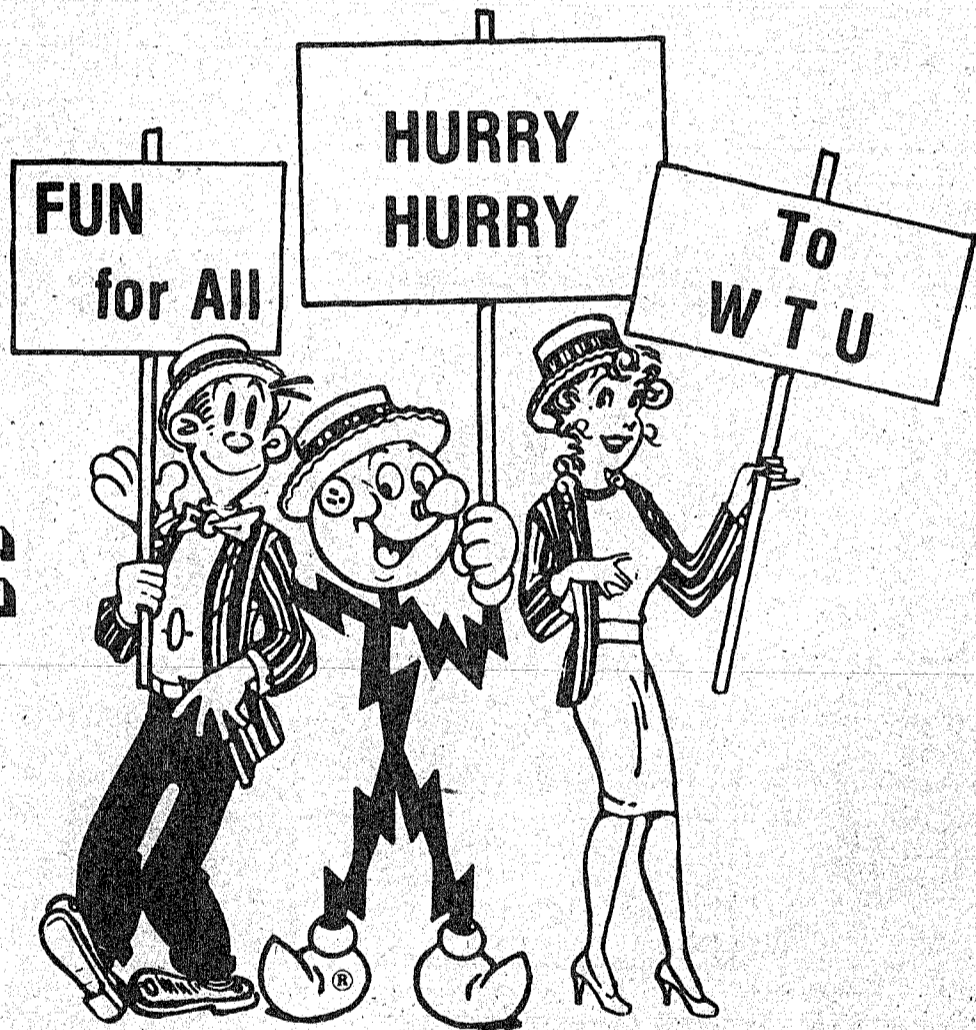

We saw steel plants, garment factories, a jet engine factory, several gas stations. There is no welfare or unemployment in Israel. Most houses there and in Egypt use solar heat. We saw Bedouin camps, shepherds with their herds and a faithful dog, date palms and a huge British Cemetery.

We stopped at a creek were David slew Goliath, saw where Philip preached to the Eunuch.

As we reached the Roman Highway to Syria from Egypt, we turned south, going by Gaza, which is in the Desert. Our drive was along the Mediterranean coast line, seeing lots of date palm trees, some were planted for protection of Bedouins. (We were told that the Bedouins are the Arabs of the Desert and were there before history began. The average life of the Bedouin people is 45 years.)

We drove through Sinai that

the Israelies are going to give back to Egypt April 25, went through check point at El Arish, where our guide, Joseph Shemitshak left and we changed coaches and drove through No Man's Land and entered Egypt. We crossed the Suez Canal on a barge - no pictures permitted - drove on to our hotel, Holiday Inn in Cairo, a city of 10-million population, the largest city in Africa on the edge of the vast Sahara Desert. It is situated near the head of the Delts, about one mile east of the Nile River, the longest river in the world.

There are thousands of Mosques in Egypt and each has Minarets, a tall spire from which the faithful are called to prayer five times a day. (We are told they have lots of loud speakers in use now)

Visiting Cairo Museum, the biggest in the world, we saw an exhibit of the riches of the fabled finds and the past grandure of the Imperial Egypt. We saw the King Tut treasures. We visited the Ben Ezra Synagogue, the first of 32 built in Egypt, visited the church of Abu Serga, where tradition says the Holy Family stayed three days in a cave under the alter of the church when they fled from Palestine. We saw where the baby Moses was found in the bulrushes along the Nile; and saw an interesting demonstration on making Papyrus parchment.

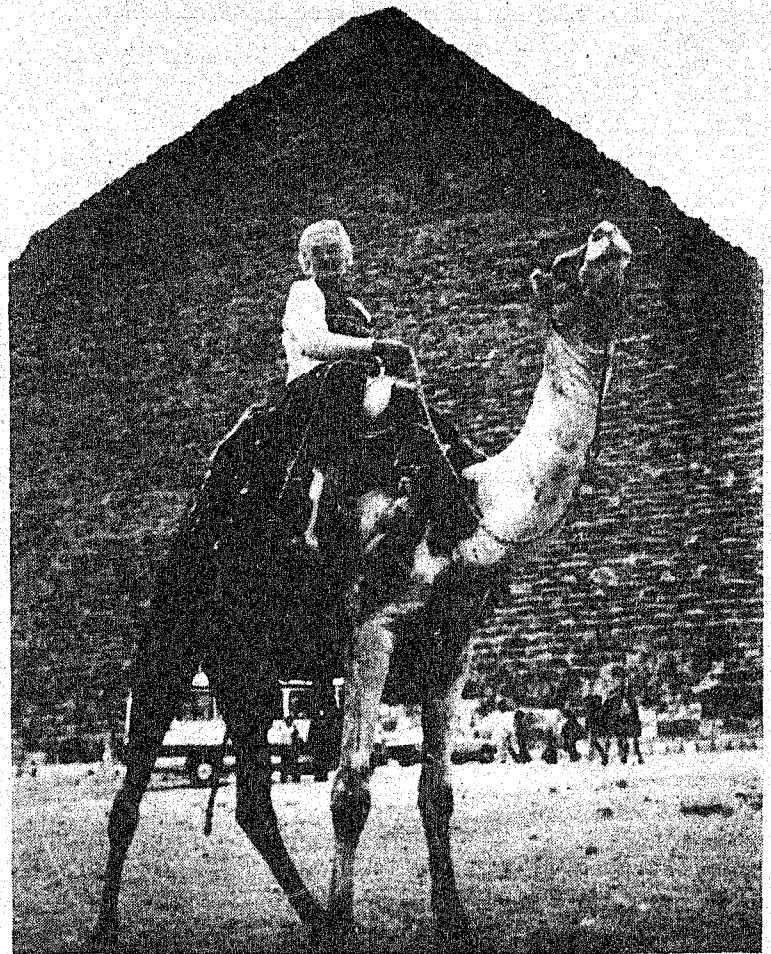
We visited Memphis, the ancient capital, situated on the west bank of the Nile, 10 miles south of Cairo. We saw the massive 80 ton Alabaster Sphinx 5000-years-old and the Colossal 42-foot high (recumbent) statue of Ramses II. Saw acres and acres of date palms. The ruin of ancient times are so wonderful because they are on such grand scale in sizes.



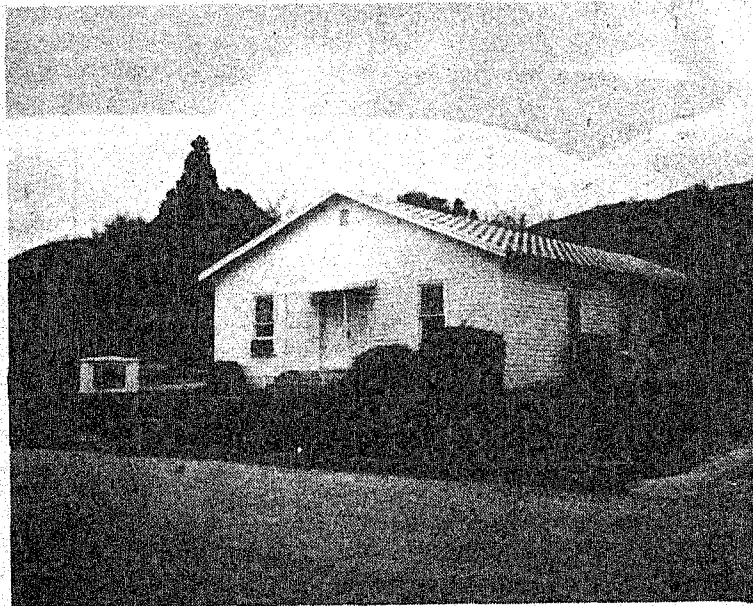
