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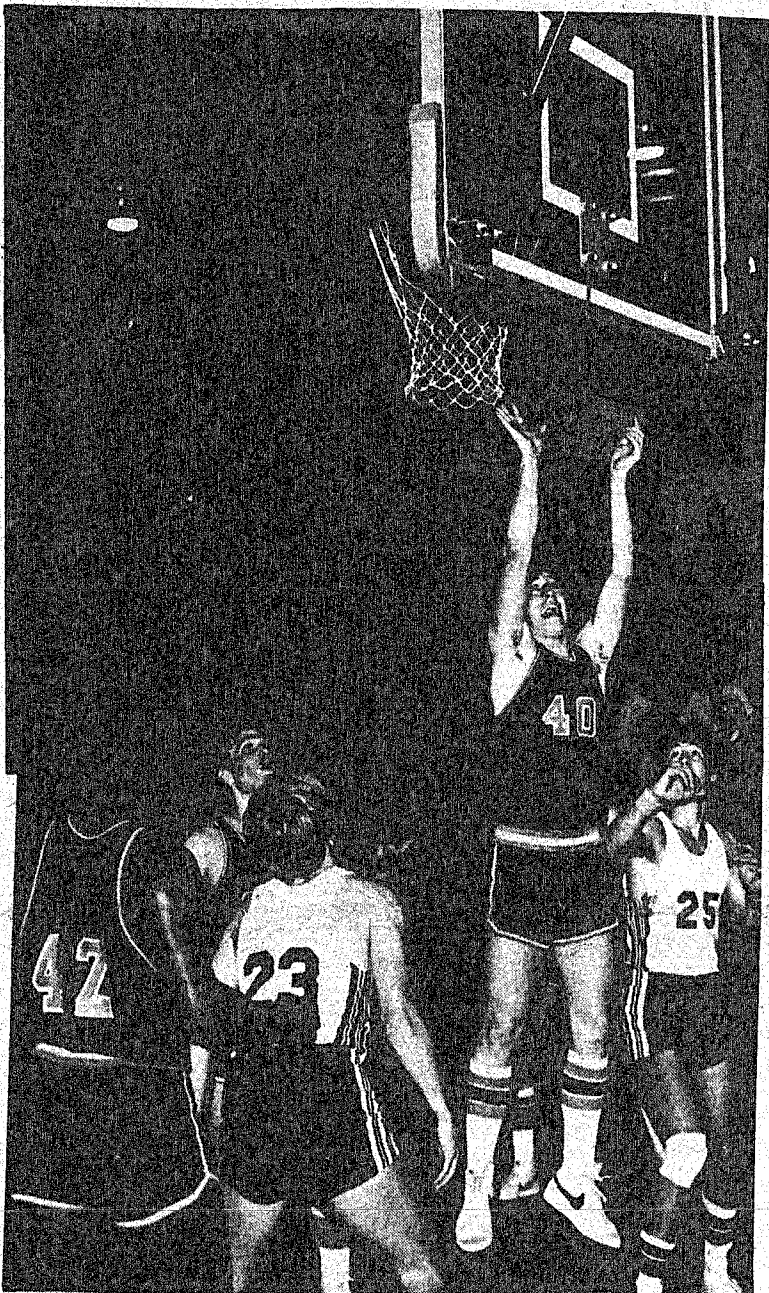

Park Committee Named By S-Anna City Council

The Santa Anna City Council met Thursday, March 4, for the monthly session at City Hall. Edd Hartman, Mayor, presided.

Alice Garza met with the Council seeking permission to use the Civic Center for services for the Mexican Baptist Church. The group has outgrown the facilities at New Hope Baptist Church and need more space. The Council will discuss the matter and make a decision at the next meeting.

Carmen Donham, Glenda Cook and Dick Longbrake were named to a City Park Committee to work with the Lions Club. Montie Guthrie III will be working with both groups to construct the park.

The City will donate water for landscaping and at least one street light at the site.

City officials were instructed that there is no charge for water to be cut off except when a service charge is made for delinquent water bills and the meter has been disconnected. At that time there is a connection fee.

R. W. Balke, Jake McCreary and Ken Bowker were named to the Housing Authority Board for another term.

It was announced that the garbage truck is being repaired and should be in operation next week. The City is still seeking a (See CITY COUNCIL, Page 9)

More Candidates on Ballots

Contests Develop in City, ISD Races

Voters in Santa Anna will have a wide choice of candidates in the April 3 election, as seven persons have applied

for a place on the ballot.

Three places are to be filled this year, the regular terms of Patrick Hosch and Scott Patterson, and the term of Donald Hosch who was appointed to the Council to fill an unexpired term.

Patrick Hosch is the only incumbent seeking re-election. Others on the ballot will be Carmen Donham, John Pearce, Glenda Cook, Joe Bertoni, Norman Asher and Jim Laubhan.

Four candidates will appear on the April 3 School Trustee election, with two places to be filled on the Board.

The last candidates to file for

a place on the ballot were Mrs. Clint (JoAn) Day and Terry McIver. Others on the ballot are the incumbents, Jay Weathers and Max Eubank.

Wednesday of last week was the deadline for applying for a place on the ballot.

Work on the building includes a partition about midway of the building, and other improvements.

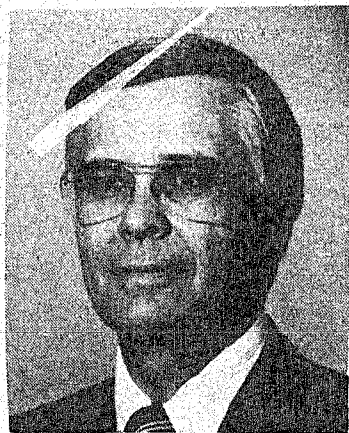
Lions Club Seeks Landscaping Funds For City Park

County Tax Board Has Monday Meeting

C. M. Huckabee of Coleman, Donnie Neff of Santa Anna and Jerry Allen of Leaday have been selected by the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District to serve on the Board of Review for 1982-83. The group will hear complaints and answer questions of county property owners as the new taxing process takes effect. The Board of Review is similar to the former Boards of Equalization appointed by each taxing entity.

The appointment of the three county residents was confirmed at the Monday, March 8, meeting of the County Tax Appraisal District held in

Coleman.

Phil McCormick, appraisal consultant, gave a report on property appraisals in the county, with the field work almost completed and the clerical work in progress.

Collection contracts are prepared for the taxing entities that will use the county's office for collecting their taxes.

John Skelton, chief appraiser, read the recent ruling on personal property exemptions for farming and ranching implements, allowing exemptions of \$15,000 for single persons and \$30,000 for a family. These renditions as well as personal property rendition forms are requested at the office as soon as possible, with May 1 the deadline for the information. Also needed at this time are the open space land applications that have been mailed to property owners.

The Tax Appraisal District Board meets each second Monday at 5 p.m. Visitors are welcome to attend the meetings.

Mountaineers Lose In Regional Tourney

After entering the Regional Basketball tournament in Stephenville as Bi-District champions over Goldthwaite, the Santa Anna Mountaineers lost in the first round of play to the Eden team 52-47 Friday night. Eden later lost in the next round of play, with Grafard taking the II-A title in the tourney and advancing to the state tournament next week.

Turnovers took their toll of the Mountaineers, despite Randy Casey's 21 points. Mike Simmons scored eight points and Bradley Wardlow had five. Others scoring for the Mountaineers were David Strickland, Albert Collins, Ricky Anderson and Tony Culpepper.

Coach Charles Brewster's team has had a fine season, winning the district title under his leadership for the second consecutive year. The Mountaineers also won the 29-A crown in 1980 under Coach Pete Simmons, advancing that year to the finals in the regional tourney.

Other members of the championship team are Doug Warnock, Ernest DeLeon and

James Bass.

Casey was also leading rebounder in the game with 16, and Wardlow, Simmons and Strickland each had two steals. Anderson led with field goal percentage with 100 percent, and Casey had 56 percent on his free throws.

For the season, Casey was leading scorer, averaging 14.4 points per game, with Simmons second with a 11.6 per game average. Casey and Wardlow were leading rebounders for the season and well as having the most steals.

The season was exceptional for Santa Anna, with the girls team also taking the district title for the first time since 1977.

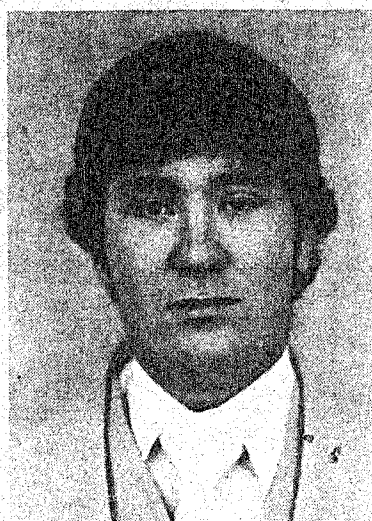

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Lynn Nabers Withdraws From State Representative Race

State Representative Lynn Nabers of Brownwood announced last week that he would not be a candidate for re-election to the Texas Legislature in 1982.

In announcing that he would not seek re-election, Representative Nabers stated that the determining factor in his decision to withdraw was that his legislative district is being revised and he simply did not have the time available to begin campaigning in a new legislative district. He also has a law practice in Brownwood.

Nabers had filed earlier for the position which he has held for 14 years. His first term came immediately after his graduation from Baylor Law

School. During his tenure he has been on a number of legislative committees, including the chairmanship of the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee and Health and Welfare Committee. He has served the area longer consecutively than any other lawmaker since 1876.

Representative Nabers is married to the former Mary Scott of Cross Plains and they have two sons, Scott and Tim. Besides his law practice in Brownwood, Nabers is a co-owner of an Abstract and Title Company, an owner of Central Texas Communications (KXYL Radio Station) in Brownwood and a director of Citizens National Bank in Brownwood.

Legislator supports farmers in fuel production

COLLEGE STATION — Texas Rep. Dan Kubiak (D-Rockdale) says it's time Americans turn to farmers for additional sources of fuel.

"We lost 3,000 farmers in Texas last year and estimate that 6,000 will be lost next year due to inflation, high interest rates and an expanding urban population," Kubiak said at Texas A&M University.

"Farmers are falling flat on their face. The prices they are now getting for farm products have fallen 14 percent lower than they were a year ago today. At the rate things are going, farmers will become extinct."

Kubiak said government subsidies should be increased to provide alternative markets for farm products and to create an incentive for alcohol production. Increasing the amount of fuel produced by American farms will help bring farmers out of a slump, he said, and it will make us less dependent on foreign countries for fuel.

"Alcohol will gain more interest as the price of gasoline increases," Kubiak said, "and it will have to be accepted by major oil companies before it can be marketed here."

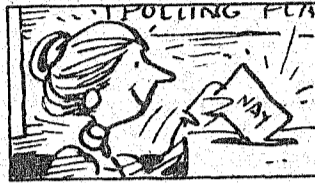

Parents Warned About Drugs

Several area newspapers have carried stories with warnings to parents about distribution in the Dallas area of tattoo transfers impregnated with LSD.

A notice published in this area was from the Dallas area, where the transfers were said to be available and reads as follows:

According to police authorities, a form of tattoo transfer called "Blue Star" is readily available in some areas of the United States. This is a small sheet of white paper containing blue stars the size of a pencil eraser. Each "star" is impregnated with LSD and can be removed from the paper to be placed in the mouth. Absorption can also occur through the skin by simply handling the paper or tattoo.

There are also brightly colored paper tabs resembling postage stamps in size, which have pictures of Superman,

Mickey Mouse (dressed as a sorcerer's apprentice), Dopey and possibly other Disney characters.

The stamps are packed in a red cardboard box with a picture of Mickey Mouse, wrapped in foil in a clear, lock-type bag. They come in five, one-inch square sheets with one hundred perforated, one-fourth inch square stamps.

This is a new way of selling ACID. A young child could happen upon these and have a fatal "trip." It is also feared that little children could be given a free "tattoo" by older children who want to have some fun. It is important that all parents be alerted in case their child is involved, even innocently.

According to the Coleman paper, local police have no knowledge of the transfer tattoo drug in this area, but parents of children should be alert for anything of this nature.

Cotton Deficiency Funds To Coleman Co. Farmers

Coleman County cotton producers have received last week \$127,032 in deficiency payments on their 1981 crop cotton. The payments were required because of the low market prices paid to producers for their cotton.

The 1981 national weighted average market price for upland cotton was 63.2 cents per pound; therefore, eligible producers were paid 7.67 cents per pound for their 1981 crop. The deficiency payments were based on the 1981 planted cotton acres times the farm payment yield for each farm.

Nationwide, cotton producers received an estimated \$530 million in deficiency payments. The payment checks were mailed to producers on February 24,

through the local county ASCS office.

At the present time, there are in excess of 2,000 bales of cotton under loan at the Coleman ASCS office. This represents approximately 55 percent of the cotton produced in Coleman County in 1981. The average loan price for the cotton pledged is about 42 cents per pound, which is almost 29 cents per pound less than the established target price of 70.87 cents.

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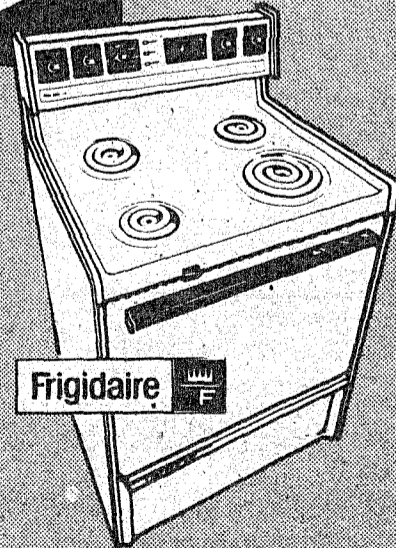
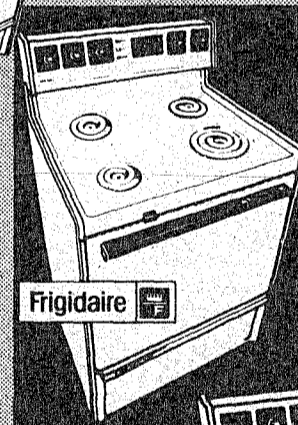
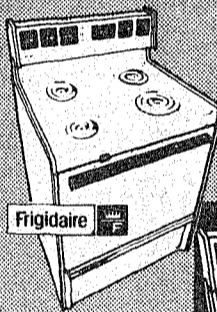

Agriculture Today

by Ed Curran
U. S. Department of Agriculture

American dairymen have a problem. They're doing too good a job! For years, they were told to feed more grain to boost production per cow, to breed more replacement heifers, to cull their herds and above all produce more milk per man. And they've done all those things.

Last year they fed their dairy cows nearly 29 million tons of grain. More than ever before. Fifty percent more than they fed double the number of cows 25 years earlier. Grain feeding averaged 5,300 pounds per cow—double

the 1960 average. Those cows produced milk — a record 12,145 pounds of it per cow last year.

Talk about dairy replacements. They had 4.3 million of them on hand at the end of last year. More than in any time in the past 13 years.

All of these things worked. Just like the extension dairymen said they would all along. American dairymen produced 132.2 billion pounds of milk last year. More than ever before. And got a record \$18.4 billion for it. More than ever before. Double the total of only

7 years earlier. Triple that of a dozen years ago.

Trouble is, Americans are using less dairy products. Per capita consumption of dairy products averaged only 523

pounds last year. The lowest on record. Which means, though the dairyman won all ties, chances are in the long run he'll lose the war.

Requirements Noted For DPS Trooper

Colonel Jim Adams, Department of Public Safety Director, announced last week that effective with the June recruit class, DPS trooper candidates may substitute law enforcement-related experience for the current educational requirement of 60 college hours. Thus, applicants with two years of commissioned law enforcement experience or two years of honorable military service would be eligible for a waiver of the two-year college requirement. Likewise, one year of such qualifying experience could be substituted for one year's college work.

The temporary modification is intended to increase the reservoir of qualified applicants, with an evaluation of the results to be conducted to determine whether a continuation is justified.

The DPS hopes to recruit 268 new troopers this year, including the 92 who are presently in training.

Recruits live in the DPS law enforcement academy in Austin during the 18-week training course. Of the recruits in the present class, 35 are from minority groups and six are women.

Review May Be Ordered in Disability Cases

If you receive Social Security disability checks, remember that these payments can be made only for as long as your medical condition is considered to be disabling under the law.

Under a change in the law, most disability cases will be reviewed periodically to make sure requirements are still met.

When disability benefits were first paid in 1957, people who qualified had to be at least 50 and have a condition expected to be of long-continued and indefinite duration or to result in death.

Because of the strict requirements, less than one percent of these early beneficiaries ever recovered. Most stayed on the disability rolls until they became eligible for retirement checks at 65 or died. A few tried to work while disabled, but there was little financial incentive for doing so.

Legislation over the years changed the picture. Today an individual can get benefits at any age if he or she has an impairment that prevents work for at least a year and meets the non-medical requirements. As a result, people not permanently sidelined by accidents or disease may receive benefits. A number of them are young, skilled workers considered most likely to recover. And with recent major advances in medical science and rehabilitation technology, many can be expected to return to work eventually.

Some beneficiaries who want to try to work even though disabled are aided by certain

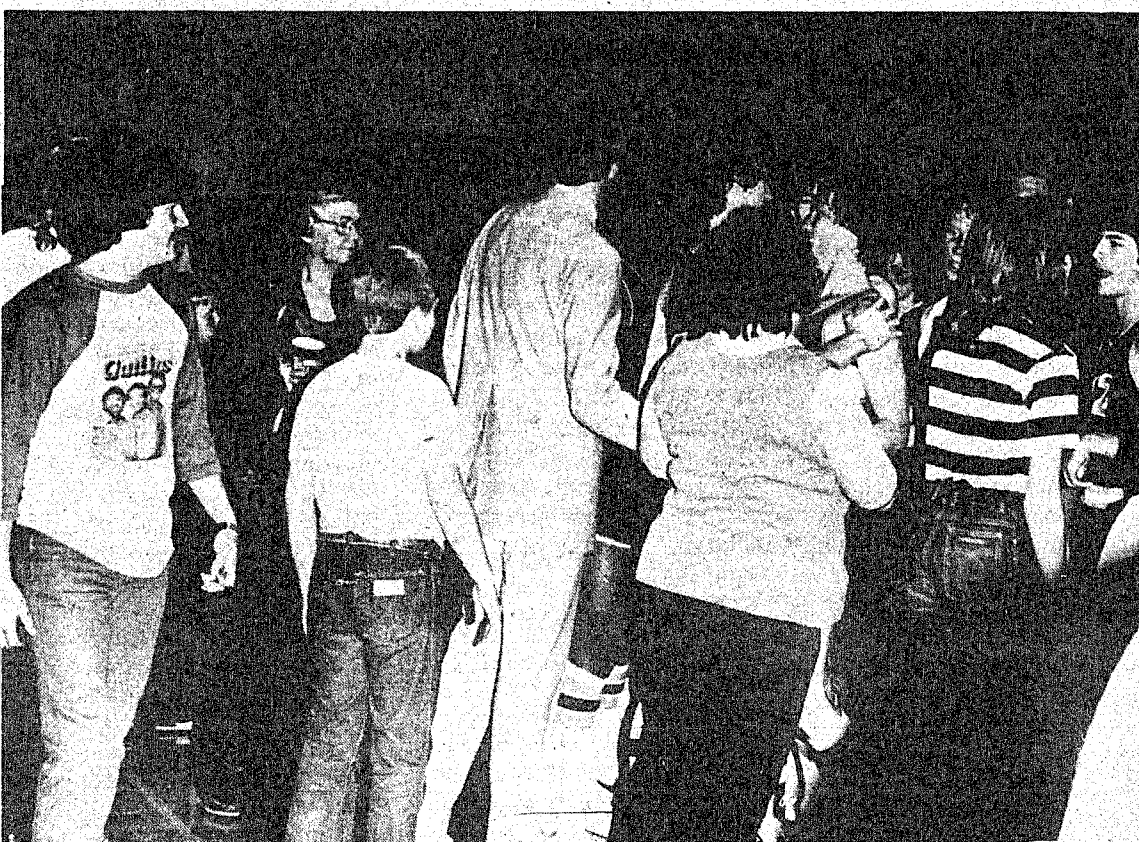
provisions in the law. One allows full benefits to be paid during a nine-month trial work period. Another allows many impairment-related work expenses to be deducted from earnings. Also Medicare can continue for up to three years if benefits stop due to work, and payments can quickly be restarted if the work attempt fails within a year after the last benefit check.

If you are a disabled beneficiary whose case comes up for review, you can be asked for information about your condition or for help in getting a recent medical report. Or you can be asked to take a special examination or test at government expense. It is important that you cooperate fully if contacted.

After the review is completed, you will receive a written notice of the decision made in your case. If your payments will end, you will first have an opportunity to submit, within 10 days, any new information or evidence you feel should be considered. You also have the right to request, within 60 days after receiving the notice you disagree with, a former reconsideration. You can find out more about this at any Social Security office.

Almost all social security matters can be handled by phone by calling toll free 800-392-1603, or visiting the Brownwood office.

New techniques for treating sewage promise taxpayers better systems at lower costs and with the consumption of less energy, to boot.

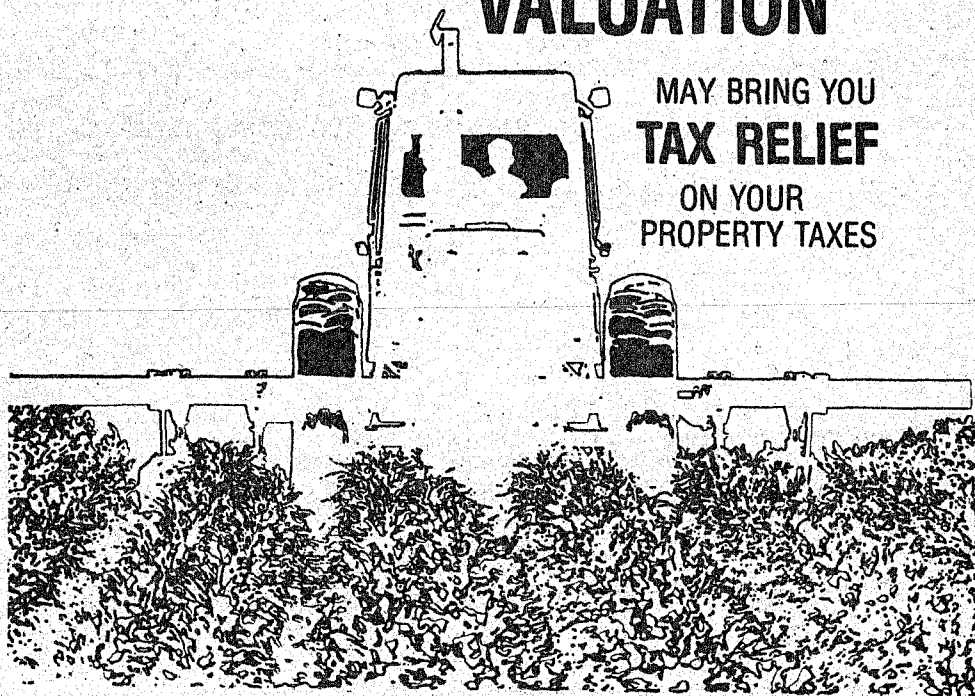

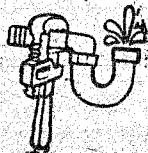
