Santa Anna High School will again be well represented at the State Boys Tennis meet in Austin this weekend, having the two doubles teams from Region II-A in the competition.

In the tournament at Abilene last week, Tommy DeLeon and Junior Salazar defeated Mike Hartman and Paul Vasquez for the Regional Championship after advancing from the District meet in the same order.

The two teams will have games Friday morning in the opening round of State competition, playing the teams from D'Hanis at the University of

Texas Intramural Tennis Center starting at 9 a.m. Their opponents also have two doubles teams in the meet.

Randy Casey and Johnny Vasquez were eliminated from the Regional contests in the second round of play, failing to qualify for the state meet. Randy is a junior and Johnny is a freshman at SAHS.

The Coleman County chapter of Association of Texas Professional Educators have selected Teresa Rolfe of Santa Anna as recipient of the 1982 college scholarship.

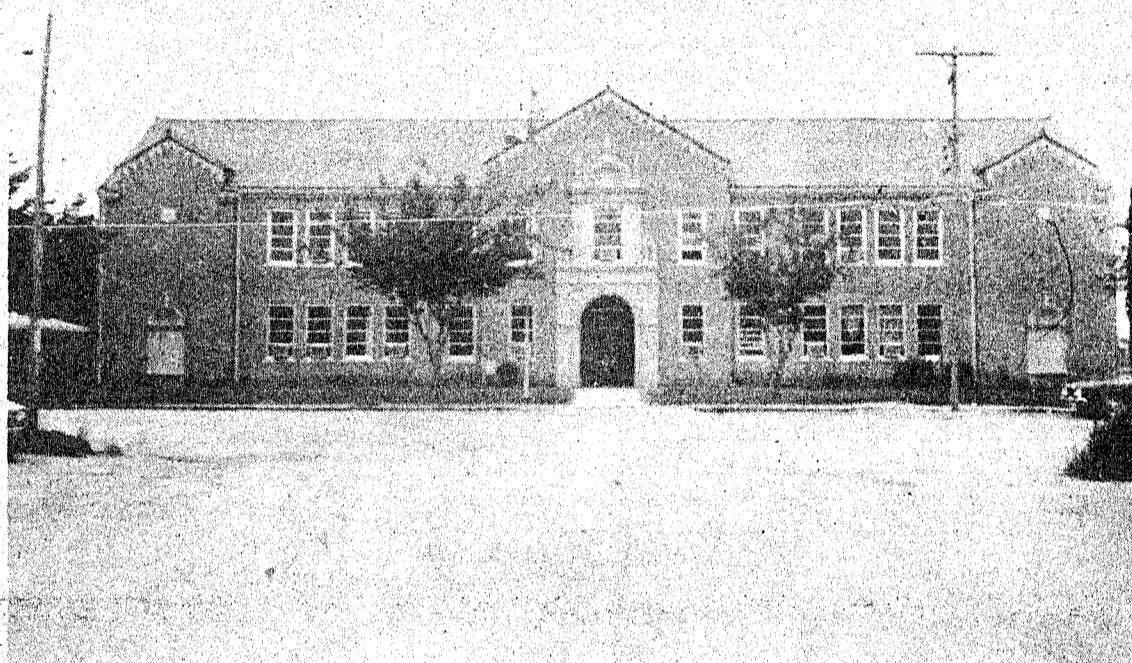
The organization is composed of faculty, administrators and school personnel, and met Monday, May 3, for the annual picnic and business meeting.

Open Letter to Citizens of Santa Anna

I would like to express thanks from the City Council and myself to the citizens of Santa Anna for their help and support concerning the surcharge added to the city utilities.

When the Council held the town meeting last September to explain the situation, we had no idea how the extra burden of \$5.00 per month would be accepted. We only knew the necessity of it.

I would like the citizens of Santa Anna to know that 98 percent of all people billed have responded favorably. Only a very few have refused to help the city in its time of need.

Regretfully, we must continue the surcharge, but we are beginning to see daylight and hope the burden can be removed as early as September 1982.

Because of the help the citizens of Santa Anna have given to their city, we have been able to accomplish several things that would not have been possible otherwise. We have been able to pay all our past due bills and are starting to work on street repair. We have also been able to replace the trash truck without having to issue time warrants.

Let me say in closing that serving the people in Santa Anna has been made much easier by the patience and understanding shown by its citizens. We say with all our hearts and gratitude -- THANK YOU, THE CITIZENS OF SANTA ANNA.

Funeral services were held at First Baptist Church Sunday afternoon, May 9, for Roscoe W. Hosch, 79, a long-time Santa Anna merchant who died early Friday, May 7, at Twilight Nursing Home in Bangs after a long illness.

The Rev. Raymond Jones of Sidney, a former pastor of Santa Anna First Baptist Church,

officiated at the services that were directed by Henderson Funeral Home. Burial was in Santa Anna Cemetery.

Mr. Hosch was born in Santa Anna November 5, 1902, the son of pioneer residents, Walter J. and Hester Ann (Ayers) Hosch. He attended the Santa Anna schools and married Texanna Willis in Santa Anna August 15, 1926.

Hosch was in the family business operations, managing the Hosch Grocery Store for many years. The store closed in 1973 when he retired.
