## City Council Has Meeting

M. L. Guthrie Jr. Chosen Mayor Pro-Tem

M. L. Guthrie Jr. was chosen Mayor Pro-tem at the Thursday, April 8, meeting of City Council. Three Councilmen were sworn into office, Donald Hosch, Jim Laubhan and

Carmen Donham.

Mayor Edd Hartman presided at the meeting, with several visitors present.

Gary Fleeman met with the Council concerning plumbing

repairs needed at the Civic Center, and Mary Lou Jones was granted permission to revise the budget for the Senior Citizens program for the community to provide additional services.

Street lighting was discussed, with plans reviewed to have additional lighting installed in the downtown area as soon as a crew from West Texas Utilities Co. was available for the work.

The Council voted to grant the Mexican Baptist Church use of the Civic Center for services on Sunday on a temporary basis, not to conflict with other events already on the Civic Center calendar.

The City Dog Leash law was approved at the third reading. Dogs running loose in the town are being picked up and owners will be fined or the dogs disposed of unless kept confined.

Health insurance for city employees was discussed, and plans made to take bids on insurance coverage for the employees.

The next meeting of City Council will be Thursday, May 6.

## New Colorado River Bridge Planned South of Rockwood

The two-lane narrow truss metal bridge across the Colorado River south of Rockwood will be replaced with a prestressed concrete structure as part of a highway project that is planned by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Bids were received this week on the project that will include reconditioning, widening and

resurfacing of U. S. Highway 283 from one mile south of Rockwood to 0.9 mile south of the Colorado River, a total of 3.7 miles.

The existing roadway width of 22 feet will be expanded to 40 feet.

Wes Heald is the department's engineer supervising the project that once underway, is expected to take 320 working days to complete.

## Former Pastor to Lead Revival Here Next Week

Rev. E. Richard Chaffin of Las Vegas, New Mexico, will be speaker at the spring revival at United Methodist Church Sunday, April 18, through Wednesday, April 21. Services will be held at 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. on Sunday, and at 7 p.m. Monday through Wednesday. Theme for the services will be "The Heart of the Bible."

Rev. Chaffin was pastor of Santa Anna United Methodist Church for four years, coming here from Eastern Hills UMC in Fort Worth. He formerly pastored churches in Baird, N. M. and El Paso, and from Santa Anna went to Fabens as pastor of the Fabens - Clint churches.

Chaffin holds a master of theology degree from Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University, and in 1980 received his doctorate degree from Brite Divinity School at Texas Christian University.

He is on the Council of Ministries, Board of Pensions and Board of Discipleship of the New Mexico Methodist Conference, and works with the District Council on Ministries in Albuquerque.

Mrs. Chaffin will be here for the services and bringing special music. The program for

basic Bible study will be used in conjunction with the revival, the theme of study for Chaffin's doctorate.

While living in Santa Anna, Chaffin was very active in community events, serving as chairman of the Committee on Aging, the Community Services, Inc., and Lions Club. The Chaffins are parents of two sons, David, a student in the Luna Vocational Technical School in Las Vegas, and Danny a student in Robertson High School there.

People of all denominations are invited to attend the services next week.

## SAHS Band Gets Top Rating In UIL Contests

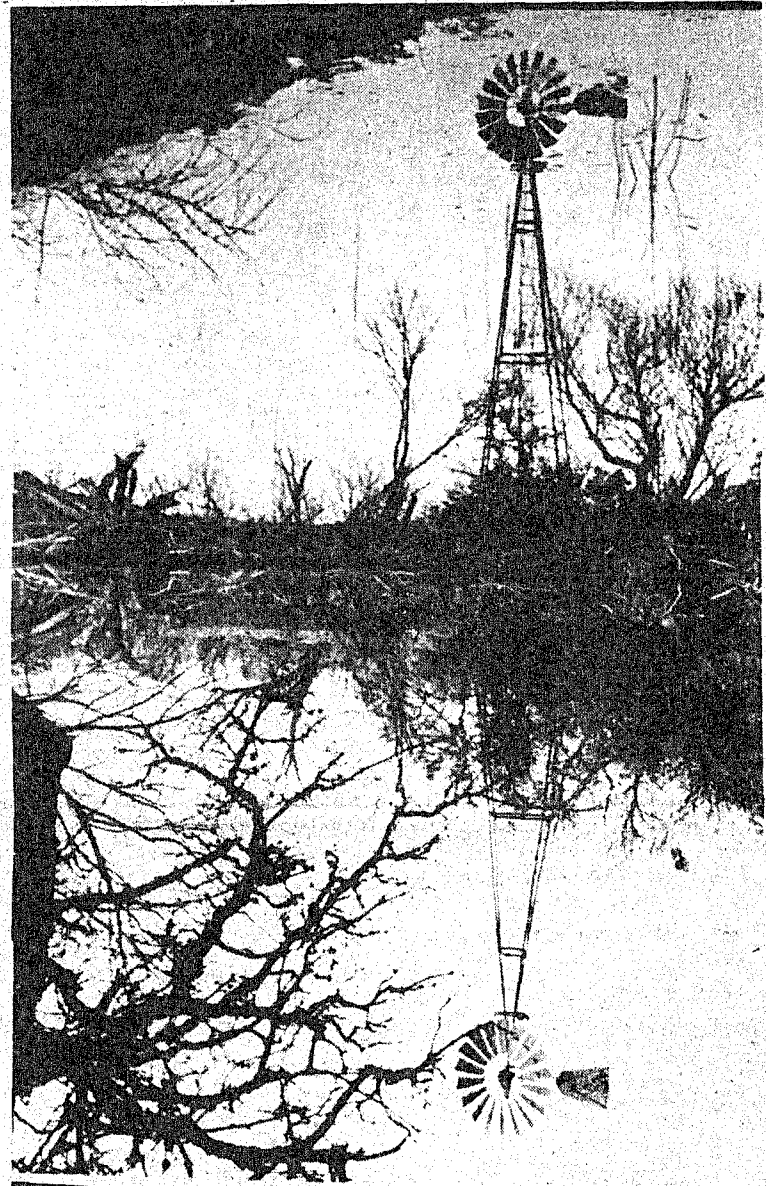

## Trickham Cemetery Group Slates Annual Meeting

The 34th annual meeting of the Trickham Cemetery Association will be held Sunday, April 18. Rev. Bob Weathers of Brownwood, District Superintendent of the Methodist Churches, will be speaker for the 11 a.m. memorial program. A business session will be held during the morning, and a basket lunch will be served at the Community Center at noon. A singing will be held during the afternoon.

The annual meeting serves as a community homecoming, with hundreds of former residents attending each year.

The Cemetery, one of the oldest in this part of Texas, was deeded to the community in 1893 by the late Mrs. M. M. Sanders who came here to claim land purchased by her late husband, and found several graves on the property. She had the five and one-half acres surveyed and fenced.

The Trickham Cemetery Association was organized February 28, 1948 with five directors appointed, Oscar Boenicke, W. T. Martin, Lige Lancaster, Will Haynes and Lou

Featherston. Lancaster served as director 21 years, and Oscar Boenicke resigned as president of the group after serving 29 years. Lou Featherston is the only surviving member of the original board of directors.

In 1950 the Association held the first Memorial Day service with Rev. J. B. Weathers as speaker, the grandfather of the speaker for this year's program.

Through contributions and interest from deposits, the Trickham Cemetery has been well maintained and a source of pride to the community. Through the community project, equipment has been purchased for the Community Center, and a special fund has been set up to maintain that building.

People of Trickham will be welcoming visitors and former residents to the community Sunday, and all are welcome to attend.

## Former Student Writes Tribute to Mrs. Evans

Mrs. Maud Evans is gone now to be with her Lord, but certainly not to be forgotten by those she touched during her life on this plane. She touched so many through her many years of teaching, nurturing and gently directing those students lucky enough to be under tutoring, I being one.

I first attended class under Mrs. Evans in the third grade, many years ago in the elementary school, now gone, where the National Guard Armory now stands. I, like most everyone, was mortified of Mrs.

Evans, even though for the life of me I can never understand why. She turned out to be the most dedicated, interested teacher I ever had.

I then left Santa Anna during the big war and did not return until my Junior year in high school in 1944. There was Mrs. Evans, as an administrator, still doing her 'thing' and doing it superbly, as she continued to do all during my schooling and then for many years after.

Mrs. Evans had dedication that few school teachers possess.

I remember in my year of endeavor in Plane Geometry, which she so lovingly taught. I was not a good student in Plane Geometry. Mrs. Evans took me home with her many afternoons after school and tutored me. She was determined that I was to pass that course. I finally did pass Plane Geometry, but only because she was interested and took the time to help me over a very difficult time in my life. I thank God for Mrs. Evans.

This is only one incident. There are so many more that in her quiet, methodical, loving way she molded the students under her care. She took her responsibility seriously.

I know that without exception, any and all of her students can relate to the incident above because of like instances in their lives.

I'll miss Mrs. Evans and will always remember her as one who did her job well in her journey on this earthly plane. She was special in my life. I wish that my children had had the opportunity of being taught by this great lady.

To know Mrs. Evans was to love her. I thank God that he gave me that privilege.

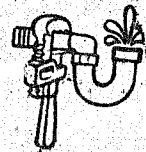

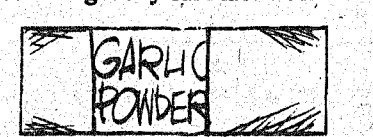

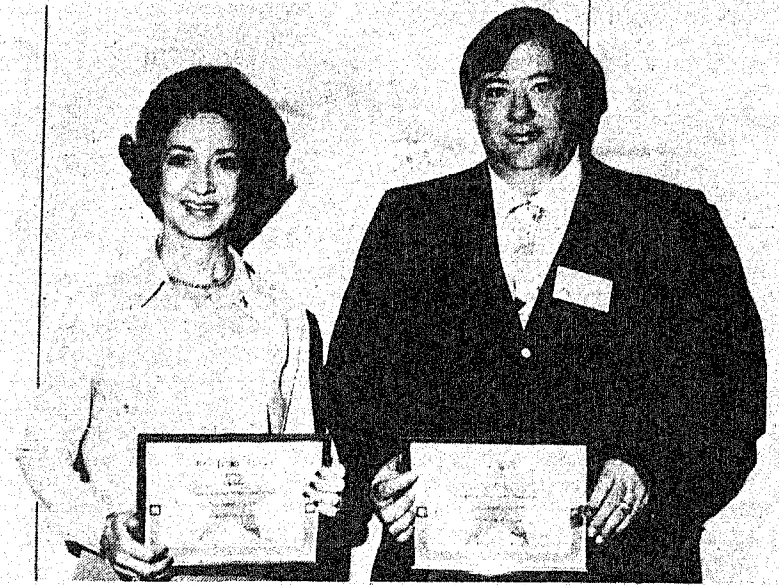

The garment factory opened just after World War II in the Coleman Air Field complex, and the business was moved to the present building in the mid-1960's. The late A. C. Jinright owned and operated the plant for many years, and a number of Santa Anna people have been employed there since its beginning.

# Foreign Owners Have Holdings in County

AUSTIN— Six parcels of agricultural land in Coleman County amounting to 9,452.5 acres have been registered as foreign owned by the U. S. Department of Agriculture since a Federal law was passed in 1976.

This total is 1.3 percent of the agricultural land in the county.

Foreign ownership in the state has increased only slightly from .5 percent in the first compilation in 1960 to .6 percent in 1981.

The total land registered in Texas of foreign ownership is 792,408.2 acres with an estimated value of \$894,859,162.00, according to

Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown.

"Land is a vital natural resource, and we should take steps to protect it if the acreage purchases by foreigners begin to mushroom," Brown said.

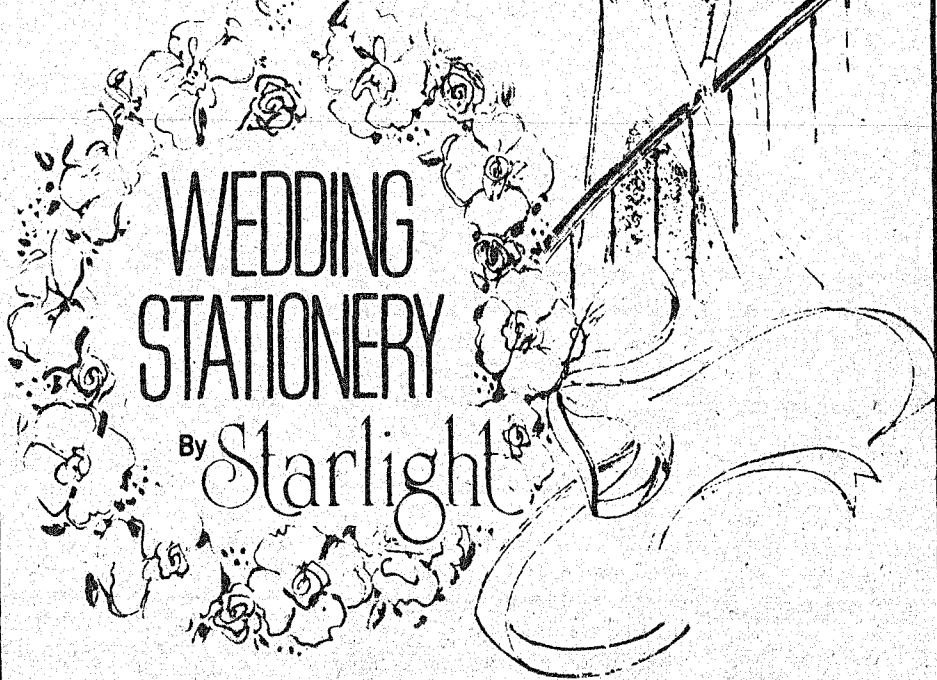

## Friday Deadline Set For Deficiency Payment Signup

Producers have until Friday, April 16, to declare their intentions to participate in the 1982 cotton, feed grains and wheat programs with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

The 1982 farm program, along with the Grain Reserve Loan Program for feed grain and wheat, is designed to reduce production, to remove commodities from the marketplace, and to eventually result in an increase in the prices received for the commodities. However, this can be accomplished only if producers understand and make use of the program.

The effects of weak economic activity and large crops continue to depress farm prices.

The Feed Grain and Wheat Acreage Reduction Programs will reduce the amount of grain harvested this year. The Grain Reserve Loan Program, if utilized by grain farmers, will reduce the amount of surplus grain on the market.

If enough farmers across the United States will use the acreage reduction and reserve programs, then farm prices should go up.

Program participation is voluntary. However, only those farmers who sign up by April 16 will be eligible for price support loans, target price deficiency payments, and the grain reserve loan program.

Coleman County farmers are requested to contact the ASCS office in Coleman by Friday, April 16, if they are interested in participating in the program or want more information.
