SAHS Students Qualify For Regional UIL Meet

Four Santa Anna High School students will be in Abilene April 14 and 15 for the Regional Interscholastic League literary contests, reaching that division after winning in district contests in Lometa last Friday.

Mike Wetsel placed first in the science contest, and Robbie Clifton was first in spelling.

Casey Anderson was third in poetry interpretation, and Monique Spillman was third in

both spelling and in calculator applications. James Peiton was fourth in the calculator contest but did not qualify for the regional contests.

Robbie Clifton was also second in the number sense event at the district meet.

The regional meet will be held at McMurry Campus, with the first and second place entries to advance to the state meet in Austin in early May.

Kindergarten Round-up Scheduled Tomorrow

Children who will be entering kindergarten at the Santa Anna Elementary School next fall are to be pre-enrolled this week. Sue Newman, kindergarten teacher, has planned the annual Kindergarten Round-up on Friday, April 2, at 2:30 p.m.

Parents of the children will meet in the cafeterium with the principal, Charles Brewster, and school nurse, Debbie Dean, while the new students meet

their classmates and teacher in the kindergarten room.

Although birth certificates and immunization records are not required for the registration this week, they are necessary for attending classes, and it is helpful to have the information available at this time.

All children who will be five years old on or before September 1, 1982 are requested to be present.

any way should be present.

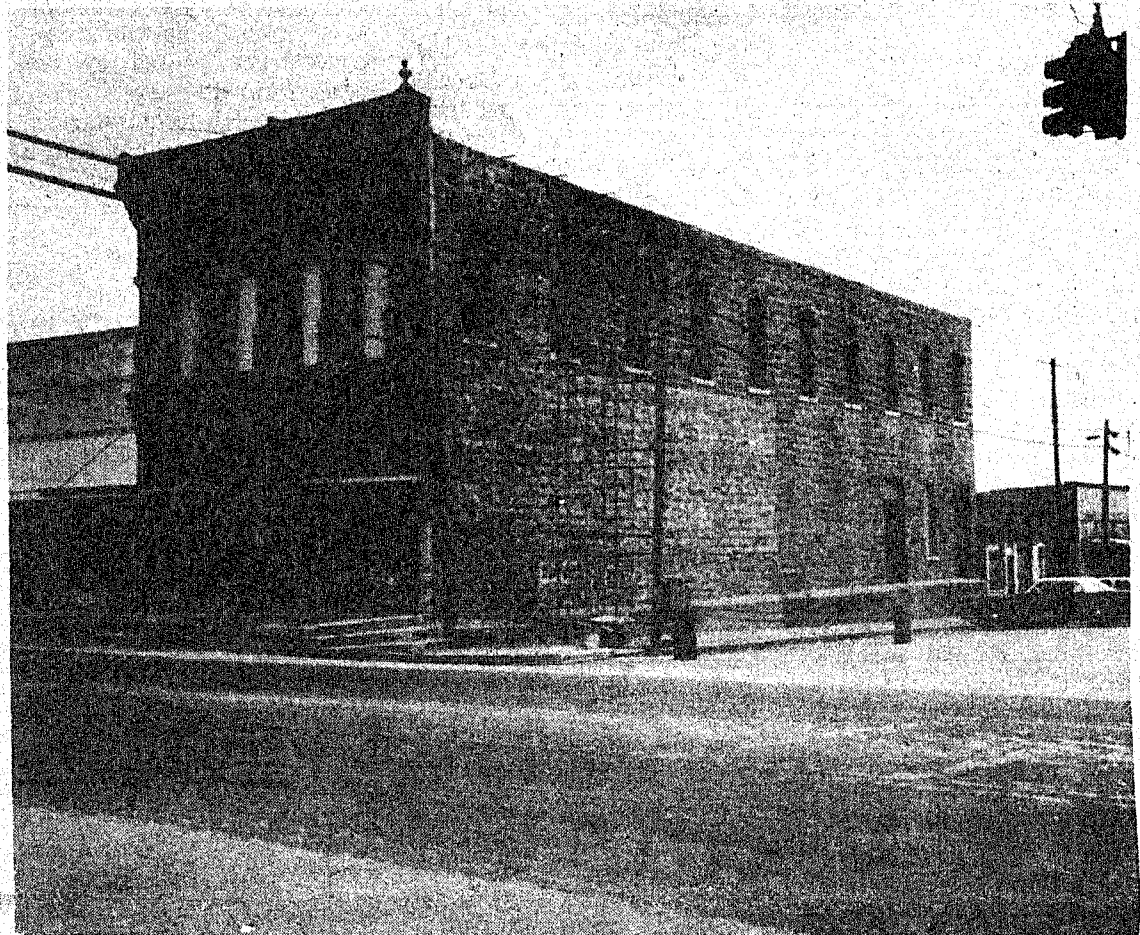
At the Monday night meeting Donna Bradley was selected vice president of the organization.

Saturday Elections Slated

City Council, School District Balloting

Montie Guthrie III will serve as election judge for the City Council election Saturday. Voting by residents of the city will be at the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative building from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Clerks will be Ramona Myers and Mary Vasquez.

Seven names are on the ballot, and another candidate is seeking election by write-in.

The three candidates with the largest number of votes will be elected for two-year terms on the Council.

Names on the ballot include Patrick Hosch, Carmen Donham, Jim Lambhan, Joe Bertoni, Norman Asher, Glenda Cook and John Pearce. Don Hosch is the write-in candidate.

Voters in the Santa Anna Independent School District will go to the polls Saturday to elect two trustees. The election will be held at the Lions Club Building from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. with Rose Bass as election judge.

Clerks will be Lillian Herndon, Myrtle Burden and Doris Griffin.

Three candidates are on the ballot, with the two receiving the highest number of votes elected for three-year terms. On the ballot are Max Eubank, an incumbent, Terry McIver and JoAn Day.

Jay Weathers, the current president of the Board of Trustees, withdrew from the race a few days after filing for re-election.

Other members of the ISD Board are Donnie Neff, Polly Warnock, Donald Strickland, Montie Guthrie III, and Eddie Wayne Hartman.

Law Suit Continues For City, Landowners

Santa Anna City officials will be in Fort Worth again Thursday (today) for a continuation of the trial involving area landowners and the City of Santa Anna. The case, involving discharge of water from the city sewer installation, is being heard in Federal Court and is to be decided by the judge, and not a jury.

The court was recessed last week after a day and one-half of testimony by Tom and Mary Stearns and Carl Benton for the plaintiffs and the attorney for the City of Santa Anna and an engineer who has worked with the project. Mayor Ed Hartman and members of the City Council are expected to give

testimony today. According to the landowners, the city has failed to stop discharge of water from the sewer installation, resulting in damage to the property and pollution of the stream into which the water flows.

The plaintiffs have indicated they sought to stop the problem without any results, and resorted to the legal proceedings as a last resort. They also have said they want no penalty or fines for the city, but to only stop the damage and inconvenience caused by the sewer farm discharge.

City officials have contended that they are operating with a proper permit and that the lan-

downers at no time came to the Council to discuss the matter.

According to those at the trial last week, the judge was critical of both parties in the suit that it should ever have reached his court.

Residents of Santa Anna have watched with interest the proceedings as a surcharge was imposed on city utilities to pay the cost of a lawyer and court expenses. The suit was filed in late 1979 and is just now coming to trial after several postponements.

City officials did not know when the judge would make a ruling in the case.

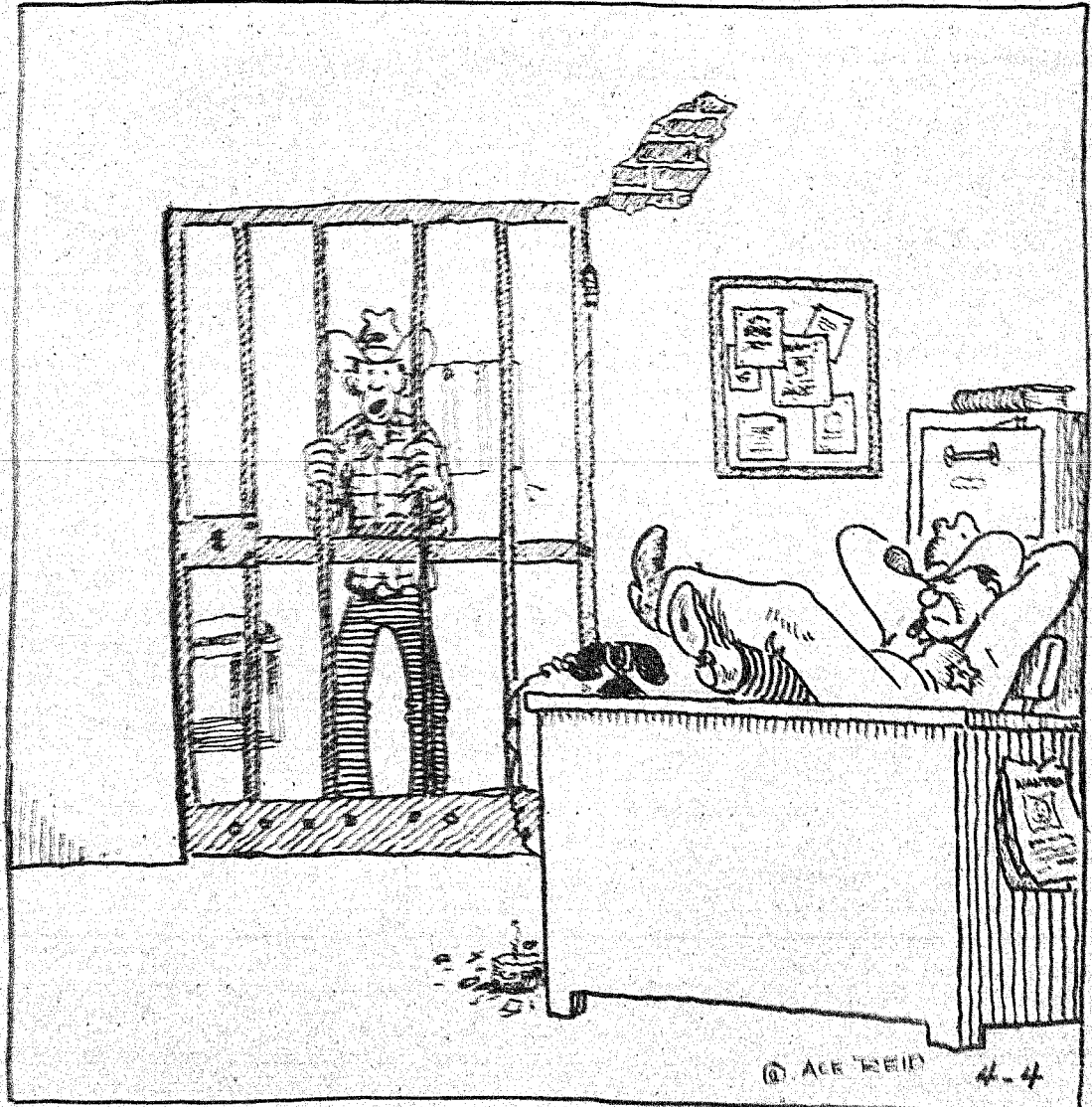

VFD Membership Drive Is Now Underway

The annual associate membership drive for Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department is underway, with local residents being contacted for donations.

The Santa Anna VFD is operated through funds from the community residents and with some aid from the City of Santa Anna.

Several major projects are planned with income from the 1982 drive. The water tank on the rural fire truck is to be replaced, the engine on the small rural truck is to be replaced, and safety equipment will be purchased for members of the department.

Rural residents are especially urged to contribute to the fund, as the majority of calls are to the rural area, and greater expense and time is required for the rural fires. The department ruled last year that those not enrolled in the associate membership group would be charged for calls to their homes outside the city limits. This regulation was made necessary by the cost of fuel, tires and other equipment used on each call.

The VFD has 19 active members at the current time. Donald Strickland is Fire Chief, and Lee Ray Huggins is Assistant Chief.

Captains are David Huggins and Charles Wetsel; Lane Guthrie and Roddy Dean are Assistant Captains. Officers of the organization are Clint Day, president; Edd Hartman, vice president; Freddie Dodson, secretary-treasurer; and John Stanislaw, chaplain.

Also present were Mrs. Marty Donham, Michelle and Suzette Cozart of Santa Anna, and Mr. and Mrs. Glen Lewis of Corpus Christi, a brother of Mrs. Donham.

In making the dedication, High School Principal Gerald Brister read the following memorial prepared by Supt. R. C. Smith:

"During the time A. D. Donham was in our school system he was an inspiration to an abundance of students, faculty and people of our community.

Coach Donham had the ability to be at ease with the sixth graders, twelfth graders and adults alike. He was a person whom after you got to know him, made you feel thankful you had the opportunity to know

such a person.

Stephen Grellett's words best exemplify the life of A. D. Donham: "I expect to pass through this world but once, and good therefore that I can do or any kindness I can show to any fellow creature, let me do it now, let me not defer nor neglect it, for I shall not pass this way again."

"A. D. Donham was a husband, father, educator and coach, but most of all he was a friend," concluded the tribute.

At the starting line to cut the black and gold ribbon across the track were Mrs. Donham and the children, Janice, Larry and Marty.

Donham, the son of Santa Anna business people, was a graduate of Santa Anna High School. He was a member of the Santa Anna school faculty 14 years until his sudden death in January 1962.

Meet The Candidates

Saturday is election day in Santa Anna, and seldom have voters in the City had such a good slate of candidates. Seven names are appearing on the ballot, and another, Donald Hosch, is a write-in candidate for the City Council post he now holds. The three candidates with the largest number of votes will be elected to two-year terms.

Scott Patterson is the only incumbent not seeking reelection. Patrick Hosch, a one-term incumbent, is seeking reelection, and Hosch, an appointee to the council, will be vying for his first regular term. Hosch assumed his election last April was for a two-year term, and after the deadline for applying for the ballot found his term was for only one year of the unexpired term held by Eddie Jones, who moved from the community.

Others on the ballot are Glenda Cook, Carmen Donham, Jim Laubhan, Norman Asher, John Pearce and Joe Bertoni.

S-Anna Woman Elected President Of W-Tex Group

The Cooks have four children, Selina and Missy, elementary students, Devin, aged three, and a baby son, Boone.

Patrick Hosch was elected to Santa Anna City Council in April 1980. He would like to be returned to office as he is familiar with the operation of the city that include problems with the water system, legal suits now in litigation, finances and bond payments. During the past year while serving on the group, the City Council has managed to get the town out of its financial crisis and on its way out of debt.

A graduate of Santa Anna High School, Hosch attended Tarleton State University three years and is a licensed mortician, working with Henderson Funeral Homes from 1973-1981. He is now employed at Santa Anna National Bank. For a number of years he was a partner in Hosch Furniture Co.

Hosch's wife, Sandra, is a physicians assistant working in Coleman. They are active members of First Baptist Church.

Jim Laubhan is a native of Odessa who has made his home in Santa Anna for nine years. He is owner and manager of Art Fabrics that designs and distributes lettering and emblems on sporting goods, caps, etc. The company currently employs eight people.

Laubhan and his wife, Judy, also own the new Opera House Antique shop in downtown Santa Anna.

As a businessman in town, Laubhan expressed an interest in the operation of the city, and wants to be involved in the city business. He feels his experience as a businessman will be an asset to the city and wants to take part in the community.

Norman Asher, the other candidate for City Council, has not been available for an interview or furnished information concerning his candidacy. He has resided in Santa Anna several years and is a heavy equipment operator.

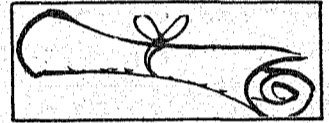
CITY COUNCIL TO MEET

Visitors are welcome to attend the 6:30 p.m. session next week.

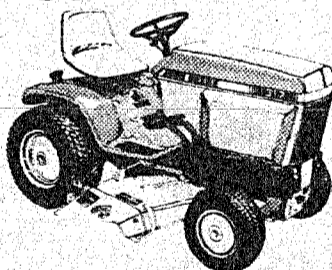

Former S-Anna Merchant Buried on Wednesday

T. Homer Goodgion, 92, a retired businessman and long-time resident of our area, died Monday, March 29, in Brownwood Regional Hospital after a brief illness. Funeral services were held Wednesday, March 31, at Henderson Funeral Chapel with Rev. Howell Martin of Trickham officiating. Interment was in the Trickham Cemetery.

Mr. Goodgion was born in Hopkins County, Texas September 2, 1889, the son of C. D. and Annie L. (Collins) Goodgion. He came to Coleman County with his family in 1907 and attended the Santa Anna schools.

He married Bessie R. Tarter at Trickham June 18, 1916. She

died in 1969. He was a Methodist and a member of the Santa Anna Mountain Lodge No. 661 for over 50 years.

After retiring from farming and ranching in the Trickham community, Mr. Goodgion opened a lumber company here, operating the business until after his 90th birthday. He was well-known in the area for his singing, and for many years took part in the singing conventions and other musical events in the area.

Survivors are four daughters, Mrs. Violet Plashett of Vallejo, Calif., Mrs. W. W. (Doris) Shaw of Santa Anna, Mrs. Jack (Ruby) Yates of Abilene and Mrs. Robert (Reba) Yongema of Corpus Christi; two sons, Hayden Goodgion of Richardson and Floyd Goodgion of Stewart, Tenn.; 17 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren.

Pallbearers for the services were R. W. Balke, Dale Bradley, Rankin McIver, Harvey Goodgion, Ronnie Yongema and Fred Seay. Friends of Mr. Goodgion were honorary pallbearers.

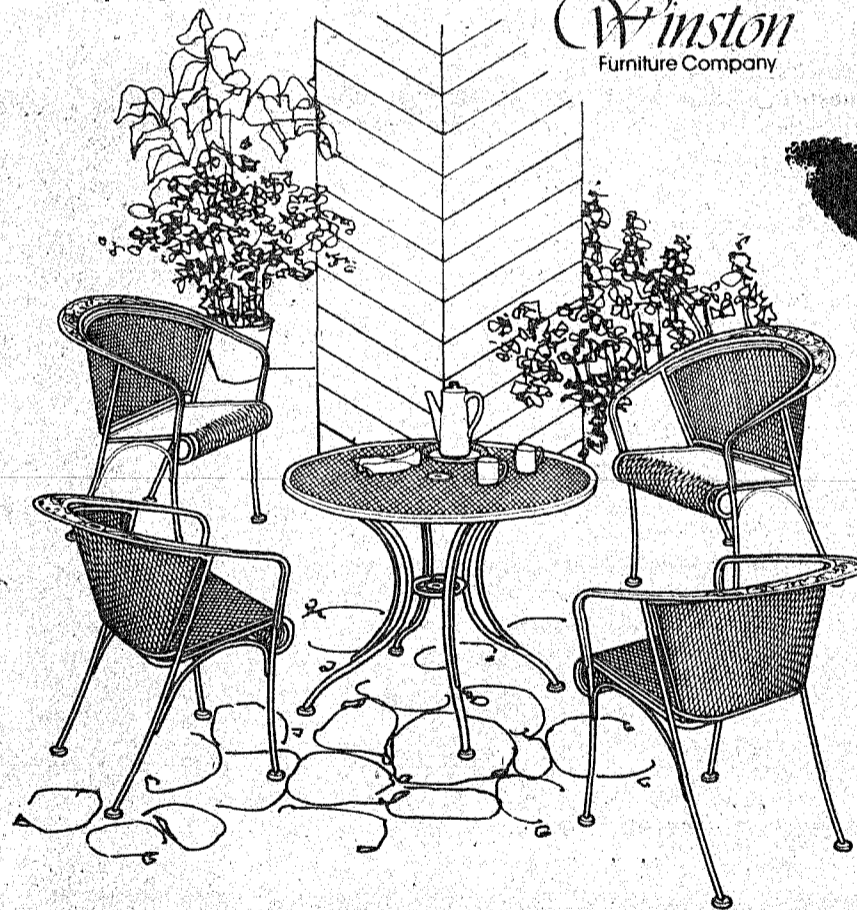
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FFA Judging Teams To Area Event Today

In the land judging contest at TSU, Ramon Castillo was fourth high individual.

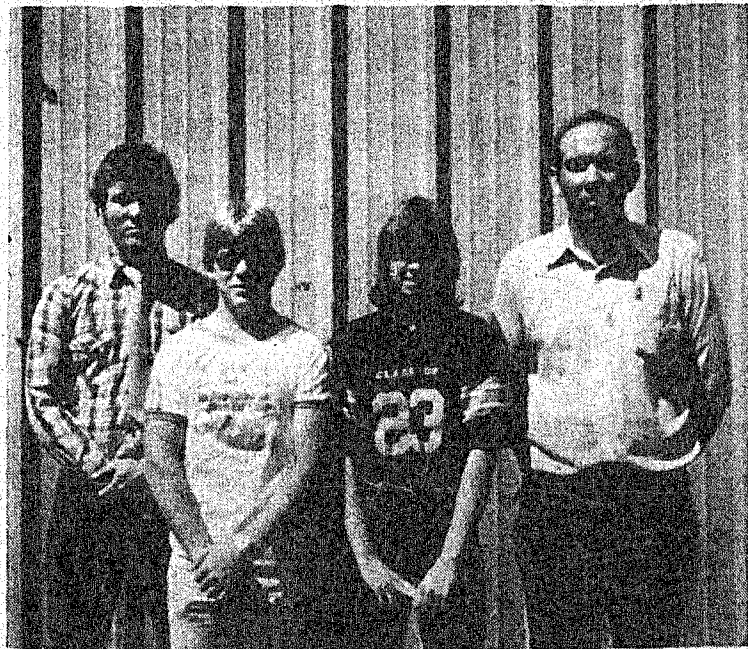

City Sales Tax Shows Increase

The City of Santa Anna received \$1,410.49 in sales taxes for the period ending March 7, according to a report from State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office. The figure included the one percent city sales tax for two months, and was a 43.37 percent increase over the same period last year.

Santa Anna has received \$7,895.19 for 1982, compared with just over \$5,500 for the same period last year.

The State-wide collection was up 29 percent over 1981.

Liability Insurance Now Required

AUSTIN—The 90-day DPS warning period for the new mandatory liability insurance law expires this week. After midnight, Wednesday, March 31, state troopers will begin issuing citations to drivers who fail to show proof of insurance when such information is requested.

The law, which became effective January 1, requires all drivers to carry minimum liability coverage for bodily injury of \$10,000 per person (\$20,000 for two or more persons) and property damage of \$5,000.

Col. Jim Adams, DPS Director, said the law is encouraging more drivers to obtain the required coverage.

"DPS figures show that during 1981, approximately 73 percent of drivers involved in reportable accidents had the insurance," Adams pointed out. "That number increased to 81 percent for the first two months of this year."

Drivers who fail to carry the required coverage risk being fined from \$75 to \$200 for the first offense, and from \$200 to \$1,000 for subsequent violations. Suspension of drivers license can also result from the offense.

Being chosen for the group is a distinct honor, and Teresa will also receive college credit for the tour. She will enroll in West Texas State University im-

mediately following her graduation from Santa Anna High School, attending part of the first summer session before departing on the trip. She has received a scholarship to the Canyon college and will be a member of the WTSU band. She also was offered a complete scholarship to Cisco Junior College and scholarships to Texas Tech University and McMurry College. She plans to pursue a career in music education, becoming a band director.

Besides attending classes at SAHS where she is a member of the tennis team, in the One-Act Play cast, a member of FHA, Librarians and Science Clubs, Teresa finds time to rehearse - sometimes several hours a day. She said her parents and twin sister, Lisa, are used to her trumpet playing as she has been doing it since sixth grade. Credit is given her brother-in-law and former band director Ben Hill, now of Whiteface, who encouraged Teresa to become so successful with her instrument. She is currently studying

with Tommy Fry, director of music at McMurry College, making a weekly trip to Abilene for a private trumpet lesson.

The trip and the many preparations are exciting for Teresa, with the thought of seeing Europe a dream come true.

Although she has accounted for about \$500 and made reservations for the trip to New York, she must raise the additional funds within two months so that final arrangements can be made.

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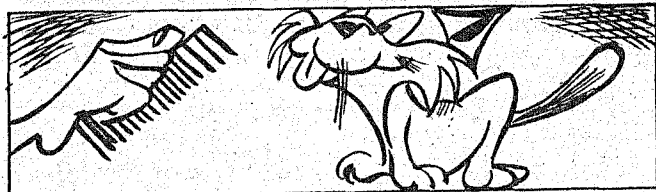

Other winners from the local team included Collins 5th in shot put; Ike Garza fourth in 110 hurdles and fifth in 200 meter dash.

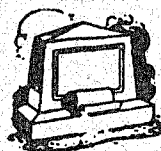
In the high school girls divi-

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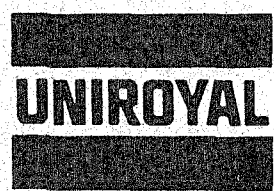
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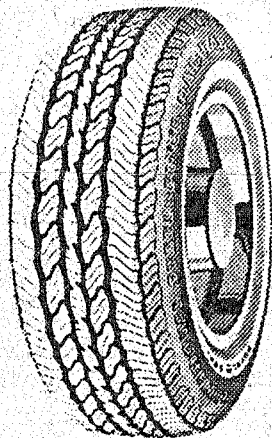
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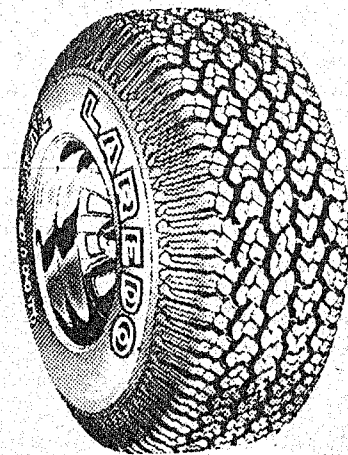

Weed Control is Urged On Texas Rangeland

COLLEGE STATION—Ranchers can knock out most annual range weeds with an early spring herbicide application.

Otherwise, an abundance of weeds can reduce grass production and rob ranchers of their profits.

"The herbicide 2,4-D gives excellent control of annual range weeds if they are growing rapidly and have not yet flowered," points out Dr. Tommy G. Welch, range brush and weed control specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University system.

Welch recommends using 2,4-D amine in areas of more than 25 inches of annual rainfall and 2,4-D low-volatile ester in areas of less rainfall. For harder-to-control weeds, he suggests mixing 2,4-D and dicamba in a 3 to 1 ratio.

"Weed control on rangeland can produce significant returns," says Welch.

Good soil moisture conditions last fall over the state allowed many weeds to germinate. These will begin to grow rapidly as temperatures moderate and spring rains come. So ranchers need to make frequent checks and begin control measures as soon as weed infestations appear.

"Car-train" crash barrier protects highway crews

COLLEGE STATION — An experimental, mobile crash barrier designed to protect road repair crews performed "excellently," says a state highway department official who watched a recent crash test at Texas A&M University.

The unconventional barrier, consisting of five old station wagons, guardrails and wood, was designed by researchers of the Texas Transportation Institute (TTI) to stop vehicles from hitting workers performing repair work on busy freeways and streets. Last year, 12 workers were killed in Houston alone.

The barrier — designed by TTI researchers Don Ivey, Hayes Ross and Ted Hirsch — is five cars connected together. Only the first car needs to run, and like a train engine, pulls the others along. Guardrailing is attached to the sides of the vehicles with heavy wood beams and metal bolts.

At present, workers are protected by either orange plastic cones or concrete, the researchers said. The cones offer virtually no protection and the concrete barriers are expensive and time-consuming to position.

Renovation of Opera House Underway

Renovation of the old Stockard building at Santa Anna's main intersection has brought interest and much reminiscing of earlier times.

Jim Laubhan, local businessman, recently purchased the two-story building from Roy Stockard Jr., the son of the original owner. Stockard, a lifetime resident of Santa Anna, now makes his home in Brownwood but continues to maintain his home here.

An antique shop is opening soon in the lower portion of the old building. An office is being prepared for Mrs. Laubhan, the proprietor of the business, on the second floor, and later plans call for remodeling the remainder of the second floor for apartments.

According to Mrs. John C. Hunter in her book, "Historically Speaking: Coleman County, Texas," the building was the first rock building constructed in Santa Anna.

The late L. V. Stockard was the first Depot Agent when the Santa Fe Railroad completed the line through Santa Anna in 1886. He soon built his home here, and later the downtown building.

The only date available is from the cast iron columns in front that have Pat. 1887, so it assumed the building was constructed within a year or two of that date. A New Jersey architect and dealer of metals visited the old building in 1977 and reported the second floor columns and cornice to be pressed metal.

The exact sequence of different businesses is not known, but W. R. Kelley had a bank in the northwest corner upstairs in 1892, and after Mr. Stockard quit the railroad, he had a real estate office in the southwest corner of the second floor. The Masonic Lodge met in the north end of the building.

The building was known as the "Opera House," with a large stage in the north end of the upstairs portion. Entry was from the double door at the southwest corner of the building.

Frequent chautauqua programs were held there, as well as musical programs and movies.

C. A. Walker had a drugstore in the building, closing it in the late 1930's. Apartments were made on the second floor about that time. The building housed the local "pool hall" for a number of years and in more recent years is has been used for storage.

About three years ago when workers boarded up the second floor windows, sightseers in the old building found the upstairs

portion almost intact, with nameplates for Dr. Tyson and others still over the office doors.

Passersby have long noticed

the interesting old building, and local residents have taken for granted the sturdy reminder of our heritage and past.


