Jones - Wetsel Qualify For State Tennis Meet

Julie Jones and Karen Wetsel will represent Santa Anna High School at the State Girls Tennis Tournament in Austin next week, playing in the doubles competition. The duo won the Region II-A championship last week, defeating the Blum doubles team 6-0, 6-3 in the final

round.

The girls won over the Cross Plains entry in the opening round, then defeated the Paint Rock duo in the second match. They won 6-2, 6-2 over the Byers girls in the semi-finals.

The two girls will compete in the State meet May 7 and 8. It will be the second trip to the event for Julie, a senior and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Jones. She and teammate Lori Smith competed last year. Her partner this year is a junior and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Wetsel.

The other Santa Anna doubles entry, Holly Smith and Robin Hartman, won their first match over Poolville, then lost in a split set to Benjamin.

Janis Weathers, the SAHS singles entry, won her first match before being eliminated from the tourney.

Coach R. C. Smith and the boys tennis entries are in Brownwood this week for the district meet, playing for berths in the Regional meet May 4 and 5. The Mountaineer team is expected to dominate the district meet as well as place well in the Regional competition.

Primary Election on Saturday

A lengthy ballot will be available for local voters in the Saturday, May 1 Democratic Primary. Santa Anna voters will cast their ballots at the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative building. Montie Guthrie III will be election judge, with voting from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Bert Fowler will be election judge at Rockwood, with voting at the Rockwood Community Center.

Precinct Two voters in the

Coleman area will vote at the office of Dr. J. Ray Martin in Coleman, with Roy Miller as election judge.

The Republican primary ballot will be brief, and only one polling place is set in Coleman County, at the Chamber of Commerce office in Coleman, also from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

In addition to the many statewide races with numerous candidates, there are area and local elections of interest.

Although three names appear

on the ballot for State Representative, Brownwood businessman John Lee Blagg has withdrawn from the race, leaving only Comanche attorney Jim Parker and Brownwood attorney Lee Haney as candidates for the post being vacated by veteran legislator Lynn Nabers.

Jewel Harris and Curly Hays, both of Abilene, are seeking the post on the State Board of Education, the position currently held by James Binion of Abilene, a former Santa Anna teacher and school administrator.

The only contest on the ballot in Coleman County and Precinct Two is for County Commissioner with Bruce Estes opposing Jake McCreary, the incumbent. Running unopposed are County Judge Pete Skelton, District Clerk Louise Thompson, County Clerk Glenn Thomas, County Treasurer Barbara Freeman, Justice of the Peace Gale Brock (Precinct Two) and County Democratic Chairman Baker Rudolph.

A sample ballot is printed elsewhere in the News this week so voters may become more familiar with the listings and make their selections before going to the polls Saturday.

SAHS Girls Qualify One For State Track Meet

Patricia Jackson, a senior at SAHS, has qualified for two events in the State Girls Track Meet in Austin May 7 and 8. She advances to the State competition after winning in the Region II-A meet in Abilene last week.

Patricia won first in the long jump with a distance of 16'-7 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Her jump was almost a foot farther than that of the second place winner.

Pat also was second in triple jump with 35'-4 $\frac{7}{8}$ ", ten inches behind the first place winner

from Santo High School.

Pat is the daughter of Judy Lee Jackson.

At the Regional Meet, the Santa Anna girls scored 24 points with JoAnn Collins placing fourth in discus and the 800-meter relay team of Pat and Brenda Jackson, JoAnn Collins and Robbie Clifton placing sixth.

Roger Goodwin is coach of the SAHS girls team this year and will be accompanying Patricia to the State Meet in Austin next week.

Llano County Man Fined Monday Night After Train-Trailer Accident

A Llano County man spent Monday night in the Coleman County jail and was fined for drunkenness after an accident in Santa Anna Monday night.

According to Sheriff H. F. Fenton, the man was enroute from San Angelo in a pickup truck, pulling a horse trailer and two horses. The man apparently became disoriented and drove off the highway, and the trailer became stuck on the railroad tracks near the highway crossing.

The driver unloaded the two horses and tied them to a nearby fence and unditched the pickup, leaving the trailer on the railroad tracks.

The trailer was hit by an east-bound Santa Fe train, demolishing the trailer.

Before the investigating officers

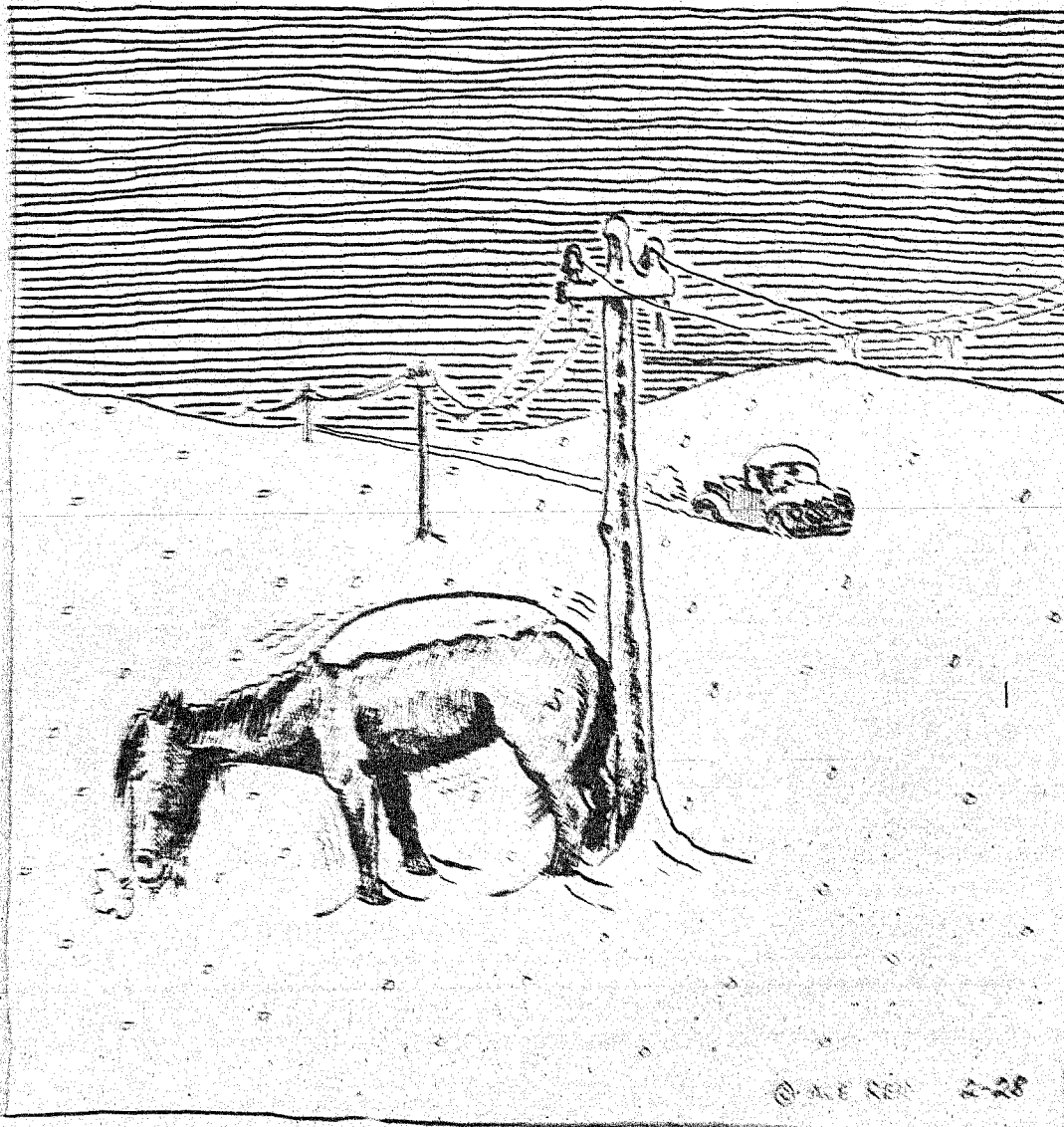



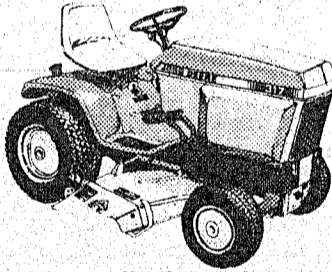

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A&M researchers design methanol fuel system

COLLEGE STATION — Two methanol-powered automobiles with a unique pre-vaporized fuel system designed by Texas A&M University researchers are undergoing a two-year test by Conoco Inc.

Six Houston-based Conoco employees are driving test

vehicles — all 1981 Ford Fairmonts — under normal conditions.

Four of the Texas cars have been modified to retain the conventional carburetor system, while the two Texas A&M cars will pre-vaporize the methanol (wood alcohol).

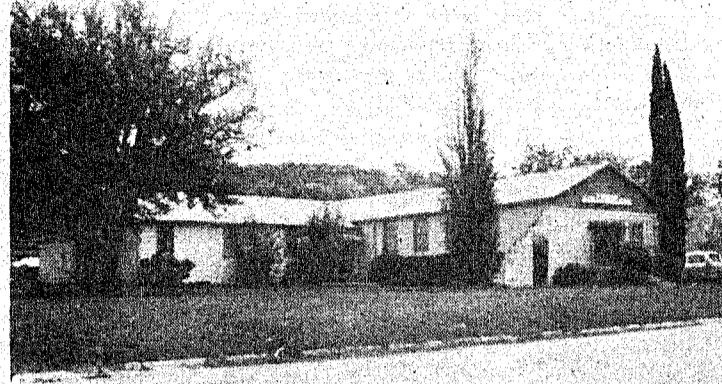

Weed Control is Urged On Texas Rangeland

COLLEGE STATION— Ranchers can knock out most annual range weeds with an early spring herbicide application.

Otherwise, an abundance of weeds can reduce grass production and rob ranchers of their profits.

"The herbicide 2,4-D gives excellent control of annual range weeds if they are growing rapidly and have not yet flowered," points out Dr. Tommy G. Welch, range brush and weed control specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University system.

Welch recommends using 2,4-D amine in areas of more than 25 inches of annual rainfall and 2,4-D low-volatile ester in areas of less rainfall. For harder-to-control weeds, he suggests mixing 2,4-D and dicamba in a 3 to 1 ratio.

"Weed control on rangeland can produce significant returns," says Welch.

Good soil moisture conditions last fall over the state allowed many weeds to germinate.

These will begin to grow rapidly as temperatures moderate and spring rains come. So ranchers need to make frequent checks and begin control measures as soon as weed infestations appear.


Among broadleaf weeds that ranchers should control are distaff thistle, annual broomweed and camphorweed, notes the specialist.

Since some weed seeds are important food for certain wildlife species, Welch suggests applying herbicides so as to leave strips of weeds. Also, applying 2,4-D early in the spring to control certain annual weeds will allow later-germinating plants such as croton (dove weed) and snow-on-the-prairie to survive and provide feed for quail and dove.

Good Seasons For Deer, Turkey

The harvest by hunters of white-tailed deer in Texas increased by approximately 15 percent in 1981-82 over the previous year, while the turkey harvest set an all-time record.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said hunters took an estimated 300,050 deer, comprised of 76 percent bucks and 24 percent antlerless deer during the past season.

Harvest surveys showed a total turkey harvest estimated at 53,500, which was almost 40 percent higher than the previous record high of 38,300 set in 1979-80.

Favorable weather conditions in early 1981 helped deer reproduction and survival, and for the second year in succession the weather has helped wild turkeys have an outstanding hatch.

Officials said an estimated 533,000 hunters went afield after white-tailed deer during the season, an increase of five percent over the previous year. The estimated success rate increased from 44 percent in 1980-81 to 47 percent this season.

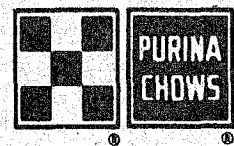
