Resignation Accepted For SAHS Teacher, Coach

The resignation of Dean Bass, social studies teacher and assistant coach, was accepted at the Tuesday, May 11, meeting of the Santa Anna ISD Board of Trustees. Bass has been on the local faculty the past three years.

In other business at the regular meeting, results of the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills tests were reviewed. The TABS testing was done in the third, fifth and ninth grades this year.

The Board approved adoption of a 15 percent penalty for delinquent school taxes, the charge of the attorney who collects the delinquent taxes. The school district has heretofore absorbed the cost of the attorney fee, and the cost of the collection will now be charged to the property owner.

The school calendar for the 1982-83 school year was reviewed and approved.

All members of the School Board were present for the meeting at the school business office.

Activities on the schedule include the Eighth Grade graduation Thursday, May 27, and the High School graduation Friday, May 28.

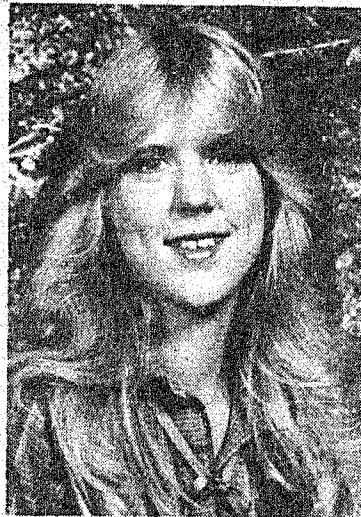
Drum Major, Twirlers Named For S-Anna Band

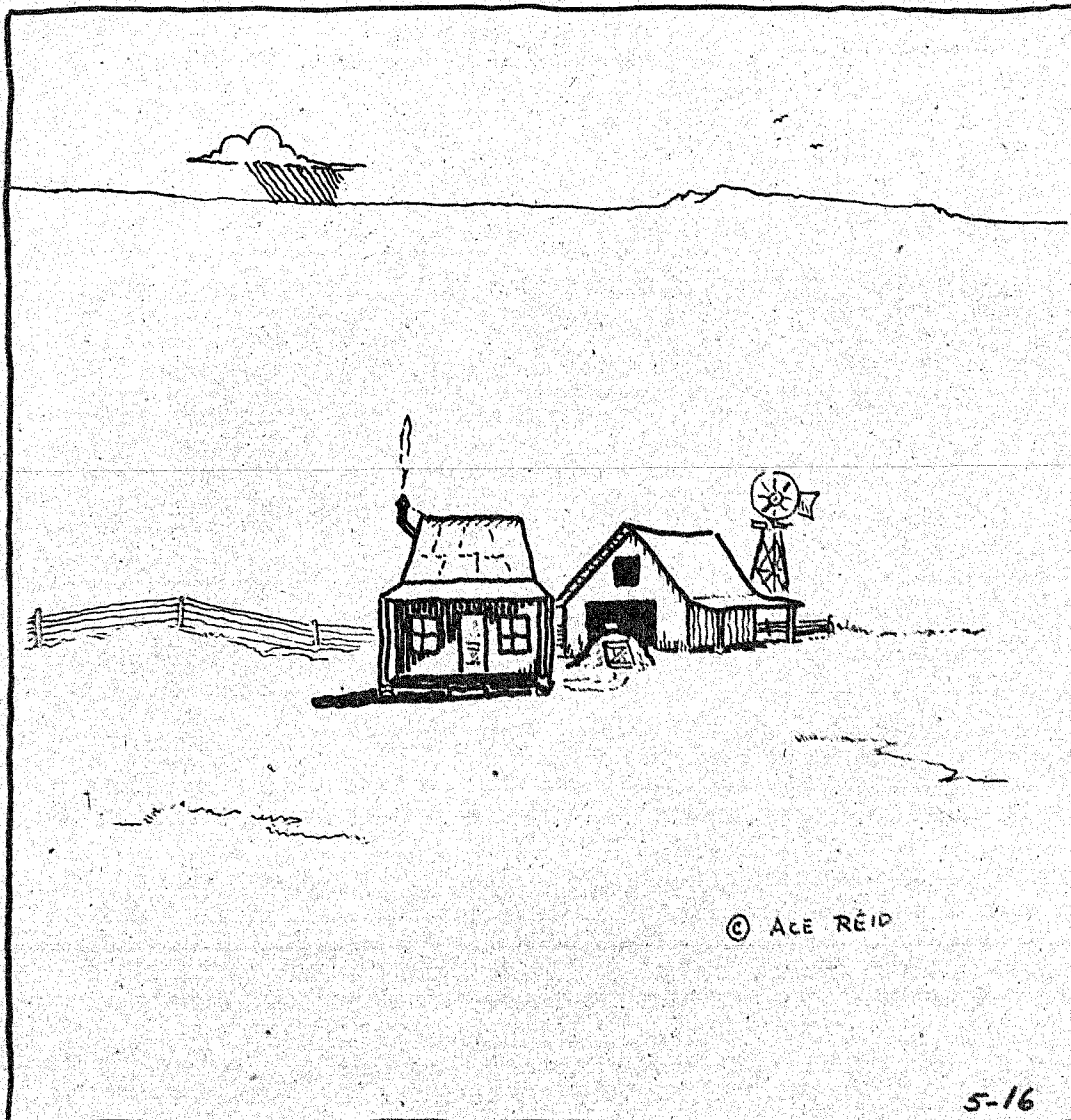

Local People Take Part In State Meeting

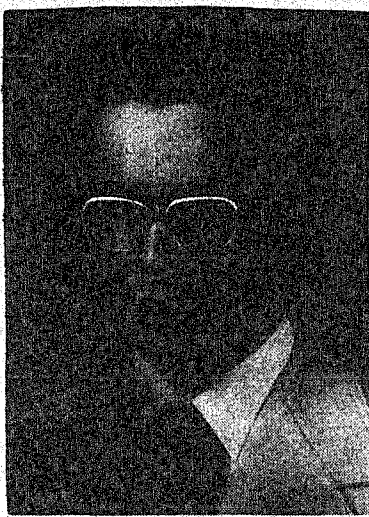
Representatives of Coleman County Telephone Cooperative were in San Antonio last week to attend the annual meeting of managers and directors of Texas Telephone Cooperatives.



Paraguay produces oil, iron, cotton and cassava for export. Clean rivers are everywhere, and sanitation and diet are unusually high, but there is still twenty percent illiteracy.

Mrs. Preston Bailey gave the geography of the Falklands, with two large and about two hundred small islands. The people are British, descendants of settlers since 1833. With an equable but cold climate, sheep raising is the main industry. Argentina is 250 miles away, but the island people consider Great Britain their home. Stanley, the capitol, has 15 stores, three churches, and two schools. There are no crime or unemployment, and the Councils are elected, with a Governor sent from England.

Fourteen members of the club attended the meeting which is the last until next September.

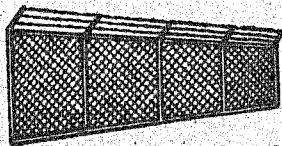

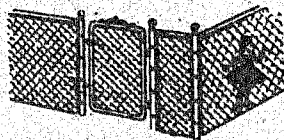

LIVING LONGER

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans are living longer, healthier lives than ever before, but they are paying more for the privilege, says Family Practice News.

The medical publication reports that between 1961 and 1978, life expectancy rose to 69.5 years for men and 77.2 years for women.

Increased use of medical services, an emphasis on preventive health practices and early detection and treatment of disease were the main reasons for longer lifespans, according to a federal survey.

The trade-off, however, has been spiraling health-care costs that continue to consume an increasingly large share of the gross national product.

Between 1960 and 1980, health-care costs rose an annual average of 11.7 percent. Health-care expenditures reached \$247.2 billion in 1980, or \$1,067 per person.

Area Oil News.....

A well producing from the Cross Cut has been completed in Coleman County Regular Field five miles south of Trickham.

The producer is M. F. Grief of Hobbs, N. M. No. 5 R. M. Tobin, located in J. W. Foster Survey 73, A-191.

Absolute, open flow was 130,000 cubic feet of gas daily with a gas-liquid hydrocarbon ratio of 196,000-1 of 61 gravity.

Production is from perforations at 540 to 543 feet, treated with 500 gallons of acid.

Spotted in the regular field two miles east of Santa Anna is Precisin Drilling Co. Inc. of Coleman No. 1 Hardy Blue.

The planned 2,990-foot venture is on a 100-acre lease in Section 59, HT&B Survey.

Another regular field project will be drilled eight miles southeast of Santa Anna as Masthead Mac Drilling Corp. of Bangs No. 3 Gerald Beard.

Having a proposed depth of 1,990 feet, it is on a 160-acre lease in G. Waters Survey 114.

A wildcat will be drilled five miles northwest of Trickham as McIver, Inc. of San Angelo No. 1-C Doris T. Kelley.

The well has a proposed depth of 1,990 feet, located in Pleasant Young Survey 494, A-727. It is on a 100-acre lease.

Sunbelt Oilfield Services Inc., of Dallas will drill three regular field projects five miles south of Santa Anna. Each is on a 517-acre lease and slated for 1,990 feet.

The locations are staked as Nos. 4, 5 and 6 Hot Springs Ranch in Section 92, ETRR Survey.

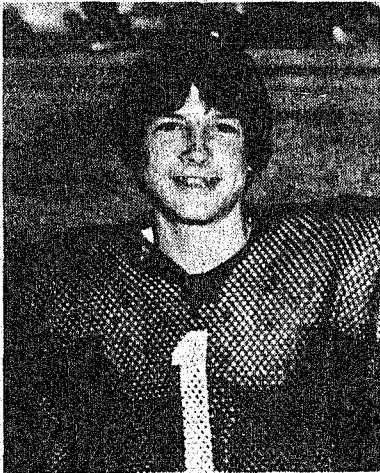
Pautsky Energy Inc. of Wichita Falls has completed the No. 21-A T. M. Hays Estate in the Regular Field four miles north of Trickham.

The wellsite is in Bonds & Sanders Survey 92, and completed on a pump, it had a daily potential of five barrels of 38.6 gravity oil, plus 28 barrels of water.

Production is from perforations at 1,121-78 feet, treated with 250 gallons of acid. The pay was fractured with 50 sacks of sand.

Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 1,247 feet, and the hole is bottomed out at 1,356 feet.




