Admission will be \$1 for students and \$2 for adults, with tickets available at the door.


Girls Track, Tennis Meet In Austin This Weekend

Three Santa Anna girls will be in Austin this weekend for the State UIL Track and Tennis meet.

Juliann Jones and Karen Wetsel are entered in the tennis doubles competition and will meet the Thrall High School team in the preliminary round Friday morning.

Miss Jones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Jones. competed at the state meet last year with Lori Smith in the doubles event. Karen, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Wetsel, is making her first appearance at the elite tournament. The two girls were winners of the Region II championship in Abilene, defeating teams from Cross Plains, Paint Rock and Byers before advancing to the finals where they won over the Blum team 6-0, 6-3. Their team mates, Holly Smith and Robin Hartman. doubles. and Janis Weathers, singles, also participated in the regional meet but were eliminated in the second round of play ...

Patricia Jackson, a senior at SAHS, is the only local entry in the State Track Meet, competing in long jump and triple

McCreary Winner Of Pct. 2 Election

Precinct Two Commission Jake McCreary received the a proval of the voters for anothe term last Saturday, defeatin his opponent, Bruce Estes, by a 334 to 64 margin. The Precinct Two County Commissioner race was the only local or county contest on the ballot in the Democratic Primary.

At Santa Anna there were 244 voters at the polls, and less than 25 percent of registered voters cast ballots in the county.

In other voting, Coleman County voters generally followed the statewide trends, and in the State Representative election gave Comanche attorney Jim Parker a slight lead over Brownwood attorney Lee Haney as Parker won the nomination . He will face Republican nominee Gary Logan of Bangs in the November general election.

Over 75 people cast votes in the Republican primary in Coleman, the only voting box in the county for that party.

County officials returned to office included Gale Allen Brock, Precinct Two Justice of the Peace. Montie Guthrie III was elected Democratic Precinct Chairman.



Destroyed in Friday Fire

A drilling rig owned by K & W Drilling Co. of Coleman was destroyed Friday by a fire that started from a welding rig at the site.

According to reports of the incident, the rig was drilling on the Hot Springs Ranch on Home Creek, formerly the Frank Crum place, when fire spread from grass at the location to a goose-neck trailer, and then to the rig.

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department was called to the site, but the fire was out of control and the rig in flames. The Coleman VFD also was called, but the Santa Anna firemen remained to keep the

blaze under control and from spreading to the pasture at the scene.

Tanks of fuel exploded in the blaze, and dark smoke could be seen from miles around.

Tommy Watson of Coleman is a co-owner of the rig, and reports had the loss estimated at nearly one million dollars.





chairman, will lead the local delegation at the county meeting, with 11 delegates named from the 13 persons attending the Saturday meeting.





Randy Casey won over Johnny Vasquez for the one two spots in the singles division.


