## Three Elected To City Council

Voters in Santa Anna went to the polls Saturday to elect three City Council persons in an election that drew more than usual interest in the community.

Leading the ballot with 166 votes was Carmen Donham, a new-comer to the Council.

Donald Hosch, an incumbent, polled 112 votes in a write-in campaign, and Jim Laubhan received 110 for a place on the Council.

Incumbent Patrick Hosch lost his bid for re-election when he received 96 votes. Others on the ballot and their votes were John Pearce, 60; Glenda Cook, 50; Joe Bertoni, 27; and Norman Asher, 7.

Also retiring from the Council is Scott Patterson who did not seek re-election for another term.

A total of 222 voters went to the polls Saturday.

The new Council members will be sworn into office at the Thursday, April 8, meeting at City Hall.

Hosch, owner of Hosch Insurance Agency, has been on the Council over one year, ap-

pointed to fill an unexpired term, then elected for a one-year period last April.

Laubhan is a local businessman, owner of Art Fabrics and Opera House Antique Shop. This is his first venture into city politics.

Mrs. Donham, a long-time resident of the community, is a member of the City Park Board and active in other civic and church events.

Edd Hartman is Mayor, and other Council members are M. L. Guthrie Jr. and Stanley Hartman.

Old business to come before the Council will be a request from the Mexican church, the third reading of the leash law, a report on the City Park, and discussion of insurance for City employees.

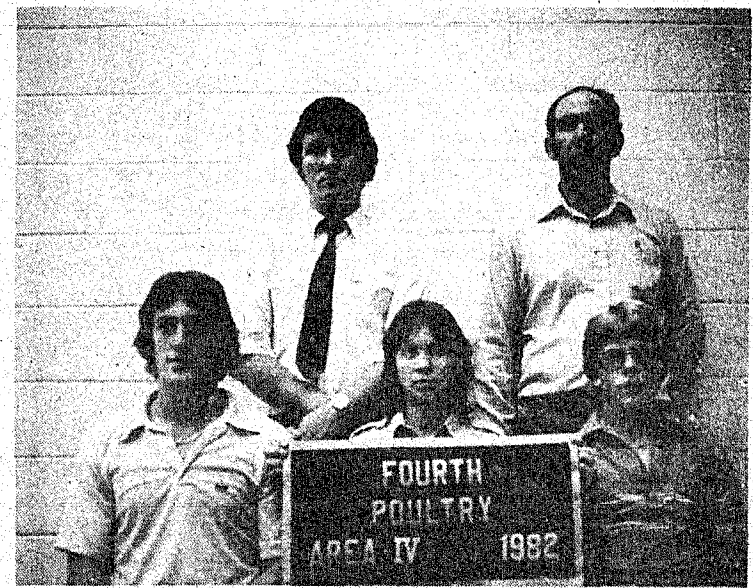
## FFA Team Qualifies For State Contest

## PTO Bake Sale Planned Friday

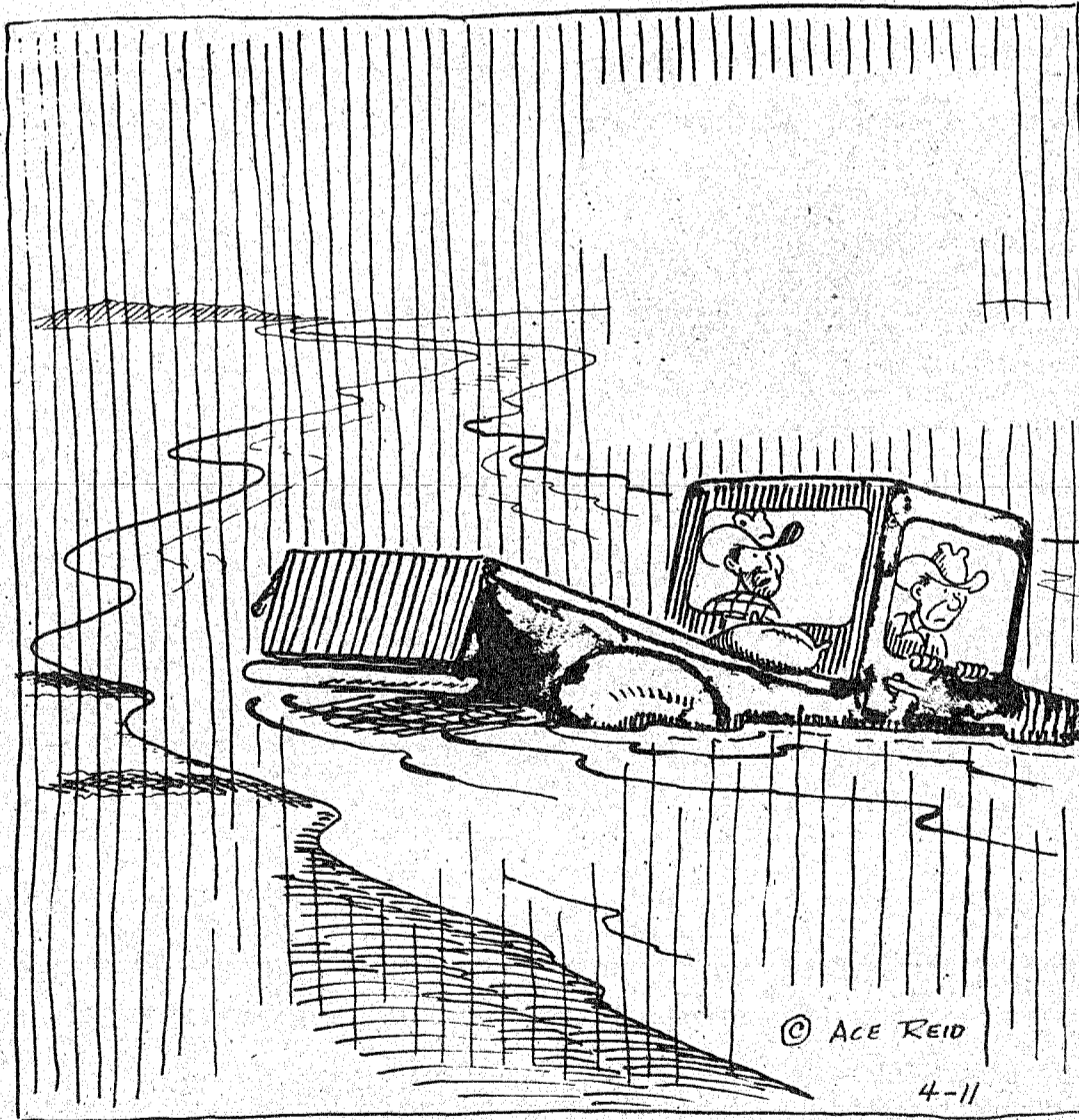

## Felton Martin Attends Meeting Of Dairymen

Felton Martin of Trickham represented area dairymen at the 13th annual meeting of the Associated Milk Producers, Inc. (AMPI) in Milwaukee last week, where 1,200 elected officials of the nation's largest dairy cooperative considered new "self-help" programs to market the growing supply of milk and dairy products in the U. S.

AMPI is made up of 33,000 dairy farm families in 20 states. Owned and operated by its members, the cooperative markets fluid milk to dairy processors and manufacturers from Canada to the Mexican border. The AMPI annual meeting was held March 26 - 28, with the corporate delegate sessions.
