Leading the ballot with 165 votes was Carmen Donham, a new-comer to the Council.
Donald Hosch, an incumbent, polled 112 votes in a write-in campaign, and Jim Laubhan received 110 for a place on the Council.

Incumbent Patrick Hosch lost his bid for reelection when he received 98 votes. Others on the ballot and their votes were John Pearce, 60; Glenda Cook, 50 ; Joe Bertoni, 27; and Norman Asher, 7.
Also retiring from the Concil is Seot Patterson who did not seek reelection for another term.
