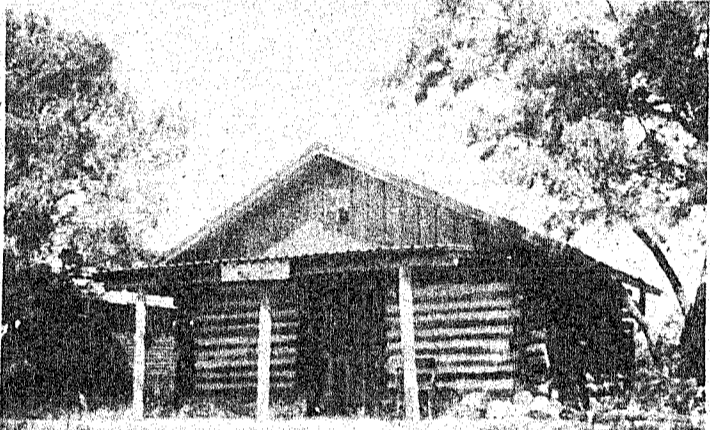

ISD Board Has Meeting Last Tuesday

Donnie Neff, president of the Santa Anna Independent School District Board of Trustees, presided at the Tuesday, June 8, meeting of the group. All members were present except Max Eubank.

Bills and accounts for the month were approved for payment, and the monthly financial report reviewed.

Supplemental salaries for teachers, paid from local funds and above the state salary schedule, were discussed. Action on the matter was tabled until the July meeting.

Bids for a new gas line at the Elementary School were opened and reviewed, and Lee Plumbing Co. of Santa Anna was awarded the contract.

Plans were made for the installation of the new water fountains purchased by the Parent Teacher Organization for the Elementary School.

Baker Rudolph, Mobil distributor from Coleman, met with the Board presenting information on installation of a gasoline tank and pumps for use by the buses and other school vehicles, which was approved by the group.

S-Anna Business Is Burglarized

Coleman County Sheriff's deputies were in Santa Anna Sunday morning to investigate a burglary at the Dairy Queen on west Wallis Avenue.

According to Deputy Wade Turner, entrance was made through the drive-in window on the east side of the building, and the intruders took a small undetermined amount of cash from the cash register and some money from the cigarette machine. There was no damage to the building or contents, and the burglar or burglars exited through the rear service door.

The break-in was discovered about 8 a.m. Sunday morning when owner Ken Boydston opened the business.

Saturday events will include registration starting at 9 a.m. with

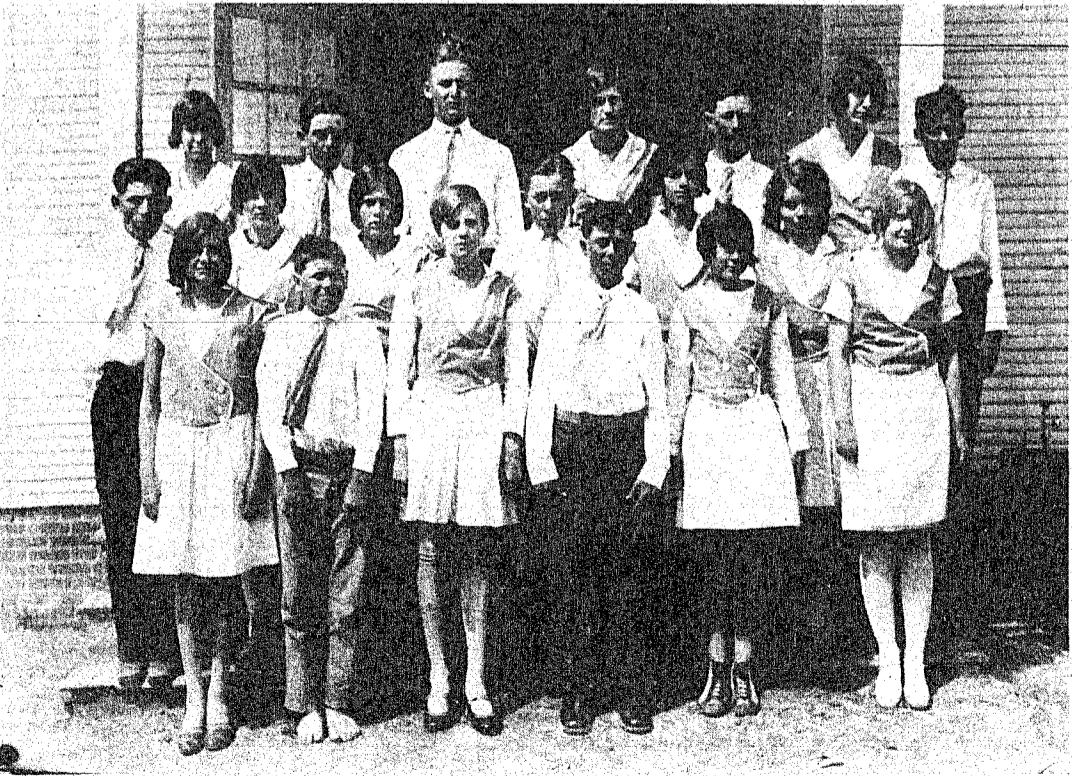

City Council Meets

There was standing room only at the Thursday, June 10, meeting of City Council, as the group met at the Fire Hall to accommodate the many visitors attending the monthly session.

Mayor Edd Hartman presided at the session, with all members present except Jim Laubhan. City Secretary Pat Rutherford read minutes of the previous meeting.

Lori Schneider of West Central Texas Council of Governments met with the Council to present a plan in which Santa Anna would have its own nutrition program for senior citizens. The program would be operated through the Coleman program, but meals would be served in Santa Anna three days a week. The program would be operated in conjunction with the current meals on wheels program or maintained separately, if chosen.

The Council agreed to study the proposal and learn more facts and requirements before making a decision.

Bob Galagher, Director of WCTCOG in Abilene, also spoke to the Council concerning a proposed program to have a full-time attorney on the WCTCOG staff who would be available to a limited number of cities for a set monthly fee. The attorney would be on call for routine

matters, not including litigation or other time-consuming action. Action on the proposal will also be made at a later date.

A number of residents of the south part of town met with Jim Spillman as spokesman to voice their disapproval of a pipe and oil field supply yard in their neighborhood. They cited several reasons they wish the business to be moved, and asked about zoning ordinances or regulations that would prevent such a business in a residential neighborhood.

As the City has no enforceable zoning regulations in that area, the residents were encouraged to send a written protest to the Council that could be studied by an attorney.

Carmen Donham of the City Park Board spoke concerning the new City Park, and sought information on work that is being completed by the Lions Club. The Park Board will be in charge of making plans for equipment and facilities, as well as supervising the maintenance of the park.

Bills and accounts for the past month were reviewed and approved for payment. Insurance for city employees was also discussed.

The group discussed the appointment of a city health officer, and the proposed purchase of a new automobile for the city night watchman.

Oil Production, Sites Located in Our Area

Precision Drilling Co. Inc. of Coleman completed two wells in Coleman County Regular Field three miles southeast of Santa Anna.

No. 1-E H. O. Norris is in M. A. Fisk Survey 630.

Daily potential was 29 barrels of 28 gravity oil and 50 barrels of water pumping from perforations at 2,371-2,401 feet. The well was treated with 2,050 gallons of acid and fractured with 24,000 pounds sand and 21,000 gallons jelled water.

Total depth is 2,500 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 517-1.

ATI Oil Co., Wichita Falls, has filed application to drill No. 4 Horace Thompson as a proposed 1,990-foot wildcat in the Trickham (Capps) Field four miles southwest of Trickham.

Location of the 94-acre lease is in Juan Arendaris Survey 4.

Sunbelt Oil Field Inc. No. 1 Hot Springs Ranch was completed in the Coleman County Regular Field five miles south of Santa Anna.

Location was in Section 92, ETRR Survey.

Daily pumping potential was eight barrels of 46 gravity oil, plus four barrels of water. Production is from perforations at 1,559-62 feet, with the 4½-inch casing set at 1,608 feet, total depth.

James D. Rice of Santa Anna will drill in Coleman County Regular Field to 2,990 feet, nine

miles northeast of Santa Anna. No. 1 E. M. Williams "B" is in John Rine Survey 629, located on a 36-acre lease.

T.O.F.C. Inc. of Brownwood will re-enter a Coleman County wildcat to 2,000 feet four miles southwest of Santa Anna.

No. 1 Walker is in Block 70, Wade H. Bynum Survey 272, A-15 on a 109-acre lease.

There is no previous record on this well. Well No. 1 was formerly the C. H. Haynes with total depth of 1,905 feet.

Nordic Petroleum Inc. of Dallas completed No. 2 Ford in Coleman Jim Bob (Jennings

Sand) Field nine miles southwest of Santa Anna.

Wellsite is in Section 82, Block 1, GH&H Survey.

Daily potential was 86 barrels of 49 gravity oil flowing from perforations at 2,088-2,120 feet.

The 4½-inch casing was set at total depth of 2,400 feet, plugged back to 2,395 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,744-1.

Charles F. Dominy of Fort Worth will test in Coleman County Regular Field to 2,950 feet five miles southeast of Santa Anna.

No. 1-A J. Wells is in Block 15, M. Martinez Survey 751 on a 73-acre lease.

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
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Mountain Echoes

The City of Santa Anna will sponsor a rabies vaccination clinic Saturday, June 19 at City Hall. Dr. Cathy Pearce, local veterinarian, will be at the City Hall from 1 to 2 p.m. to vaccinate pets for rabies. Cost for the vaccination will be \$4.

A representative of the City will also be on hand to issue dog license tags that are required for all dogs in town. Cost of the license is \$1.

Local pet owners are urged to have their pets vaccinated, and the local clinic is a convenience for many pet owners.

Local Residents Attend Strake Campaign Event

Speaking to a group of local supporters in Coleman Wednesday, former Secretary of State George Strake, candidate for Lt. Governor, pointed out the difference between his ideas on how to fight crime and the record of his opponent, incumbent Lt. Governor Bill Hobby.

"The difference between us is a clear example of a basic philosophical difference," Strake said.

"I believe that the primary purpose of our criminal laws, law enforcement, trial and punishment

is to protect citizens from those who now laugh at the judicial process."

Strake contrasted his approach to the crime menace with Hobby's record of support for an organization which aids criminals more than victims of criminals. He cited his opponent's fund raising event for American Civil Liberties Union, used to defend persons charged with crimes.

"As a conservative," continued Strake, "I take strong issue with Bill Hobby and other friends of ACLU,

whose primary concern seems to be protecting the criminal by making conviction more and more difficult to obtain and punishment less and less certain."

Strake said this difference between himself and his opponent has nothing to do with party labels.

Strake visited in Coleman as a part of a central Texas campaign swing, that included stops at San Marcos, Llano, Mason, Brady and Clyde.

In Coleman, Strake was greeted by County Republican Chairman Beck Knox, and others, and later entertained with an informal reception at Coleman Bank Clubroom.

A number of Santa Anna people were present for the occasion that also introduced Republican State Legislature candidate Gary Logan of Bangs who is seeking election to the post being vacated by Rep. Lynn Nabers of Brownwood.

Liberty Resident Killed In County Line Mishap

A two vehicle accident just east of the county line between Santa Anna and Bangs took the life of a Liberty Community man early Thursday, June 10. Ralph L. Drury, 38, was killed instantly when his 1974 Ford pickup truck struck a tractor-trailer rig driven by Marve M. Ross of Sweetwater.

According to investigating officers, Drury's vehicle was traveling west in the eastbound lane, and although the truck driver tried to avoid the mishap, the vehicles collided. The driver of the tractor-trailer was uninjured in the mishap.

An employee of the Bangs Post Office, Drury owned property in the Liberty Community and had moved there from Bangs.

Funeral services were

held Saturday afternoon in Bangs United Methodist Church with interment in Bangs Cemetery. Rev. Leon Eason officiated at the services that were directed by Davis-Morris Funeral Home of Brownwood.

Drury was born July 24, 1943 in Bangs. He was a veteran of the Viet Nam war, a member of the Bangs American Legion and United Methodist Church.

Survivors are a son, Vic, of Bangs; two brothers, Billy Dean Drury of El Paso and Donnie Drury of Bangs; two sisters, Zelda Danley of Brownwood and Sue Bleeker Barksdale of Bangs.

City Sales Tax

Large Increase

A total of \$2,700.61 in city sales taxes was collected in Santa Anna during the month of May, according to announcement from State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office. The 1982 figure is almost four times the amount of the same period last year when \$720 was reported.

According to the news release for cities in Texas, Santa Anna's total for the first five months of 1982 is \$17,304.91, a 78 percent increase over the same period of 1981.

The one-percent city sales tax is collected along with the state sales tax and returned to the cities after being computed in the State Comptroller's office.

S-Annans' Kin 'Hotline' Volunteer

A Volunteer With Arlington Cancer Group

(The following story is from an Arlington newspaper, telling of volunteer activities of Billie Balke, daughter-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Balke of Santa Anna.)

The man on the other end of the line was asking Billie Balke if she'd needed help. She told the man she didn't. She was calling to see if she could do anything to help others.

Mrs. Balke, a 52-year-old homemaker, had just finished reading a newspaper article about the Cancer Hotline of Tarrant County, and the phone call started her work as one of the Hotline volunteers.

It's been two and one-half years since Mrs. Balke underwent surgery for breast cancer. Sitting in the wood-paneled den of her home near Shady Valley Country Club, she talks matter-of-factly about her illness and her work as a Hotline volunteer.

Mrs. Balke says she was lucky. When she was told she had cancer, she was able to find support from a close friend who had already been through a similar ordeal.

Talking to someone who had gone through the treatments and who was able to tell her what to expect was a big help, Mrs. Balke said. She wanted to make sure other people could get the same kind of support.

Mrs. Balke, a 12-year resident of the city, is one of 22 trained volunteers for the Cancer Hotline. Another 14 people have signed up and are waiting to go through the training.

"You have to be a good listener. You need to know the do's and don't's of good communication, and you have to be somewhat people oriented," she says in her soft-spoken voice.

"Sometimes people want to know very simple things like where they can go to buy a wig or a prosthesis. People usually start out with very practical questions, things that are on safe ground."

Volunteers, she says, also must be able to handle the emotional strain involved. They know that some of the people they talk to are

not going to get well. One day you're well. The next day your doctor tells you your biopsy is malignant.

"Most of the time it happens very quickly. There is no time to prepare. You go from being well to being sick," she says. And she says too many people still think of cancer in terms of the cures and cure rates that are outdated.

Mrs. Balke, who suffered severe bouts of depression while undergoing chemotherapy, found support from her three children and her husband, Rodney, a Bell Helicopter executive. But even a sympathetic family cannot take the place of one of the volunteers.

"When I listen to someone tell me how bad they feel during their treatment, I know how they feel. It was absolutely the roughest thing I've ever gone through, and I had three difficult pregnancies. I won't kid you," she says, lowering her voice. "I don't know how many, but some people chose to die. I can understand."

Larry Moore, president of the Cancer Hotline, says more volunteers are needed for certain types of cancer patients. Among those already trained for

the Hotline, the youngest is a 15-year-old boy who was told at the age of nine he had terminal cancer.

Moore, who started the local Hotline after reading about Richard Bloch's pioneering efforts, is also considered cured of a rare form of genital cancer.

"When I was diagnosed I knew I wanted to survive. I knew I wanted to live. I knew I had to get the best medical care. Proper medical care the first time around is important. The

second time around it's too late," he says.

Recent Turkey Season Was Successful

AUSTIN-Field reports indicate the spring turkey season was every bit as good as predicted, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said.

"Most hunters we have talked to say that they've never seen more turkeys than there are right now," said Don Wilson, upland game program leader. "The harvest was an all-time high, since more counties now have a spring season, and hunter success was improved as well."

In most of Texas, the season opened April 17 and closed May 2.

"A tremendous hatch last spring and two years of favorable weather conditions caused increases in

turkey populations in most of the traditional areas," Wilson said. He said the region situated roughly between Wichita Falls and San Antonio is the major spring turkey hunting area, especially the Edwards Plateau, that includes the central Texas area in which Coleman County is located.

Another factor in hunter success may be increased skills in use of turkey calls - a technique which is fairly vital to tricking a spring gobbler.

The spring season is set in a time frame designed to minimize effects on turkey reproduction, as most breeding activity has occurred and nesting is underway.

Dove, Duck Limits Set For 1982-83

AUSTIN—The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has approved 1982-83 hunting season date and bag limits for doves, teal ducks and other "early season" game birds.

However, the mourning dove hunting season dates may be altered later if the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service authorizes a 70-day rather than a 60-day season, officials said.

The North Zone mourning dove season, of which Coleman County is a part, will be September 1 - October 30, 1982. If the USFWS authorizes the extra days, a 10-day winter season would be set for January 1 - 10, 1983.

In the South Zone, the adopted split season dates are September 20 - November 2, 1982, and January 1 - 16, 1983. In South Zone counties which have a four-day white-winged dove hunting season, the fall season for mourning doves would end October 29.

Shooting hours in both zones will be one-half hour before sunrise to sunset, except in counties having days with concurrent white-winged and mourning dove hunting, where

hunting hours will be noon to sunset during the whitewing season.

Bag limit for mourning doves will be 12 per day, possession limit 24. The whitewing daily bag limit is 10, possession limit 20. The 1982 early season for all teal duck species was set for September 11 - 19. Bag limit is four per day in the aggregate, possession limit eight in the aggregate.

As was the case last year, hunters in some counties are required to leave one fully-feathered wing attached to the carcass of each dove taken, until the bird reaches the hunter's abode or a commercial preservation facility. This includes the southern part of the state in the South Zone.

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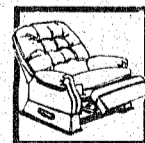
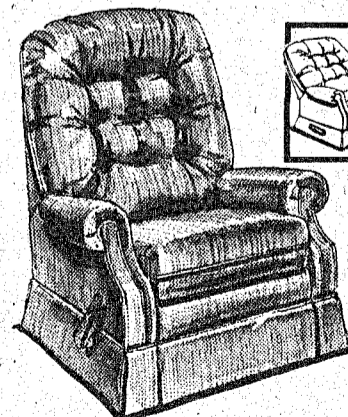


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Seniors Van To Coleman Each Week

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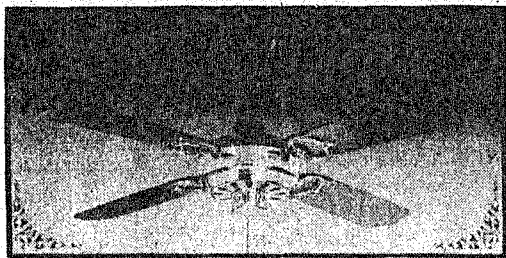
