Demo Runoff Election Saturday

Light Voting Expected For Statewide Races

Rose Bass will be election judge for the Precinct Two Democratic Primary Runoff election to be held in Santa Anna Saturday, June 5. As provided by the Texas Election Code, precinct voting may be consolidated when there are no local candidates or propositions on the ballot.

Usual voting precincts of

Rockwood, 2-East (Coleman) and Santa Anna will vote at the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative building in Santa Anna. Voting will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

All other precinct voting will be in Coleman, with Precincts 1 and 4 voting at the County Courthouse, and Precinct 3 at the Teen Center.

Four state races are on the ballot Saturday, namely State Attorney General; Commissioner of General Land Office; Judge - Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1; and Judge - Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2.

Clif Drinkard, County Democratic Chairman, stated that the consolidation of polling places will save the tax payers about \$2,000.

Local Grain Elevator To Open This Week

The grain harvest has started in the central Texas area, and a good harvest is anticipated. There appears to be more wheat planted in our area, and yields are expected to be above average. Oats is in smaller quantities in this area and also of good quality.

Central Texas Grain Co. will open in Santa Anna this week for the season, with the first grain expected at any time.

Ray Schulze of Bangs and Bobby Doyal of Lohn have taken over operation of the facility this year. Schulze is the

son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Homer Schulze and owns property at Rockwood. Doyal, from neighboring McCulloch County, operated a grain elevator there last season.

Schulze said this week that the facility will be open day and night when necessary, and local farmers are welcome to call for information. Also working at the elevator will be Val Garza.

Farmers are in hopes the weather will cooperate so that the harvest may be completed soon. Many fields are too wet for the combines, and moisture content in the grain is still high.

Summer Baseball Into Second Half

Despite postponement of several ball games because of rain and wet fields, the summer ball program is well underway.

The Little League season goes into the second half of play next Tuesday, June 8. The Santa Anna Mets will complete their games of the first half Thursday (today) in Coleman with the Mozelle team.

Events will include bull riding, bareback riding, ribbon roping, tie down calf roping, barrel racing and pole bending. Stock will be furnished by SGS Company.

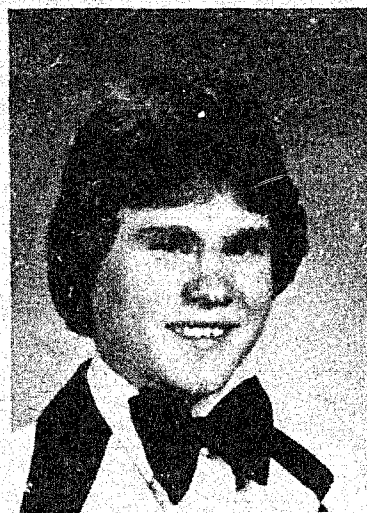

Admission will be \$2 for adults and \$1 for students. Area young people are invited to enter the events this weekend.

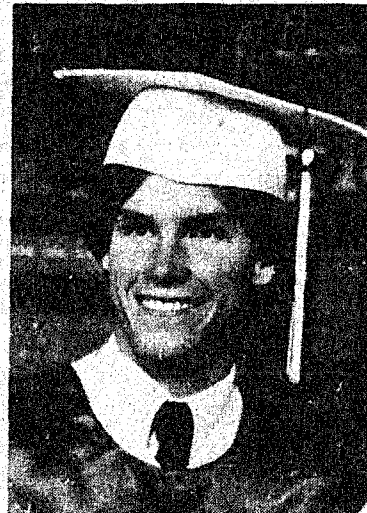
Allen Qualifies For NIRA Finals

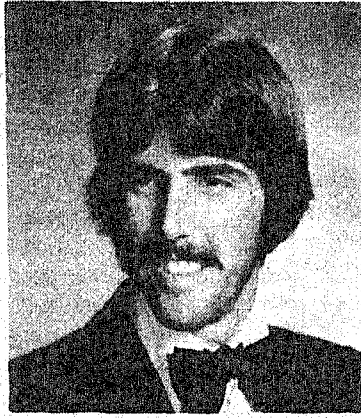

Board of Review Organized May 31

The organizational meeting of the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District Board of Review was held Monday, May 31, at the District office in Coleman. C. M. Huckabee of Coleman was chosen chairman, and Jerry Allen of Leaday is secretary. The other board member is Donnie Neff of Santa Anna.

The three men were chosen by the Tax Appraisal District Board, and will be meeting from time to time to plan their

review sessions with property owners that are scheduled to begin in July, or when the appraisal roll is returned from the computer company and 20-day notices are mailed.

The three have attended one instruction session for area board of review members, and will be making other preparations to meet with those wishing more information on the new tax rates.

Although the target date of

May 15 was planned for the new tax roll, the deadline for exemptions was extended to May 31, and the completion is delayed.

Meetings of the Board of Review will be posted by the chairman.

Santa Anna Native to New Post

Ruth Milligan Meredith in Traditionally All-Male Job

Despite the "equality for women" trend in our world today, one field has remained traditionally a man's world - with a few exceptions.

And one such exception involves a Santa Anna native and graduate of Santa Anna High School.

Ruth Milligan Meredith of El Paso, a 1956 graduate of Santa Anna High School, was recently selected Athletic Director of Ysleta Independent School District. She is believed to be only the second woman athletic director of a major school in Texas, the other being Ellie Noack of Austin School District.

Mrs. Meredith was chosen from five finalists recommended to the Ysleta Board of Trustees, and was the group's unanimous choice. She replaces Vic Clark who is retiring this year. He has been Athletic Director there since 1974.

Ruth, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. S. Millagan of the Shields Community, has been with the Ysleta ISD 14 years, but never in the coaching capacity. She has been the "number two" person in the athletic department for the past

eight years, during which time she has served as assistant athletic director, director of fall and winter sports and physical education supervisor for girls athletics.

The Ysleta School District is composed of some 45 schools, including six 5-A high schools. Enrollment of the district is over 45,000 students. Eleven different sports are offered at each high school.

Meredith has received tremendous support from the coaching staffs of the schools upon her appointment. She was recommended by Mr. Clark for the position.

After graduation from Santa Anna High School, Ruth attended business college in Abilene. She has lived in El Paso since 1962, and received her bachelor and masters degrees from University of Texas at El Paso. She taught four years in elementary school, then served as assistant principal and elementary curriculum supervisor before taking the post of physical education supervisor.

While a student at Santa Anna High School, Ruth was active in athletics, taking part in basketball, volleyball and tennis, and

watching football as closely as possible as a member of the cheerleading squad.

In her new position Mrs. Meredith will have five supervisors working under her direction. Her duties will include making athletic schedules for the numerous schools in the district.

Mrs. Meredith and her husband, J. A., are parents of a daughter, Lea, a freshman student at Angelo State University. Mr. Meredith is a retired Air Force member.

A formal hearing will continue through Friday, June 4, in San Angelo, conducted by the Environmental Protection Agency. The hearing, started May 25, is part of the EPA review of the current ban on use of the predator control pesticide, Compound 1080.

EPA Administrative Law Judge Spencer T. Nissen is conducting the hearing, having held sessions in different areas since March 30. The hearings will continue in Denver, Colorado June 8-25.


The public may attend the hearing to observe the legal proceedings, but must be pre-registered to testify.

EPA cancelled Compound 1080 (sodium fluoroacetate) in 1972. Sheep and goat ranchers contend that they are suffering undue losses to predators such as coyotes.

Farm Bureau Endorses Farm Economic Policy

Victor Cardinas of Coleman, president of Coleman County Farm Bureau, says that Farm Bureau is conducting an all-out campaign to improve farm income.

He, Jack Knox and Cliff Horn attended a Farm Bureau district meeting in Abilene May 27, where the organization's "Action Plan for a Profitable Agriculture" was discussed by leaders throughout this area. Similar meetings are being held in all 13 Farm Bureau districts in Texas.

The county farm leader said that Farm Bureau is taking this action because farmers and ranchers are facing their worst crisis since the Great Depression of the 1930s.

He added that the problem is overproduction, coupled with high cost of production.

Farm Bureau's four-point action plan includes (1) support completion of Economic Recovery Program to stop inflation and lower interest rates, (2) Expand export markets through export financing of agricultural commodities and removal of trade barriers, (3)

stop government from "breaking" markets through export embargoes and release of commodity reserves, and (4) cut red tape immediately to expedite approved FmHA loans.

This is the third consecutive year of depressed income in U. S. agriculture, according to the Farm Bureau. Immediate action is needed to improve the long-term outlook for agriculture.

Coleman County Farm Bureau was represented at the open house at the Texas Farm Bureau state office in Waco Saturday, May 22. Those from the county attending were President and Mrs. Victor Cardinas, Felton Martin, Dale Brewer, Oliver Caulk, William Brown and Cliff Horn.

The open house was held to celebrate the addition of two final floors of the six-story concrete building near Lake Waco,

and renovation of the original four floors of the office headquarters. Tours of the building were conducted, and Texas Farm Bureau President Carroll Chaloupka spoke at a brief ceremony.

County Farm Bureau leaders and other dignitaries were guests at a luncheon at Ridgewood Country Club at noon.

The building houses 355 employees of the farm organization and its affiliated companies. There are an additional 185 employees around the

state, representing a membership of 290,000 member families in 216 organized counties.

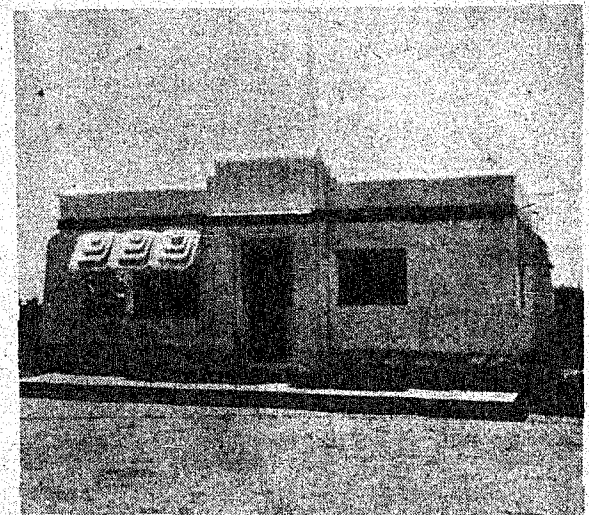

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

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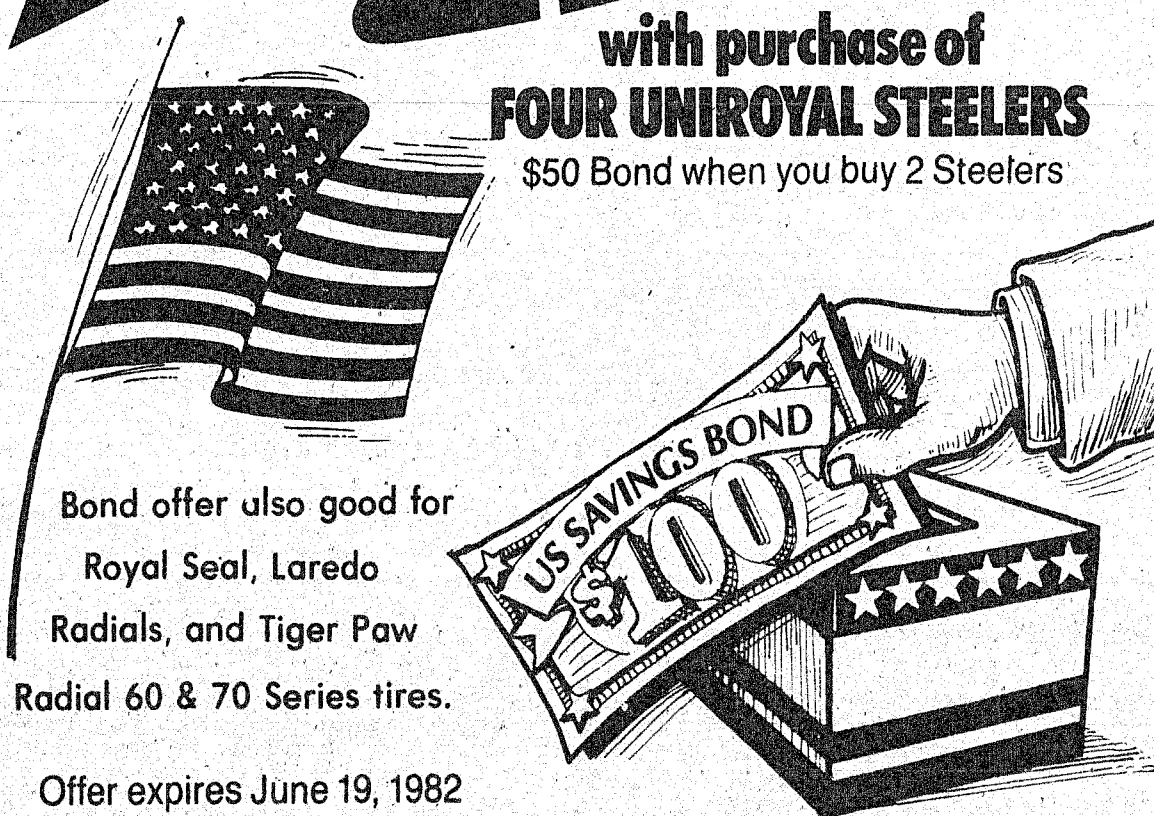
