An agreement was made with Scott Patterson to provide maintenance on the school vehicles for the coming school year.

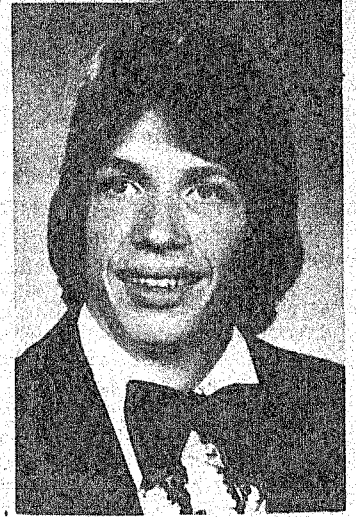
The annual report from food service was given, with information of the past year's lunchroom operation. Supplementary salaries for staff members above the state salary schedule were discussed, and the

County Senior Citizens Agency

Expands To Serve Meals in Santa Anna

Senior citizens in Santa Anna will have an opportunity to meet and visit with their friends and take advantage of a balanced meal when the local senior citizens program is expanded next week.

The Coleman County senior citizens nutrition program, under sponsorship of West Central Texas Council of Governments and approved by the City of Santa Anna, will be serving the noon meal to local senior citizens three days each week. Plans are being made to start the local service next Monday, August 2.

Mrs. Glen (Udell) Copeland has been named by the City of Santa Anna as director of the local program. The food will be prepared at the Coleman Nutrition Center and brought

here each Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Although the program will be started next Monday, the site for the serving has not been set. However there will be signs in the downtown area and announcements on the radio when the place is selected.

Those taking advantage of the program must be 60 years of age or over. Each person is encouraged to make a donation toward the cost of the meals, with the balance funded through local, county and WCTCOG funding.

Since the Coleman County program has been in operation, eight to 12 local people have gone by van to Coleman for the meals, but with the expanded program it is expected 20 or more persons will be taking part.

With Mrs. Copeland in charge of the serving, volunteers from within the group present will assist with the serving. Mrs. Copeland will also be in charge of the local Meals on Wheels program, with food prepared by W. B.'s Cafe and delivered to homes of shut-ins five days a week.

Mrs. Copeland has many years experience in food service, having been director of the school cafeteria a number of years and later being manager of the local Dairy Queen business. Her new job will include working with local senior citizens and coordinating the volunteer workers.

A grand opening for the program is being planned later in August, according to Pat Rutherford, City Secretary.

Gas Rate Increase Request Rejected

AUSTIN- The Railroad Commission has suspended a \$90 million natural gas rate increase requested by Lone Star Gas Company. The proposed increase would affect 451 Texas cities and outlying areas and more than 1.1 million bill-paying customers.

The 120-day suspension order signed by Chairman Jim Nugent and Commissioners Mack Wallace and

Buddy Temple will delay the effective date of the proposed increase while the Commission's Gas Utilities Division examines the Lone Star request in detail. The company had asked that rates be increased effective August 2.

A hearing on the Lone Star application has been set for September 14.

The statement of intent filed with

the Commission by Lone Star asks for an increase in its city gate rate. The city gate is the delivery point at which a city distribution system receives gas from its supplier.

In examining the proposed rate increase, the Railroad Commission will analyze Lone Star revenues and determine the reasonableness of the company's expenses.

1982 Tax Appraisal Notices To Be Mailed In Early August

Tax appraisal notices are now being prepared by the Coleman County Appraisal District using the reappraisal of property that was mandated by Senate Bill 621 to become fully operational in 1982.

Reappraisal notices will be mailed to all property owners in the District whose property value has been increased over \$1,000. The notices will contain the following information:

1. Appraisers estimate of value.
2. Exemptions the owner has qualified for.
3. Estimate of the tax rate and amount of taxes for each taxing entity.

If the property owner believes the estimated market value exceeds the true market value, or if the owner is not shown to be receiving exemptions to which he is entitled, or if notices contain incorrect information, the property owner should contact the Appraisal Office as soon as possible.

Every effort has been made to eliminate any errors, but it is virtually impossible to recompile records from nine different taxing entities without having a few errors made.

An office employee will review the property file with the owner. If the owner does not agree with the appraisers' value, or cannot agree with the appraiser on adjustments, he will be given the opportunity to schedule a hearing with the Appraisal Review Board. Hopefully any difference can be worked out in the office, but if that is not possible, protest forms are available with the office staff available to assist in filling out the forms.

The Appraisal Review Board will meet beginning August 5 on mineral and related property, with hearings scheduled later in the month for protests on reappraisal notices. Once the hearings are completed and all corrections made, the Board will certify the records. Each taxing entity will be furnished with their values and an effective tax rate published. The rate cannot be increased over three percent of the amount of revenue generated in the prior year.

Once the effective tax rate is published, the governing body of each taxing entity will start proceedings to adopt the 1982 tax rate. The adopted tax rates will then be given to the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District, with these individual rates to be applied to produce a tax roll and tax

statements.

The Appraisal District will mail statements and collect for all taxing units except the Coleman Independent School District and the City of Novice, beginning with the 1982 tax year which began July 1, 1982. Property owners will receive one consolidated tax statement and the total of all taxes owed to all units - County, City and School District - on the one statement.

Some confusion and misunderstanding is expected with the new system. In the past it has been the practice to value property at a fraction of its market value, with often different values placed on each parcel of property for three different taxing entities. From this year forward, one value will be shown on the appraisal notice for all entities.

Property owners are asked to note that the Appraisal District has no taxing authority. Only questions concerning the appraised value can be answered at the County Appraisal Office. Questions concerning tax rates and dollar amount of taxes must be directed to the local elected officials.

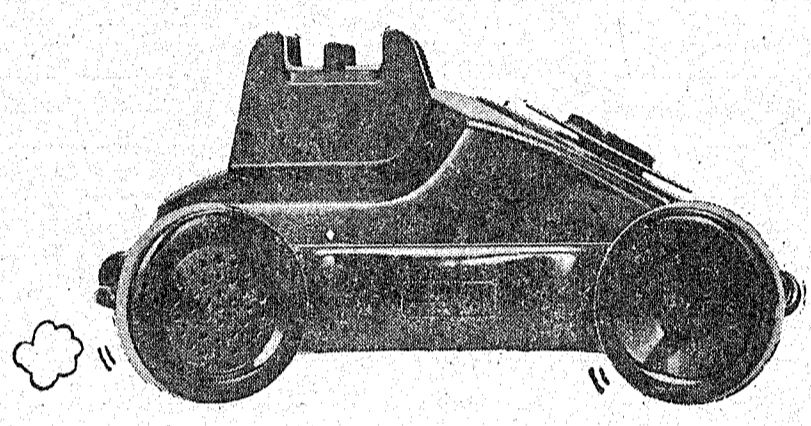
