Coleman Rodeo Next Week

Performances Slated July 14 - 17

Coleman's 45th Annual PRCR Rodeo will begin next Wednesday night, July 14, for a four-night run. Performances will be at 8:30 p.m. each evening at the Coleman Rodeo Association arena.

Approved by the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association and Women's Professional Rodeo Association, the event will draw top cowboys and cowgirls from the southwest to participate in the major rodeo events. Stock will be furnished by Mesquite Rodeo Co. owned by Neal Gay, providing the very best rodeo stock in the business.

Sharon Sneed, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Sneed of Coleman, will serve as Queen of the 1982 Rodeo. Sharon is a spring graduate of Coleman High School.

Allan Bing of St. Joseph, Missouri will provide background music for each performance.

Clowns for the rodeo will be Quail Dobbs and Frank McVain. Both have performed at the Coleman Rodeo in previous years. Announcer will be Tom Hadley of

Mason, recognized as one of the best rodeo announcers in the business.

Besides the regular rodeo events, there will be a kids' goat scramble each night, and a dance will be held at the pavilion at the rodeo

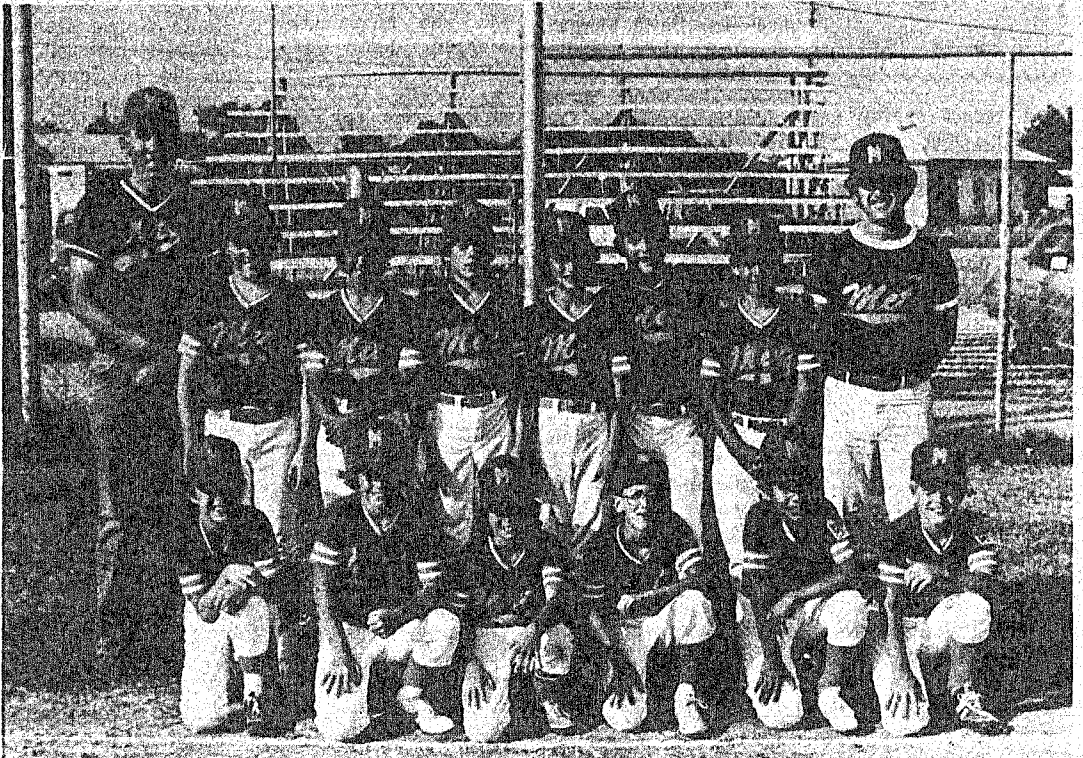
grounds. Music will be provided by the Texas Road Gang of Waco.

Opening the annual rodeo will be a parade Wednesday afternoon, July 14, at 5:30 p.m. featuring local riders. A Saturday parade will feature floats and out-of-town riding clubs.

A special feature of the rodeo will be the Nestea Comany's "Teenage Top Hand Challenge," with one or two high school contestants competing in the saddle bronc riding, calf roping and barrel race at each performance. The Nestea Company will be adding a minimum of \$1,000 prize money at the rodeo.

The Coleman Rodeo is one of the major events in Coleman County each year, and all area people are invited to attend or take part in any way. Reserved seat tickets are available as well as general admission. There is seating for 6,000 persons and ample parking at the dust-free arena.

President of the Coleman Rodeo Association this year is Ted Taylor of Coleman, husband of the former Sonja Neff of Santa Anna. A number of Santa Anna men are members of the Association.

Stenholm to Visit In Coleman Friday

Three players from the Santa Anna Mets Little League ball team were chosen for the Coleman County All-Star Team when coaches of the county teams met in Coleman Friday night.

Selected from the local team were Eddie Tomlinson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tex Tomlinson; James Hartman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Hartman; and Rodney Musick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rodney Musick. The local team members will take part in the All-Star tournament later this month.

The Mets finished the season with a league-leading 11 wins and four losses, but did not win either half of the season and did not qualify for the championship series.

The first half champion Yankees defeated the second half champ Rangers in a best of three game series to reign as Coleman County

1982 Little League Champions. The Yankees will be playing in district competition this week.

The Mets completed their regular season with a 25-0 win over the Mozelle A's. Winning pitcher was Rodney Musick who allowed only one hit. Leading the hit parade were Eddie Tomlinson with three; Toby Goodwin, Chris Kleman and James Hartman with two each; and Salvador Perez, Rodney Musick and Caesar Padilla with one each.

Eddie Hartman has served as manager of the Mets this season, and Scott Patterson is coach.

In the All-Star staff, Rondoe Smith from the Yankees and Tommy Floyd from the Rangers will be manager and coach of the group. The first game will be in Coleman Monday, July 19, with Cisco. Winner of that game will advance to the area tournament that weekend.

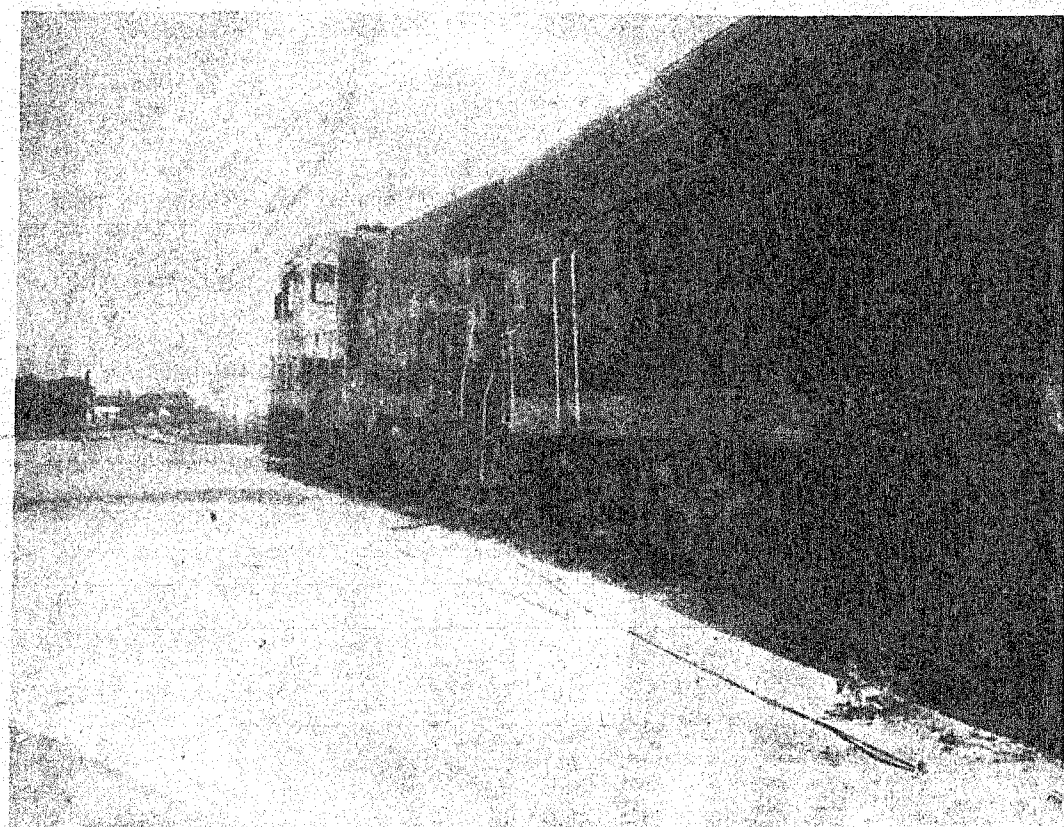

David Barkley is retiring president of the group and will automatically serve one year on the Board of Directors.

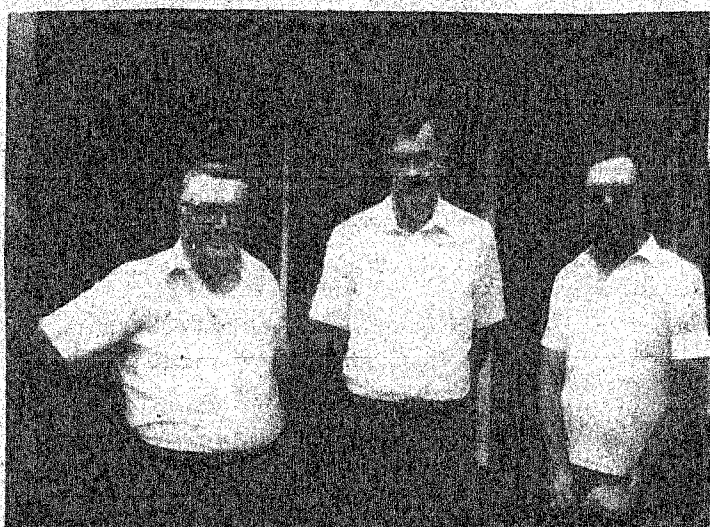
Barry Miles was elected this spring as first vice president, but has resigned and is moving from Santa Anna. The other vice

Tax Payments To Be Made At County Office

Effective July 1, all Santa Anna City taxes will be collected through the Coleman County Tax Appraisal Office in Coleman. All records will be kept at that location and all transactions made at that site.

Under the new tax appraisal program, most taxing entities in Coleman County have contracted with the county office to assess and collect taxes. The tax rates will be set by the City of Santa Anna, but all correspondence and collection made through the Coleman office.

Pat Rutherford, City Secretary, noted that all current and delinquent taxes should be paid at the Coleman office, located just south of the Courthouse. Notices of the 1982 taxes are expected to be received soon, with questions on the City taxes to be answered by staff members in Coleman.

Court Upholds Stacy Dam Appeal

The proposed reservoir on the Colorado River at the Stacy site is back in the news. Wednesday of last week the Third Court of Civil Appeals in Austin upheld decisions of the lower court and of the Texas Water Commission which had approved application by the Colorado River Municipal Water District, officed in Big Spring.

An appeal by opponents to the

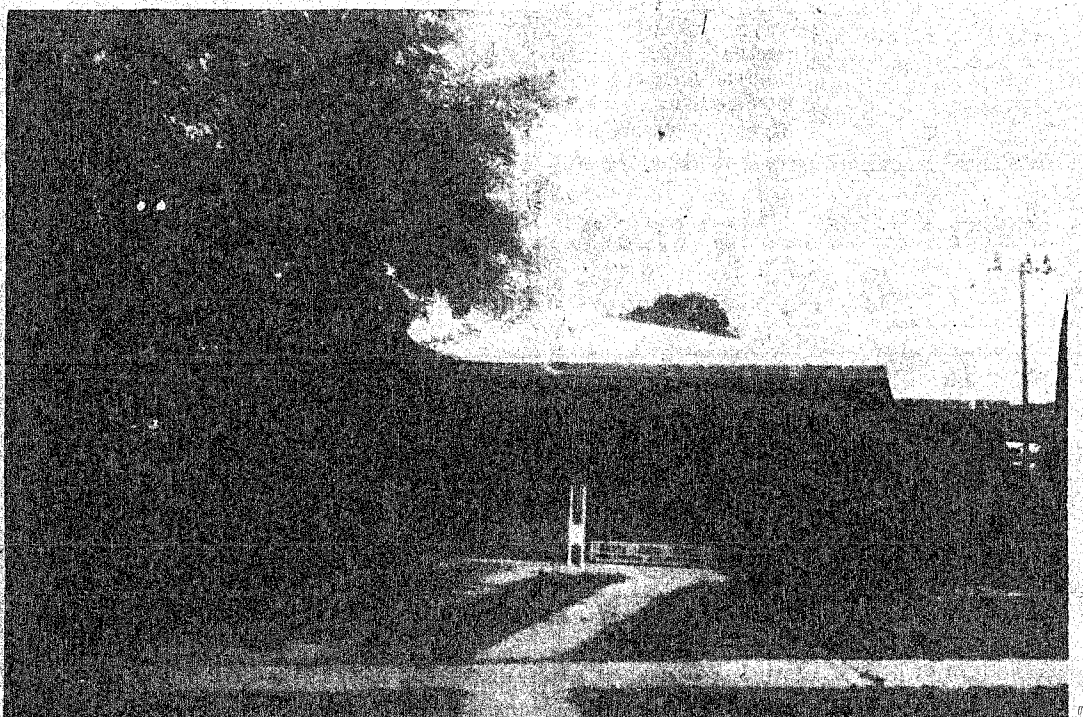
Texas Supreme Court is still possible, but had not been filed last week.

O. H. Ivie, general manager of CRMWD, indicated the board will meet to evaluate this latest development, but most likely defer further action to see if the matter is appealed again.

The proposed lake is to be about 1.13 times the size of Lake E. V. Spence near Robert Lee, and would straddle the Concho-Coleman county

line below the confluence of the Concho and Colorado Rivers, near the Leaday and Stacy communities.

The proposed reservoir would have a 135-foot-high dam impounding 554,000 acre feet of water, backed up the river channel some 15 miles when at maximum level. Plans also include a 45-inch pipeline laid to the Midland-Odessa area via a route to permit taps by other cities.

A recent survey has revealed that newspaper readers in small towns want their newspapers to change with them. The study, by a research group, found that small town readers consider the local newspaper their most credible medium, but they want improvements made.

Among the areas listed as problems for many small circulation newspapers were:

1. Inadequate local news. Readers charge that many papers were too preoccupied with Paris and Peking and not enough with their own home towns.
2. Failure to help readers cope. Readers claim most newspapers do not help them with a complicated world, difficult economy and personal needs.
3. The bad news - good news syndrome. Readers complain that newspapers overplay the bad news, manipulate readers through sensational headlines and pay too little attention to reporting good news.
4. Hard to read newspapers. Readers believe that newspapers are becoming increasingly hard to read and handle; lack adequate indexes, news summaries; and overplay continuous stories even when nothing is happening.
5. Depersonalization. Readers said they can't trust the people who publish, edit or write for a newspaper if they know very little or nothing about them.

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June 27 Fire the Second For Santa Anna News

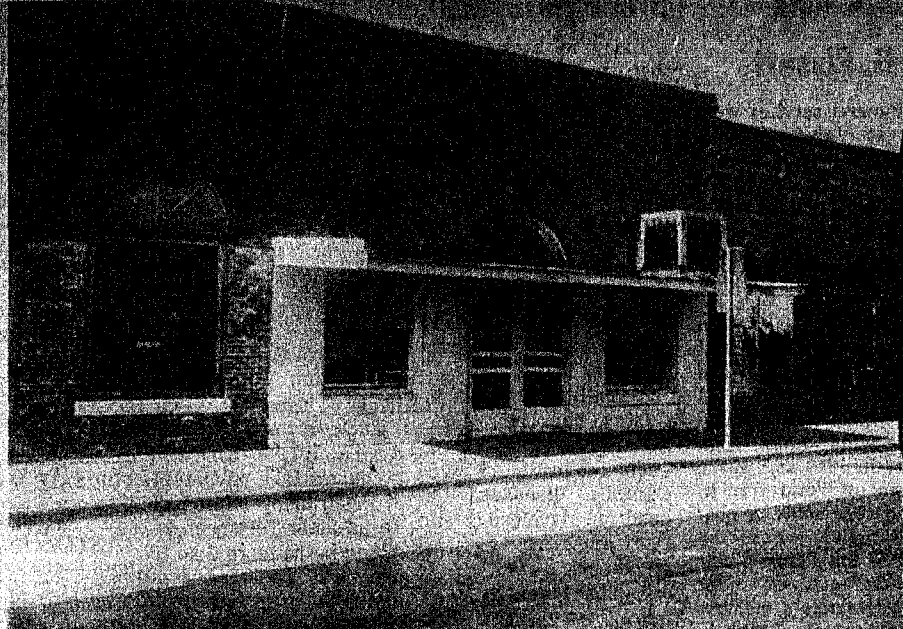
The Santa Anna News is settled in a new location at 214 North Second Street, just off the main downtown intersection. The move was made Thursday, July 1, with equipment and furniture put into place in the two-room office suite in Santa Anna Housing Authority property.

After about 50 years in the same Wallis Avenue location, a Sunday, June 27, fire caused the location change. Lightning was cited as the cause of the blaze that severely damaged the building and the adjoining building owned by the Cheaney Estate.

Despite the damage of fire, water and smoke, most of the furnishings and contents were salvaged. Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department was praised for their efficient and quick work.

Few newspapers have as unique a history as the News. The first issue was published in a cave on the west mountain.

Beatrice Grady Gay, in her book "Into the Setting Sun," wrote that Con Rowland established the newspaper here in January 1886, coming to Santa Anna for his health.



AFTER THE FIRE the old Santa Anna News building is boarded and abandoned for the present time. Home of the newspaper for the past 50 years, the building in the downtown section was vacated after the Sunday, June 27, fire. The structure is owned by the Santa

Anna News, a part of the Woodson Newspapers, Inc. Plans for renovation or rebuilding have not been made at the present time. The next door building, formerly Howard's Barber Shop, was also damaged in the fire.

The cave was utilized as there was no house on the property, and he spent the winter in the sort of dugout. The paper remains the oldest continuous business in the community.

No doubt the newspaper was soon moved to a building, but in 1886 the town was moved from "the gap" to near the railroad tracks.

The exact location of the News is not known, but in 1912 it was in operation at a site just north of the present Santa Anna National Bank building. That building burned, and it is also known that the News office -- and all the back issues and files -- burned in 1919, so perhaps it was still there at that time.

From that site until the early 1930's, the place of business is not recorded. However John C. Gregg, Santa Anna Postmaster and former publisher, said

it was located at the Wallis Avenue building in about 1932. His late father was also owner and editor of the News for a number of years.

Other editors and publishers have included Bob Parker in the mid-1960's and Johnny Valentine in 1967-69.

The late W. T. Hays owned the News for ten years, selling to the Woodson newspaper chain in 1979.

Barbara Kingsbery has been editor of the News

since October 1968. The circulation now numbers 1,100.

Production of the weekly newspaper is done at Bangs at the office of the Brown County Gazette, with printing at Brownwood Bulletin plant in Brownwood.

After the fire last week and while all the equipment and furnishings were standing out on the street, some were wondering if that original cave might be available for the News office!
