Summer Swim Program To Start Lessons Monday

Santa Anna children have an opportunity to take part in the summer swimming classes at Coleman, with the sessions to start next Monday, June 14, at the Coleman Municipal Pool at City Park.

Debbie Dean, coordinator of the Santa Anna program, announced this week that the classes will be held June 14-25, with sessions starting at 9 a.m.

Santa Anna children may attend any of the sessions, but a bus will be available for local children to the 11 a.m. beginner session and the 12 noon session for advanced beginners. The bus will leave the school at 10:30 a.m. each day.

Other sessions include intermediate and advanced swimming from 9 - 10 a.m. and another class for beginner swimming from 10 - 10:45 a.m. Children who take part must have completed first grade in school.

Mrs. Dean stated that cost for the lessons is 50 cents per day. and those riding the bus will be required to pay an additional 25 cents. In addition, each child who rides the bus must sign the necessary papers in advance, and a parent or guardian- of each child will be required to ride the bus at least one day to chaperone the group.

Additional classes are planed June 28 - July 9 for children who have completed kindergarten and pre-school children. The kindergarten class will be from 10 - 10:45 a.m. and the pre-school group will meet from 11-11:45 a.m. The pre-schoolers must be out of diapers and must have an adult in the pool with them during the lessons. Cost for the lessons will be 50 cents plus 25 cents for each adult in the pool. No transportation will be arranged for these sessions.

Parents are urged to contact Mrs. Dean at 348-3362 this week to see the response to the program. Certified teachers are provided by the Coleman Recreation Department.

Camp Meeting Set This Month

Area people are urged to mark their calendars for the meeting and make plans to attend as many of the services as possible. boxes were combined for the election, and only 50 voters from the Coleman East, Santa Anna and Rockwood areas cast votes. There are approximately 1,450 registered voters in the Precinct.

Just over 200 votes were cast in the entire county Saturday.

In the four state races, Coleman County voters gave Jim Mattox a 109 - 93 lead over John Hannah, and Pete Snelson was leader in the Land Commissioner's race by a 128 - 93 margin over Garry Mauro, who was the winner of the Democratic nomination. Mauro will meet Republican Woody Glasscock of Hondo in the general election.

Mattox faces Bill Meier of Euless in November.

In the county balloting, Charles F. Campbell polled 97 votes to 88 for John Humphreys; and Bill Black led over Chuck Miller 96 - 88. Campbell does not have a Republican opponent in the November general election, but Miller, the statewide winner, will meet Ray Moses, the GOP nominee.

Rose Bass was judge of the Saturday election held at the Telephone Cooperative building.

SAHS Teacher Is Chosen For Institute

Roland Nicholas, math and computer programming teacher at Santa Anna High School, is one of six central Texas teachers chosen to receive fellowships to attend the 25th annual Petroleum Institute for Educators to be held this month at the University of Houston.

The institute is sponsored by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, Oil Information Committee.

Other area teachers chosen for the institute were David Bradley, Patricia Fisher and Sallye Japhet of Abilene; Stacy Rhodes of Early and Juanema Westmoland of Albany.

The institute started Monday, June 7, and will continue through June 25 at the University campus in Houston.

County Historical Group Gets State Award

The Coleman County Historical Commission has received the State of Texas Distinguished Service Award for outstanding accomplishments in the field of historical preservation. The commemorative plaque was presented during an awards banquet in Brenham April 16. The banquet, part of the Texas Historical Commission's 1982 Historic Preservation Conference, was attended by some 200 delegates representing county historical commissions from around the state.

To qualify for the honor, the local group had to meet requirements in thirteen categories. In some of the categories, options were given to choose one of a group of activities to qualify.

Ralph Terry of Coleman is chairman of the Coleman group, with membership open to all interested people in the area. One of the categories in the judging included enlisting young people in the organization and encouraging young people to take an interest in preserving their local history.

Coleman County was among 28 counties winning the state DSA honor this year.

The Texas Historical Commission's year-round educational and consulting programs include workshops, publications, professional consultation, and other public services in the fields of preservation, restoration, archeology, and museology. In addition, the THS is the Texas liaison with federal


agencies on projects affecting historic sites.

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The History Of

The Coleman Museum and Camp Colorado

Summer is almost here, school is out and families are making plans for travel as well as other summer activities.

But if you are like alot of people today, you cannot afford to travel cross country as you once could. Therefore many people are beginning to discover more about local areas and sites, still having an enjoyable time for alot less money.

One such place you may wish to visit this summer is only about 29 miles west of Bangs in the city of Coleman—The City Museum—located in the city park on Highway 84 toward Abilene. Even though it is not the large facility, it displays a wide array of antiques and relics that will take you into the past of frontier days in this area.

The museum had a rather odd beginning. A veteran service officer by the name of Ben F. Cox became interested in antiques back in 1961, picking up a few and hanging them on the wall of his office in the courthouse. Everyone visiting his office would see them and then bring relics of their own to add to the collection. It wasn't long before he had more than his office could hold.

The City Council became interested in opening a museum and donated a building in the city park which was a replica of the administration building at Camp Colorado. The building was built during 1935-1937 from rocks used in the original building.

The museum opened June 1, 1969 and after three months 6,558 visitors from 47 different states and nine countries had registered. By November, over 8,000 people had registered.

J.B. Harris was hired as custodian and operator. His rife and son, Johnny Harris are still operating the museum today.

Camp Colorado was originality established on the Colorado River in 1856 as protection against hostile Indians. The fort was one of a link of frontier projection stations from San Anconio to Fort Griffin, commanded by Major Van Dorn.

Mosquitoes and yellow fever

plagued the first camp down in the lowlands so the fort was moved to the Jim Ned Valley

during August of 1856 higher in the country about 15 miles northeast of Coleman. Once established, there were stone buildings, parade grounds, stockades and a cemetery.

The fort was abandoned February, 1861 due mostly to the Civil War. Not much of the original fort still stands today except for portions of the stone wall. There is one home owned

by the Sackett family of Dallas that includes the old stockade built during 1857 as the back portion of the house. The rest of the house was built during 1879 and still stands strong and beautiful.

Another interesting landmark of the area is the Camp Colorado Cemetery established in 1857. Now almost covered with brush, trees and weeds, the near forgotten location holds the last remains of men, women and children who lived in the rough country and died from diseases, Indian attacks, and plain old natural causes. Some of the old tombstones have crumbled into pieces with the lettering on them so worn you cannot read the names or dates. Other graves only have rocks as headstones with stories lost forever.

Many relics from the old fort site have been found by means of metal detectors or by hunters just roaming around the location. Permission must be granted to enter the private property but some of the finds of these treasurer hunters can be seen at the museum. The collection includes Indian relics, steel uniform buttons, bullets, a door hinge, all kinds of little odds and ends.


Other items on display at the museum includes the first Coleman fire unit of 1902, the first Coleman fire truck—a 1928 La France, old clothes, hardware, a saddle used by the Coleman sheriff in the 1880's, stuffed animals, the first Coleman newspaper, and the oldest picture of downtown Coleman in existence taken in 1879 when Coleman was three years old.

Other interesting items includes a black beer bottle that dates back before 1860, a snuff bottle that dates back to 1858, and a life-size statue of a horse with real horse hair for it's mane and tail

The only items displayed are those from residents and former residents of Coleman County


The museum will be open this summer everyday except Thursday from 1 p.m. until 5 p.m. You can also enjoy the park in which the museum is located or the the nearby swimming pool.
