Hearing Held at Rockwood On Mining Regulations

Area residents and interested persons met at Rockwood Community Center June 24 when the Texas Railroad Commission conducted a hearing concerning the application of Amistad Fuel Company's permit to conduct a surface mining operation in Coleman County.

The hearing was to determine if the surface mining and reclamation rules meet the requirements of the state and federal surface mining

laws and are properly enforced.

The proposed permit area is approximately 1,100 acres one mile southwest of Rockwood, and one mile north of the Colorado River. The mine has been in operation about two years at the site, with coal processed there for shipment to San

Javier Padilla, Hearings Examiner, Surface Mining and Reclamation Division, Railroad

Commission of Texas, led the hearing.

RRC recently approved permits for six lignite mining sites in Texas where the mixing of topsoil and subsoil results in soil medium equal to or more suitable for sustaining vegetation than the available topsoil. Railroad Commission surface mining rules were developed in 1979, with the Commission having authority to enforce both state and federal provisions.


Policeman Sought for Santa Anna

under her supervision also. Mrs. Barnes also organized and supervised the fund raising projects for the Meals on Wheels program.


Area Library Leader To Visit Here Monday

Son of Business People Killed In Parachute Mishap


Leonard, "'Leo' Jameson, 28, of San Antonio, formerly of Coleman, died late Wednesday afternoon, July 7, near San Antonio in a skydiving accident. The young man was the son of Woodrow and Bonnie Jameson of Coleman, the owners of City Cleaners in Santa Anna.

According to a report in a San Antonio newspaper, the accident occurred as Jameson and three other members of the San Antonio Parachute Center took off from Midlake Airport about a mile from the site where he eventually hit the ground.

The airport owner said the sky divers were trying to make a "four," a maneuver in which four chutists leave the plane at the same time and come together, joining hands in a free-fall formation before opening their chutes.

Jameson's parachute did not open, and he pulled the emergency chute too late, the airport owner The Cessna 182 aircraft

took off from the airport with the pilot and the four jumpers. After about a 20-minute climb, the four

jumped. Because of brisk winds estimated at more than 20 miles per hour, they drifted about a mile from the space above the airport.

After jumping at about 7,500 feet and falling to about 2,000 feet, three chutes opened, but the one worn by Jameson did not. The three saw that their companion was in trouble and watched him plunge to his death. The parachutists said Jameson had been jumping with the club about four months.

runeral services were held at Henderson Funeral Chapel in Coleman Saturday, with burial in White Chapel Cemetery west of Coleman. The Rev. Billy Roberts of Northside Baptist Church in Coleman officiated at the services. Leonard was born in Col-

eman February 10, 1954 and was a graduate of Talpa-Centennial High School. He attended Howard Payne University and North Texas State University and was an Army veteran. He worked as a derrick man for Global Marine Offshore Drilling Co. and had lived in San Antonio the past six years.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow Jameson of Coleman; three sisters, Mrs. Rebecca Richmond of Austin, Mrs. Marie Stobaugh of Plano and dall Jameson of Odessa.






