## Bank Ownership Changes

**Bangs Bank Executive Added to Local Staff** 

The controlling interest of Santa Anna National Bank has been sold by Mrs. O. L. Cheaney and the Cheaney Estate to Dr. Wesley L. Wise of Brownwood. New management will be added to the staff of the Bank.

Mr. James Shelton, President of First State Bank of Bangs, will take on additional duties as President of Santa Anna National Bank and will actively participate in the management of the Bank. Shelton and his family reside near Bangs where they are active in community affairs.

Joe Ed Wise of Lamesa has accepted the position as Vice President and will begin his duties October 1.

A Rockwood native and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe W. Wise of Rockwood, he will start his career in banking after a successful tenure with the Texas Extension Service. A Santa Anna High School graduate, he holds bachelor and master's degrees from Texas Tech University and has been with the Extension Service since 1968.

Wise served as Assistant Agent in Dawson County, then was Agent in Crosby and Gaines counties. He returned to Dawson County in 1976 as Agent and has received numerous honors and awards in many fields.

He was the one Texas County Agent chosen for the Achievement Award given by the National Association of County Agents

in 1978, and in 1979 was chosen the Outstanding County Agent in Texas by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. Just this year he was given the Distinguished Service Award by the National Association of County Agents.

Besides professional memberships, Wise is an honorary member of FFA and has served on the board of directors of West Texas Opportunities, Chamber of Commerce and the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association. He and his wife, the former Ruth Ann Walker of Santa Anna, are parents of two sons, Bradley and Nathan, and are members of the Methodist Church.

Rob Cheaney will continue as Executive Vice President and be active in the management of Santa Anna National Bank.

It is strongly felt that with this additional outstanding personnel the Santa Anna National Bank will be better able to serve Santa Anna and Coleman County.

Dr. Wise, a member of the Board of Directors of the local bank for eight years, has recently purchased controlling interest in First State Bank of Bangs. He also has farming, ranching and other interests in the area.

The Santa Anna National Bank is one of the oldest businesses in the community, having its start in 1889 as a private bank established by the late W. R. Kelley and has operated at the same downtown location since before the turn of the century.



### **Social Security Notes** Check the Records Periodically

People who work in or she should contact a employment covered by Social Security should away. check their Social Security record every three years or so, Priscilla Tercero, Social Security branch manager in Brownwood, said recently.

This is especially important if the person changes jobs often or has more than one job. A post-card form is available at any Social Security office for a person to request a statement of the earnings reported to his or her record.

A person's earnings record is very important, Tercero said. Eligibility for and the amount of any benefits due will be based on the information contained in that record.

Once a person receives a statement of earnings, he or she should examine it and covered earnings. carefully to make sure that the proper amount of earnings has been reported to Social Security. If the pershown on the statement, he month.

because most corrections to an earnings record must he reported within three years, three months, and 15 days after the end of the year the earnings were paid or the selfemployment income was derived. The person should bring his or her own records of the earnings that are available so that in investigation can be made.

September 15 is the last the necessary cash date on which applications reserves or additional borwill be accepted for All- rowing capability to take a Risk insurance policies on 1983 crop wheat. All-Risk Crop Insurance Field Operations Director F. W. Ted" Crouch Jr., says that a list of local agents who offer the insurance can be obtained by contacting the county ASCS office.

Crouch says that the number of applications received to date and the interest expressed by wheat growers suggests that the amount of insurance in force will be a record high.
