Bank Ownership Changes

Bangs Bank Executive Added to Local Staff

The controlling interest of Santa Anna National Bank has been sold by Mrs. O. L. Cheaney and the Cheaney Estate to Dr. Wesley L. Wise of Brownwood. New management will be added to the staff of the Bank.

Mr. James Shelton, President of First State Bank of Bangs, will take on additional duties as President of Santa Anna National Bank and will actively participate in the management of the Bank. Shelton and his family reside near Bangs where they are active in community affairs.

Joe Ed Wise of Lamesa has accepted the position as Vice President and will begin his duties October 1.

A Rockwood native and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe W. Wise of Rockwood, he will start his career in banking after a successful tenure with the Texas Extension Service. A Santa Anna High School graduate, he holds bachelor and master's degrees from Texas Tech University and has been with the Extension Service since 1968.

Wise served as Assistant Agent in Dawson County, then was Agent in Crosby and Gaines counties. He returned to Dawson County in 1976 as Agent and has received numerous honors and awards in many fields.

He was the one Texas County Agent chosen for the Achievement Award given by the National Association of County Agents

in 1978, and in 1979 was chosen the Outstanding County Agent in Texas by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. Just this year he was given the Distinguished Service Award by the National Association of County Agents.

Besides professional memberships, Wise is an honorary member of FFA and has served on the board of directors of West Texas Opportunities, Chamber of Commerce and the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association. He and his wife, the former Ruth Ann Walker of Santa Anna, are parents of two sons, Bradley and Nathan, and are members of the Methodist Church.

Rob Cheaney will continue as Executive Vice President and be active in the management of Santa Anna National Bank.

It is strongly felt that with this additional outstanding personnel the Santa Anna National Bank will be better able to serve Santa Anna and Coleman County.

Dr. Wise, a member of the Board of Directors of the local bank for eight years, has recently purchased controlling interest in First State Bank of Bangs. He also has farming, ranching and other interests in the area.

The Santa Anna National Bank is one of the oldest businesses in the community, having its start in 1869 as a private bank established by the late W. R. Kelley and has operated at the same downtown location since before the turn of the century.

Fiesta de la Paloma Events Listed

The annual Fiesta de la Paloma on Saturday, September 25, will have activities for everyone in the family. The Coleman County festival is expected to draw hundreds of people for the varied events during the day.

The Dove Cook-off is one of the main attractions of the Fiesta, with cash prizes of \$400, \$300 and \$200 to be awarded the first through third place winners. Out of town judges will award prizes for the best dove dishes and most unique cook-sites.

Deadline for entries is Tuesday, Fiesta-goers of the Flea Market, September 21, for persons in or outside Coleman County.

Doves will be cooked on the site, with entrants furnishing all necessary equipment and supplies. Electricity will be furnished if needed.

All dove dishes will be judged according to flavor, appearance and uniqueness of dish. In addition to the three prizes for the entry, a cash prize of \$100 and a plaque will be awarded the most colorful and unique cook-site.

Another event that is a favorite of with dozens of exhibitors having their wares on display. A 20' x 30' space can be reserved for \$6, with individuals, church, schools or organizations welcome to bring mer-

chandise, arts or crafts for sale.

Dealers must provide their own shade and display tables. Market hours will be 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Dozens of other attractions will be in store for those attending the Fiesta, and area people are urged to attend and take part in the entertainment.

Mountaineers Lose to Bangs; Home Game Set Friday Night

The Santa Anna Mountaineers had a poor start for the 1982 football season when the Bangs Dragons rolled to a 63 - 0 victory Friday night. The Dragons took their first possession for a 23-yard touchdown, and went on to amass 600 yards rushing, including 261 yards and four touchdowns by Bangs senior Randy Bernalard.

The young and inexperienced Mountaineers were overpowered by the big Class AA squad that is considered a leader in their district this season.

Bodie Stark led the Mountaineers

with 100 yards rushing. The Mountaineers also had seven yards on one pass completion, with a total yardage of 188.

Santa Anna had five first downs to 14 for the winners.

Santa Anna had 8 punts averaging 45 yards, while the Dragons had three punts averaging 15 yards.

Coach Jack Snipes cited Bodie Stark as outstanding back in the game, and named Maurice Costillo as outstanding offensive and defensive linemen. Also playing an outstanding game were Paul Vasquez and Rodney Guthrie.

The team will have some added depth and experience for the Friday night game with Throckmorton as two seniors, Steve Hughes and Randy Casey, join the squad. The two suffered injuries last season and were doubtful about joining the team this year.

The Friday night game at Mountaineer Stadium will start at 8 p.m. with the Class A team from Throckmorton.

Admission to the football games will be \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for students. Reserved seat tickets are 50 cents per game, with season tickets available Friday night.

Guy Allen has taken a wide lead in the Professional Steer Roping event, going to the National Steer Roping Finals in Laramie, Wyoming this weekend with earnings of \$18,165 for the year. Listed second in last week's records was Jim Davis of Pecos who had won \$13,533. Phil Lyne of Cotulla was less than three hundred dollars behind for third place, and veteran Walt Arnold of Silverton was in fourth place.

Allen, who now calls Lovington, New Mexico his home, is a two-time National Steer Roping champion, and his father, James, has been among the leaders in the event for many years.

Gip Allen, the youngest of the Allen clan, did not qualify among the top 15 ropers for the finals competition although ranked about 25th in the nation.

Ropers enter the finals on an even basis, with the championship going to the roper who earns the most money in the ten-steer event Saturday and Sunday, September 11 - 12.

Guy Allen competed in the National Intercollegiate Rodeo circuit while a student at Ranger Junior College and later at Sul Ross State University where his brother, Gip, is now a student. He has made his home near Lovington since his marriage last year.

Charles F. Domy of Fort Worth completed No. 1 A. J. Wells in Coleman County Regular Field five miles southeast of Santa Anna.

Wellsite is in the M. Martinez Survey 751.

The well had an absolute open flow of 155,000 cubic feet of gas daily with a gas-hydrocarbon ratio of 136,000 - 1 of 34 gravity.

Production is from perforations at 2,160 to 2,228 feet, treated with 1,000 gallons of acid.

The 4 1/2-inch casing is set at 2,363 feet, total depth.

Santana Exploration Inc., Santa Anna will drill No. 1 Bruce Terry in the Coleman Junction, North Brenecke Field in Coleman County.

The planned 2,500-foot venture is located three miles southeast of Coleman on a 125-acre lease.

It is in the Coleman CSL Survey 57.

Pautsky Energy Inc. of Wichita Falls filed application to drill two proposed 1,500-foot regular field projects in the area.

No. 33 T. M. Hays Estate is located four miles north of Trickham on a 450-acre lease.

It is in Bonds & Sanders Survey 92.

The other test is No. 5 O. H. Watson, located three miles northwest of Trickham on a 173-acre lease.

Drillsite is in Pleasant Young Survey 494.

AUSTIN- Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent announced that Texas operators reported 122 gas and 67 oil discoveries in August 1982.

One year ago, 130 gas and 37 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in the eighth month of the year included 52 in deep South Texas, 27 in the Refugio area, 13 in Southeast Texas, eight each in East Texas and West Central Texas, five in North Texas, three in the San Angelo area, and two each in the San Antonio and Midland areas and East Central Texas.

Oil discoveries included 13 in West Central Texas, nine each in North Texas and the Midland area, seven in deep South Texas, six each in East Texas and the Refugio and San Angelo areas, five in Southeast

Texas, three in the Panhandle, two in the Lubbock area, and one in East Central Texas.

Through the first eight months of this year, there have been 993 gas and 435 oil discoveries throughout the state. For the same period last year, there were 841 gas and 420 oil discoveries.

Applications to drill, deepen, plug back and for service wells in August amounted to 2,913 against 3,724 a year earlier.

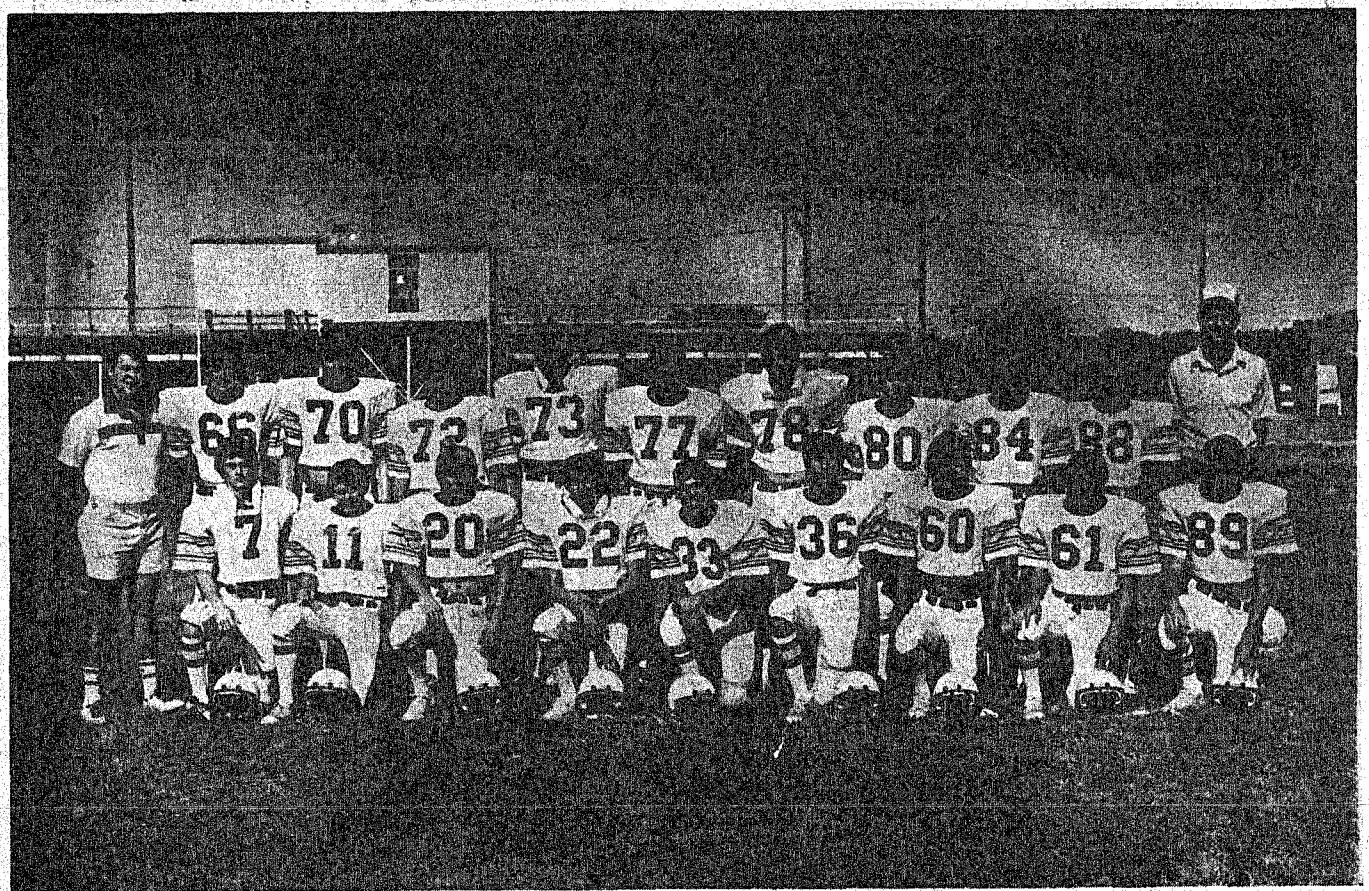

AUSTIN—Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Jamison Jr. have been named Coleman County co-chairmen for the Governor Clements campaign.

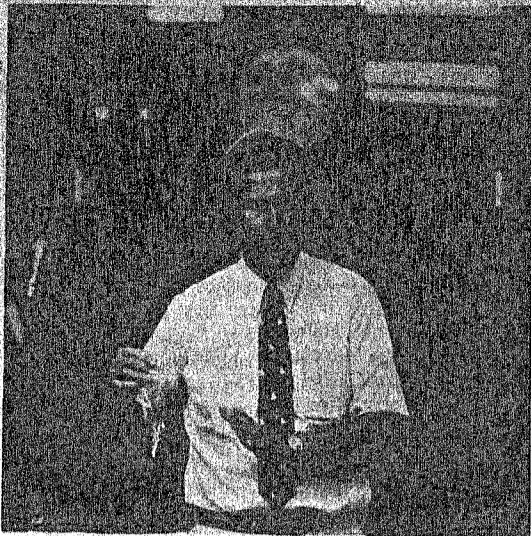
