General Election Tuesday

Campaigns Come to an End; Six Amendments on Ballot

Voters will be going to the polls on Tuesday, November 2, to cast their ballots in the general election that will choose leaders from county to national level. Also on the ballot will be six proposed amendments to the State Constitution.

Voters in the Santa Anna area of Precinct 2 will vote at the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative office on North Second Street from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Precinct 2 also includes a voting box in south Coleman and one at Rockwood. Voters are urged to check their voter registration certificate if they are not sure of their voting place.

In the Santa Anna area, there are 880 registered voters; Rockwood has 110. Eligible to vote at the Coleman 2-East box are 353.

Montie Guthrie III will be Santa Anna election judge on Tuesday.

Clerks will be Rose Bass, Gail Horner, Carmen Donham, Patsy Isenhower and Lillian Herndon. Bert Fowler will be judge of the Rockwood election.

Guthrie said this week that less

than eight percent of the qualified voters in the precinct cast ballots in the June run-off election. A large turnout is urged for the General Election.

Absentee voting will end Thursday (today) at the office of the County Clerk in Coleman.

VFD Gets Check From F-Bureau Insurance Co.

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department received a check for \$150 from Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies last week, an expression of appreciation to the Department for extinguishing a fire at the property of Mrs. Inez Steward

The fire at the Steward property destroyed a storage shed near the house where the Bo Wilson family lives. The Santa Anna VFD were able to keep the fire from spreading to the house or other outbuildings.

The Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies pay volunteer fire departments this amount when they answer a fire call to rural areas to property insured by them.

The Insurance Company believes volunteer fire departments have contributed to reduce the amount of loss involved in fire and more important, to prevent fires. It is their hope this money will help the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department in their program.

State Leader To Present Church Program Sunday

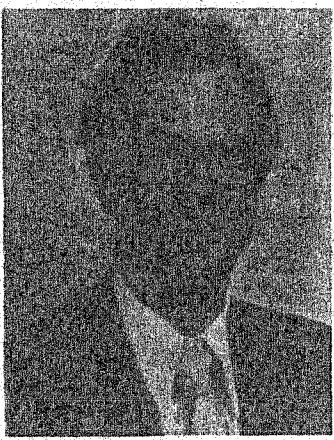

A grand opening for the store is planned at a later date.

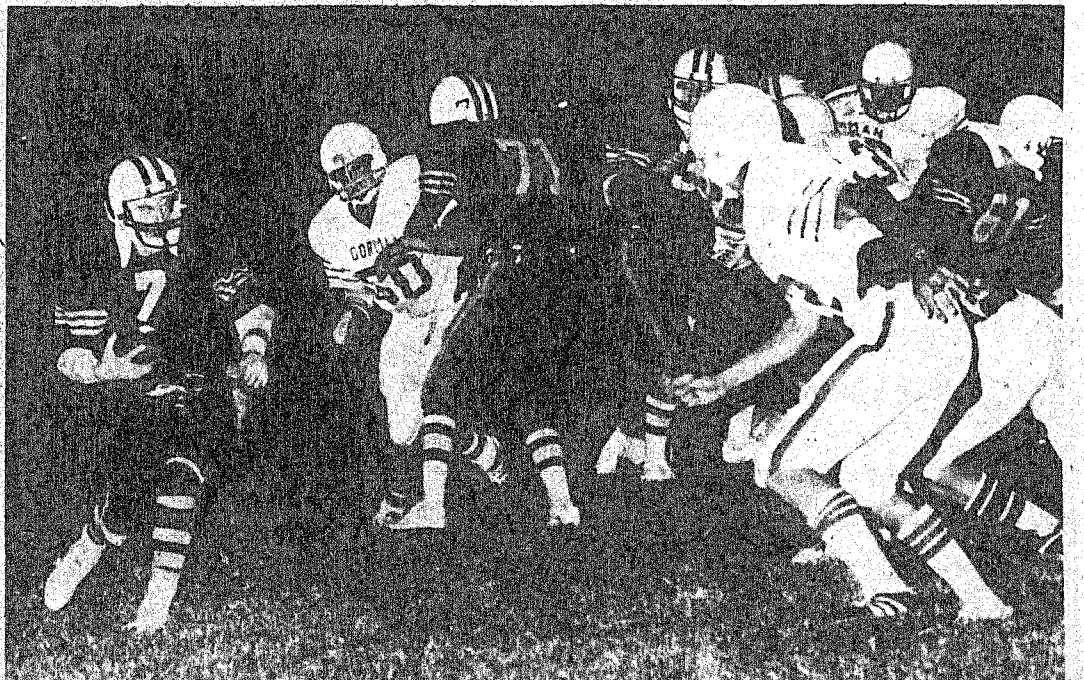
Fees For Using City Landfill Set at Recent City Council Session

Mountaineers Lose to Gorman

Open Date This Week; One More Home Game

The Friday night football game with Gorman was perhaps the best played this season by the Santa Anna Mountaineers despite the final score.

With their superior playing, the Mountaineers held the powerful Gorman team to a 0-0 stand-off for the first half. The game was a toss-up until the last 26 seconds when Gorman's two-point conversion was completed for the final 14-12 tally.

The Mountaineers were determined to have a victory that would give them a berth in the District 8-A playoffs, but Gorman also needed the victory and put another victory on their 5-1 season record while Santa Anna dropped to 3-2-1 for the season.

Santa Anna's first score Friday night was on a one-yard run by Bodie Stark. Stark scored his second TD on a 16-yard scoring run in

the final quarter after Gorman had gotten on the scoreboard by way of an 80-yard kickoff return.

The Mountaineers kept their composure during the Gorman drive for their final score that came in the final minute of play, followed by the winning PAT.

Gorman led Santa Anna in first downs by 14 to 13, and had 165 yards rushing and 68 passing. The Mountaineers had 186 yards rushing, with Stark accounting for more than 100 on 30 carries.

Santa Anna's fine defensive playing and hard hitting caused five Gorman fumbles. Coach Jack Snipes praised the entire team for their 100 percent effort and exceptional playing.

Snipes said this week that the game was the best one of the season, and as exciting as any game on television. Too much em-

phasis is often placed on the won-loss record instead of seeing the superb playing exhibited by the two high school teams, the coach said.

The loss gives Santa Anna almost no chance of

staying in the play-offs, but an opportunity to continue the season in fine style. The Mountaineers are idle this week, then will resume play on Friday, November 5, with a game at Evant. The final game of the season will be in Santa Anna on November 12 with the Blanket Tigers.

City Sales Tax Increases Again

Santa Anna's share of the September sales tax has been returned from the office of State Comptroller Bob Bullock and totals \$887.60 for the period ending October 8.

The figure is only \$15 over the sales tax total for the same period last year, but the overall total for 1982 is 36 percent higher than 1981.

According to the figures from the state office, Santa Anna has received \$23,028.25 for the year, compared to \$16,913.33 for the same period last year.

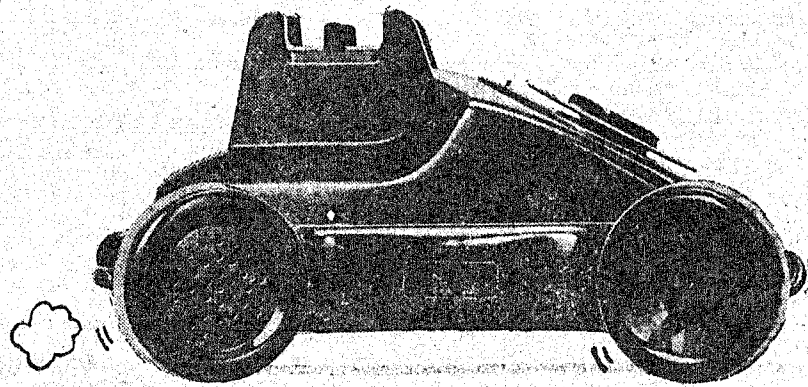

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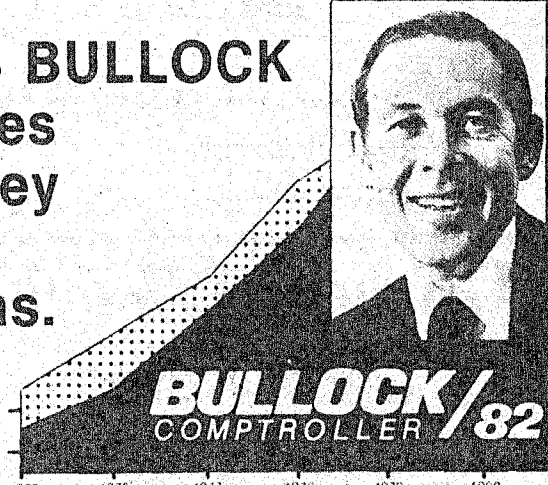

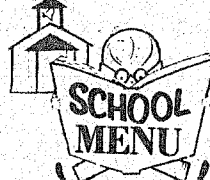

Health Notes...

"Managing" Arthritis

COLLEGE STATION- Managing arthritis requires a team approach and depends as much on the arthritis sufferer as on the doctor.

"Arthritis is a term applied to more than 100 different diseases, each of which - in some way - affects the joints. Americans spend an estimated \$4 billion each year on arthritis care and relief, making it an extremely costly health problem," explains Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, health education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

By practicing "self-management," arthritis sufferers can do much to help themselves live a normal life.

"With your doctor's help, decide on a self-management program that best suits your needs," Shirer suggests.

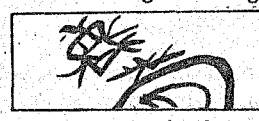
Self-management activities include:

Breaking the pain-depression-stress cycle through either medication, relaxation techniques or just keeping your mind busy on other things.

Exercise - although exercise is vitally important to keep joints flexible, you must also know when NOT to exercise. If a joint is red and hot, exercise should be limited to minimal movement.

Protect affected joints from injury and over-exertion by proper lifting techniques, avoiding prolonged periods of maintaining the same joint position, and balancing work with rest to conserve energy and strength.

Practice good eating

habits and maintain ideal body weight. With the exception of gout, there is no concrete scientific evidence that eating or not eating certain foods affects arthritis.

Many types of heat help arthritis pain. Be careful not to cause burn, however.

Cold compresses will have a numbing effect and give relief from pain for some arthritis sufferers.

Good posture - whether resting, sleeping, standing or walking - is vitally important for people with any kind of arthritis.

"Finally, it is important to work closely with your doctor. Since there are many types of arthritis, the first step is an accurate diagnosis. Your local Arthritis Foundation office also can help you in managing arthritis," Shirer says.
