Fiesta de la Paloma on Saturday

Events, Activities Stated All Day in Coleman

All roads will lead to Coleman on Saturday, September 25, as the fifth annual Fiesta de la Paloma will be held at the Rodeo Grounds. Sponsored by the Fiesta Committee of Coleman Chamber of Commerce, hundreds of people will be assisting

with the event that evolved from the Coleman County Fair.

One of the main attractions will be the Dove Cook-off Saturday morning, with cash prizes of \$900 to the top three chefs, and a plaque and \$100 cash prize for the most unique

cooks. Last year 20 contestants took part with their favorite dove recipes.

The Ranch Rodeo is a new attraction that is expected to draw a good crowd. There will be two performances, one at 10 a.m. and another at 7 p.m. with cowboys from Coleman County ranches to compete for prize money plus \$1,000 in added money. Admission will be \$3 per person with children under six free.

Other events during the day will include an art show, beauty pageant, flea market, jeep rides, skeet shooting contest, home foods exhibit and contest, commercial displays, horseshoe pitch, food and drink concessions and mechanical bull ride.

There will be dances in the open air pavilion Friday and Saturday nights, and Fiddlin' Frenchie Burke will play a free matinee at 5:30 Saturday afternoon. The dance Fri-

day with music by Country Crossfire of Coleman will be from 10 p.m. - 1 a.m. The Saturday night dance will feature Burke and his band from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.

A sheep shearing demonstration will be held during the day at the Fiesta grounds. Sponsored by the Coleman County Farm Bureau, the machine, crew and sheep will be furnished by Bob Turner of Voss.

The fun lasts all day, and there is no gate admission fee. Most of the activities and events are free of charge, and entertainment is geared for the entire family.

Many local people are expected to have entries in the ladies divisions of the Fiesta that will be exhibited from 12 noon until 5 p.m. Saturday in the Breeder-Feeder Building.

Carnival attractions will be available all day.

A concession stand will offer cold drinks and coffee during the evening.

Several classes are planning reunions during the weekend, and several hundred former students are expected for the two-day festivities.

Senior Citizens' Meals A Great Success Here

Response has been excellent to the newest senior citizens' project in Santa Anna - the nutrition program that provides the noon meal three days per week for persons over 60 years of age.

Started just one month ago, the program now has 75 persons enrolled and an average daily attendance of 36. The largest single day's attendance was 52.

Directed by Udell Copeland, food is prepared at the Coleman Senior Citizen's Center each Monday, Wednesday and Friday and brought to the Mountain City Center to be served from 11:30 to 12:30. Two or more volunteers assist Mrs. Copeland in preparing the buffet-style meal that is complete with drink and dessert. Decorations on the tables add a festive touch to the center, and following the meal there is group singing, music, bingo games or other entertainment.

Sponsored in part by the West Central Texas Council of Governments, the program also receives some funding by the federal government as a means of providing nutritious meals for senior citizens as well as a social activity for those who might otherwise spend most of their time at home alone. Many of the local people arrive early in order to visit with friends and neighbors before the serving begins.

The local program also gives volunteers an oppor-

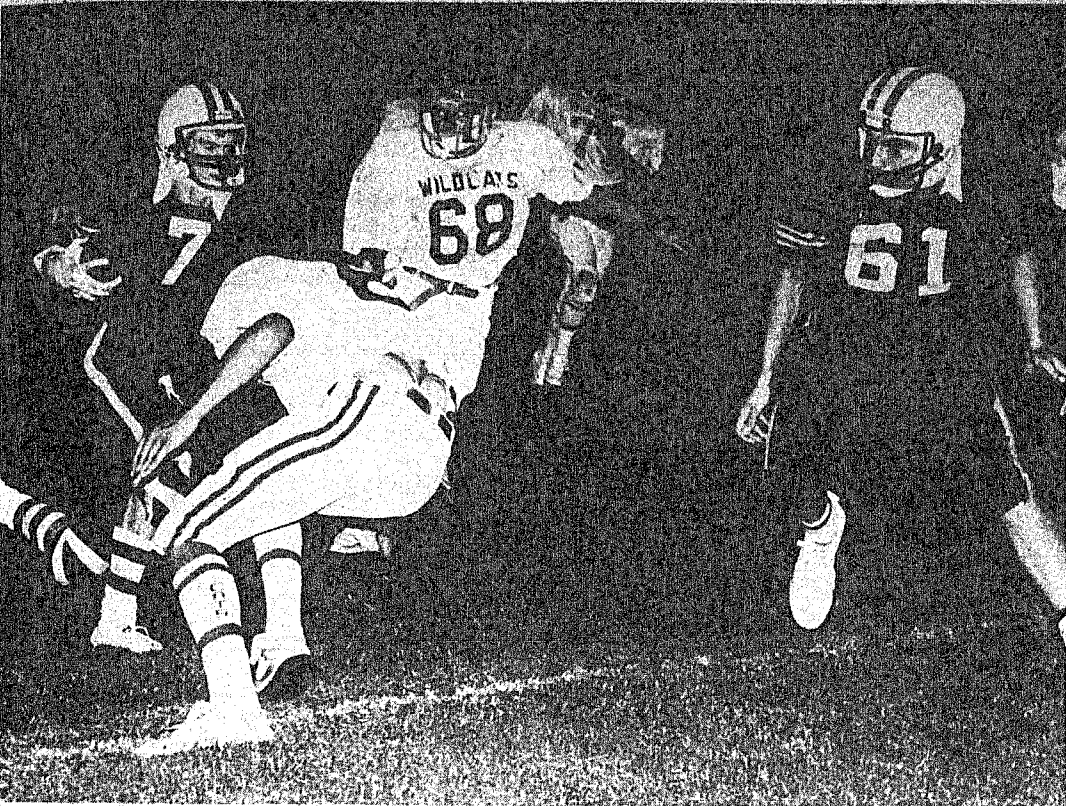
tunity to help, with about 25 persons having taken part at least once. Special events planned each month will include a special Birthday Table for those with birthdays during the month.

Mrs. Copeland expressed appreciation to those who are taking part for their support and interest. Contributions have averaged 97 cents per meal, which is enough to keep the program in good financial shape along with other funding.

Any people aged 60 or over and their spouses are welcome to take part in the program.

Mountaineers Win Friday! On the Road Again Friday to Lometa

Coach Jack Snipes and the Mountaineer Football Team showed talent and determination Friday night as they won their first victory of the season over Rising Star. Santa Anna won 18 - 0 over the Wildcats in the District 8-A opener at Mountaineer Stadium. Coach Snipes had highest praise for the squad, and said the team effort brought about the victory. The defense was outstanding, according to Coach Snipes, with all players listed as contributing to the victory. Snipes named Steve Hughes, Randy Casey, Maurice Castillo and Rodney Guthrie, along with the secondary, Raymond Vasquez, Ike Garza and Bodie Stark, and Doug Warnock, Tommy DeLeon, Paul Vasquez and James Culpepper. The offensive line was also praised, being Warnock, Castillo, Hughes, Danny Siller, Culpepper and Paulie Vasquez. Freshman quarterback Russell Williams played an outstanding game and was first to score in the first quarter.

Bodie Stark teamed with Warnock on a 55-yard pass play to Doug Warnock for the 12 - 0 lead at halftime. In the final quarter, Randy Casey scored on a four-yard play for the 18 - 0 total. The offense was evenly balanced with a total of 263 yards on the ground and 84 in the air. Rising Star was limited to 120 yards of offense. Santa Anna led with 17 first downs to seven for the Wildcats. The Mountaineers also led in penalties, with 10 for a total of 80 yards to only one 15-yard penalty for Rising Star. The Mountaineers will travel to Lometa Friday night for a 7:30 game. Barry Miles, former Santa Anna mentor, is head coach of the Lometa squad this year. The Hornets are winless this season. A pep rally will be held at 3:15 p.m. at Perry Gymnasium. Everyone in the community is invited to attend, then travel to Lometa for the game that evening to support the Mountaineers.

Steer Roping Results Listed

When figures for the PRCA Steer Roping finals were computed, Guy Allen was credited with earnings of \$25,524 for the 1982 season. The Santa Anna native, now of Lovington, N. M., went to the Laramie, Wyoming event in first place, and maintained the lead through the ten-steer roping. Runner-up for the Steer Roping title was Phil Lane of Cotulla with \$17,725. Walt Arnold, a frequent leader in the event, was third with \$17,123. Allen won two of the first go-arounds at the finals, and placed third in another. He and Call tied the fastest steers at the finals with 13 seconds flat, but failed to set any records. Wade Lewis was the big winner at the finals with \$5,165 which moved him from 12th place to sixth for the year. He roped and tied all ten of his steers in a total of 222.8 seconds. Allen earned \$2,792 at Laramie. Guy Allen has won the world championship three years, in 1977, 1980 and 1982.



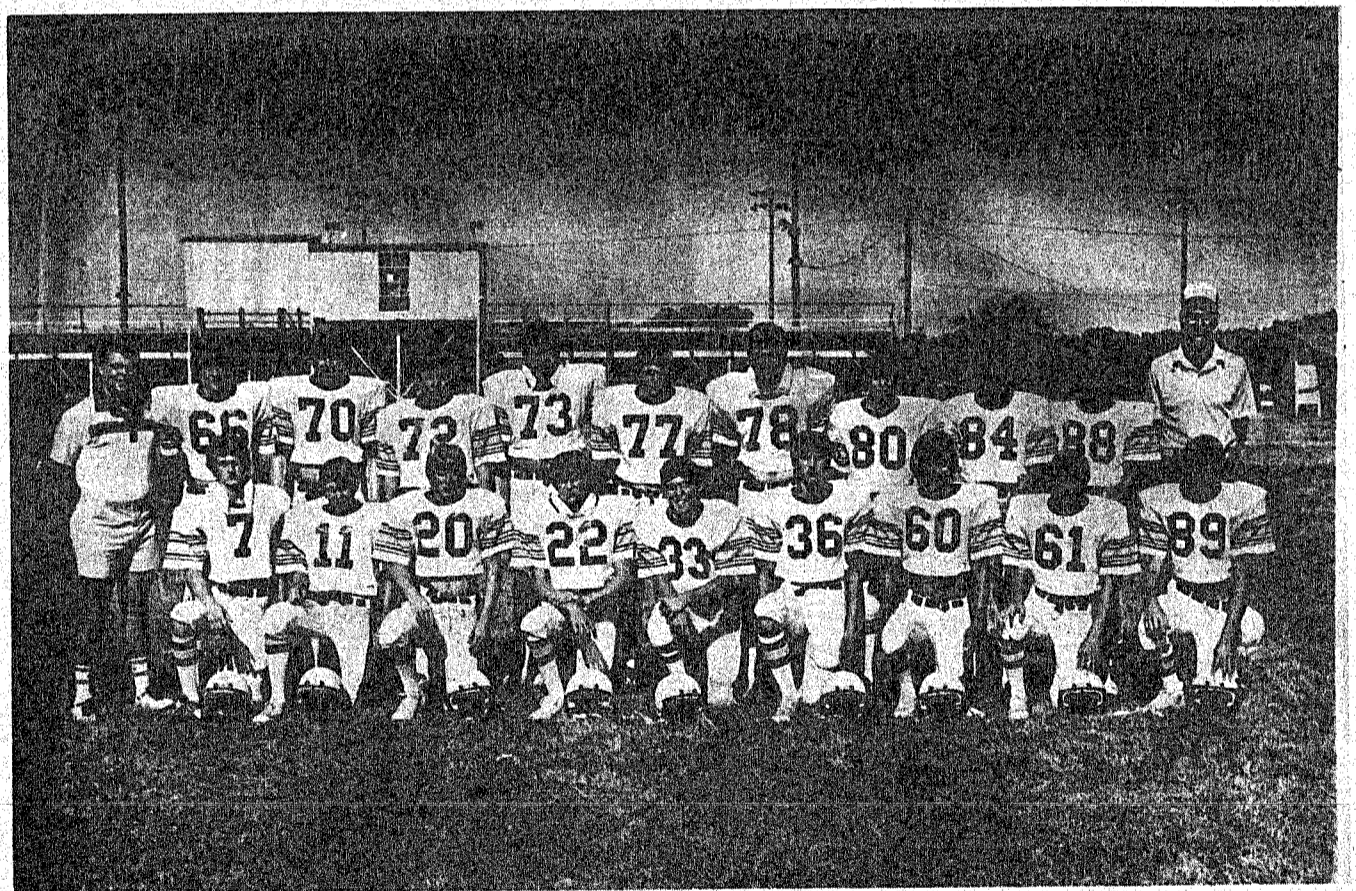

Wool Producers Approve Financing of Product

Wool producers, by 23,000 to 8,975 margin, have voted to continue deductions from Commodity Credit Corporation wool incentive payments to finance promotion of wool.

Preliminary returns show 72.5 percent of the producers favored the advertising and other market development activities which would be continued under a proposed new agreement between the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the

American Sheep Producers Council, Inc. Producers voted in a referendum held August 16-27.

The proposed agreement authorizes continued deductions from payments made under the National Wool Act on wool and unshorn lambs marketed during 1982 through 1985. The new agreement authorizes deductions of up to four cents a pound on shorn wool and 20 cents a hundredweight on unshorn

lambs, up from 2½ cents and 12½ cents, respectively. The previous rates had been in effect for four years.

Last year, the council's expenditures for wool and lamb promotion were about \$4 million, the same amount budgeted for the current year.

Sheep producers have approved the wool and lamb promotion program by the necessary two-thirds majority in seven referendums held since 1954.

The council's national wool promotion program is run in cooperation with other segments of the industry which provide additional or matching funds. Promotion activities include advertising, merchandising and education.

Sen. Bentsen Names Folks For Campaign No Fatalities In Coleman Co. Mishaps

There were no fatal traffic accidents in Coleman County during the month of August, according to a report from the Texas Department of Public Safety and Sgt. Hugh Lillie of the Brownwood Office of the Texas Highway Patrol.

Troopers in Coleman County investigated a total of four rural traffic accidents during August, with one of the accidents resulting in injury to three individuals, and three property damage accidents.

During the month of August, 11 persons were killed as the result of 10 fatal rural motor vehicle accidents in the 25 counties of the Abilene District, of which Coleman County is a part.

Sgt. Lillie said the total accidents were down over the same period last year and also injury accidents were down. In Coleman County during August 1981, 11 accidents were recorded with nine persons injured in five injury accidents. There were no fatal accidents in Coleman County in August 1981.

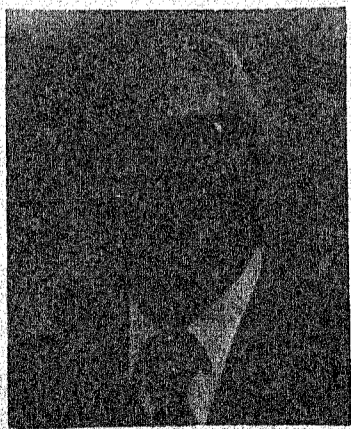

Strake Talk

CRIME: IT'S THE VICTIMS WHO ARE LOCKED UP

I want to talk to you this week about an issue that troubles me greatly and which I know is of great concern to Texans. It seems that whenever I have spoken about crime in the past 12 months I have gotten a strong and troubled response. No matter where I am—Jewett, Roma or Dalhart—people tell me they are angry and afraid about crime in our state. This anger and fear concerns me for two reasons. First, because this kind of anger and fear serves as a sort of "jail" for innocent people. They are the ones locked in their homes at night while criminals go free. The second reason I am concerned is because unless something is done to stop the crime epidemic, people will be ripe for the kind of politician who will play on citizens' fears. The result could be that Texans lose their liberty in return for their "safety". In that sense, the crime problem is like a cancer gnawing at democracy.

The incumbent Lt. Governor's response to the crime issue has been shameful. While

he has been in office the crime rate has risen 131%. He has done nothing to attack crime in a substantial way. In fact, he has fought stronger anti-crime measures. He openly opposed the new wiretapping law designed to catch drug dealers. He openly opposed the Governor's anti-crime package by putting it in a legislative committee run by a hostile Senator who promptly bottled it up. Much of the package passed anyway and now Mr. Hobby has the gall to go around the state taking credit for it!

His sympathies in the light against crime are evident. Not long ago he allowed the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) to hold a fundraiser in his Houston mansion and he proudly defends it. The ACLU has consistently opposed laws that would make it easier to deal with the crime problem.

I think such two-faced maneuvering is disgraceful. It is obvious that if we are going to attack the crime problem, if we are ever going to give law officers, judges and prison guards the tools they need to make us safer, Bill Hobby will have to go.

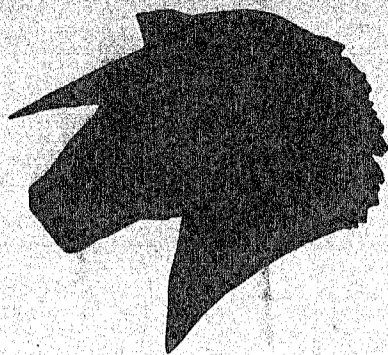

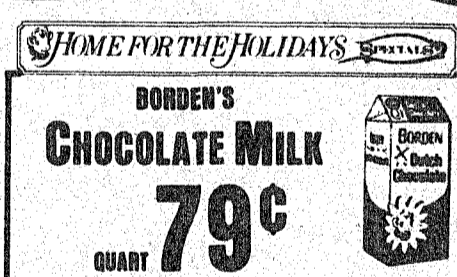

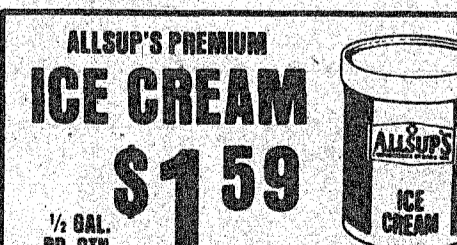
