Former Students, Teachers to Gather Here Friday and Saturday

Former students and teachers of Santa Anna High School, their families and friends will have a busy weekend, with activities planned Friday and Saturday to celebrate the annual Ex-Student Homecoming.

A parade in downtown Santa Anna will open the activities at 2:30 p.m. Friday. Clubs and organizations will have floats in the parade, as well as the Band and football team. Featured will be the High School Homecoming Queen candidates, the Ex-Student of the Year and Coming Home Queen.

The Homecoming football game with Rochelle will begin at 7:30 p.m. Halftime activities will include the crowning of the High School Homecoming Queen and presentation of the Coming Home Queen, Linda Sudderth McCullough of San Marcos, a graduate of the Class of 1962.

Registration Saturday morning will begin at 9 a.m. and continue through the morning. A coffee at the school cafeteria will be from 9:00 to 10:30 a.m. with Oma Dean McDonald Horner as chairman.

A concert by the Mountaineer Band will be held at the school

auditorium from 10 to 10:30 a.m.

Pete Simmons, president of the Ex-Student Association, will preside at the Saturday morning meeting beginning at 10:30. Frances Jones Strauss of Houston from the Class of 1932 will be presented as Ex-Student of the Year. An election will be held to select a director to succeed Patrick Hosch, whose term expires, and Dean Bass, second vice president, who has resigned.

Ione Perry Caton is compiling names of former students and teachers deceased since last October for the brief memorial service that will conclude the program.

Other officers of the group are Terry McIver, first vice president; Leanna Pollock Hartman, secretary-treasurer; and Dickie

Horner and Bettie Ruth Blue Henderson, directors.

The Band Booster Club will cater a buffet luncheon at the school cafeteria from 11:30 to 1 p.m. The turkey and dressing meal will be \$3.50 per person. All local people are invited to have lunch with the group. A number of classes and groups will be meeting during the afternoon and evening for reunions.

The final event of the Homecoming will be a dance at the Civic Center Saturday night from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m., sponsored by the Epsilon Sigma Alpha Sorority chapter. Texas Pride country-Western band from Brownwood will furnish music for the dance. The doors will open at 8:30 p.m. Cost will be \$6 for individuals and \$10 for couples. There will be no reserved tables, with seating on a first-come, first served basis.

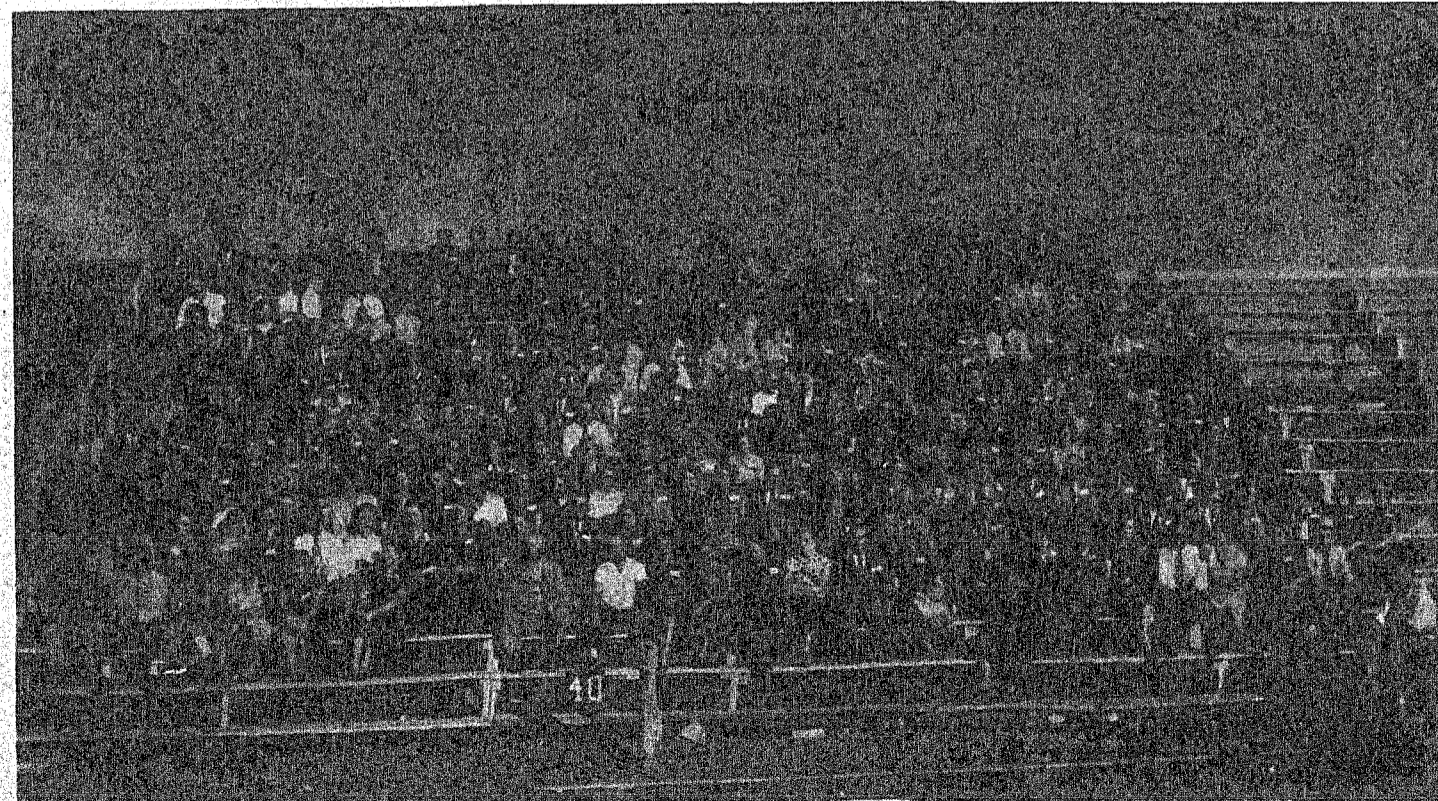
Youth Fellowship Planned Friday Night

Fire Prevention Week Observed With Program

In observance of Fire Prevention Week, the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department and Auxiliary presented a special program at school Monday.

Members of the VFD were on hand with a fire truck to give demonstrations, and a fire drill was held in the elementary school.

Assistant Fire Chief Lee Ray Huggins explained the operation of the different equipment on the fire truck and answered questions. Wilburn Bible, City Fire Marshall, gave a demonstration of methods of ex-

tinguishing fires and talked on fire prevention. Two demonstrations showed the hazard of using hair spray near an open heater, and how to extinguish a grease fire.

In conjunction with the special week, a Fire Prevention poster contest is being held, with the VFD Auxiliary to award prizes for the winning posters that are prepared by students in the elementary school.

The VFD Auxiliary has placed posters around town showing methods of extinguishing fires or preventing them.

Fire Prevention Week Being Observed This Week In Texas

October 3 - 9 has been proclaimed Fire Prevention Week in Coleman County and across the nation. The theme is "Learn Not To Burn Wherever You Are."

Vic Cardinas, president of Coleman County Farm Bureau, has emphasized fire prevention because of the special significance to farm and ranch families.

Fires on farms and ranches pose a special threat, unlike urban or city property that has immediate access to a fire department and an abundance of water.

Many farms and ranches have the added fire risk brought on by traversing of railroads and roads. Trains cause grass fires as the result of a "hot box." The careless smoking motorist

uses the roadway instead of an ash tray - thus turning valuable farm property into ashes.

Though U. S. fire losses amount to approximately \$5 billion annually, the human misery caused by unwanted fires is the most terrible cost. More than 6,000 people die and many more are injured in over one million fires each year.

Farm fire property losses - dwellings, buildings, crops, machinery, etc. - approach an estimated \$300 million annually.

Frequent causes of building fires include electrical faults, smoking and matches, heating and cooking equipment, children playing with matches, open flames and sparks, arson, chimneys and flues, lighting and spontaneous combustion.

Joe Smetana, Safety Director of Texas Farm Bureau, offers these suggestions for fire and burn prevention:

- Plow fire lanes around pasture or range land. Also plow fire lanes around farm structures, equipment and baled hay. Spray to kill weeds and grass that later become a fire hazard.
- Update any old electrical system. Check fuses and circuit breakers. Check wire size with the amount of current being used.
- Be careful with matches, lighters and smoking.
- Think about fire prevention when you use a welder,

Swedish Foreign Student at SAHS

USA and Santa Anna "Better Than Expected"

Santa Anna High School students are getting an opportunity to learn more about the world in which they live, and in addition are enjoying the friendship of a new schoolmate.

Eva Ekstedt of Stockholm, Sweden is attending SAHS as a member of the Senior Class, the first foreign student to be in the community through the American Field Service program. For her year in Santa Anna, Eva is living in the home of Pam and Norman Anderson and children, Casey, a junior, and Joey and Scotty, elementary students. Elizabeth Siller, a junior at SAHS, also makes her home with the Andersons.

Eva arrived in Santa Anna in mid-August, flying to Dallas from New York

after meeting other AFS students for orientation upon their arrival in the United States. She enrolled in school two weeks later, having very little difficulty with the English language after having studied English since the fourth grade.

The friendly teenager joined the band where she plays the bells, was elected secretary-treasurer of the Santa Anna 4-H Club of which Casey is president, and just last week was chosen by the Senior Class as representative for the Halloween Coronation.

Although Eva has been reared in the city of Stockholm, she has spent much of her time in the country with her first love - horses. After learning to ride at a very early age at a

nearby stable, she has progressed to a horse trainer, actually breaking and training horses and competing in English riding, hunter jumping and dressage. She has worked with about 100 other trainers at Stramsholm, near Stockholm, training several horses. She is also a pianist and competed in swimming and other athletics until injuring a knee while playing volleyball. The mishap resulted in four operations and 12 casts.

The year in the United States is a break in the rigid educational program of Sweden. Students attend public schools where 15 subjects are assigned each year, on a 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. daily schedule. The courses are the equivalent

of college freshmen, then students who qualify may attend the university for special study. Eva hopes to study medicine. Public education is available to the students, and most live at home as they attend the university.

Eva is the only child in her family. Her father is an electrical inspector with a company that manufactures computers, and her mother is an employee of the Royal Telegraph office.

The transition to west Texas lifestyle has been easy for Eva as she immediately adopted the casual Western style of dressing - buying boots, belt and Levis. Among things most different here, Eva says, is that girls wear more makeup and curl their hair more. The dating system is also very different from her native country.

Range Management Program Slated October 28

"A lot of Central Texas ranchers have expressed an interest in learning more about the use of fire on rangeland, and that's the basis for this program," said Welch.

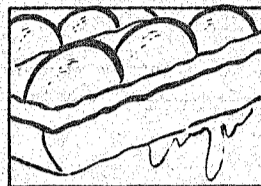

Coleman County in List Of SBA Loan Groups

James C. Sanders, Administrator of the U. S. Small Business Administration, last week designated 68 counties in Texas as an area of Economic Injury, due to severe damage to agricultural crops as a result of heavy rain and hail during the period of June 18 - 25, 1982.

Coleman County is one of the counties that stretch from central to north Texas.

Officers after examining the financial statements of the business. The loans are not available to farm operators affected by the disaster.

SBA disaster loan officers will be located in Amarillo, Lubbock and Grand Prairie for as long as needed. More information is available by calling the U. S. Small Business Administration Office, Lubbock, (806) 762-7461, or Amarillo (806) 372-2465.

The action allows eligible small businesses which are non-farm enterprises to apply to the SBA for Economic Injury Disaster Loans to assist them in meeting those obligations they would have met had the disaster not occurred.

Only those non-farm businesses which are considered small by the SBA and which are unable to meet their current short-term obligations through the utilization of their own resources or credit are eligible. The action was based on a request by Governor Clements.

The loans may be made for up to \$500,000, at an interest rate of eight percent. Those eligible must prove that the economic injury was caused directly by the June 1982 storms.

The economic injury will be determined by SBA loan

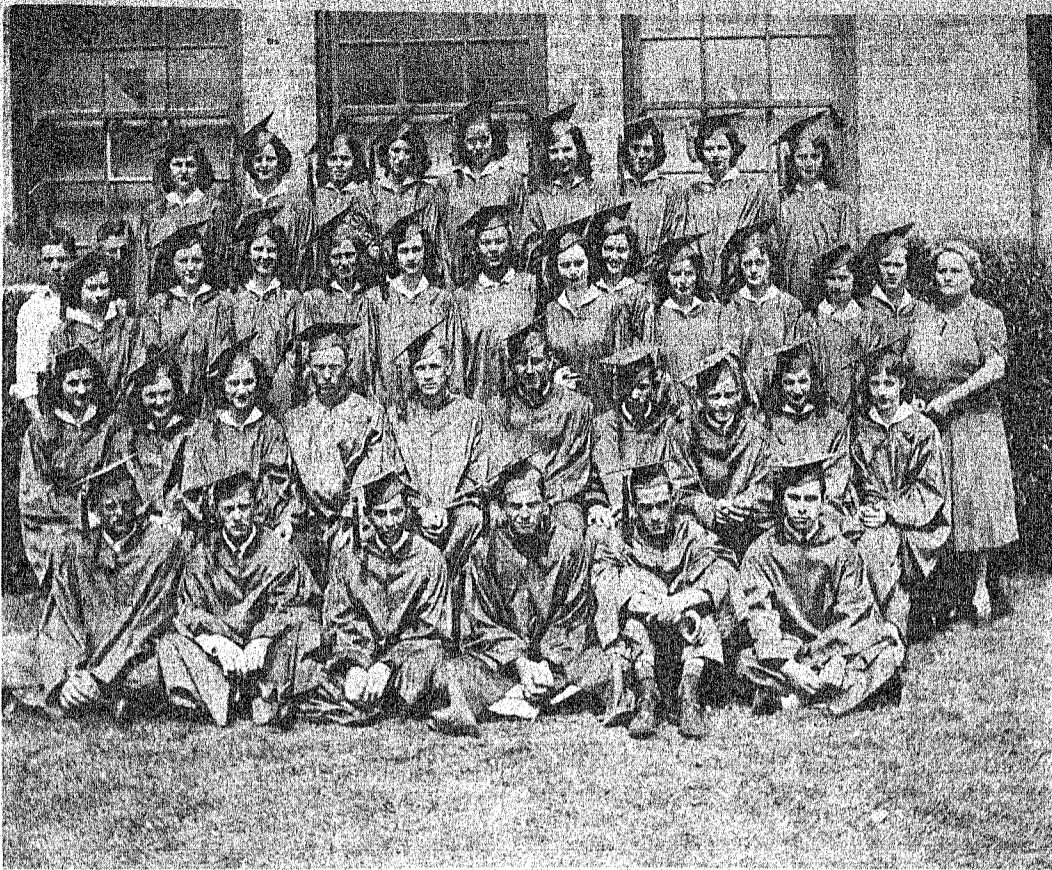

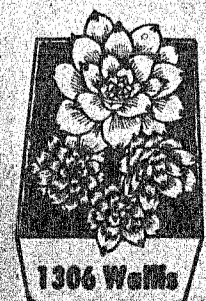

1892 Cyclone Recalled in Santa Anna

The following story is from the December 29, 1961 issue of the News.

SANTA ANNA CYCLONE
Recalled by sisters of an early pioneer family, some of whom are still residents of Santa Anna.

On March 31, 1892, after two days of strong south wind, early in the night, Santa Anna's south side was visited by a twister from the southwest. There were fewer farm homes then, else the destruction would have been much greater.

It's still amazing how this small tornado made its way around and between homes, seemingly providential in its movements. When within a quarter of a mile from one home its course changed and a family of eight was spared. It then whirled between a home on its left occupied by a widow and her three children. To the right of its path, a widow with about seven children were spared.

Directly in its path two houses were destroyed, the

two elderly occupants being away at that time. The owners of a new two-room house went to a close neighbor and lost their home.

Another family was miraculously preserved, although their home was destroyed. They found themselves among the ruins where the baby of the family was said to still be asleep.

At another home a group of relatives kept vigil beside the body of a man who had just died. A boy was killed here and several injured in this demolished house, before the funnel cloud passed through our local cemetery where a number of headstones were toppled or left leaning.

Many months after the cyclone, the sisters preparing this article (who requested their names not be used) discovered an arbor vitae cedar near the west edge of the cemetery that was entirely covered with soft duck feathers, from a mattress torn by the wind.

In the Mukewater community, between Santa Anna and Bangs, the damage was greater. Mrs. Maud Owens of Bangs tells of a harrowing experience in this way:

"My mother was lying on

a bed with her 12-day old son, Troy Brooks. My father kept looking out a west window, then said, 'A cyclone is coming.' We four older children gathered around her bed. In seconds it struck. Our father and we children were blown across the road and let down in the orchard. My mother hovered over the baby, while furniture was blown over them, pinning them down. For days afterward, fine gravel blown into the baby's soft scalp was carefully removed with a soft cloth. He is alive today."

Mrs. Owens' father had a

muzzle-loading shot gun hanging on the wall. She said the gun was probably discharged during the storm.

Several weeks afterward Mr. Brooks complained of a pain in a shoulder. After three months he mounted a horse and rode to Brownwood, where a doctor from England, upon examination found a pocket of shot in his back. While Mr. Brooks sat astride a chair backwards, leaning his arms and head on the back of the chair, the doctor removed the shot without an anesthetic. He lived to be ninety-eight years of age.

Use of sunscreen before exercising not recommended

Sunscreen, although they seem to present no problems for most people, may do more to the body than prevent sunburn, says a Texas A&M University researcher who has been testing the effects of sunscreens on thermal regulation of the body during exercise.

Dr. George Jessup, associate professor of health and physical education and chairman of the Human Performance Laboratory, says that persons choosing to apply sunscreens before exercising in hot, dry or hot, humid climates run the risk of significantly elevating their skin temperature.

This increase in skin temperature causes an early onset of sweating and as a result important losses of body fluids occur that can lead to dehydration.

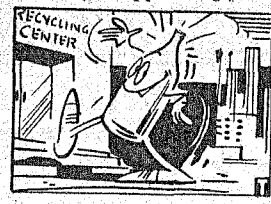

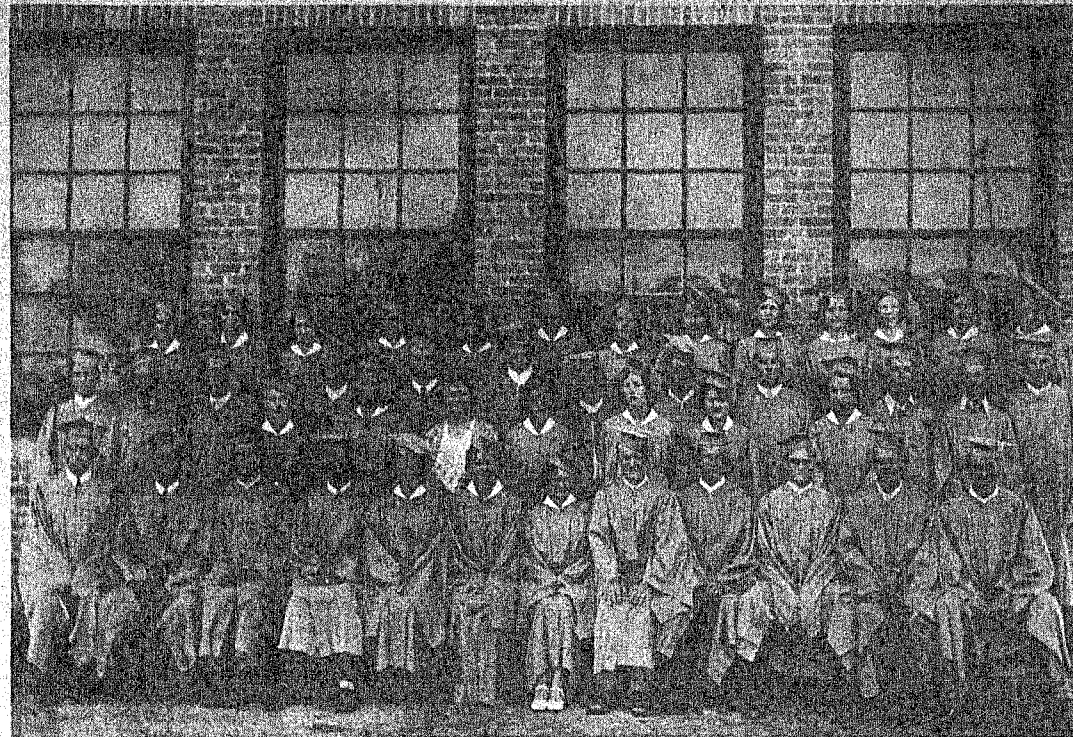

TTI researcher says user fees needed to finance highways

COLLEGE STATION — Automobile owners should get used to the idea of higher fuel taxes and other fees to finance construction, repair and research on the nation's strained interstate highway system, says a transportation expert.

"Obviously, new sources of revenues — taxes and fees — will be needed to address the problems of new construction, proper rehabilitation of existing roads and to accommodate the exploding new growth in Texas," said Dr. C. V. Wootan, director of the Texas Transportation Institute, a research agency.

He said many transportation officials feel that money for building and repairing roads would come from user fees such as gasoline tax, license tag fees and earmarking sales taxes on new cars for highway purposes.

Kathryn Rose Pinney will speak as valedictorian of the class, and Carl Flores will deliver the salutatory.

Early Mailing Encouraged

Although temperatures are still indicating summer is here, the calendar tells us otherwise. With the approaching winter, Christmas is just behind, and certain deadlines are to be met for that season.

The U. S. Postal Service has issued a list of recommended mailing dates for packages and mail to military or foreign destinations.

October 5 is the recommended deadline for regular surface parcels to Armed Forces in Australia, Far East and Southeast Asia.

Regular surface parcels to Armed Forces in the Mid East, and Space Available Mail to the Mid East should be sent by November 1.

Regular surface parcels and Space Available Mail to Armed Forces in Africa, Central and South America

and Europe and Southeast Asia should be dispatched by November 8.

Regular surface parcels to Armed Forces in Greenland and Iceland and Space Available Mail to the Caribbean and West Indies, Greenland and Iceland should be sent by November 22. Other foreign packages should be dispatched before December 1.

First Class Letter Mail should be sent as early as possible in December to insure getting to its destination before Christmas. Some Priority Mail and Airmail letters and parcels can be sent as late as December 13.

Early mailing of parcels and cards will not only help the Postal Department, but will keep the holiday season more pleasant.

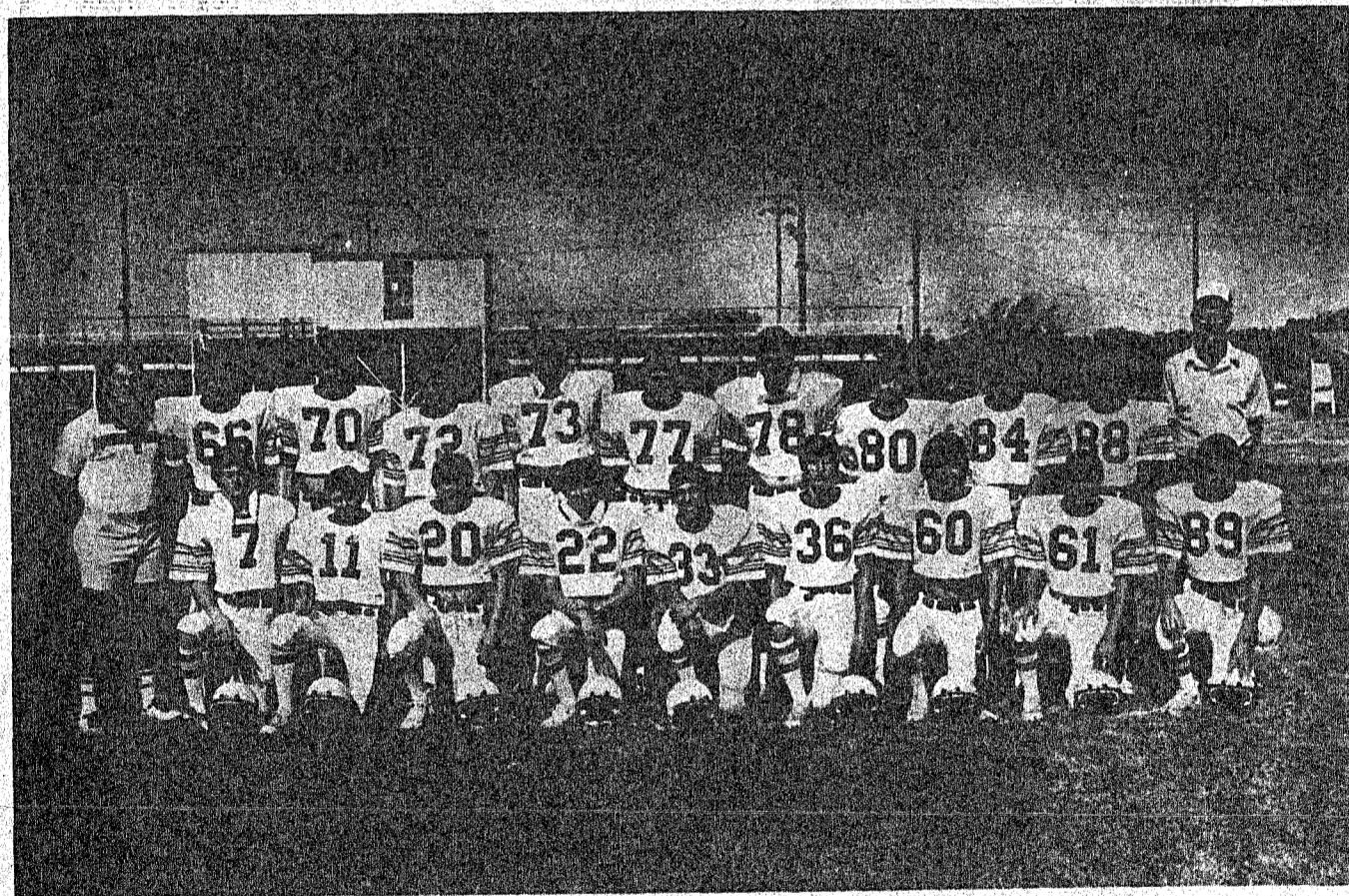

Social Security Notes

Overpayment Information

People who have received overpayments from Social Security can expect to hear from Social Security promptly about the need of repayment. Under a new policy, money owed to Social Security will be more aggressively collected.

The tougher policy is a result of standards established jointly by the General Accounting Office, which is an agency of the Congress, and the Department of Justice.

The standards are expected to result in recovery of a higher percentage of money owed to the Federal Government.

In general, money owed to Social Security results from overpayments -- payments people receive to which they were not entitled. The law requires that

Social Security overpayments be paid back. This is usually done through a lump-sum payment or by withholding portions of future checks due the beneficiary.

Overpayments generally occur when people fail to report a change in circumstances that affects their entitlement to benefits. Marriage of a widow or dependent, earnings over the annual limit, or stopping school while receiving student's benefits, are typical examples of events that affect entitlement to benefits.

The most common cause of overpayments is failure to promptly notify Social Security when a person expects to earn over the annual limit for people receiving Social Security benefits. In 1982, the limit is \$6,000 for beneficiaries 65 to 72, and \$4,440 for people under 65. Earnings over the limit cause the benefit to be reduced by \$1 for every \$2 of earnings above the limit.

The Social Security Administration has a policy of helping beneficiaries avoid overpayments to the extent possible. When people are awarded benefits, a special leaflet is sent explaining what they need to report to Social Security is a change in circumstances could affect their eligibility or the amount of their monthly checks.

Aggie doctors get top ratings from hospital directors

COLLEGE STATION — A survey of physician residency program directors turned up highly favorable comments regarding the first class of doctors ever to graduate from Texas A&M University's medical school.

The students involved in the residency survey all graduated with M.D. degrees nearly a year ago and had completed about six months of residency training when the survey was taken.

In the three-part national FLEX (Federation of Licensing Examiners) tests, students in this class at A&M turned in the highest average statewide. They scored well above the state average in all 13 categories of medical science represented by the FLEX tests.

Nineteen directors answering the survey said the Texas A&M graduates showed characteristics that set them above residents from other medical schools.
