## Telephone Cooperative Directors are Re-Elected

Tom Kingsbery, Glen Copeland and Grady McIver were re-elected as directors for Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. at the Saturday, August 28, membership meeting. A large crowd attended the annual meeting at the athletic stadium.

Members attending the meeting cast ballots for the directors who will serve three years. Kingsbery is currently president of the group, McIver is vice president, and Copeland is secretary.

Country-Western music entertained the crowd as they arrived. Door prizes were given members, and a drawing was held at the close of the

meeting for gifts from the Cooperative.

Manager Thomas Wristen reviewed the annual financial report and give information concerning additional updating of the telephone system that covers most of the rural area of Coleman County. Danny Kellar was introduced to the group. He assumed the position of assistant manager on September 1.

The Board of Directors of the Cooperative will meet in regular session Thursday, September 16, to elect officers. Other directors are Jerry Allen of Leaday, Leroy Williams of Burkett, Topy Beaver of Talpa and Glen Scarborough of the Shields Community.

## Eldorado Man Drowns Sunday In Tank South of Town

A 45-year-old Eldorado man drowned early Sunday at a stock tank south of Santa Anna. Richard Tony Faye Jr. was with a Coleman man and two other Eldorado

residents when his small boat overturned and he drowned.

According to the investigation by Sheriff's deputies, Faye's fully-clothed body was recovered from the shallow water by his companions. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Gale Brock of Santa Anna.

The tank is located on the Robert Stewardson ranch 12 miles south of Santa Anna. The fishermen were setting a trotline when the accident occurred about 2 a.m. Deputy Mike Bowers investigated the accident. The victim was taken by Stevens Ambulance to Coleman before being transferred to Kerbow Funeral Home in Eldorado.

Purchased by Dr. Wes Wise

Announcement was made this week by James C. Shelton, President of First State Bank of Bangs, of the recent purchase of controlling interest in the Bank by Dr. Wesley Wise of Brownwood. J. H. Weatherby has been owner of controlling interest of the bank since June of 1976.

The change in ownership is pending approval of banking regulatory authorities.

Dr. Wise has stated there will be no changes in management or directors of the Bangs bank. "I am pleased to be associated with James Shelton, the directors and

employees," Dr. Wise stated. "They have been responsible for seeing the First State Bank grow from a \$4,000,000 institution in 1976 to almost \$15,000,000 at the present time."

Mr. Shelton stated he was pleased that a man of Dr. Wise's status and capabilities has purchased the controlling interest as it keeps the bank in local ownership, independent and in Brown County.

Dr. Wise, a native of Rockwood, also has farming, ranching and other business interests in Coleman and Brown counties. He is a member of the Board of Directors of Santa Anna National Bank.

## Cline Smith

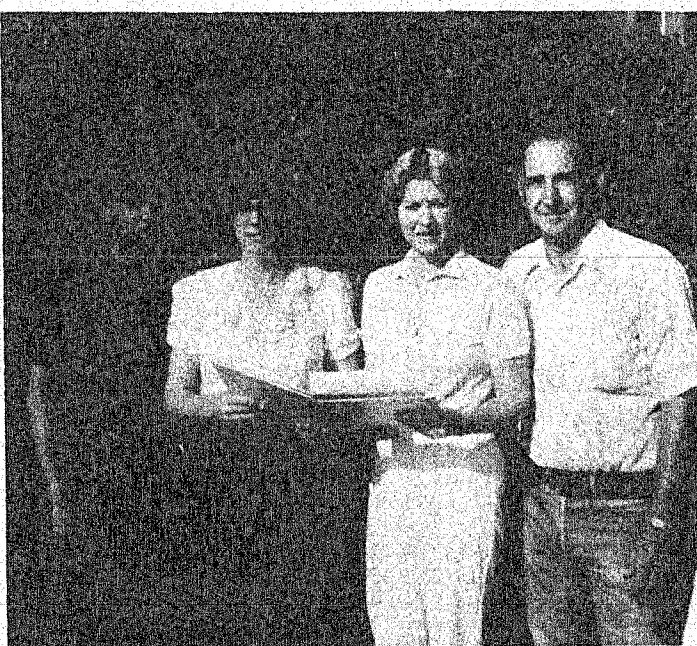
### UTPB Graduate

## Traffic Mishaps A Concern During Labor Day Holiday

Captain G. J. Matthews, Commander of the Texas Highway Patrol for the Abilene District, said, "The Labor Day holiday period is the time for the last trip of the summer for a lot of Texans. While Texas drivers are planning their activities for the holiday weekend, the Texas Department of Public Safety is planning how to remove the dangerous drivers off the highways. The DPS will be striving to prevent traffic accidents and save peoples lives."

The Department of Public Safety will have all available troopers on

duty and will be especially watchful for those drivers who are committing accident causing violations. The two major areas of concern for the DPS are speed and driving while intoxicated.

"We are concerned about the safety of all drivers on the highways," Captain Matthews said, "even though some drivers don't show much concern for their own safety much less the safety of someone else." In driving he said, "The one thing to look out for is your life. Don't do anything that you could be sorry for later."

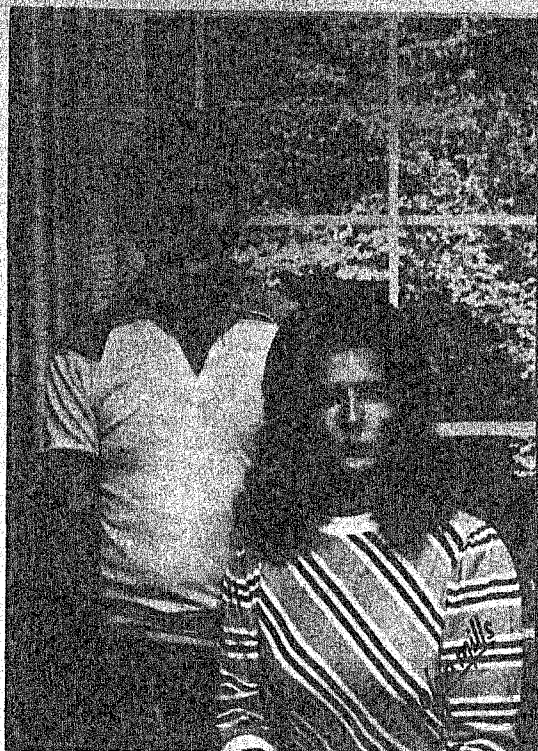

Texans have a healthy skepticism of their elected officials, a wariness of entrenched power that they have embodied in the state constitution. They have historically refused to keep top state officeholders more than a few terms.  
Now my opponent comes along, having spent nearly ten years in the Lt. Governor's office, one of the top state policy-making offices. 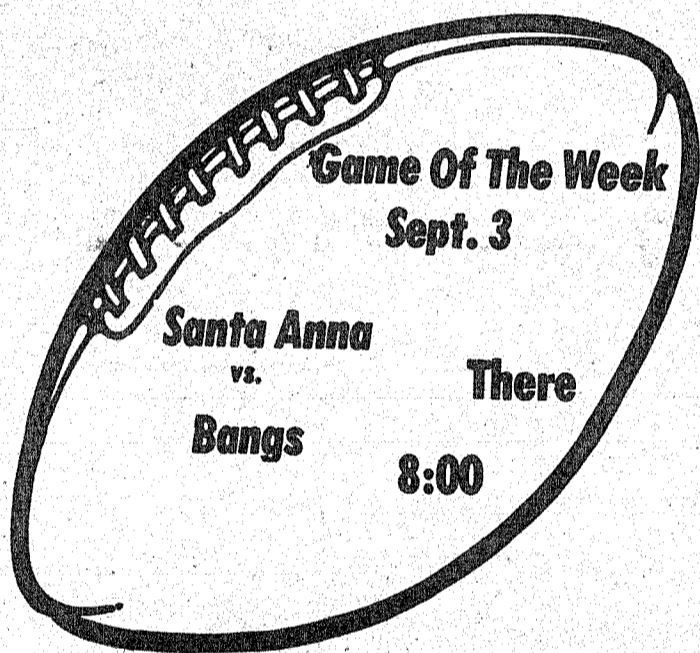

The Blue Bird group of Camp Fire Girls have completed another successful year with several special activities during the recent weeks. Day camp was held July 26 at Coleman City Park,

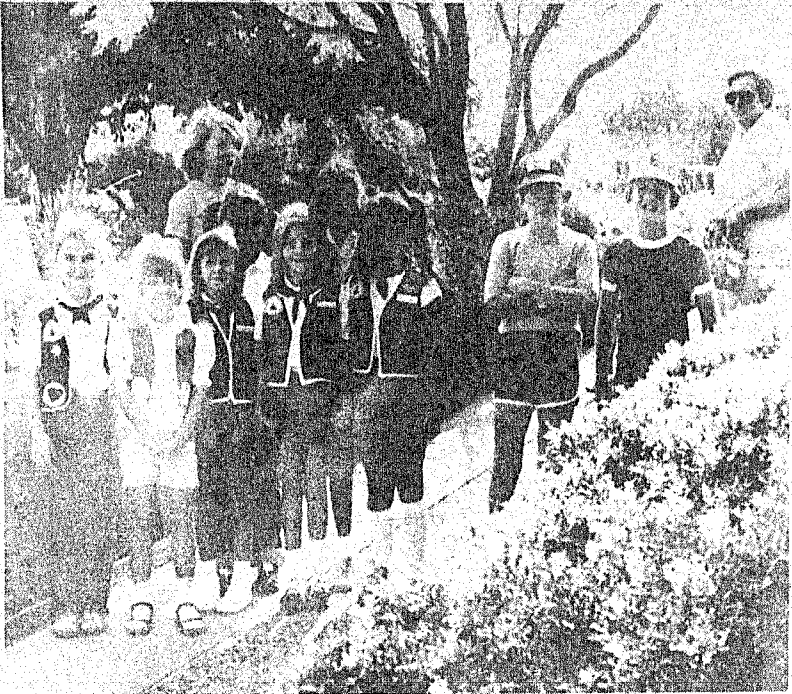
with members attending being Candi Daniel, Cheree Halmon, Monica Rendon, Julie Dean and Shirley Taylor. Others were Bar-

## Voter Registration Urged

With the approach of the November 2, general election, persons who are not registered to vote have just one month in which to be registered.

Information on registration and qualifications have been submitted by the Secretary of State as follows:

### QUALIFICATIONS FOR VOTING:

1. You must be a citizen of the United States
2. You must be at least 18 years of age on the day of the election
3. You must be a resident of the county, or political subdivision conducting the election
4. You must be registered to vote

### PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE:

1. Those convicted of a felony whose full rights of citizenship have not been restored
2. Those persons found mentally incompetent by a court of law

1. Complete a post card application for voter registration and mail it postage-free or present it in person to the voter registrar in your county.
2. You may register to vote at any time, but your application must be received by your county Voter Registrar by October 3, 1982 in order to vote in the November 2, 1982 general election. Because October 3 falls on a Sunday, persons wishing to register in person at the voter registrar's office by the October 3rd deadline must do so no later than the close of business, Friday, October 1, 1982.
3. You may register to vote if you are at least 17 years and 10 months of age, but you may not vote until you are 18 years of age.

To obtain a voter registration application, contact your County Voter Registrar or call the Secretary of State's office toll-free at 1-800-252-9602 and an application will be mailed to you.

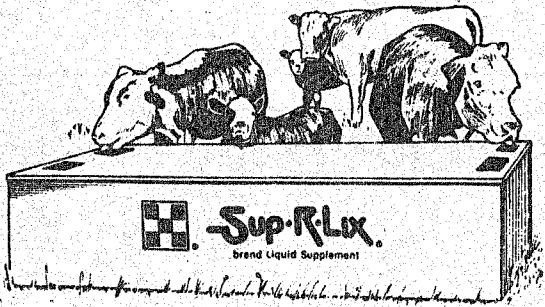

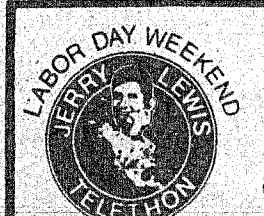

## Missionary Visits Here

### Nancy Wingo Fleed Lebanon Fighting

The recent fighting in the mid-East was brought closer home this week with the visit here of a Baptist missionary to Lebanon.

Nancy Wingo, the daughter of the late Rev. and Mrs. Hal Wingo,

visited in Santa Anna last weekend with her cousin, Mrs. Norman Hosch. While here she shared part of her brief visit talking about the situation in Beirut, Lebanon, and telling of her life in that country.

She went into foreign mission work in 1963, spending two years in language study at Georgetown University. Her first and only assignment has been in Lebanon where she teaches English in the Beirut Baptist School. Enrollment is now about 800 in pre-school through twelfth grade -- the equivalent of first year in college.

All the students are Lebanese, with eighty per cent being of the Moslem faith, the major religious group in that country.

Miss Wingo left her home -- adjacent to the school -- in West Beirut when fighting started in July. She first went to a nearby

village in the mountains where the Baptists have a seminary and the publications and radio studio. When it appeared the fighting would continue, she took an emergency furlough and returned to the States.

Although all the school staff left the area during the shelling, the principal returned as soon as possible to retain possession of the building. However the building -- including a two-story medical clinic -- was taken over by the Palestine Liberation Organization for housing for families of the PLO fighters. Some 250 to 300 people were assigned quarters there during the city's siege.

At last communication, the school building had been hit by only three shells, and damage was minor. Since the school term there starts in October, Miss Wingo will be leaving in late September to be back on duty for the new term. The fighting began as the school term was ending, so there was little disruption of the schedule, despite the danger and inconvenience.

When fighting started in the city, students scattered to neighboring villages and other points. The week after she left Beirut, two

children -- a first grader and a second grader -- were killed in the fighting.

The faculty at the Southern Baptist mission school is composed of five Americans and about 40 Lebanese teachers and staff members. Christian religion is included in the instruction. There is complete freedom of religion, with Bible study and chapel sessions for all students.

Children enrolled in the elementary school are taught in English, French and Arabic, their native language. At high school level, all instruction is in English, with students studying for the government examination for university enrollment. Only those who qualify to attend the university can hope to advance in government or business. The American University has the most prestige in the country.

The cause of the current crises goes back to World War I when the territory was divided between the British and French. In 1948 the nation of Israel was established, and property taken from people of Palestine, who were then relocated at refugee camps. From these camps during the past thirty-four

years the Palestine Liberation Organization was formed.

People in the camps are embittered and resentful of the Israelis and feel it a battle of honor to fight to regain their country.

With the recent cease fire, the PLO fighters were sent to several Arab states, again to be in refugee camps where the problem will most likely be compounded. Little has been reported on the status of the families of the PLO fighters, or if they will be reunited in the new refugee camps.

According to Miss Wingo, the problem of fighting between the two countries is

not over. No one has actually "won" the war, and the PLO leaders will still seek ways to recover the territory. It is considered an act of valor to give your life for the PLO cause. The liberation movement has publicized their plight, which had gone almost unnoticed for 20 or 30 years as the people lived in the refugee camps.

The people of Lebanon are very divided. The Christian people are glad to have the PLO out of the country, but most Moslems are sympathetic of their cause. Both factions blame the United States, Miss Wingo said, since the planes flying overhead are

American, and the United States continues to be supporters of Israel.

As a final word, Miss Wingo said there is no answer to the problem, and no one will be the winner.

Accompanying Miss Wingo to Santa Anna was her niece, Nancy Wingo, the daughter Mr. and Mrs. Hal Wingo Jr. of Greenwich, Conn. She is entering Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth after working since her graduation from Baylor University in the radio-television field in New York. The other child of the late Rev. and Mrs. Wingo is Jean Thurmond, the wife of a Fort Worth dentist.

Born in Santa Anna in the 1930's while her father was pastor of First Baptist Church, Nancy and her family lived in Gonzales for several years, then in San Antonio where the late Rev. Wingo was Area Missionary of that district.

After graduating from a San Antonio high school and Baylor University, Nancy studied at Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth.
