W. B. BAKER ANNOUNCES FOR RE-ELECTION AS COUNTY ATTORNEY

W. B. Baker, present County Attorney, who has served Coleman County as County Attorney for the past two years is a candidate for re-election to that office and for the second term.

During his present term as County Attorney he has disposed of more than six hundred (600) cases in the Justice Courts of this County and over one hundred and twenty-five (125) cases in the County Court up to this date, and his first term will not expire until January 1, 1937.

When the Legislature changed the County Attorney's offices over this State to a salary basis, his record showed that he had handled more cases and turned into the Treasurer more money than any of the adjoining Counties to Coleman. He has been licensed to practice law since April, 1932, and more experienced by far than any opponent who will oppose him in this campaign.

He has studiously been on the job, the entire time and in his office from early until late each day, working on the duties of said office and he states he will continue this practice if re-elected to office of County Attorney of this County.

During his present term he has appeared in many cases in the District Court in the trial of felony cases, assisting both of the District Attorneys, A. O. Newman, and W. A. Stroman, in the prosecution of felony cases of all kinds, in both of the District Courts in this County, and if re-elected will continue to render such service to both of said District Attorneys in the future.

He says he will pledge himself again to the people if re-elected, that he will vigorously prosecute all offenders and violators of the law of every character without friendship or favoritism to person or persons. He says that he understands that it is the duty of the County Attorneys to prosecute all violators of the law, regardless of whether their offenses carry small or greater punishments and that the constitution and the laws of this State require the County Attorneys to take an oath when qualifying that they will prosecute all offenders and violators of the law alike.

He says he also desires to thank the good people and voters of Coleman County in electing him to this office for his first term and he will appreciate their continued support in behalf of his race for the second term.

**Judge E. J. Miller Makes Statement**

Discharge of official duties has kept me in Court most of the time for several weeks and with a heavy docket in Brownwood where Court is in session and will continue to July 18th. I have not had and will not have opportunity to see a great many of the voters personally; however, I shall avail myself of every opportunity to meet them at picnics and other public gatherings.

I was elected to this important office of District Judge not because of any unusual reputation as a lawyer, neither because of political sagacity or experience but because of the PRINCIPLES AND IDEALS OF SERVICE for which I stood. Those principles and ideals were as follows:

"Orderly and Economical conduct of the Court; more trials and fewer continuances; dispatch business and clear dockets."

Those principles and ideals of service expressed sincere convictions resulting from extended observation and mature deliberation. That I have lived up to these principles and accomplished these ideals cannot be denied. With the assistance of the other officers and backed by the sympathy and approval of the great majority of the people of the district, Court has been conducted in an orderly, economical and business like way; the criminal dockets have been cleared; all civil cases ready for trial have been tried; contested continuances are practically never granted; by using

or excusing jurors and witnesses and energetically pushing the business of the Court the expense to County and State per case tried has been greatly reduced; more cases have been tried than ever before in the same length of time with less expense and delay.

Experience and results obtained have clearly proved the soundness of those principles and ideals of service. That the people of the district endorse the same and approve my administration of the Court business was clearly shown by my re-election with a very much increased majority. My candidacy for re-election is based upon the same principles and upon my record based thereupon.

My record in the Appellate Courts is much above the average, that is a smaller percentage of cases appealed from my Court are reversed than for all the District Courts of the State. The Supreme Court has rarely reversed my holdings and frequently where the Court of Civil Appeals has reversed me, the Supreme Court has sustained me and reversed the Court of Civil Appeals. Two such cases are reported in the last volume of Supreme Court Reports.

I most sincerely appreciate the confidence shown in me and the support given me in the past and I trust that the PRINCIPLES AND IDEALS OF SERVICE for which I stand and the record I have made may appeal to your good judgment; that they are worthy of your endorsement at the polls on July 25th and that I may merit your continued confidence and support.

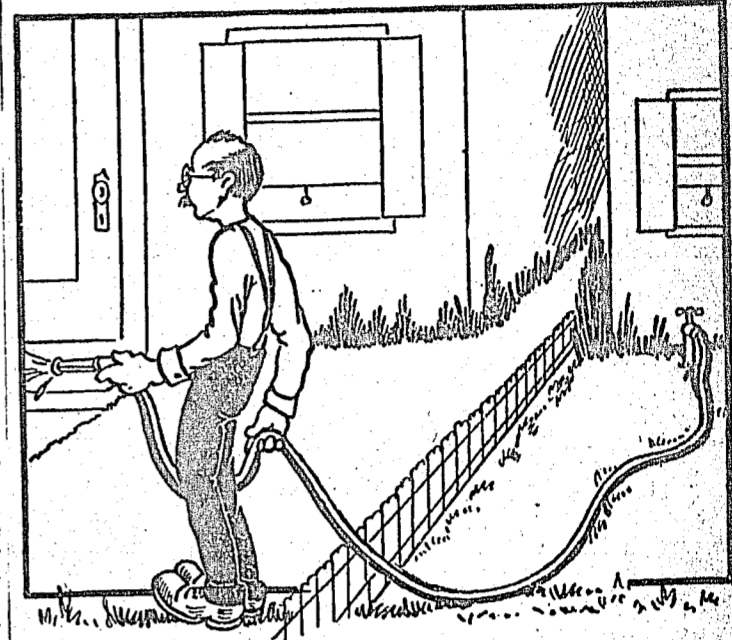

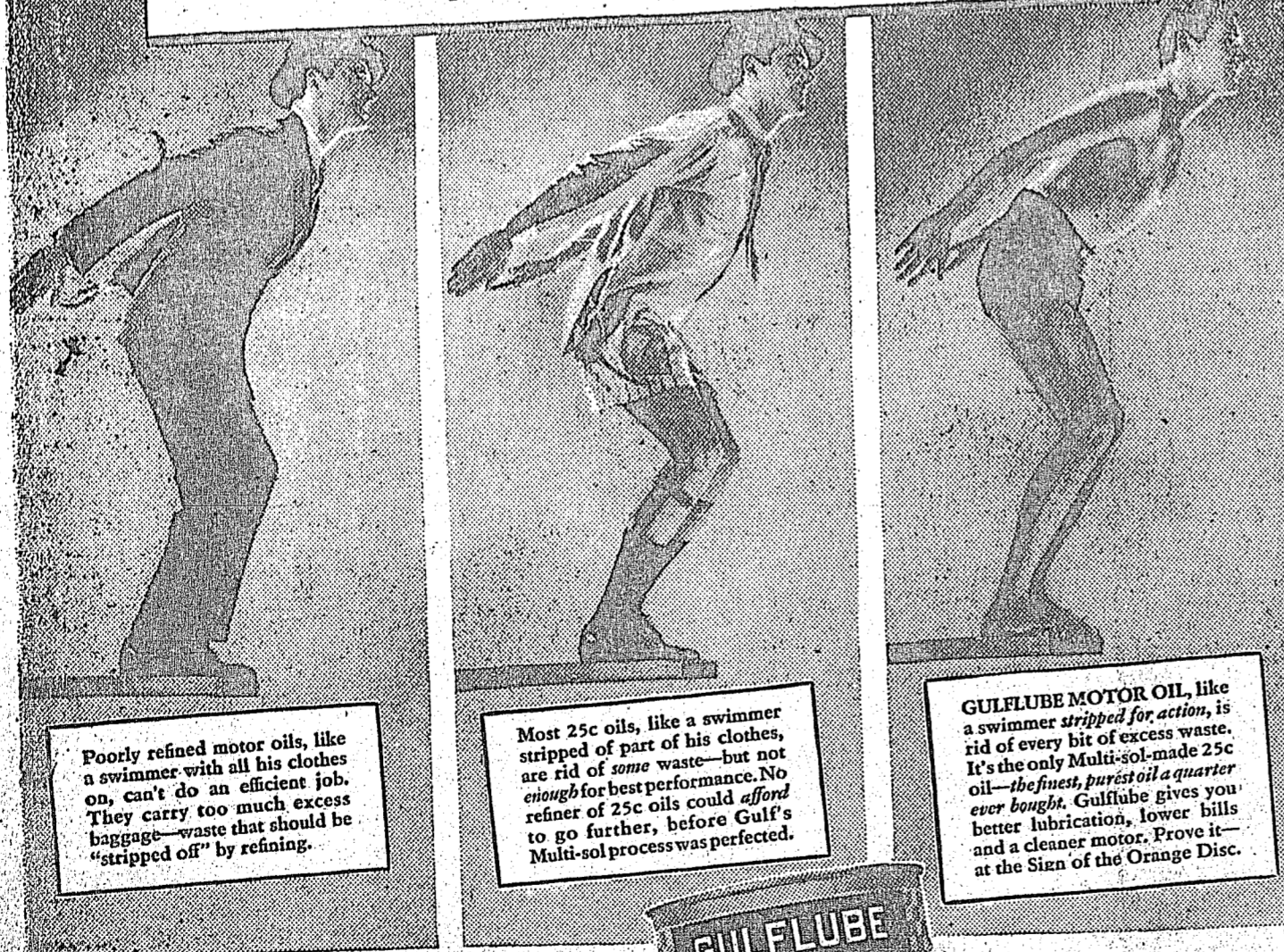
