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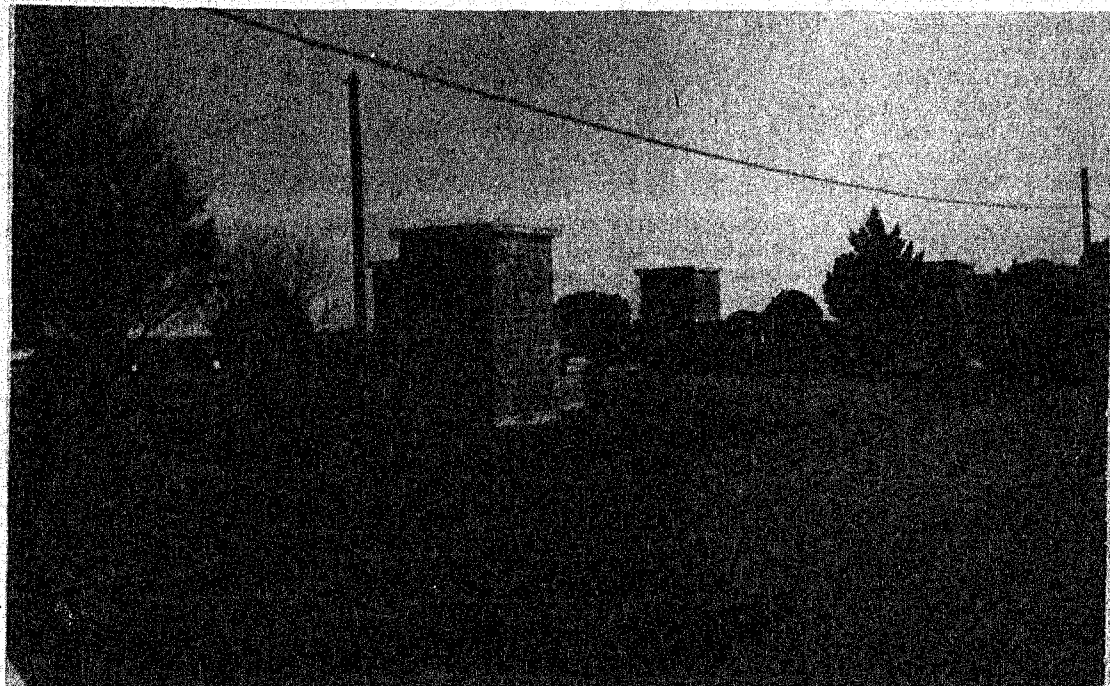

Santa Anna Nutrition Program Having Successful Year

Average attendance dropped slightly during the month of December for the Santa Anna Nutrition Program, with two holidays from the three-times-weekly program and cold weather keeping some of the senior citizens at home.

An average of 38 persons per day ate lunch at the Mountain City Center, with donations adequate to keep the program stable.

Hot meals are served each Monday, Wednesday and Friday, starting at 11:30 a.m. The food is prepared at the Coleman Nutrition Center and brought here for serving, with preparations made for about 45-50 persons. Anyone aged 60 or over, and their spouses are invited to eat lunch with the group. Entertainment including music and games is planned

each day, providing a friendly group atmosphere for the older

citizens of the community. The program is especially designed for those who might not otherwise prepare and serve a balanced meal at noon.

The local program includes taxi service for those who do not have transportation, and those wishing to have a ride to the downtown center should contact Udell Copeland at the Chamber of Commerce Office after 9 a.m.

New Cookbook is Planned; Recipes Are Being Requested

The Santa Anna Nutrition Center is starting a new project that will be of interest to many people. A cookbook, to be entitled "Mountain City Cook Book," is being compiled for publication, and recipes from local and area residents and former residents are being collected.

Fire Destroys Home South of Santa Anna

The country home of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Clendenen was destroyed by fire on Friday, December 31. The home was located on the former Bartholemew place across the highway from the Burgess Stewardson place. The ranch is owned by Roy Bell of Odessa.

Two rural fire trucks, the support van and about 10 firemen answered the call at 9 o'clock Friday morning and found the house completely engulfed in flames and the roof caving in. The firemen were unable to save any of the structure.

Although the house was a total loss in the fire, the Clendenen family was able to save some clothing and valuable items.

The house was a frame structure moved from the Gouldbusk area several years ago and remodeled for the family. The fire was thought to have started from defective wiring in the walls, according to local VFD members.

The Clendenens have had more than their share of trouble, as their home was damaged and two barns destroyed in the tornado that passed through the community in June.

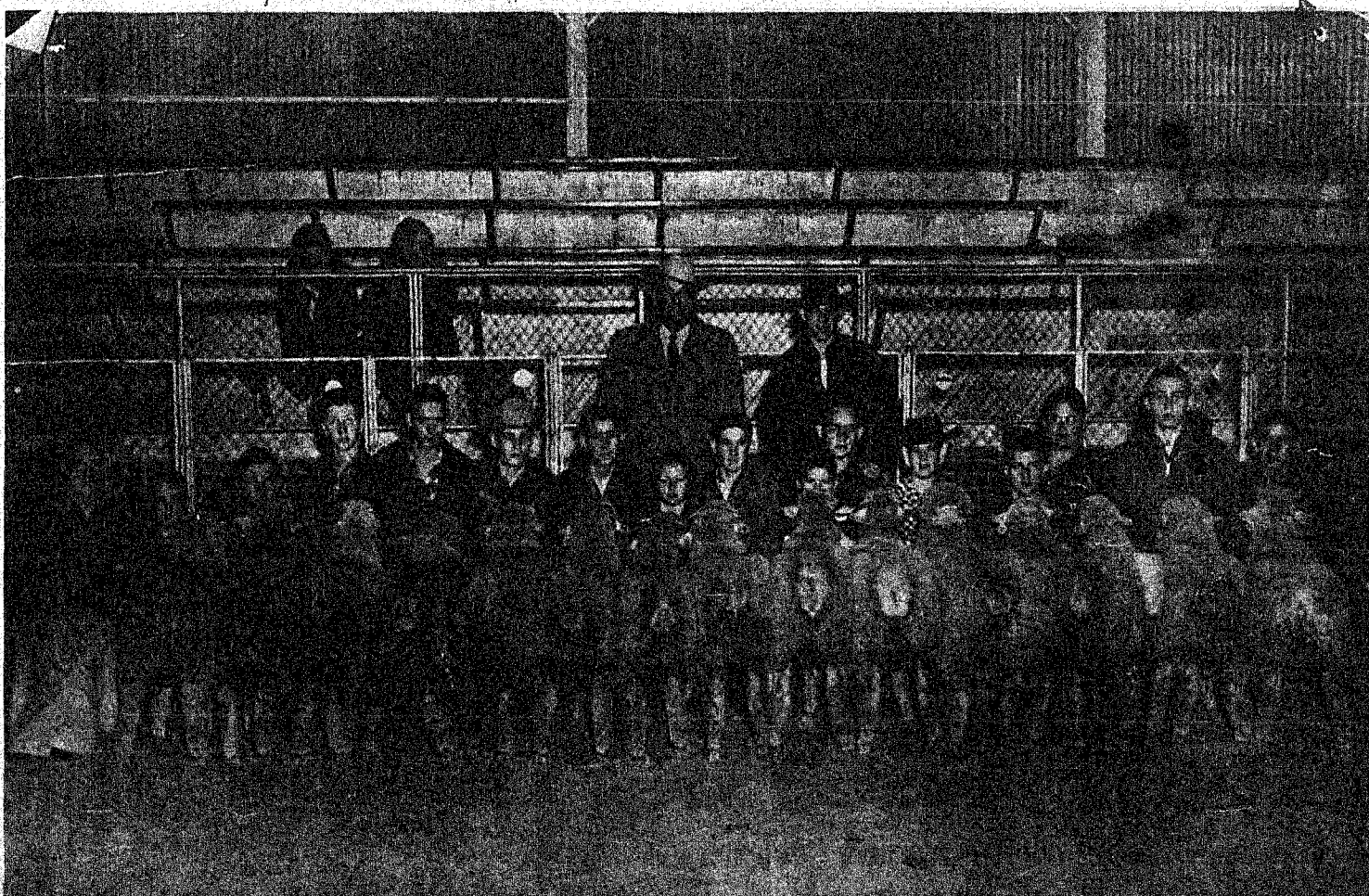
Substantial work and money was donated by the local Campfire Girls for playground equipment.

Out of State License Rules Given by TP&WD

AUSTIN— Many out-of-state sport fishermen have asked the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department whether they are required to purchase a nonresident fishing license if they are under 17 or 65 years of age or older.

The answer is if the nonresident angler is an Oklahoma or Kansas resident in either of those age categories, he or she need not purchase a fishing license.

Officials said Texas grants such exemptions only to residents of states which offer a similar exemption to Texans fishing in their states.

All other nonresident fishermen regardless of age must purchase a \$15 nonresident fishing license or a temporary five-day nonresident fishing license for \$4.50.

Texas also has special agreements with Oklahoma and Louisiana on license requirements for fishing border reservoirs. The agreements with Louisiana allows resident sport fishermen of either state who are properly licensed or exempt because of age to fish common boundary lakes and rivers between the two states.

A special Lake Texoma license allows its holder to fish both the Texas and Oklahoma waters of Lake Texoma, with no other license required. This license is valid until Dec. 31 following its date of purchase.

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"Any person who believes himself, or any specific class of individuals, to be subjected by this organization to discrimination prohibited by Title VI of the Act and the Rules and Regulations issued thereunder may, by himself or a representative, file with the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250, or this organization, or all, a written complaint. Such complaint must be filed not later than 180 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of complaints will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the Rules and Regulations."

Social Security Notes

Medicare Charges Defined

Medicare medical insurance payments are based on what the law defines as reasonable charges. These charges may be less than those actually billed by doctors and suppliers. Medical insurance then pays 80 percent of the approved charge, even if it is less than the actual charge. The approved charges for covered services and supplies are determined by the Medicare carrier under a procedure outlined in the law. The carrier reviews the actual charges made by doctors and suppliers in a given geographic area, and based on this review, establishes new approved charges that become effective about July 1.

These approved charges are based on "customary" or "prevailing" charges. "Customary" generally refers to the charge most frequently made by each doctor and supplier for each separate service or supply provided patients during the course of the previous calendar year; "prevailing" refers to the amount of the charge for each covered service and supply that is high enough to cover the customary charges in three of every four bills submitted during the previous year for each service or supply.

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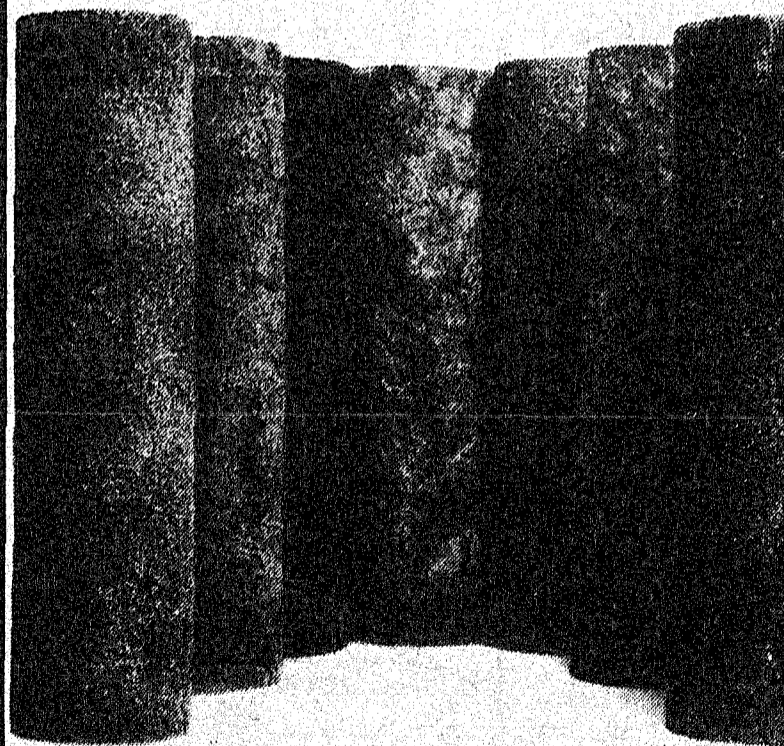

Direct Deposit: Best Arrangement For Checks

Social Security checks usually arrive in the mail about the same day each month—on the 3rd. If the 3rd is a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday, however, the check will probably arrive the day before. Each check represents the benefit payable for the prior month.

Unfortunately, Social Security checks, like others, are subject to loss or theft. If this happens, the Social Security office should be notified at once. Although the check can be replaced, the process obviously will take a little time.

One way to avoid having a check cashed by someone not entitled to it is not to endorse the check until it is actually being cashed. If the check is endorsed

beforehand and is then lost, whoever finds it may be able to cash it.

The best way to avoid having a check lost or stolen is to arrange for it to be deposited directly in a bank, savings and loan association, credit union, or similar financial institution. In addition to eliminating worry over the loss or theft of the check, direct deposit has other advantages.

First, it does away with the need to stand in line to cash or deposit the check. Furthermore, if the recipient is on vacation or away from home for any other reason, the check goes directly to his or her account instead of sitting in a mailbox.

Anyone wishing to arrange for direct deposit of a

Social Security check or to obtain further information about the procedure should contact his or her Social Security office or the financial organization to which the checks would be sent.

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Area Oil News

Liveoak Production Co. of Coleman completed No. 2 Ted Taylor, et al, in the Trickham (Lower Cross Cut) Field.

Location is 12 miles south of Santa Anna in the James O. Butler Survey 214.

The well had an absolute, open flow of 370,000 cubic feet of gas daily with a gas-liquid hydrocarbon ratio of 445,000-1 of 62 gravity. Production is from perforations at 961 - 988 feet with the 4 1/2-inch casing set at 1,017 feet. The hole was drilled to a total depth of 1,020 feet.

Liveoak Production Co. of Santa Anna will drill No. 3 A. L. Freeman as a proposed 1,500-foot wildcat in the Trickham (Lower Cross Cut) Field three miles northwest of Trickham. Location is on a 96-acre lease in the J. O. Butler Survey 214.

Another wildcat will be drilled six miles southwest of Santa Anna as Terry L. McIver of Santa Anna No. 1 C. D. Bruce. Slated for 1,800 feet, it is located on a 460-acre lease in Creed T. Pendleton Survey A-551.

A regular field project will be drilled three miles west of Trickham as James D. Rice of Santa Anna, No. 2 Lorene Rice. Slated for 1,990 feet, it is on a 160-acre lease in Elijah Votaw Survey 224.

Haynes Production Co. of Brownwood will drill No. 4-A Haynes in the Santa Anna (Marble Falls) Field five miles southeast of Santa Anna.

The planned 2,400-foot venture is on a 100-acre lease in Lot 5, Martinez Survey 751.

Pautsky Energy Inc. of Wichita Falls filed application to drill three Coleman County wildcats nine miles south of Coleman. Each test is slated for 1,000 feet, located on a 640-acre lease.

They are listed as No. 3, No. 4, and No. 5 Casey, in Section 77, Block 1, GH&H Survey.

AUSTIN- The Railroad Commission has approved for public comment a proposed rule that would give law enforcement officials a way to track oil carried by truck in the state.

The proposed rule would require each transporter to prepare a separate run ticket each time oil is trucked from a lease or other facility. One copy must be left at the site the oil was removed from, another must remain in the transporting vehicle, and a third copy must be given to the receiver of the oil when it is delivered.

If the rule is adopted, failure of a transporter to carry a run ticket for oil being run will provide law

enforcement agencies a basis for detaining transporters suspected of oil theft.

Run ticket copies must be kept by each respective party for two years and must be available for inspection by Railroad Commission agents or law enforcement representatives.

The proposed rule requires that the run ticket identify the lease or facility from which the oil was taken, the point of destination, the quantity of oil being moved, the date and hour when the oil was removed from the lease or facility, and the identity of the transporter, including the driver's name.

AUSTIN- Texas crude oil production totaled 73,086,968 barrels in October, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent.

The figure compares with reported September production of 71,732,070 barrels and October 1981 production of 75,146,653 barrels.

Texas oil production averaged 2,357,645 barrels daily in October, up slightly from the previous month.

The October allowable totaled 93,975,695 barrels. The preliminary October summary indicated Texas oil production was 22.23 percent under the allowable for the month.

Through the first ten months this year, Texas has produced 725,928,852 barrels of oil.

Deer, Turkey Season Ends; Dove Season is Underway

December is over and that means the deer season has closed. The hunter is now asking himself, "What am I going to do with my spare time now?" Well, don't put those guns up yet, because we still have three choices of hunting.

January is my favorite time of year for hunting, especially when we have a winter dove season January 1 through 10. The winter season is going to be wild and furious because the mild weather we have had has held large concentrations of doves in our area.

The harsh weather they've had up north has pushed even more birds south. So we have plenty of birds to harvest. And the best thing about the winter season is you can shoot a few quail to go along with the doves.

I've been paying close attention to the areas with the largest concentration of dove. In Coleman County the best bet of getting your limit is around the already-harvested cotton fields.

The community of Shields seems to be the hottest spot in the country.

In Brown County, the hot spots seem to be where the peanuts are out of the fields. The northern part of the county is the largest producer of peanuts and these barren fields have thousands of birds in them.

Deer and turkey hunting season closed Sunday, January 2. However the quail season continued through Sunday, February 13.

The winter dove hunting season opened on January 1 and will continue through Tuesday, January 10. Limit is 12 per day.

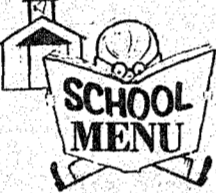
The daily bag limit for quail is 20, with 60 allowed in possession.

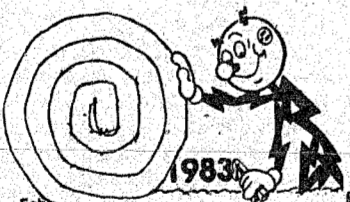
