Stock Show Set Saturday

FHA Exhibits Planned; County Show Starts Sunday

The Santa Anna FFA and 4-H Livestock Show will be held Saturday, January 15, at the show barn on the school campus. Judging will get underway at 9 a.m.

Larry Smith, Brownwood High School vocational agriculture teacher, will judge the local show that will have classes for lambs, swine, steers and chickens. The

largest division will be the swine division, according to Scott Patterson, local vocational agriculture teacher.

Entries in the 1983 show are expected to be approximately 75, about the same as last year. The local youths will take their stock directly from the show Saturday to Coleman

where they will be weighed in at the County Stock Show at Coleman Rodeo Grounds. Judging there will be held Monday and Tuesday.

The Santa Anna Livestock Association is sponsor of the local show, with Donald Strickland as president of the group. Cash prizes and ribbons will be awarded winners in the classes.

In conjunction with the stock show, an exhibit is planned at the Vocational Agriculture Building for FHA youth fair items, including foods, sewing and arts and crafts. Entries will be judged during the morning by Lorene Halfmann, Coleman Homemaking teacher, and Cynthia Whitfield, Novice Homemaking teacher, and open for exhibit at about 11 a.m. as the stock show is in progress. Sharyl Fuller, homemaking teacher and FHA sponsor, is coordinator for the youth fair division.

Local people are encouraged to attend the stock show and FHA exhibits Saturday morning to see the outstanding projects of the Santa Anna students. A concession stand will be open during the morning, operated by the FFA chapter.

Election Called for April 2 To Elect Mayor, Councilmen

Santa Anna City Council has called the 1983 election to be held on Saturday, April 2. On the ballot will be candidates for two council positions and mayor.

The terms of Dickie Horner and Joe Guerrero expire, Horner having served one term in office and Guerrero an appointee replacing M. L. Guthrie Jr. who resigned last summer. Mayor Edd Hartman is also completing his second year in office. Deadline for filing for places on the ballot is March 2.

In other business at the Thursday, January 6, meeting, the City Council granted permission for the Half-Century Club to use the Civic Center on Tuesday night for dance practice.

The group volunteered to work on the parking lot at the Center where parking is difficult when it rains. The City will provide materials and equipment for the project and members of the club will volunteer their labor.

Approval was given for purchase of fire extinguishers for the City Hall, Civic Center and City Library.

Council members discussed formation of a Police Reserve program in the city. No action was taken on the project that is being used in many towns.

During other routine business Thursday evening, minutes were read and approved and bills and accounts approved for payment.

Local Delegation Attends State Meet in Fort Worth

Santa Anna First Baptist Church was well-represented at the annual Texas Baptist Evangelism Conference held Monday through Wednesday at Tarrant County Convention Center in Fort Worth. Twenty-one local people were among the several thousand other Baptists attending the meeting.

The record-breaking goal to baptize 83,000 converts in 1983 was launched at the three-day meeting. Baptisms in Texas Baptist churches are up about eight percent statewide this year, and the conference is expected to help provide zeal and spiritual power for reaching many of the 5 million Texans who claim no affiliation with any church.

Among the outstanding speakers on the program were Southern Baptist Convention President James T.

Draper Jr. of Euless, and D. L. Lowrie of Lubbock, president of the Texas group.

Carlos McLeod, director of evangelism of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, noted Santa Anna's attendance at the meeting in the recent issue of the Baptist Standard - statewide publication of the denomination. Last year six couples from the local church attended, resulting in emphasis on evangelism and the addition of 22 members to the church.

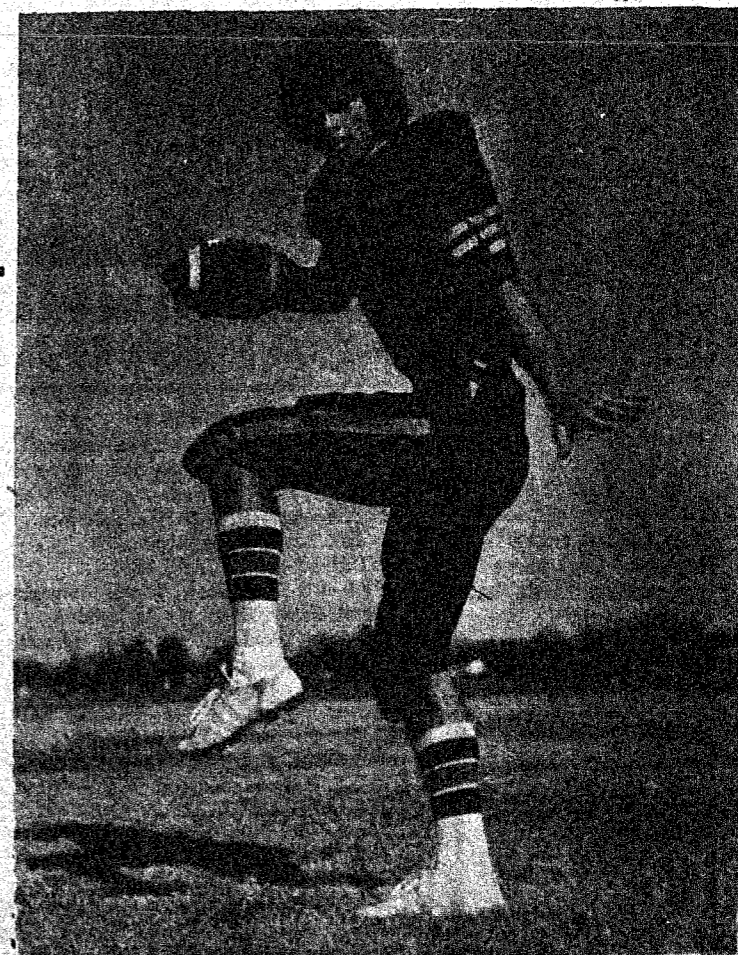

Tax Appraisal Board Has Monday Meeting

The January meeting of Coleman County Tax Appraisal District Board was held at the Coleman office Monday, January 10, at 5 p.m. Harold Pittard, chairman, led the meeting with all other members present, Harold Bragg, Barbara Kingsbery, James Isenhower and Bill Sneed. Minutes of the December meeting were read and approved, and John Skelton, Chief Appraiser, gave the financial report and reviewed monthly bills and accounts which were approved for payment.

In an election of officers, Pittard was re-elected chairman and Barbara Kingsbery re-elected secretary. Bill Sneed was chosen as vice-chairman of the Board.

The amended budget for 1982 was approved as submitted to the county taxing entities and as studied at the last meeting. Funds from the budget were re-allocated and the total amount decreased from the original budget.

C. M. Huckabee was re-appointed to the Board of Review for a two-year term to expire January 1, 1985. Terms of Donnie Neff and Jerry Allen expire January 1, 1984.

A contract was signed to retain Russell Graham of Austin as delinquent tax attorney. Mr. Graham's firm offers several services that will be used by the District along with the collection service.

Mr. Skelton reported on collection of taxes for the county taxing groups, showing 64 percent of the over two-million total to be collected. The figures include 64 percent for Coleman County; 61 percent for Mozelle School District; 66 percent for Novice ISD; 59 percent for Santa Anna ISD; 68 percent for Talpa ISD and the City of Coleman; and 67 percent for the City of Santa Anna. The Coleman ISD does their

own collection of taxes. Funds remaining from the Tax District 1982 budget will be placed in a contingency fund and credited in proportionate amounts to the taxing entities from which they were collected. The funds will not be returned to the taxing entities at the present time but kept in an emergency fund.

Other routine matters were discussed by the group before the meeting adjourned. The next session of the Board will be on Monday, February 14, at 5 p.m.

Coleman Co. Bank Deposits All-time High

Combined bank deposits in Coleman County have moved past the \$90-million mark for the first time in history, according to reports as of December 31 from Santa Anna National Bank, First Coleman National Bank and Coleman Bank.

Meanwhile loans are down slightly from the report of a year ago.

Combined deposits totaled \$90,747,624.00, up \$3-million from the third quarter report of \$87,659,181.11, and up \$10-million from the year-end report a year ago.

Combined loans on December 31 were \$39,205,450.20, up slightly from the report of three months ago, but under the report of \$41,792,135.00 a year ago.

In addition to the amount due and the due date, the statements carry the customer account number, the fuel cost factor, the dates and amounts of the last two meter readings, and the number of kilowatt hours used.

First to receive the new bills will be customers in WTU's Abilene District, which includes Abilene, Albany, Baird, Cisco, Clyde, Cross Plains, Merkel, Moran, Rising Star, Santa Anna, Tuscola, and Winters. The new bills will be used in other districts as the customer information is transferred to the new computer system, Connors said.

Changes Effective For

Brucellosis Rules

AUSTIN- Revised and updated federal brucellosis regulations became effective January 12, Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, announced last week.

"The present brucellosis program will remain in effect until Commissioners of the Texas Animal Health Commission act upon proposals before them. However, Texas livestock producers need to be aware now of the new federal changes," Dr. Holcombe said.

Under the federal regulations, Texas will continue its two-area classification, and as of January 12, the former Class A area and Class B area became

known as Class B area and Class C area.

The new class B area contains 140 counties in the western half of the state; the Class C area contains 114 counties in the eastern half of the state.

The most significant change for movement of cattle for Texas livestock producers will be those non-vaccinated test eligible females of breeding age in the Class C area which are to be shipped out of that area.

Under the new federal regulations, a non-vaccinated test eligible female will require two negative tests at least 60 days apart, with the second test within 30 days prior to movement and retest at destination.

Farm Road Repair Needed For Texas Good Roads In Image

AUSTIN—The battle cry, 'Get the farmer out of the mud,' that brought Texas a great Farm to Market Road system may be heard again.

The state's rural roads in some areas are literally being pounded into unpaved routes by heavy equipment serving oil fields, timber stands and lignite and uranium diggings.

Engineers of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT) have become increasingly dismayed by the rapid destruction of roads built to serve low-volume, lightweight traffic.

'You don't have to be a student of economics or transportation to realize that we have a problem that will effect every Texan,' DHT Engineer-Director Mark Goode said. 'Without adequate roads, it

won't take long for increased cost of transportation to hit everyone's pocketbook.'

DHT diverted \$12.5 million from this year's budget for emergency repair of the most critically affected roads but DHT maintenance engineers believe the funds are only a fraction of the total needed.

Most of the routes on the State's FM system were built in the 1950s and 1960s in a massive construction program to provide better roads for farmers. The Colson-Briscoe Act, passed in 1951, provided \$15 million annually for FM roads, and was the Legislature's answer to farmers' complaints about muddy, rutted roads that had to be traveled before agricultural products could get to market.

He said the diverted funds came from flood- and bridge-damage repair monies. DHT, Goode said, also is concentrating much of its normal FM maintenance money on those roads most critically affected.

The Sunday drive in the country has become a thing of the past in these energy-conscious days.

And holiday visits to grandmother's house often end up at her condominium instead of her farmhouse—so most Texas motorists are spared the bumpy, car-rattling rides on the state's

rural roads. But those Texas motorists, and all Texans, will have to pay for the deterioration of FM roads—the total transportation system is greatly affected by any weak or missing links.

Energy Saving Laundry Tips

COLLEGE STATION - High energy and water prices can be cut considerably by some simple conservation practices in home laundry.

The water heater should be set no higher than 140 degrees Fahrenheit, according to Becky Saunders, clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Normally soiled clothing will wash nicely in warm - rather than hot - water. A cold rinse is just as effective as a warm one, and can save energy.

Conserve water by setting the water level to match the load size. Wash time can be shortened - and energy saved - by using soak cycles.

When buying new appliances, consider how much hot water is used per cycle. Read the operating manual carefully and learn all the energy and water saving instructions.

Water and energy savings can be achieved by combining small loads, but do not overload the machine because this can result in wrinkling, lint or cleaning problems, or can

cause other damage to your clothing.

Assure proper cleaning in shorter cycles by pre-treating or soaking heavily soiled clothes. Use the correct amount of laundry detergent for the load size.

Mend any tears or holes in clothing before laundering garments, because washing often worsens these problems. Pre-treat stains and spots. The heat of the dryer could make them permanent.

Don't forget that physical energy can be conserved, Saunders adds. The dryer, if not overloaded, can save on ironing.

Sharing the work load with other family members can help. Be sure, however, that everyone who does laundry follows energy-saving procedures.

Social Security Notes

Benefits For Retirees, Etc.

As we start this new year, the vitality of the Social Security system is confirmed in two distinct ways. First, the whole country is watching and waiting for the legislative medicine that will restore financial health to the retirement and survivors benefit system. This public attention will assure effective treatment. Secondly, routine, annual adjustments and program refinements, already provided by law, will take place as usual in 1983.

Orderly change of this type is characteristic of a stable and mature system. Beginning this year, retirees who are at least age 70 can earn any amount and still get all their Social Security

benefits. This 'earnings test exempt age' had been 72 until this year. Also, retirees between the ages of 65 and 70 can earn \$6600.00 in 1983 without losing any benefits - a \$600.00 increase in this 'allowable earnings amount.' For younger retirees, survivors and dependents the annual exempt amount is \$4920.00, up \$480.00 from 1982.

Social Security benefits are intended to partially replace lost earnings. Therefore, these annual earnings limits apply only to payment for services, including wages, salaries, and net profits from a business or partnership. The limits do not apply to other types of income. Remember that those

who received a Social Security check last year, who were not at least age 72 throughout 1982, and whose earnings were above last year's limits must file an earnings report with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1983. The 1982 exempt earnings limits were \$6000.00 for those between the ages of 65 and 72, and \$4440.00 for younger beneficiaries. People who estimated their 1982 earnings would exceed last year's can expect to receive an annual report form in the mail. Forms can also be requested from your nearest Social Security office. Filing a tax return with the IRS does not satisfy this annual report requirement.

There is no scheduled change in the Social Security payroll tax rate in 1983. The tax rate will remain 6.7 percent, paid by both employees and employers. Self-employed persons will continue to pay 9.35 percent on their net profit. The amount of earnings subject to Social Security tax, however, has gone up this year, from \$32,400.00 to \$35,700.00. This taxable wage base increases automatically each year to reflect the rise in average wages. Although some workers will pay a slightly higher Social Security tax amount due to the increase in the amount of wages covered in 1983, there will be no increase in the amount of Social Security taxes paid by about 92 percent of all workers.

Also tied to the rise in average wages is the amount of earnings which will result in one quarter of work credit under Social Security. People born after 1928 need 40 quarters of work credit (or about 10 years' credit) to qualify for retirement benefits. Fewer quarters of work credit are needed by people who will be 62 before 1991 or in cases of death or disability before age 62. The new quarter of coverage amount is \$370.00, up \$30.00 from last year.

A final routine annual adjustment involves the Medicare hospital insurance deductible amount. The deductible amount is designed to represent the average cost of day of hospital care. To keep up with rising hospital cost, the 1983 inpatient deductible has increased by \$44.00 to \$304.00.

While some of these routine annual adjustments are more welcome than others, the changes are a necessary part of this country's most important system of financial protection and health insurance - the Social Security system.

Almost all Social Security matters can be handled by phone. Medicare questions or filing of medicare claims can be taken care of by calling toll free 800-442-2620. You may file an application to establish your eligibility by calling 915-646-7533 in Brownwood.



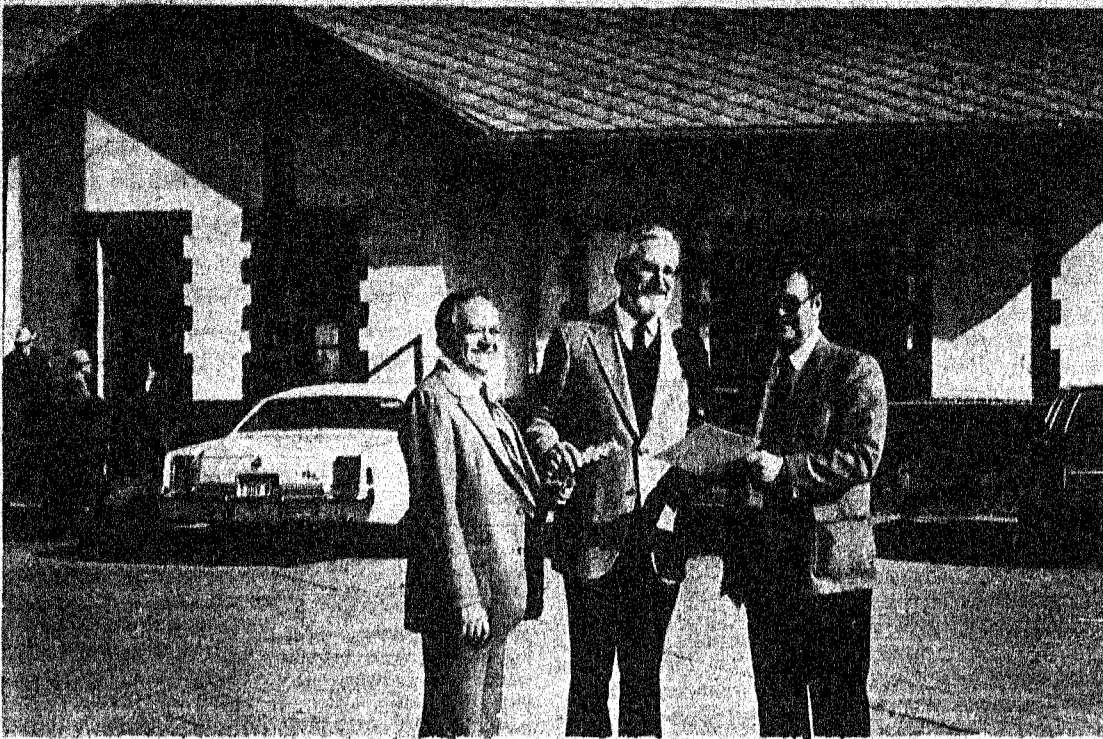

Developing Family Health Habits

COLLEGE STATION- With the new year just underway, this is a good time for families to 'take stock' of health habits for all members. Good health habits are easy to establish and should be practiced all year long. Health experts suggest the following practices as a way to stay healthy:

1. Learn to manage stress and enjoy life more. Emotional and physical stresses should be handled daily. Outside interests and an exercise program help relieve stress.
2. Practice good nutrition - eat three balanced meals a

day and try to reduce salt, saturated fat and sugar intake. The average adult consumes up to 100 pounds of sugar a year and high intakes cause obesity, diabetes, heart disease and tooth decay. Normal weight should also be maintained.

3. Get regular exercise and proper rest. Consistently

walk, jog or do other exercises suitable to your individual needs. Get plenty of sleep in the winter because the body's defenses need to be at their peak, particularly during this season.

4. Avoid substance abuse like smoking and drinking excessive amounts of alcohol - neither is a safe or health habit.
5. Be sure immunizations are up-to-date, including booster shots.
6. Use seat belts when traveling - auto accidents are among the leading causes of death in Texas.

Develop a sense of health awareness - learn basic first aid procedures and cardiopulmonary resuscitation. Practice good health habits every day for a happier and more fulfilled life for all family members.

Coleman Railroad Depot Given for Police Station, Jail

The historic Santa Fe Depot in Coleman was given to the City of Coleman in a presentation ceremony in Coleman last week.

The 67-year-old building will be remodeled for use as the City Police station and City Jail.

Several Santa Fe officials and employees were on hand for the presentation to Coleman Mayor Hugh Stempel and members of the City Council.

Built in 1916, the masonry building replaced the temporary building on the site in east Coleman since the railroad came to the city in 1886. The building was remodeled in 1958 to accommodate freight handling. rooms as well as a passenger platform. Mayor Stempel expects remodeling to take several months, with the move to the new location later in the year. The Coleman Police Department and Jail are currently housed in the City Hall building.

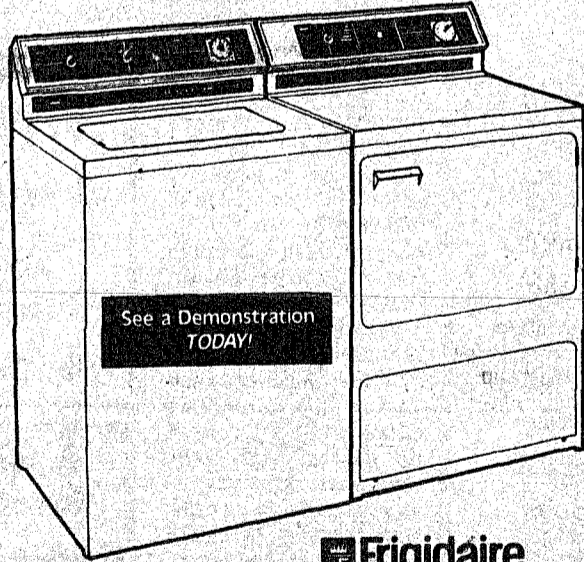
