## REA Rate Increase Explained by Manager

Due to conflicting information in local and area news reports concerning the proposal by Coleman County Electric Cooperative for an increase in rates, currently before the Public Utilities Commission, REA Manager James Barr prepared the following statement to clarify the situation.

The statement points out that proposed increases are no where near what had been indicated, and, that in fact, the rates would allow an overall increase in revenues of 8.3 percent, and that 1000 kilowatts for residential customers would only be 12.4 percent higher under the proposal.

The full statement by James Barr follows:

In explanation of the recent area newspaper reports of rate increases for our cooperative, I would like to try to clear some points of major concern.

At the present, our bills rendered each month represent three major components which are the follow-

ing: base rate, fuel adjustment charge and power adjustment charge.

The base rate provides funds to the Cooperative to operate and continue to bring service to the people in our service area. The fuel adjustment component is a dollar for dollar pass through to the generating power company to cover

## City Sales Tax Shows Decrease

After a steady gain in city sales tax for several months, the total declined for the City of Santa Anna for the second consecutive month.

The sales tax returned to the city by State Comptroller Bob Bullock for the period ending January 7 totaled \$1,414.88, down from the \$1,621.34 for the same period last year, a decline of 12.73 percent for the first period of the year.

On the statewide level, payments were down seven percent from the same month last year.

## CCTC Warehouse Being Constructed

Construction has started in Santa Anna on a new warehouse and storage building for Coleman County Telephone Cooperative. The new building is located on North Santa Fe Street, between H&H Food Mart and Robinett's Garage.

The all-metal building will be 40 x 80 feet, with Carroll Hines of Valera as contractor. The property was purchased from the R. C. Gay Estate and includes several lots that will provide parking and driveway space for the Cooperative vehicles and employees.

The Cooperative is currently leasing space in one of the metal quonset huts across the highway from the Co-op Gls, and will move equipment and materials to the new site when it is completed in a few months.

## Fines to be Imposed For Roadside Dumping

Santa Anna area people who dump garbage and trash outside the City dump ground may be fined up to \$200, according to announcement this week by city officials.

Since the dump ground is now open only on Tuesday through Saturday afternoons from 1 - 5 p.m. and there is a charge for individuals using the disposal site, many people have been dumping their trash in the road and ditches outside the grounds, which is against the city ordinance.

Although the new hours may be of slight inconvenience to some people, the charge is

minimal, being an average of \$2 per load, the cost depending on size and difficulty of disposal or burning. A worker must be at the site to direct the dumping and control burning, if needed.

State regulations have caused the changes in use of the site, and the charges have been imposed to help pay for a new landfill site to replace the current one that almost over-filled.

Local people are reminded to use the dump site only at the stated hours, and to expect to pay a small amount for the service.

## Senator Grant Jones Chosen for Leadership

AUSTIN. Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby announced at the opening of the 68th Legislative Session that is appointing State Senator Grant Jones as chairman of the Finance Committee, and as a member of the Education Committee and the Economic Development Committee.

Jones, from Abilene, served in these same capacities during the last legislative session.

At the opening session of the group, Jones was unanimously elected President Pro Tempore of the 68th Legislature.

The President Pro Tempore is second in line of succession to the office of Governor. Whenever the Governor and Lieutenant Governor are absent from the State, Jones will act as

Governor. Normally, the President Pro Tempore's duties are routine or ceremonial but occasionally more is involved. In recent years, Governor-for-a-Day ceremonies have been held to honor the President Pro Tempore during his tenure.

Senator Jones has served in the Legislature since 1964. After several terms in the House of Representatives, he was elected to the State Senate in 1972.

He has served on numerous committees and is active in several legislative organizations. He is a graduate of Southern Methodist University and received his MBA from the Wharton School of Finance. He has been active in the insurance business for several years and is licensed to practice law.

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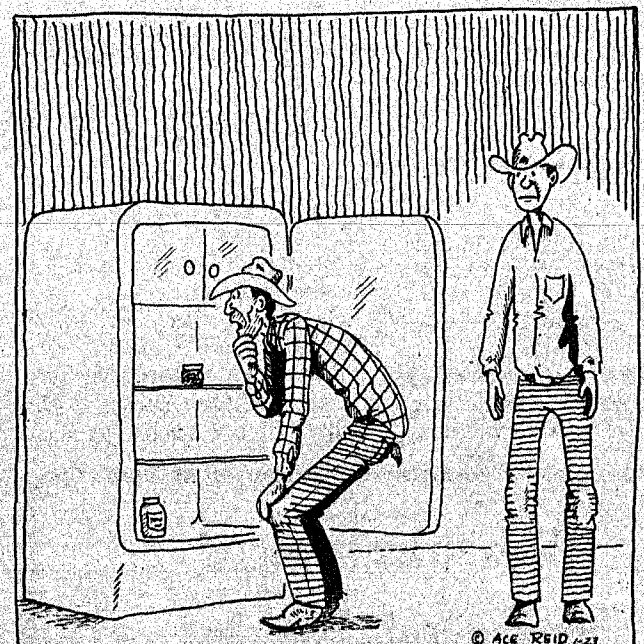

## Agriculture Census Forms Return Due by February 15

The 1982 Census of Agriculture gets underway this week with the mailing of report forms to farmers and ranchers in the 50 states, the Commerce Department's Census Bureau announced last week.

Farmers and ranchers are being asked to report on their agricultural operations during 1982 and to return the form by February 15. The 1982 census is the nation's 22nd agriculture census in a series that started in 1840.

For the first time in a mail agriculture census report forms will reflect regional cropping patterns to make reporting easier.

Farm and ranch operators will be asked to report the acreage in their operations, form of ownership, type of organization, location of the place, use made of the land and when their operations began. Other questions will cover

livestock and poultry inventories and sales, amount of government crop loans, crop acreage, amount harvested, and value of crops and livestock sold.

About 20 percent of farmers and ranchers will receive a form with an additional page with inquiries on production expenses, value land and buildings, machinery inventory, etc.

Assistance in completing the forms is available locally from the offices of the Extension Service ASCS of SCS.

The law which requires farmers and ranchers to report in the census also protects the privacy of their reports. Each report form has a file number printed on the address label. If a report is not received for each file number, a follow-up letter will be sent to all who have not responded.

## Cotton Harvest Almost Over In Community

The Santa Anna Co-op Gin is still in operation although the ginning season is almost completed, according to gin personnel.

Ten or more bales of cotton were on the gin yard Monday, making about 1440 bales for the season. However moisture started falling about noon which was expected to postpone the harvest in the community.

Gin manager J. T. Avants had hoped to complete the ginning before January 1, but wet weather caused several delays during December.

The cotton crop in Coleman and Brown counties was much less than last year when 1535 bales were processed here, and prices for cotton is lower than the previous year. The Santa Anna gin is the only one in operation this year in Coleman County, and nearest for the south-Brown County farmers who patronize the local facility each year.

## Changes Listed in Tax Law

### Concerning Medical Expenses

COLLEGE STATION—Taxpayers who itemize deductions on their tax returns need to give careful consideration to medical expenses and casualty losses as they look at their 1982 income tax situation.

"This year's tax law (the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982) brings about some changes in filing tax returns that taxpayers need to be aware of," says Dr. Ashley Lovell of Stephenville, and economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Effective Jan. 1, 1983, the new tax law increases the exclusion on medical expense deductions to 5 percent of adjusted gross income from the present 3 percent.

Also, all health insurance premiums paid by the taxpayer are treated as just another medical expense item and are subject to the 5 percent exclusion. This compares to 1982 and earlier years when taxpayers could deduct one-half of their health insurance premiums, up to \$150, with the balance subject to the 3 percent limitation.

The current 1 percent exclusion for drugs and medicines will remain the same in 1983, notes Lovell.

"All this means that in 1983 many individuals will not exceed the exclusion requirements and will not have deductible medical expense except in extreme situations," the economist points out.

Thus Lovell advises cash basis calendar year taxpayers to consider paying outstanding drug, doctor and hospital bills by Dec. 31

if they intend to itemize medical expenses on Schedule A of their 1982 tax return.

Another consideration would be to move surgery and dental work scheduled for early 1983 into this year. Moving up surgery and dental work also might be advantageous from an insurance standpoint, since insurance deductibles may already be met for this year.

Besides realizing a larger benefit from medical deductions this year, taxpayers also get the deductions a year earlier and before tax rates are reduced in 1983, says Lovell.

Beginning in 1983, the total of unreimbursed personal casualty and theft losses is deductible to the extent that it exceeds 10 percent of adjusted gross income. In addition, each incident is reduced by the \$100 exclusion.

"This means that only low-income taxpayers or taxpayers suffering large unreimbursed losses will qualify to itemize these losses on Schedule A beginning next year," says Lovell. He advises taxpayers with 1982 casualty losses to consult with their tax advisors regarding such things as the new alternative minimum tax, unsettled casualty claims that fall into 1983, and carryback of casualty losses to the previous year.

With the change in casualty loss deductions as well as inflation, the economist advises taxpayers to evaluate the adequacy of casualty insurance coverage on homes, autos and other

assets. Since the federal government will be assuming a smaller share of the insurance deductible, it may be necessary for many to choose smaller deductibles in insurance policies unless they are financially able to assume greater losses.

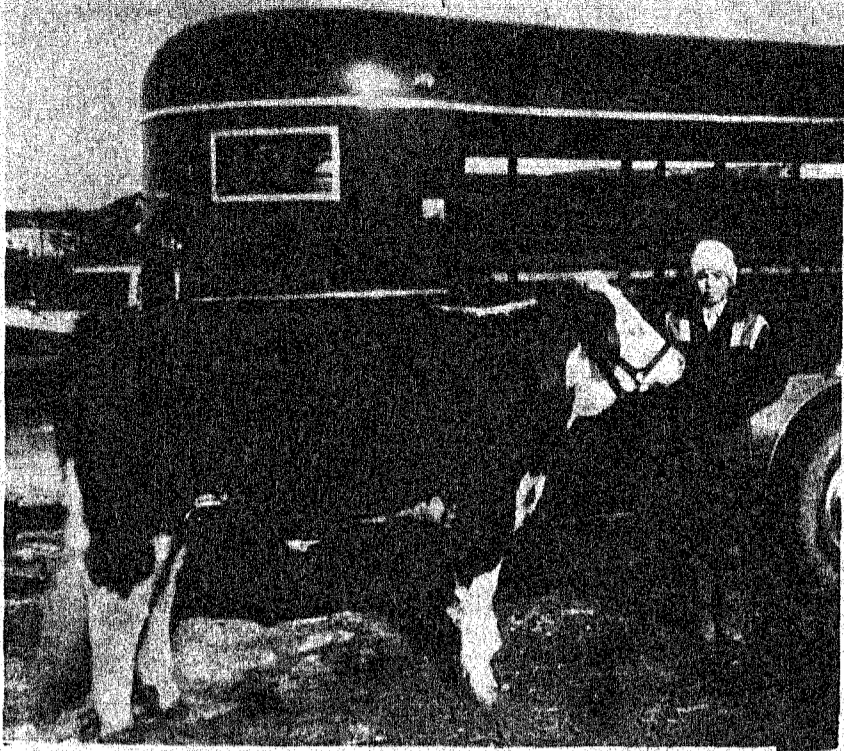

Lucile Wylie read a humorous poem.

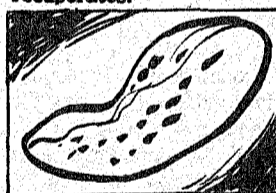

## Mandatory Liability Insurance Still Required by Auto Owners

AUSTIN—The Texas Department of Public Safety will continue to enforce the current mandatory liability insurance law as enacted by the last session of the Texas Legislature. A recent Attorney General's opinion stated that failure to carry, produce or provide proof of insurance is not an offense. However, the opinion does not require DPS policy to be changed.

The offense contained in the law is "failure to maintain financial responsibility," i.e., failure to maintain liability insurance.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, said "the statute requires motorists to furnish information concerning evidence of insurance to a police officer upon re-

quest. Failure to provide satisfactory information creates a rebuttable presumption under the statute that the motorist failed to maintain liability insurance. This presumption may be rebutted by presenting evidence to the judge that the motorist did in fact have insurance and the judge may dismiss the charge."

If the officer is not satisfied with the information provided, he can issue a citation. Adams said troopers will continue to issue citations when drivers are unable to furnish satisfactory information.

The Department of Public Safety issued rules when the law went into ef-

fect detailing examples of information which would be accepted as evidence of financial responsibility. The items include the insurance policy, insurance identification card, or other information which confirms to the satisfaction of the officer that the operator is in compliance with the law.

If a person is unable to furnish the information requested by the officer, the officer MAY issue a citation even though the individual claims to have the required insurance, Adams stated.

Colonel Adams said the law has produced positive results, and has resulted in an increase in the number of Texans who presently carry liability insurance. "Before the law was passed, 74 percent of the Texas motorists involved in vehicle accidents did not have insurance. However, 1982 accident reports indicate that 91 percent of the drivers involved in vehicle accidents have obtained and maintain insurance," he said.

sleep, and may even completely alleviate the problems associated with sleep," says Shirer.

Heavy meals before bedtime can interfere with sleep, since digestion is such a demanding physiological process. Food allergies can cause insomnia, and caffeine can disturb sleep, because it acts as a stimulant.

Shirer says evidence indicates that heavy alcohol intake causes less total sleep time, less deep sleep, and less dreaming sleep. Sleep medications can be bought over-the-counter or with a prescription. "These medications, when used on a short-term basis under a physician's supervision, are frequently beneficial and worthwhile," says Shirer.

The recommended dosages of over-the-counter sleep aids should not be exceeded. Overdoses can cause confusion, memory disturbances, worsening of glaucoma, and in rare cases, death.

Sleep aids prescribed by physicians are usually either barbiturates or benzodiazepines. Both of these drugs are physically addictive, Shirer warns.

Barbiturates, when consumed in large doses, can cause kidney failure, breathing difficulty, coma, and death. Large doses of benzodiazepines by themselves are not harmful, but combined with alcohol they can lead to impaired functioning, even death.

Adequate sleep is necessary for an individual's health and well-being. If sleeping troubles occur, improvements in lifestyle habits may help, but for severe problems, a physician should be consulted.

## Sleep Patterns Altered By Diet, Activities

COLLEGE STATION—Getting enough restful sleep is important if a person is to feel good and function properly. Sleep patterns can be interrupted, however, by factors such as age, food and alcohol intake, and sleep aids.

Many sleep disorders have been associated with poor lifestyle habits, according to Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, health education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

These poor lifestyle habits include lack of exercise, inadequate meals and ineffective handling of stress. "Positive changes in these habits will improve

## TENS Pain Treatment Offers Relief for Some

Electrical stimulation has joined the more traditional treatments of surgery and drugs as a means of relieving chronic pain.

This relatively new treatment is called transcutaneous electrical nerve stimulation, or TENS, says the Texas Medical Association. Nerves are stimulated transcutaneously, meaning through the skin.

The device used consists of a small battery-powered generator about the size of a deck of playing cards, small enough to be carried by hand or worn on a belt clip. Wires run from the generator to a pair of electrodes about the size of half dollars. The electrodes are coated with a conductive gel and are placed either directly on or next to the area of pain.

When the generator is turned on, pulsating, low

current passes through this area and alleviates certain kinds of pain. The patient may feel nothing or only a slight tingling at the point of contact. Relief can last hours or days but is generally temporary with chronic (lingering) pain. So the device must continue to be used.

The U. S. Food and Drug Administration says about 40 brands of TENS devices are on the market with claims of providing some pain relief. The gadgets sell for \$500 to \$600 and are available only with a doctor's prescription.

Studies show they are most effective on low back pain and osteoarthritis.

TENS does not work for all people, and the reason why is not known. Still, the FDA has called TENS "an effective method for the treatment of certain types of pain disorders."

Increased cost in generating fuel. The power cost adjustment recovers increases in wholesale power cost on a monthly basis, dollar for dollar, until which time it can be put into a base rate.

Our present rates have some base power cost in them. When power cost exceeds this base amount then that amount is billed to the consumer.

The new rate schedule will have all these power costs included in the base rates. So bills will not have a power cost adjustment charge on them until changes in the wholesale rate from West Texas Utilities Co. pushes this cost above the amount built into the new rates.

Since all of the power adjustment cost that you are paying on the present rates will be included in the proposed energy rates, this has a tendency to inflate the increase in cost of energy. However the new energy charges would also include all power cost adjustment you are presently paying on your bills as a separate charge.

When the new energy charge in fact does have power cost that you already pay rolled into it, and you look at it as only an increased energy charge, then percentage increases in energy charges as stated by some area news media, is not in fact correct.

Consumers are more concerned with the difference in the amount of dollars difference in their total bill at the end of the month, than they are percentages. So to see the difference in a consumer's bill for a given month, let's use the same 1000 KWH that was used in other releases, and apply the new proposed rate, plus the same fuel and power charges which apply.

what they are currently paying. These differences in total bills do in fact contain power cost. (Previous reports from area newspapers said they did not include power cost.)

The 12.4 percent increase that is used in this explanation is only for the residential class of consumers. Other classes would have different charges and percentages. All classes when put together for the entire cooperative would have an average of 8.3 percent increase. As you can see, some classes would be more and some would be less. The 8.3 percent is an overall average. This is the exact amount presented to the Public Utility Commission and advertised in our service area.

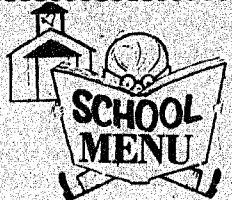
