Telephone Cooperative Manager is Retiring

Thomas Wristen Jr., manager of Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. for almost 16 years, has retired as administrator effective February 17. The announcement was made by the Board of Directors following the February meeting.

Danny Kellar, assistant manager since last September, has taken over the administration of the Cooperative, with Wristen to continue through June 30 as consultant. He will be in the office part time until that date.

A Santa Anna native and graduate of Santa Anna High School, Wristen was in formerly in business and was serving his second elected term as County Commissioner when chosen as manager of the Cooperative in May 1967 succeeding Allyn Gill.

During the time he was manager of the telephone cooperative, subscribers increased from 1220 to

1714 and the system went from multi-party lines to one-party. The direct dialing system was added during that time, and revenues increased about 1,000 percent in the 16-year period. New exchanges were built in the five rural areas served by the cooperative, as well as additions to the physical plant in Santa Anna.

While in the leadership position with the CCTC, Wristen has been active in the state and national telephone cooperative organizations, serving as president of the state group and on numerous committees. He has served as Mayor of Santa Anna, as president of the Lions Club and as president of the Chamber of Commerce. He is a former member of the Santa Anna Housing Authority and a former director of the County Child Welfare Board.

SAHS Track Meet Saturday

The annual Santa Anna High School Track Meet will be held at Donham Memorial Track on Saturday, February 26, for boys and girls teams from Class A schools in the central Texas area.

Coach Jack Snipes is in charge of the event that is the first meet of the season for most schools.

Sponsored by the Booster Club, dozens of local people will be assisting with the events, the conces-

sion stand and other assignments. If the weather cooperates, hundreds of people are expected to be on hand during the day and evening.

Competition in the field events will get underway at 9 a.m., and running events will start at 11 a.m. Finals will begin at 2:30 p.m. or one hour after the preliminaries are completed.

Gerald Brister will be announcer for the meet, and Terry McIver will be starter. Derriel and Polly Warnock are in charge of the concession stand.

Teams from about 15 area schools will take part. The Santa Anna boys are coached by Brian Hunt, and Jack Snipes is coach of the girls track team.

Local people are invited to be on hand for the annual track meet.

One Local Man Is Listed As City Candidate

Only one candidate has applied for a place on the ballot for the April 2 city election, with two Councilpersons and the Mayor to be chosen.

Norman Asher is the only candidate on the ballot this week. He was a candidate on last year's ballot and is again seeking a place on the City Council.

Terms of Dickie Horner and Joe Guerrero expire this year.

Mayor Edd Hartman has not indicated if he will seek re-election. He has served one two-year term in office.

Local Poet to be Included In American Poetry Anthology

Bobbie Seals of Santa Anna has just received word that her poem 'Faith' has been accepted by the American Poetry Anthology and the poem is being considered for the many prizes awarded each year.

More information on the honor follows as was received by Ms. Seals.

'American Poetry Anthology in which your contribution will appear is a striking collection of today's best poetry. We strive to keep the Anthology not only a poetry showcase but also a guide to aspiring poets who study the poems.'

'Your poem will be a resource to important libraries such as those at Princeton, Columbia, Harvard, Yale and Stanford universities, as well as major foreign universities such as Sorbonne in Paris, Oxford and Cambridge, and the universities of Rome and Tokyo.'

'I have some more good news for you. The volume of the American Poetry Anthology in which your poem appears will be our largest and best ever. The several hundred pages of poetry, displaying the entire range of poetic expression, will

be enhanced by pictures of great poets reprinted from rare works of the nineteenth century. The book contains work from poets in every state and over 20 nations. It even has a poem by a congressman. This volume will be released at the end of February.'

Just this week Bobbie received a letter asking for a poem for the special edition 'Hearts On Fire'. She is one of the first to be asked and if her work is accepted will appear alongside that of some of the most important poets.

Bobbie Seals is well known in Coleman County as a Christian Education major, a reading specialist and a tutor. She has devoted a great deal of time to church school training and is currently teaching the high school

Before the illness of her husband she was quite active as a writer and was selected to become a member of International Platform Association. She was also selected as an advisor-chaperon to Western Culture Seminar for 45 days in London, Paris and Rome.

Incumbents and Others File For School Board Election

Voters in Santa Anna Independent School District will have a choice of candidates in the April 2 School Board election, with four people already signed as candidates and another indicating he will be on the ballot.

Incumbents Eddie Hartman and Montie Guthrie III have applied for places on the ballot, and Donald Strickland, the other incumbent, has indicated he will also seek re-election.

Roddy Dean is among the most recent to apply for a place on the ballot, and Terry McIver is also seeking a first term on the Board of Trustees.

Hartman is co-owner of H&H Food Mart and has served two terms on the Board and is a former president of the group. Guthrie, self-employed in the construction business, is a former teacher in the local school system.

Strickland is employed at 3-M Company in Brownwood and is seeking his second term on the Board. Dean is employed as a driver with a Brownwood distributing company.

Will Kids Have Baseball this Summer?

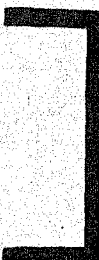
The status of the summer baseball program is in doubt, due to the apparent lack of interest of parents and others in the community. At the meeting of the

Historical Group to Publish History

The Coleman County Historical Commission held its regular monthly meeting Wednesday, February 16. A presentation was made by Frances Opitz, representative from Taylor Publishing Company on publishing of county histories.

Following the presentation, a discussion by Commission members led to a unanimous vote in favor of discontinuing editorship of the Coleman County History Book by Mr. Estill Allen of Early, due to communication problems arising from the editorship. The Commission will continue to gather material for one large book containing family histories, church histories, school histories, community histories, and any other interesting and important information concerning the history of our County. The only important change is that the Commission will work together as one to do the work, rather than having Mr. Allen do this work. All members felt that much more could be accomplished in this way. The problem of assigning jobs and checking back and forth between Coleman and Early has become too much of a task.

We hope that this necessary change will not present a problem for those who have already turned their information in to Mr. Allen, as we expect that he will return the material that he has received on behalf of the Historical Commission. We feel that this change will be beneficial to everyone who is working on their history.

We will be making a concentrated effort to have everyone with Coleman County connections write their history now, before that valuable information is lost, so that our descendants will know something more of their personal heritage than we know of our forefathers. We are constantly losing older citizens

and need to record as much as is now known. If you are of a pioneer family or if you have been in Coleman County for only a short time, or if you once lived in Coleman County, write up what you know for inclusion in the history book. When all this material is put together in book form, it will be invaluable to future generations. DO THIS WRITE-UP TODAY, DON'T WAIT ANY LONGER. Even if you know little of your grandfather, write up what you do know of your or your father's generation... think of what it will mean to your grandchildren and their children someday.

In the next few months, the Coleman County Historical Commission plans to have a series of workshops in different towns in the County to answer questions on writing histories and to help in any way that they can with your write-ups. Only you can easily get the names, dates and places that you need to write your history, but we will be glad to help in offering suggestions on the best way to write it down, if you need help.

The Commission is also still working on community, church and school histories, and will be running articles to let you know in what areas they need people to help... but don't wait on us to ask you... if you know something about any area in Coleman County and want to write or help, let one of the Commission members

know. We will also be running lists of the family histories that have been received, so you will know if your family has been covered.

In the future, you will be seeing numerous articles in the local media relating to local history and the Historical Commission. This is because of the many projects that we have going on at the same time in regards to the history of our county. So little has been put down for our future use that now we are playing catch-up in trying to record as much as we can. We are doing this by writing books, saving old pictures

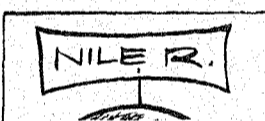

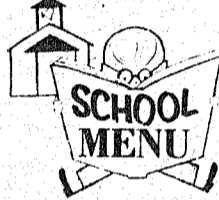

Many Apply For Jobs As Game Warden

AUSTIN— The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is processing more than 1,500 applications to fill less than 30 game warden positions.

Officials accepted applications during December from prospective game warden trainees. Those selected will receive four and a half months of training at the department's academy in Austin beginning next August or September, officials said.

Announcement of the openings brought a flood of inquiries from across the state, including an estimated 5,000 calls to the department's toll-free information line.

The applicants will be evaluated through extensive background investigations and interviews this spring, a spokesman said. Game wardens enforce provisions of the Parks and Wildlife Code and certain other laws.

Pet Owl Runs Amuck

In Brownwood Recently

BROWNWOOD- The inadvisability of keeping wild animals as pets was illustrated here recently when a great horned owl had to be destroyed after attacking pedestrians and pets.

The bird attacked a male jogger on successive mornings, killed a poodle and harassed a woman attempting to hang out her wash.

Two biologists from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department found the owl and destroyed it after it

became apparent the bird had lost all fear of humans.

A section of wire attached to one of the owl's legs indicated the bird had been held, and possibly abused, by someone until it escaped or was released.

Although consideration was given to live-trapping and relocating the owl, biologists felt this would simply transfer the problem instead of solving it.

It is unlawful to possess owls or any other species of raptor in Texas without a permit.
