
Holly-received her fourth consecutive All-District award, having



Cotton Harvest Completed; Gin Ready for Next Season

With cotton planting time not far away, the 1982-83 harvest is just completed.

J. T. Avants, manager of Santa Anna Co-op Gin, is supervising the work on cleaning up after the recent harvest and preparing the gin for the next season.

The last cotton ginned at the local facility was brought in on February 18, making a total of 1,469 bales processed here. That is a few more than the previous season, according to

Cotton farmers had a poor season, as much of the area cotton was destroyed in the south part of the county in a hail storm in late June, then the crop that was harvested brought a low price, ranging from 43 to 52 cents per pound.

The local gin is the only one in operation in Coleman County, and shareholders.

also draws business from Brown County and from Rising Star in Eastland County.

Mr. Avants stated this week that many cotton farmers will be participating in the Payment in Kind (PIK) program, but if the weather cooperates there should be a better crop than this year.

The local gin is very good shape, as work and additions are done each year. Last year the gin was changed to an all-electric operation, with a 200-horsepower motor replacing the original gas-powered engine. Not only has the renovation provided a saving in fuel costs, but it was a great help in efficiency and ease of operation.
