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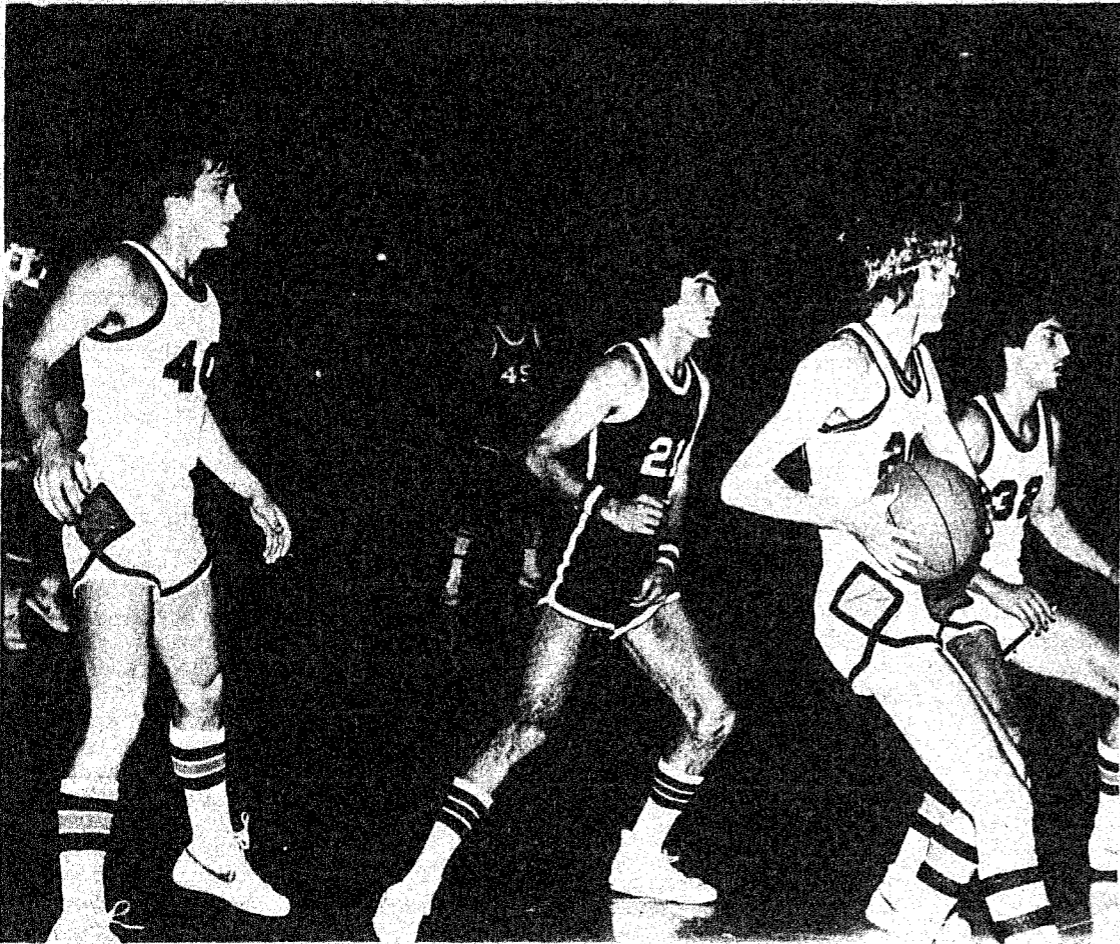

Mountaineers in action in Area Class A Game with Zephyr

1983 Bi-District Champions SAHS Boys Lose to Zephyr

The Santa Anna Mountaineer basketball team was defeated 54 - 52 Tuesday night by the Zephyr boys for the area title and a place in the Regional Class A tournament. The game was a toss-up until the final buzzer, with Santa Anna coming from behind several times but never getting ahead of the Zephyr squad.

Randy Casey led the scoring with 20 points, shooting 67 percent from the field. Ricky Anderson scored 18 points with a 64 percent record. Each of them had seven rebounds, and Casey had three steals.

The Zephyr team got off to a head start and ended the first quarter with a 16 - 8 lead. The score was tied 26 - 26 at halftime.

The Mountaineers were plagued by turnovers in the third quarter and trailed the opponents 43-40 at the end of the third quarter. The Zephyr boys used their speed and full-court press to contain the Mountaineers and keep their narrow lead.

While the Mountaineers were playing in Brownwood Coliseum, Lohn and Goldthwaite met for an area contest at Perry Gymnasium in Santa Anna. Goldthwaite won 61 - 46 to advance to the Regional tourney in Stephenville this weekend.

The Santa Anna boys, runners-up in District 22-A, were crowned Bi-District Champions by defeating Christoval last week. Coach Charles Brewster's team ended the season with a 13 - 15 record.

Seniors on the team are Casey, Anderson and Steve Hughes. Other members of the team are Doug Warnock, Chris DeLeon, Paul Vasquez, Johnny Casey, James Wray, Ramon Vasquez, John Morris, Shelby Tuttle and Russell Williams.

More Candidates Listed For City, ISD Elections

With one day left before the deadline, three people had signed applications for a place on the City Council ballot, and one name was on the roster for Mayor.

The two incumbents, Dickie Horner and Joe Guerrero, were the last to file for places on the City Council ballot, the other candidate being Norman Asher.

Mayor Edd Hartman was the only candidate on the ballot for Mayor, seeking re-election for a second term.

Wednesday, March 2, was deadline for filing for the ballot, and other applicants will be reported next week.

On the School Board ballot, one new candidate had applied for a place on the ballot since last week. Marty Donham, a Santa Anna native and employee of Stemple Mfg. Co. in Coleman, applied for a place on the ballot on Monday. Others who were listed as candidates during the first three weeks are the incumbents, Ed-

die Hartman, Montie Guthrie III and Donald Strickland; and also Terry McIver and Roddy Dean.

The elections for both the city and school district will be Saturday, March 3. Absentee voting will be held starting next week and continuing until five days before the election.

'Cowpokes' Easter Eggs Made For White House Event

The annual Easter Egg Roll on the White House lawn at Washington, D. C. will have at least two very special eggs. Kerrville cowboy artist Ace Reid Jr., son of Mrs. Ace Reid of Santa Anna, was sent two wooden eggs to be painted with his familiar cowboy cartoon characters for the annual event.

The eggs were sent from the White House, with the request for the art work. After the Easter event, the eggs will be put on permanent display at the Smithsonian Institute.

Having his work displayed at the Smithsonian is a distinction given few other cartoonists, and having his cowpokes - a pair of critters with a keen aptitude for finding tormenting predicaments - chosen by First Lady Nancy Reagan to grace Easter eggs for the White House activities delights Reid. "She just knows talent when she sees it," he declared immodestly.

In an interview by the Kerrville Daily Times, Reid also added he is unfamiliar with Easter eggs as an artistic medium. "I've laid plenty of eggs before. But I've never painted

any," he said.

Reid is not only a cowboy cartoonist, but also well-known as a humorist and speaker, traveling extensively throughout the state and surrounding area.

Among other recognition in recent months, he was featured in a recent issue of Ranch Magazine, a San Angelo-based publication of interest to the livestock industry. The story includes pictures of his Kerrville office and studio and tells of his career in the art field. Reid's Cowpoke cartoons are now published in some 500 magazines and newspapers around the world. The cartoon, sponsored by Santa Anna National Bank, has been a popular feature in the Santa Anna News for several years.

SAHS Track Meet Held Saturday

The Eastland High School girls and the Baird High School boys were winners of the Santa Anna Track Meet on Saturday, leading the team totals during the annual event.

The Eastland team had 128 points, just ahead of the Eden girls who scored 127 points during the day.

Goldthwaite was third with 109, Newcastle fourth with 54, and Santa Anna was fifth with 47 points.

The Baird boys scored 104 and were well ahead of Gustine who was second with 78 points. Mullin has 72, and Eden was fourth with 54.

short-handed as many of the boys are still involved in the basketball playoffs.

The major winners for the Mountaineers Saturday included Castillo, who placed second in the pole vault and James Wray, third in the high jump.

Other schools represented in the meet Saturday were Cross Plains, Cherokee, Lohn, Mozelle and Lueders-Avoca.

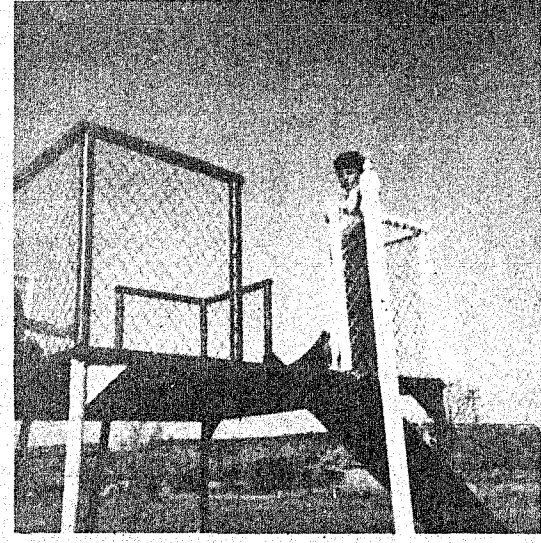

County Tax District Board Has Meeting in Coleman

Tax collections in Coleman County were at about 85 percent at the end of January, according to John Skelton, Chief Appraiser for the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District. The report was given at the Monday, February 14, meeting of the group held at the Tax District office in Coleman.

Second notices were mailed to property owners who had not paid their taxes by the January 31 deadline, and delinquent tax statements were to be sent in February.

The collections are about normal, Skelton said, for the taxing entities for which his office collects.

Skelton also noted that the 1983 property appraisals will be reviewed by the Appraisal Review Board and tax rolls brought up to date and corrections made from the current year's records.

The Tax District Board approved the selection of Collier Watson of Coleman as auditor for the District. Harold Pittard, chairman, presided at the monthly session, with all members being present, being Bill Sneed, Harold Bragg, James Isenhower and Barbara Kingsbery.

In other business, minutes of the January meeting were read and approved, and bills and accounts reviewed and approved for payment.

Estate Planning Seminars Three Sites, Dates Scheduled

COLLEGE STATION-Farmers and ranchers have been concerned for years about high taxes that erode their estates. To help take the bite out of their high estate taxes, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is planning several educational programs as part of a continuing effort in farm and ranch management.

Three two-day seminars are planned which will help farmers and ranchers learn how to reduce taxable estates and learn new methods for passing their operations to the next generation.

These special seminars on "How to Lower Your Estate Tax Burden" are

scheduled for the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center, Dallas, March 10-11; Holiday Inn Airport, San Antonio, May 3-4; and Nueces County Extension Office, Robstown, May 24-25.

"Of major importance is how every farm estate will be affected after the recent estate tax law changes," points out Dr. Wayne Hayenga, a lawyer and Extension economist. "The best tax planning of the past may be the worst under the new law."

Each seminar will begin with a discussion on estate taxes, including deductions, expenses and tax rates.

Basic estate planning devices will be explained in depth. Among these are wills, by-pass trusts, gifts, disclaimers and property titles.

There will also be a separate segment of the program devoted to treating beneficiaries fairly.

Another discussion will center on estate planning tools for agriculture and will deal with corporations, partnerships and selling part of the business to heirs.

The second day of the program will be devoted to special estate tax rules for agriculture. These include special farm land valuation, deferred estate tax payment rules, life insurance, "flower" bonds and other property.

Joining Hayenga in conducting the program will be Extension economists Ken Stokes of Dallas, James Novak of Corpus Christi and Joe Pena of Uvalde.

Estate planning is a step toward reduced taxes," points out Hayenga. "This process should start when you plan to inherit substantial property, when you have an active and growing business, when you still have time to take tax-saving actions, when you have minor children, and when your children marry or divorce."

Early-day Santa Anna

Former Merchant, Postmaster Notes Events in our Town

The following article is a copy of a notebook written by the late F. C. (Jack) Woodward about 1960, recalling early days in the community. Woodward was a businessman and later long-time postmaster in Santa Anna.

About the turn of the century began the change over from the land of big ranches and open range to farms.

In the blackland part of Texas land was high and hard to buy, so many of the younger people would look westward for new homes. Knowing land, when they reached Coleman County with its rich virgin soil which could be bought for \$5.00 to \$15.00 an acre, here they stopped to make new homes, build schools and churches. Here they could raise their families.

These new farmers were not afraid of work. They soon paid for their homes and found that their Coleman County farm would give as good return as the blackland had.

These new farmers had to have a point on the railroad to market their produce. Santa Anna was a favorite with the farmers. So when my family (the W. B. Woodward family) moved to Santa Anna in 1905 we found a small but busy town with good people, schools, and churches, surrounded by a big trade territory with good people, which we later called our friends and neighbors.

Santa Anna was a big trading center with merchants like M. Tyson, Kelley, Shield, Wofford, Hunter, Phillips and others. There were also lumber yards, wagon yards, banks and one of the best cotton markets in the state.

Just one thing that kept Santa Anna from being an ideal place to live and that was scarcity of water. A few shallow wells, cisterns for catching rain water, and water holes were all we had.

In about 1906 or 1907 it was decided to incorporate and get a water supply for domestic use and for fire protection. After much disagreement and many suggestions it was decided to vote bonds and build a lake north of the mountain, and pump the water to the top of the mountain where it would be turned into a distribution system to town.

This system was built and fire plugs installed on all four-inch and six-inch mains. These were just in the business section and on Wallis Avenue and Third Street. Up to this time Santa Anna had no fire department though we always could make up a bucket brigade to fight a fire if we could find water.

This reminds me of the biggest fire I witnessed in Santa Anna before we had a fire company and water.

The north side of Wallis Avenue was all frame buildings until 1905 when the start was made to replace them with masonry buildings. The block from the bank to Kelley's building was nearly solid with wooden buildings and known as "rat row." On the Kelley corner was a two-story frame building. The second story was the Masonic Hall and the lower floor D. O. Niell's Grocery and Feed Store. This caught fire one night. The Phillips building was being built and the dirt from the excavation had made a dam on the vacant lot between this building and the two story building which a good rain had filled with a lot of water and mud. The brigade was able to keep the fire from spreading (using the water from the excavation). This fire speeded up the effort to get a water supply.

When the water system was in the City Council

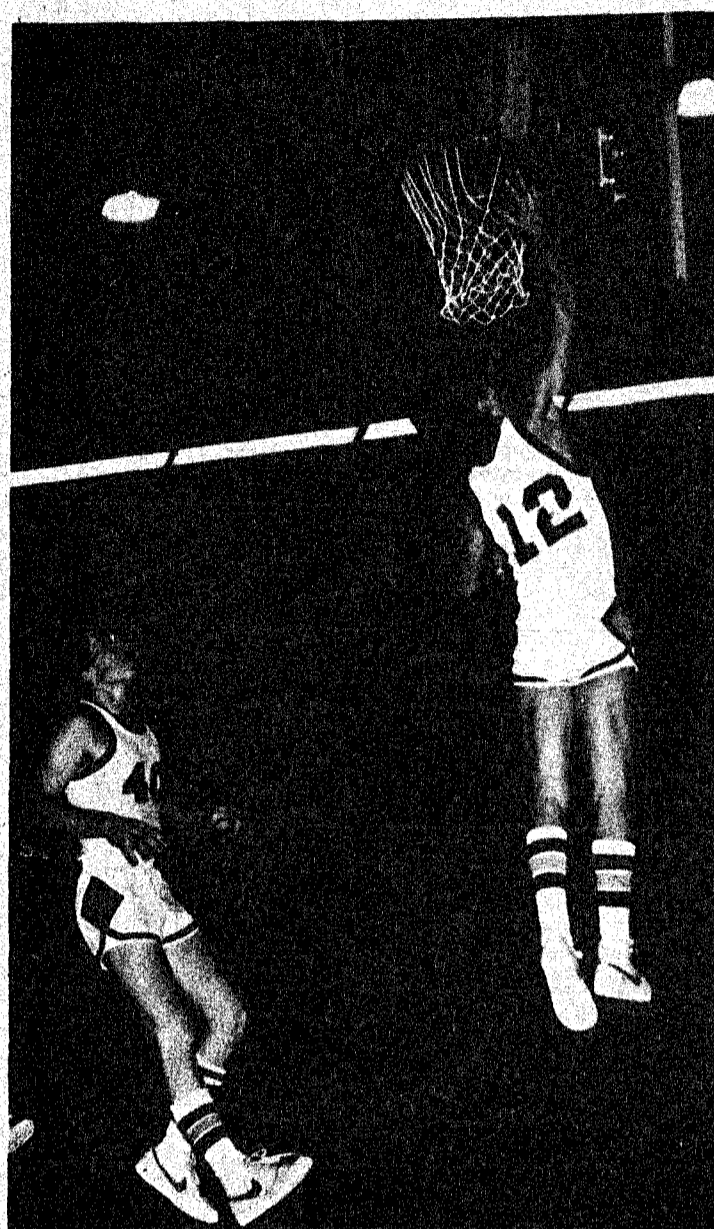

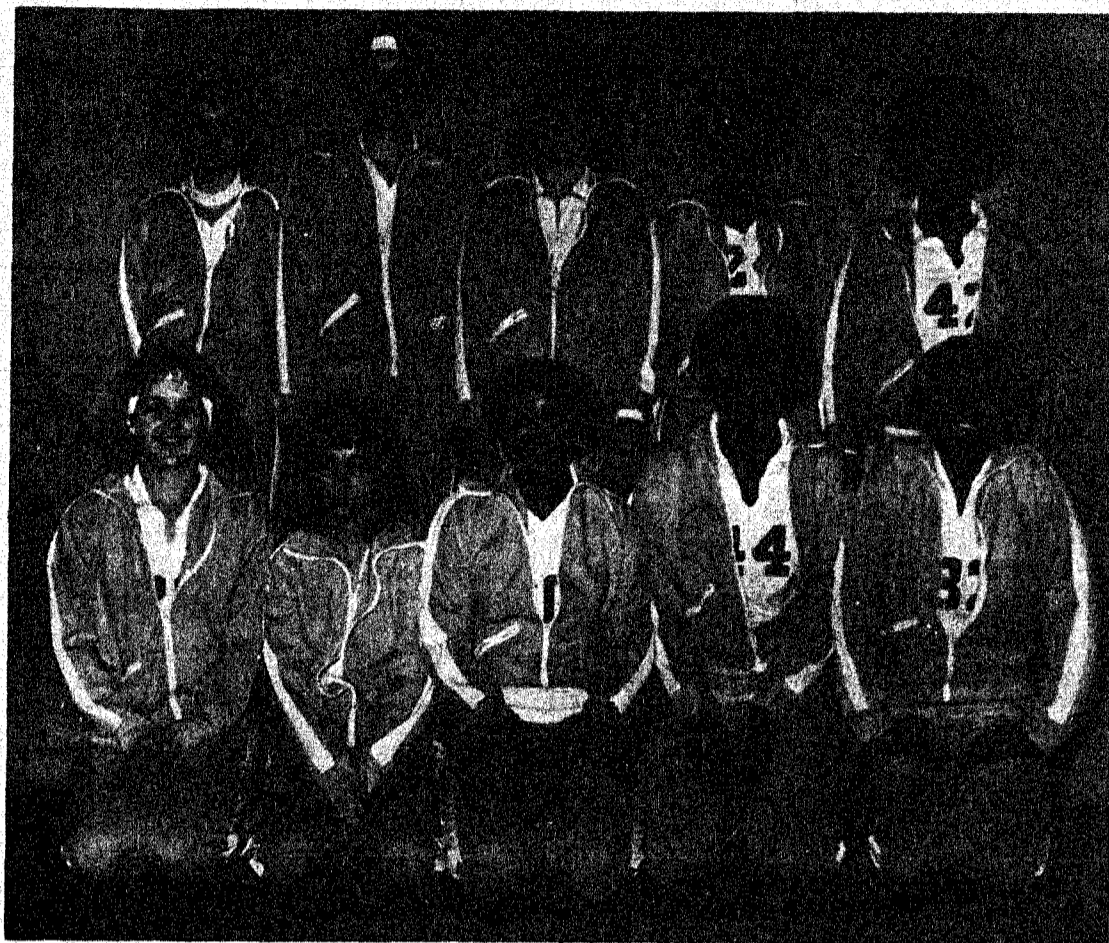
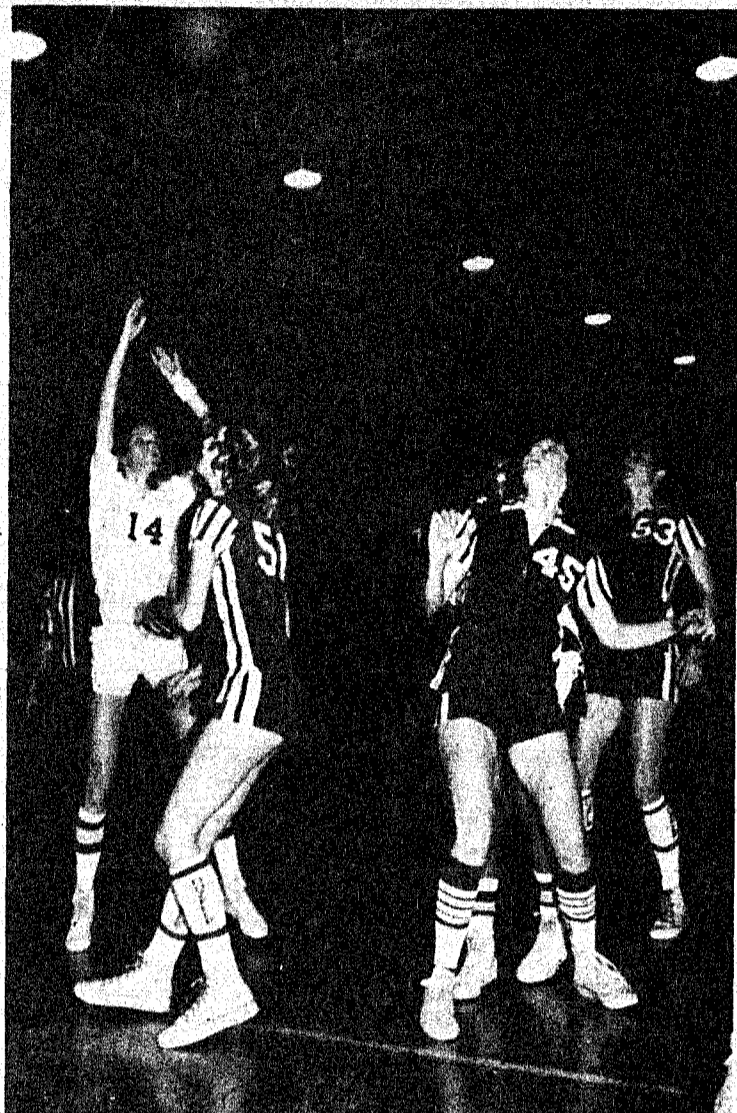

Researcher says managers should reward performance

COLLEGE STATION — Bosses who get upset over employees coming to work late or socializing on the job often care more about them putting in the time than putting the time to use, says a Texas A&M University management professor.

"Managers who focus on time usually concentrate on the wrong things," says Dr. David Van Fleet, an expert in time management and organizational behavior.

"They're saying being on the job is the important thing, but what's really important is doing the work."

The professor pointed out that some people with lenient working hours who are regularly tardy, normally leave a little early to lunch and get back a little late may do more than others who are on time.

"Workers do what they perceive as necessary to get rewards," Van Fleet said. "Managers should concentrate on rewarding performance, rather than worrying about time."

Land Management for Wildlife

AUSTIN— Intensive land management for production of deer and other wildlife is slowly coming into vogue with Texas landowners, according to an official of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Charles Winkler, big game program director, told a recent session of the Texas Chapter of the Wildlife Society annual meeting that the apathy encountered among landowners during the 1950s and 1960s is fading, and a growing number are now actively engaging in deer management programs.

A growing number of owners of large ranches are hiring qualified wildlife biologists to conduct surveys and formulate management plans. "This is an excellent idea, but an effective management plan actually can be accomplished without having to employ a biologist," Winkler said. "The department has five technical guidance biologists who are able to help landowners formulate a plan," said Winkler.

Winkler said an adequate harvest of deer is an essential element in most management plans. Equally important, he said, is habitat protection and enhancement, and proper stocking of livestock to prevent overgrazing.

Landowners interested in determining the nearest biologist may call the department's toll-free information line, 1-800-792-1112.

Many of America's approximately 25 million people who are over 65 are asking Congress to repeal a tax bill that could affect them particularly.

The new rule requires savings institutions, banks, corporations, money market mutual funds and others that pay taxable interest or dividends to withhold ten percent of all taxable interest and dividend payments before paying them out to investors.

This is especially hard on senior citizens and retirees. Many will be entitled to exemptions—but will have to file with each payer of interest or dividends to get them, disclosing sensitive information about their incomes and ages.

Some people will be too ill to file for exemption or refunds of tax that should not have been withheld.

People whose income from other sources falls during the year they retire will not be able to file for an exemption if their taxable income was relatively high in the previous year. Senior citizens are also likely to suffer under this new rule, as the rest of the country does, from its effect on the recession.



Withholding will be a disincentive to save, at a time when the economy is trying to pull out of a recession and savings are needed to finance home buyers and industrial revitalization. It removes savings that would otherwise be on deposit, point out the experts at the United States League of Savings Institutions.

What's more it will not bring in nearly as much revenue as the Treasury claims it will, the League has determined. An increasing number of senior citizens are joining other taxpayers asking Congress to repeal this rule. They are writing to the House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515 and the U.S. Senate, Washington, D.C. 20510.

Faculty members were in Bronte Monday and Tuesday for in-service training, and Friday was a holiday for students while faculty members had a workday at school.

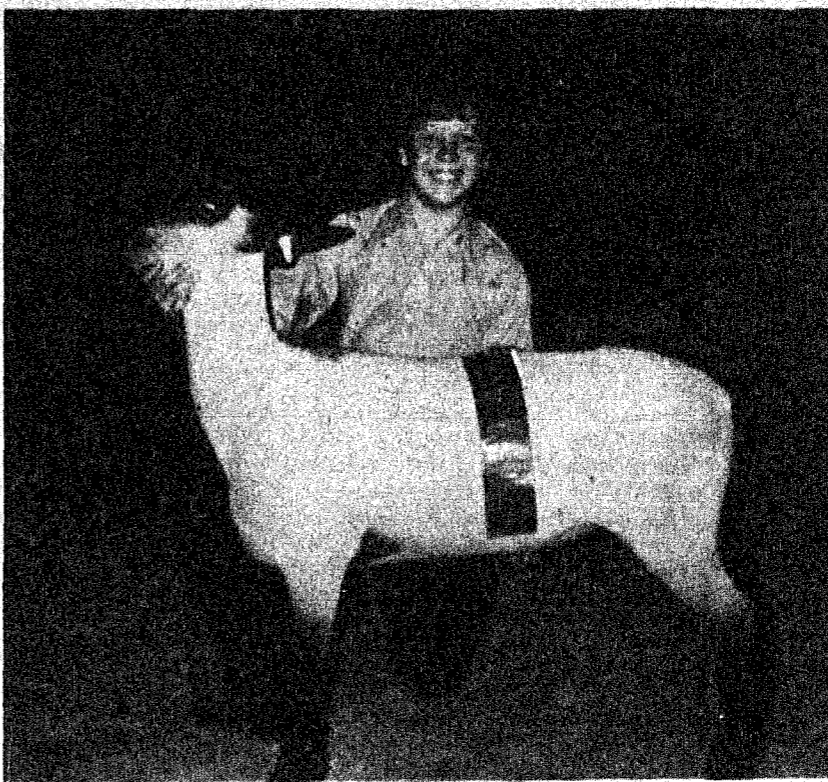

Dress for Success in Business World

COLLEGE STATION—Classically styled garments help the professional women project an appropriate image for business. "With the competitiveness of today's job market, projecting this image is important," says Nancy Brown, clothing specialist with the Texas Agriculture Extension Ser-

vice, Texas A&M University System.

According to Brown, a recent survey shows working women believe their manner of dress is important in creating a successful image, and most said that purchasing garments which project competence is vital to their careers. Of these women, 86 percent preferred classically styled clothing and were generally less influenced by current fashion.

Because classical garments are an investment that will last for several years, less money must be allocated to the clothing budget each year, adds Brown.

Classical designs, unlike fads, are seasonless. In women's clothing they are similar to men's tailored suits: simple, clean, yet elegant. There is no direct focus, but rather a style that reflects a hint of authority.

To achieve a classic look, Brown recommends blouses, blazers and jacket dresses to develop a slim and natural silhouette.

For a businesslike appearance use straight lines, restrained curves, and vertical movement, Brown advises. Avoid soft curves, small detail and pastel colors because they project a weaker, feminine image.

People who dress and look successful tend to receive preferential treatment in business encounters. So the proper wardrobe can be a practical aid for success in the business world, says Brown.
