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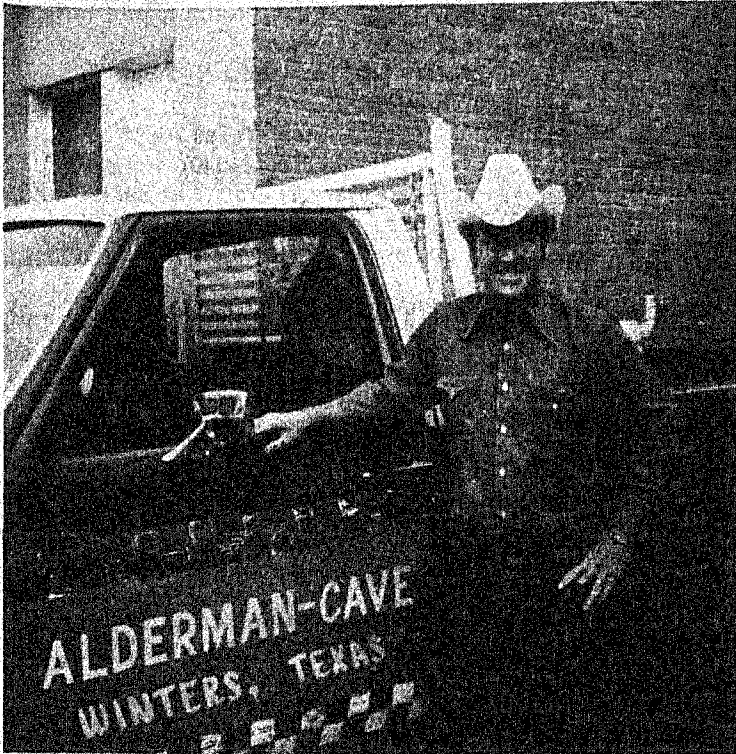

NEW OWNERSHIP of the former Santa Anna Grain Elevator was announced this week when the facility was sold to Alderman-Cave Milling and Grain Company of Winters by Terry McIver. A major renovation project is planned to begin in about a month. The facility has been in operation in Santa Anna for many years, owned originally by Santa Anna Co-Op Gin and Continental Grain Co.

Grain Elevator Has New Owners

Alderman-Cave Company Plans Major Renovation Here

Alderman-Cave Milling & Grain Company of Winters has announced the purchase of the Santa Anna Grain Elevator from Terry McIver.

The elevator, located on the north and south sides of the Santa Fe tracks, is slated for a major renovation to begin in late February or early March.

According to Butch Perry, the new Santa Anna manager for

Alderman-Cave, a new scale, office, truck hoist, and additional storage tanks will be constructed this year during the first phase of the renovation. The existing north elevator will also be modified and improved for faster unloading and handling.

He said that the company will then implement phase two of the renovation plan. This will include

construction of an additional receiving pit, elevator leg, and storage.

Perry said, "Santa Anna is a good location for an elevator because of the road system leading into town and because the railroad offers excellent service. There is a lot of grain grown in the surrounding area, and we plan to attract farmers from a wide

radius."

Alderman-Cave operates a feed mill and grain elevator at Winters and an elevator at Tuscola. The new manager noted that the Santa Anna elevator will buy wheat and oats during 1983, but that a decision has not been reached regarding mill purchases.

Perry is a Brownwood resident with nine years of grain buying experience. He emphasized that Alderman-Cave is a bonded grain warehouse and that payment for grain will be made at the elevator in Santa Anna. The elevator will also be offering to contract wheat and oats later this spring and will offer storage as well.

McIver has owned and operated the local facility the past ten years, buying the north elevator from Santa Anna Co-Op Gin. The elevator on the south side of the railroad was purchased from Continental Grain Co. in more recent years.

Cemetery Association Leaders Are Elected

Luther McCrary was elected president of Santa Anna Cemetery Association at the Friday, January 21, meeting of the group held at the Telephone Cooperative building. Also elected for 1983 was Robert Robinett, vice president, and Mrs. W. B. Griffin was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

Mrs. C. M. Moseley and Glen Scarborough were re-elected for three-year terms as director. Hold-over directors are Dickie Horner, Patrick Hosch, Mrs. B. A. Parker, McCrary and Robinett.

During the meeting, it was

reported that approximately 40 new perpetual care memberships have been added during the past year, making over 250 enrolled in the plan.

Funds received from memorial gifts will be used to construct a new tool building and office at the cemetery. It will replace the current

frame building that is inadequate and not feasible to repair or enlarge. When additional funds are available, the streets will be repaired where rain has caused damage.

Charlie Armstrong is caretaker of the Cemetery and in charge of the maintenance there.

Steer, Showmanship Winners Chosen At Recent Youth Stock Show

Santa Anna youths had several winners in the Coleman County Youth Stock Show steer division, with Bradley Wise, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Ed Wise, exhibiting the Reserve Champion of the show, a 1165-pound light heavyweight crossbred named "Gayland" and bred by Herman Boone of Spearman.

Bradley also had the champion in the Angus class.

Wade Miller exhibited the first place lightweight crossbred steer. Jena Miller and Shawn Miller had the second and fourth place entries in the heavy crossbred class, and another of Jena's entries was eighth place in the medium weight crossbred class. Rachel Phillips

Barker, son of Lewis and Janet Barker of Coleman and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Scarborough of Santa Anna. Mike had the first place pen of three crossbred steers, and his younger brother, Jim Bob, also exhibited steers in the show, winning second, third and fourth place awards in the crossbred classes.

Others receiving awards were Ben and Tish Taylor of Coleman, children of Ted and Sonja Taylor and grandchildren of Mr. and Mrs. received the seventh place award with her light heavyweight crossbred steer, and Shaine Myers placed fourth with his Polled Hereford steer.

Winner of the Grand Champion award in the steer show was Mike

Buddy Neff.

The auction sale concluded the 1983 event, with a total of \$100,449.97 paid to the young exhibitors for their stock. The new record was \$22,000 over the 1982 total.

Hog sales totaled \$30,748.25, averaging \$1.66 per pound. Lambs averaged \$3.34, with 112 lambs bringing \$37,566.00.

Twenty-seven steers were sold, bringing \$29,021.72, for an average of \$1.00 per pound. Thirty pens of rabbits averaged \$100.50, and one pen of chickens sold for \$100.

The Coleman FFA Chapter won the new Herdsman Award, presented by Martin Brick Co. of Coleman.

Dog Bites Local Child

Leash Law Not Observed; Stray Dogs a Real Problem

A two-year-old Santa Anna child is undergoing rabies inoculations as a result of an attack by a dog on Monday morning.

Little Benito Diaz, son of Benito and Gloria Diaz of South Second Street, was bitten on the face by a dog that was said to belong to a family living about a block away.

According to Mrs. Diaz, she and her two young sons were in the street talking with their neighbor, Mr. G. R. Anderson, when the little boy was bitten by the dog. Mrs. Diaz pulled the dog off the child and rushed him to the local clinic where the wounds were treated by Dr. Filemon Cabansag. Had Mrs. Diaz not been nearby to rescue the child, the injury could have been much worse.

City officials were called, and the dog that attacked the child was picked up and impounded. Since there

was no registration tag or vaccination tag on the dog, it will be kept for observation for at least ten days to determine if it has rabies.

Dr. Cathy Pearce, local veterinarian, contacted the Public Health Service in Abilene and arranged for the rabies treatment that includes a series of shots for about a week and is not as severe as the former treatment. The shots are being administered by Dr. Cabansag.

City officials have tried in recent months to control the stray dog problem, and last summer enacted an ordinance prohibiting dogs from running loose in town. A number of dogs have been caught and disposed of, and others have been impounded and later released to their owners after the pound fee is paid or dogs are properly licensed and vaccinated. However no fines have been imposed for the leash law violation.

Old Santa Anna News Files In Lubbock for Microfilming

Forty-nine years of Santa Anna history will soon be permanently recorded on microfilm for the Southwestern Collection at Texas Tech University at Lubbock.

Richard Mason, a staff member with the University museum and collection, came to Santa Anna last week to transport the old newspaper files to Lubbock where they will be microfilmed for the collection.

Newspapers from the years 1919 through 1968 were available, except for the year of 1929. Also taken for filming were the issues published in 1969 and 1976 that were not found in the Santa Anna News microfilm files.

Very little damage was done to the old newspapers in the fire that destroyed the Walls Avenue building last June. The papers were in metal storage cabinets and rescued by firemen when the building burned. However the old newspaper files remained in the abandoned building until last week.

The newspapers will be returned to the office here in about three months, with copies of the microfilm available on request. The microfilmed issues will be available through the Texas Tech collection to those wishing information from the earlier years. Numerous editions of old newspapers have been preserved by the University, including those from Coleman, Brady and other neighboring towns.

Duplicate files of the News were found for several years, so the popular "Years Ago in the News" column can continue while the majority of the old issues are on loan for filming.

Ralph Terry, chairman of the Coleman County Historical Association, was instrumental in the project.

County Lawsuit to Trial In San Angelo February 7

A \$50,000 lawsuit filed by a former county jail prisoner against the Coleman County sheriff, judge and commissioners, is scheduled to be heard in U. S. District Court in San Angelo on February 7, County Attorney Joe LeMay said last week.

The suit, filed by Robert Dean Cates Koym of San Angelo in 1980, alleges Koym's civil rights were violated because of substandard jail conditions at the time. The suit was filed through West Texas Legal Services in Brownwood.

According to the suit, Koym was arrested in San Angelo May 30, 1979 for an undisclosed offense and transported to the Coleman County Jail, where he was held about six weeks. LeMay said Koym had

What could have been a major fire and disaster for a local couple was averted Sunday when a smoldering fire was extinguished at the home.

Fire from the fireplace at the new country home of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Horner ignited lumber and sheetrock behind the fireplace, but the airless chamber caused the fire to only smolder.

The fireplace had been in use several days during the cold weather, and Mrs. Horner on Saturday smelled a different odor but was not unduly concerned. On Sunday morning, when there was no fire in the fireplace, she saw a wisp of smoke in the gameroom that adjoins the room in which the fireplace is located, and called firemen to come investigate.

The brick wall in the gameroom had some hot spots on it, indicating a fire, and with fire extinguishers ready, the wall was broken open, disclosing the burned area and smoldering inside wall.

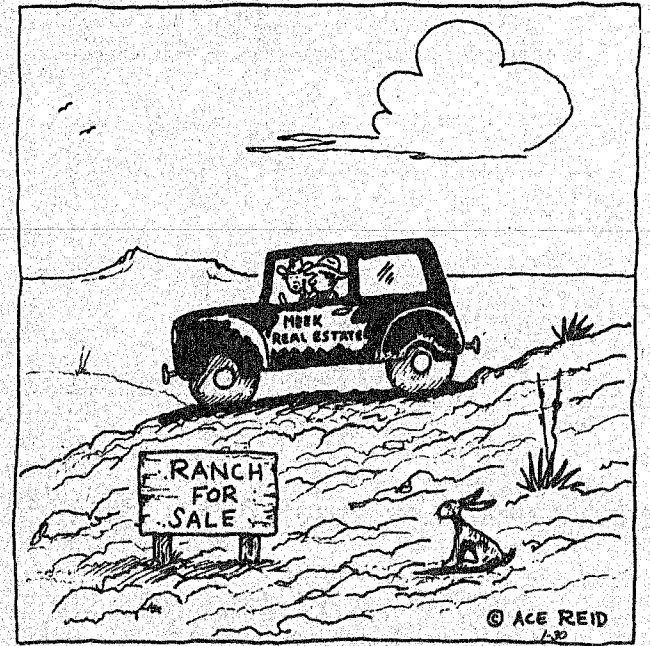

TENS Treatment Used Here

Two Local Women Praise Results

An article from the Texas Medical Association and printed in the January 20 issue of the NEWS about the use of electrical stimulation for treatment of pain, brought response from two local women who have recently started using the treatment with great success.

Dorothea Shields Hernandez and her sister, Loretta Cochran, have been using the TENS (transcutaneous electrical nerve stimulation) device for the past two weeks, and call the results "a God-send."

Mrs. Hernandez, a Santa Anna native and the

daughter of the Mrs. Mary New Shields and the late Charlie Shields, suffers from a severe spinal problem plus arthritis of the spine. Since childhood she has been treated for the condition, and has spent a small fortune on medicine and pain medication. Some of the medications caused reactions, allergies and other problems, so the new treatment has been of benefit both physically and financially.

Mrs. Cochran's treatment is for pain resulting from a back injury she suffered in a fall several years ago. Until using the TENS treatment she was almost bedfast.

The TENS device, about the size of a deck of playing cards, consists of a small battery-powered generator that can be carried by hand or worn on a belt clip or in a pocket. Electrodes of pliable material and about two and one-half inches in diameter are coated with a conductive gel and placed on the area of pain. When the generator is turned on, low current passes through the area, bringing relief that can last hours or days.

Dr. Filemon Cabansag recommended the TENS treatment to the women, and they spent several days in Brownwood Regional Hospital being taught by a therapist how to attach and operate the device. At first the low pulsating sensation was annoying and made them nervous, but within a week there were no problems. Mrs. Hernandez wears her device about four hours a day, and Mrs. Cochran wears hers for longer periods, with the relief lasting most of the time.

According to Mrs. Hernandez, Dr. Cabansag has been recommending TENS device to patients about two years with great success. The TMA story stated it is most effective on low back pain or osteoarthritis, but doesn't work for all people.

With the new treatment, the two women are free to enjoy their families and their hobby - singing and playing gospel music. Although the initial \$600 cost of the TENS device plus the cost of the hospital stay for training in its use seems high, relief from pain and discomfort make it a bargain, they say.

Littering a Problem On Gulf Coast Waters

ROCKPORT- Some boaters and fishermen who wouldn't think of littering a park or roadside don't hesitate to throw trash overboard when on the bay or Gulf waters. This attitude is harmful for both an aesthetic and biological viewpoint, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist Bill Baker.

"Trash, beverage containers, pull-top tabs and old line thrown over the

side all can be harmful to fish, birds and other animals," Baker said. Baker said incidents of fish being killed by ingestion of discarded objects are fairly common. "Even throwing monofilament line from a blackclashed reel overboard can cause fish or birds to become entangled and die."

Baker said its easy to carry a litter bag or toss unwanted items in a corner of the boat until returning to a shoreline trash can.

PIK Program Signup Begins

The Payment-In-Kind (PIK) Program for the 1983 crops of wheat, grain sorghum, corn, cotton, and rice has been announced.

Signup for the PIK will begin on Monday, January 24 and run through March 11, 1983.

Producers have four possible options for making 1983 farming plans, which are:

1. Participate only in the regular farm programs, which requires a 20 percent reduction of the farm's base acreage.
2. Participate in the regular program PLUS the 10 to 30 percent PIK program.
3. Withdraw the entire farm base acreage if the whole base bid is accepted.
4. Do not participate at all.

Farmers who sign-up for the PIK will contract to receive a certain amount of bushels or pounds of the commodity they would have produced on the PIK acres. Compensation for the 10 - 30 percent PIK will be announced percentage (95 percent for wheat and 80 percent for grain sorghum, corn, cotton, and rice), times the farm program yield, times the PIK acreage.

A producer who wishes to take his entire base acreage out of production may bid to do so by specifying the percent of the farm yield that he will accept in return for diverting all of his base acreage for the commodity. He may bid any amount, but it must not be more than the offer rate for the 10 - 30 percent PIK.

The number of whole base bids accepted in the county will depend on the level of sign-up for the 10 - 30 percent PIK, plus other relevant factors. However, in no case will the amount diverted exceed 50 percent of the total base acreage in the county.

Fifty award winners will be selected on the basis of academic performance, involvement in extracurricular activities and the need for financial aid.

TENS Treatment Used Here

Two Local Women Praise Results

An article from the Texas Medical Association and printed in the January 20 issue of the NEWS about the use of electrical stimulation for treatment of pain, brought response from two local women who have recently started using the treatment with great success.

Dorothea Shields Hernandez and her sister, Loretta Cochran, have been using the TENS (transcutaneous electrical nerve stimulation) device for the past two weeks, and call the results "a God-send."

Mrs. Hernandez, a Santa Anna native and the

daughter of the Mrs. Mary New Shields and the late Charlie Shields, suffers from a severe spinal problem plus arthritis of the spine. Since childhood she has been treated for the condition, and has spent a small fortune on medicine and pain medication. Some of the medications caused reactions, allergies and other problems, so the new treatment has been of benefit both physically and financially.

Mrs. Cochran's treatment is for pain resulting from a back injury she suffered in a fall several years ago. Until using the TENS treatment she was almost bedfast.

The TENS device, about the size of a deck of playing cards, consists of a small battery-powered generator that can be carried by hand or worn on a belt clip or in a pocket. Electrodes of pliable material and about two and one-half inches in diameter are coated with a conductive gel and placed on the area of pain. When the generator is turned on, low current passes through the area, bringing relief that can last hours or days.

Dr. Filemon Cabansag recommended the TENS treatment to the women, and they spent several days in Brownwood Regional Hospital being taught by a therapist how to attach and operate the device. At first the low pulsating sensation was annoying and made them nervous, but within a week there were no problems. Mrs. Hernandez wears her device about four hours a day, and Mrs. Cochran wears hers for longer periods, with the relief lasting most of the time.

According to Mrs. Hernandez, Dr. Cabansag has been recommending TENS device to patients about two years with great success. The TMA story stated it is most effective on low back pain or osteoarthritis, but doesn't work for all people.

With the new treatment, the two women are free to enjoy their families and their hobby - singing and playing gospel music. Although the initial \$600 cost of the TENS device plus the cost of the hospital stay for training in its use seems high, relief from pain and discomfort make it a bargain, they say.

Littering a Problem On Gulf Coast Waters

ROCKPORT- Some boaters and fishermen who wouldn't think of littering a park or roadside don't hesitate to throw trash overboard when on the bay or Gulf waters. This attitude is harmful for both an aesthetic and biological viewpoint, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist Bill Baker.

"Trash, beverage containers, pull-top tabs and old line thrown over the

side all can be harmful to fish, birds and other animals," Baker said. Baker said incidents of fish being killed by ingestion of discarded objects are fairly common. "Even throwing monofilament line from a blacklashed reel overboard can cause fish or birds to become entangled and die."

Baker said its easy to carry a litter bag or toss unwanted items in a corner of the boat until returning to a shoreline trash can.

He is a 1962 graduate of Santa Anna High School and entered the U. S. Army last summer.

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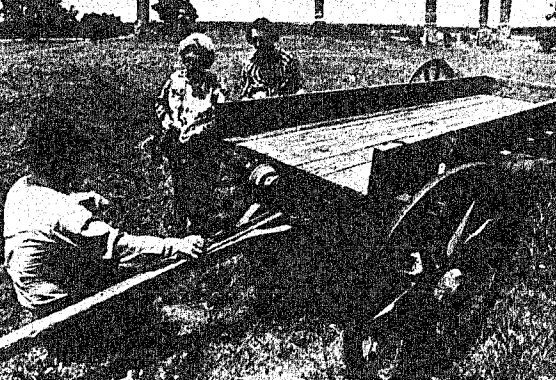

PIK Program Signup Begins

The Payment-In-Kind (PIK) Program for the 1983 crops of wheat, grain sorghum, corn, cotton, and rice has been announced. Signup for the PIK will begin on Monday, January 24 and run through March 11, 1983. Producers have four possible options for making 1983 farming plans, which are:

1. Participate only in the regular farm programs, which requires a 20 percent reduction of the farm's base acreage.
2. Participate in the regular program PLUS the 10 to 30 percent PIK program.
3. Withdraw the entire farm base acreage if the whole base bid is accepted.
4. Do not participate at all.

Farmers who sign-up for the PIK will contract to receive a certain amount of bushels or pounds of the commodity they would have produced on the PIK acres. Compensation for the 10 - 30 percent PIK will be announced percentage (95 percent for wheat and 80 percent for grain sorghum, corn, cotton, and rice), times the farm program yield, times the PIK acreage. A producer who wishes to take his entire base acreage out of production may bid to do so by specifying the percent of the farm yield that he will accept in return for diverting all of his base acreage for the commodity. He may bid any amount, but it must not be more than the offer rate for the 10 - 30 percent PIK. The number of whole base bids accepted in the county will depend on the level of sign-up for the 10 - 30 percent PIK, plus other relevant factors. However, in no case will the amount diverted exceed 50 percent of the total base acreage in the county.

Junior and senior class high school students who are interested in applying for \$1,000 college scholarships should request applications by March 15, 1983 from the Educational Communications Scholarship Foundation, 721 N. McKinley Road, Lake Forest, Illinois 60045. To receive an application, students should send a self-addressed, stamped envelope with a note stating their name, address, city, state, and zip code and approximate grade point average. Fifty award winners will be selected on the basis of academic performance, involvement in extracurricular activities and the need for financial aid.

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A Visit to New York City

Sights and Sounds of City Fascinate West Texan

When I departed downtown Santa Anna January 15, 1983, I expected an extreme contrast from there to New York City, and I was not disappointed.

The weather was perfect for flying and all went very well. I witnessed the flood-ravaged areas recently assaulted by the rivers unimpeded. Several days had gone by, but a great area is still under water with the entirety seen from an aerial view.

The New York City arrival was at night, and the skyline was a sight to behold, but leaving near mid-day was equally impressive. Time being limited, I made an all out effort to absorb as much as I could and would like to share a few of the things with you here in the beloved town of Santa Anna.

The writers' seminars began Monday morning

and were quite an inspiration to a country girl. The theme was "If you have the courage to dream, you have the power to make it come true." Speakers' main topics covered freelance writing, short stories, poetry and full-length novels. Probably the most beneficial thought I brought home with me was simply this: You can spend two hours a day thinking about writing, or you can spend two hours a day writing, but unless you spend at least two hours a day writing, success is not very likely.

When I was not in meetings I was hurrying right along the avenues with the New Yorkers, although mine was strictly for sightseeing. My hotel was located on Lexington Avenue, right in the heart of the city of steel and concrete. It was such a thrill to walk on the famous streets I've heard of all my life, such as Madison Avenue,

Park Avenue, Fifth Avenue, and all of these within walking distance. I couldn't resist checking out Saks Fifth Avenue and Bloomingdale's, but declined to purchase my souvenirs there.

I expected to see innumerable skyscrapers, but the variation of architecture and designs overwhelmed me. It also made me aware that I would like to know much more about the different type structures and periodical history.

I am sure my literary interests would be enough to enjoy the New York City Public Library, but the building itself was indescribable. The beautiful architecture is scheduled to be refurbished to its original state. Among the vast array of literature were also featured exhibitions, international collections of prints, rare manuscripts and books. An unlimited amount of time could be passed there easily for one interested in books.

The Statue of Liberty was high on my list of landmarks to see, and it was very impressive, but as the wind chill factor was 25 degrees below zero that particular day, I declined the ferry ride to see it up close. I understand the statue will be closed next year for renovation.

Central Park I enjoyed from the perimeter, and it was beautiful, totally covered with snow, and though my hotel was but a

few blocks from there, no snow was found at Hotel Summitt. The park covers 810 acres and contains five lakes, two of which are man made.

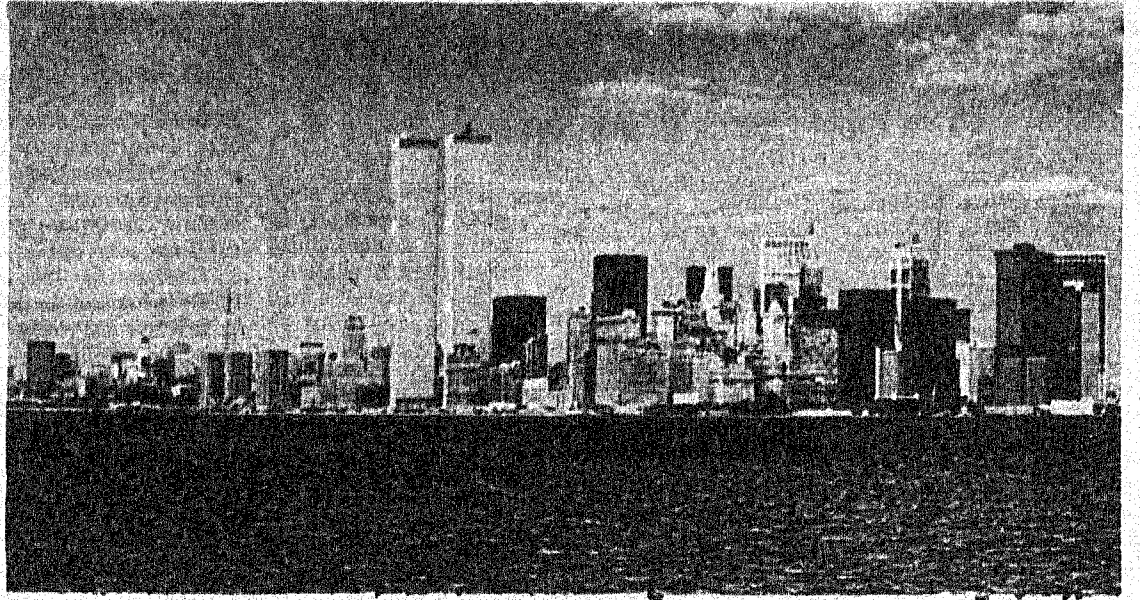
The Cathedral of St. John the Devine was nothing short of awesome. Construction was begun in 1892 and it is second in size only to St. Peter's Cathedral in Rome. Original structure was Romanesque in design, but when dreams of becoming the largest cathedral in the world were undertaken, the structure took on a Gothic style. A new construction period was begun in 1979 and will continue, according to plans, for twenty years, and at a cost of \$20 million.

The Columbia University was massive, tall buildings pressed closely together, bearing little resemblance to the college campus areas in Texas.

The Manhattan Borough has one and one-half million people and 1,200 taxi cabs. The need for additional space is a growing problem, and as a result a 50-story skyscraper office building is on the drawing boards to be built over St. Bartholomew's Church. A similar skyscraper for housing is planned to top another famous building in the city.

The Rockefeller Plaza was impressive, but I loved the ice skating rink in the Promenade. Children there skated as naturally as our children might play baseball or football.

As my tour traveled

through Harlem I was informed that it was Martin Luther King Day in observance of his death, which occurred while preaching for peaceful integration, and public schools were closed.

The city's constricts were very evident in that right next to Harlem are buildings costing millions of dollars, including multi-storied complexes housing millionaires, complete with pent houses graced with trees and swimming pools high in the sky. Among these complexes was one formerly owned by Richard Nixon. The original purchase price was \$750,000, and he sold it

three years later for \$2 million and moved to New Jersey.

The state of New Jersey is separated from New York by the Hudson River and transportation is by way of George Washington Bridge. All in all, is a beautiful sight.

Then one returns to buildings uninhabited because of condemnation for safety reasons. The government is attempting to encourage landlords by subsidizing renovation and charging no tax for a period of several years. Over a period of time the rent control of the buildings has been replaced by the right of the landlord to

raise the rent and re-write the lease every three to four years to cover increase in tax, insurance and upkeep.

My sightseeing included lunch at the famed Sardi's restaurant on Broadway and a matinee performance of the musical "Forty-Second Street." Since it was my first musical production, I was impressed with the costumes, music and choreography, and the packed house attending the Wednesday afternoon performance.

A little surprising to me was the number of different languages spoken as numerous people rushed to

and fro on the sidewalks. It also served as a reminder of how nice it would be back in familiar surroundings, visiting with friends at a much slower pace. That aided tremendously when it was time to leave the fascinating city.
