April 2 Candidates Listed

Four Seeking Council Seats

Mrs. Bill (Bernidine) Watson, a local homemaker, was the final person to file for a place on the City Council last week, placing her name on the ballot with three others in the Saturday, April 2, election.

Mayor Edd Hartman is running unopposed for Mayor of Santa Anna, having served one term in office.

The two incumbents, Dickie Horner and Joe Guerrero, have also filed for re-election to the Council, and Norman Asher is the other candidate.

Horner has served two terms on the Council, and Guerrero has served since last September, having been appointed to fill the unexpired term of M. L. Guthrie Jr. who resigned.

Other members of City Council whose terms expire in 1984 are Carmen Donham, Jim Laubhan and Don Hosch.

Absentee voting will be at City Hall for those who will be out of town on election day.

Six Candidates Seek Places On ISD Board of Trustees

Six persons are vying for places on the Santa Anna Independent School District Board of Trustees, with three to be chosen at large in the Saturday, April 2, election.

No new applicants filed for a place on the ballot during the closing hours last Wednesday, and voters will be choosing from the three incumbents and three others whose names will be listed.

Incumbents Eddie Hartman, Donald Strickland and Montie Guthrie III are seeking re-election, and newcomers listed are Terry McIver, Roddy Dean and Marty Donham.

Mrs. Rose Bass will be election judge on April 2, with absentee voting to be at the school business office starting next week and continuing until five days prior to the election.

Trustees in the Santa Anna ISD are chosen at large, with the three polling the largest number of votes to be selected.

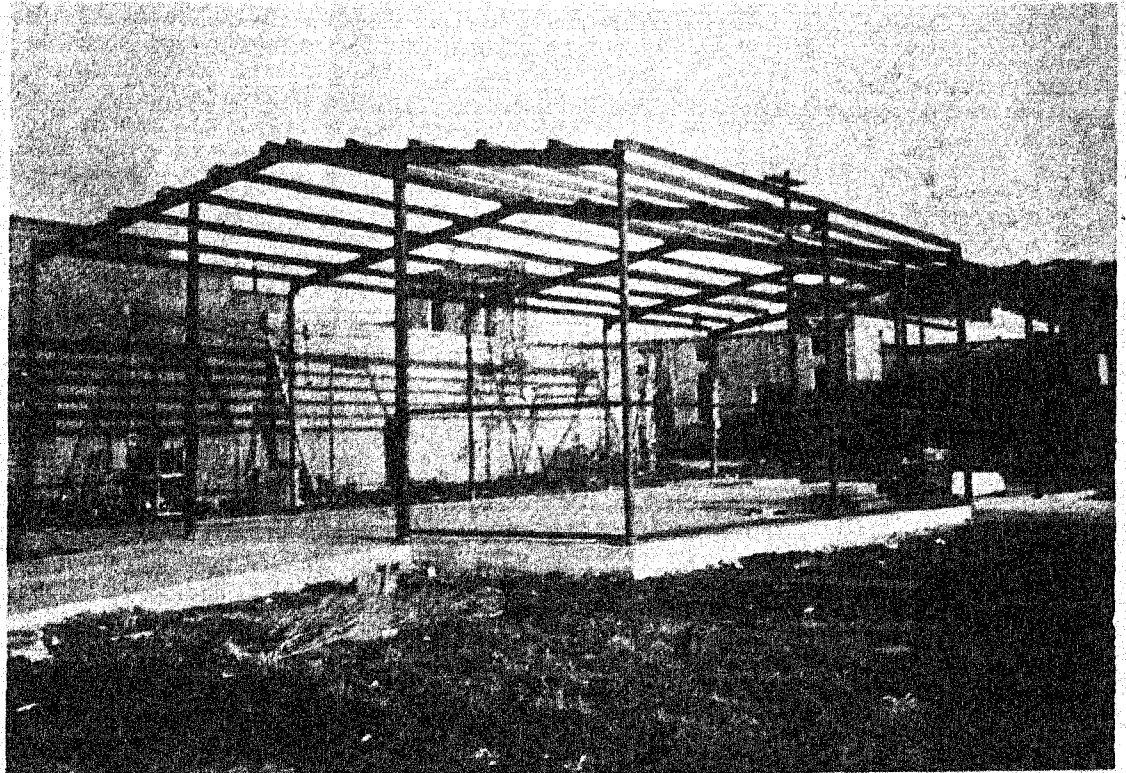
Hartman has served three terms on the School Board, while Strickland and Guthrie are ending their first term of office.

Members of the School Board who have unexpired terms are Donnie Neff and Polly Warnock, whose terms expire in 1984, and Max Eubank and JoAn Day, who have two years remaining on their terms.

Summer Baseball Program To Be Planned Tonight

The 1983 summer baseball program for Santa Anna will be planned at a meeting tonight at the Vocational Agriculture Building at 7:30 p.m. Montie Guthrie III, chairman of Santa Anna Community Services, Inc. will lead the session, and parents of all children interested in participating in the program are requested to attend.

The status and success of the summer ball program depends on participation of parents and other interested persons, and the meeting tonight was called after only three people showed up for a meeting last month.

Approximately 100 children take part in the T-Ball, Minor League, Little League and Senior League teams each year, and it requires the help of dozens of parents and others to serve as coaches, umpires, con-

cession stand workers, and other jobs. Anyone is welcome to help with the ball program, and when there are many volunteers, the job is not difficult for anyone.

The Santa Anna program has operated successfully for many years, providing the major organized summer activity for local children. The Santa Anna teams are included in the Coleman County leagues, providing additional competition for the Coleman and Mozelle teams and making a full schedule of games possible for the local teams.

If the program can be organized and planned tonight, registration for the teams will begin in early April. Tryouts for the teams will be held in mid-April, and the games scheduled by early May.

Officers of the group will be elected at the meeting tonight. Mrs. Tex (Roberta) Tomlinson is current secretary-treasurer of the organization.

It is important that each family be represented at the session tonight to make the summer program possible.

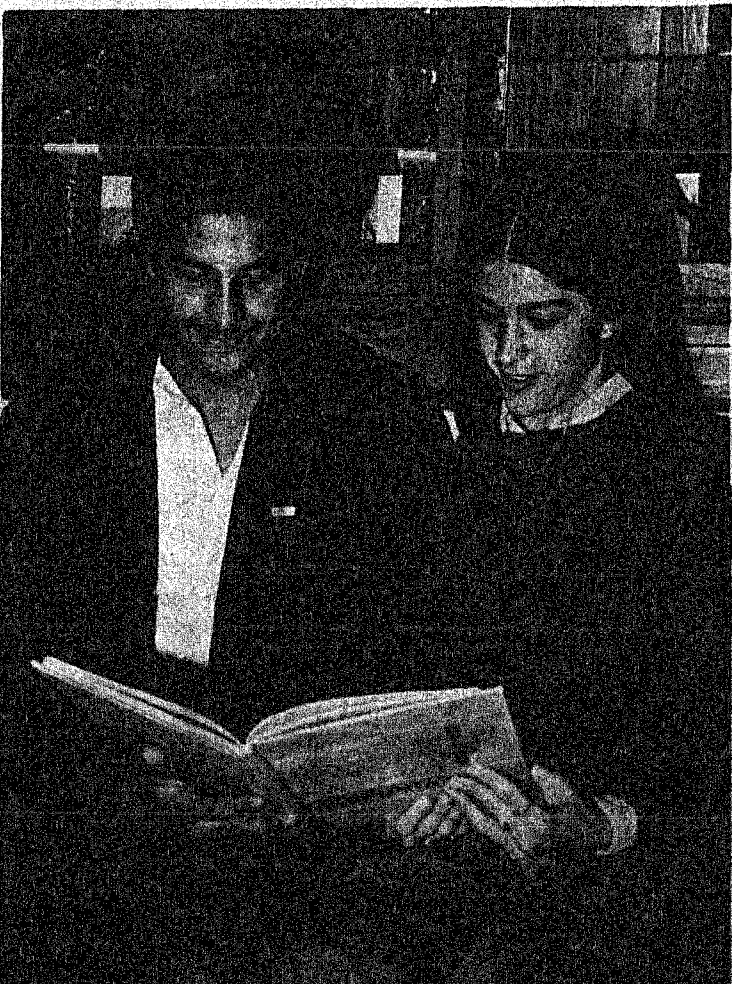
Rainfall Listed For February And for 1983

The Santa Anna area had the largest amount of rainfall of the year last week when up to 1.5 inches of rain was reported in the area.

R. W. Balke, local rain reporter, recorded .10 inch on Wednesday, March 2, and 1.10 inches on March 3 in the town of Santa Anna. Many parts of the community had 1.5 inches during the two-day period.

The recent rain brings the total for 1983 to 4.21 inches. January had 2.60 inches of moisture and the February total was .41 inch.

The total rainfall for this time last year was 1.61 inches that fell in January, with no rain recorded in February of 1982 and the next entry made on March 14.

Lamb Brings \$71,500 at Auction

Guyer Wise Has Champion At Houston Stock Show

A record price — \$71,500 — was paid for the grand champion lamb of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo last week, with the exhibitor the daughter of a Santa Anna High School graduate who showed the champion there in 1956.

Guyer Wise, the 13-year-old daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Wes Wise of Brownwood, sold her 141-pound Suffolk lamb for the highest price ever paid at the Houston event. Buyer was Baytown Budweiser wholesaler Jim Ferris.

Wise, now a thoracic surgeon, was one of Santa Anna's outstanding lamb exhibitors while in school here,

and was paid \$2,000 for his Houston winner 27 years ago. The previous high was \$63,000 paid in 1982.

Miss Wise, the granddaughter of Mrs. Hilton Wise of Rockwood, has been a consistent winner in the show circuit for several years, and this year her younger sister, Sheffield, has also been in the winners' circle several times. The two girls also showed steers during the current season.

A local winner at the Houston show last week was Bradley Wise, who exhibited the Champion medium weight medium wool lamb which sold for \$5,897.00. The lamb weighed 121 pounds and brought \$57

per pound.

The young Santa Anna student also exhibited a Maine Anjou steer that placed fifth in the medium weight class.

Bradley, 11, is a member of the Santa Anna 4-H Club and has had winners in the local and county shows as well as at San Antonio. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Ed Wise and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Joe W. Wise of Rockwood and Mrs. Alice Louise Walker of Santa Anna.

Winning the championship at a major stock show is the dream of all exhibitors, and congratulations are in order for those who achieve their goal.

Lake Building Equipment Now Owned by Local Man

The recent story about the construction of Santa Anna's first City Lake brought back memories of many local people and some interesting facts about the construction.

Ray Owen has two of the "slips" used in building the lake, the implements also known as scrapers or freanos. The slips, which were powered by mules or work horses, were given Mr. Owen by the late Elgean Shield and had been used by the late Mack Cummings who worked for Shield's father and was employed on the dam project. Owen remembers that Cummings

later operated a dray line in Santa Anna, owning and using some beautiful dray horses.

The old city lake is located just north of the east mountain on property now owned by Earl Simmons. For many years the lake was city-owned, but later purchased by George Johnson and called Johnson Lake.

Owen, who came to Santa Anna from Bell County with his family in 1914, remembers being at the lake as a child while visiting in the George Davis home nearby. The two cast-iron implements used in the are at the home of Owen's daughter, Kay Dyer, in Coleman.

Mrs. Goodloe, a Santa Anna antique dealer, was born in Santa Anna January 10, 1915, the

daughter of Santa Anna pioneers Fred W. and Bessie (Moore) Turner. She was reared here and was a 1933 graduate of Santa Anna High School and attended Texas Tech University.

She married Robert Goodloe in Lubbock November 26, 1937. He died in 1959.

She returned to Santa Anna about 20 years ago to make her home, and owned and operated the Cottage Antique Shop for many years. She was a Presbyterian.

Maternal grandmother is Mrs. Leta Parker of Santa Anna, and Mrs. Edith Hancock of Denison is paternal grandmother.

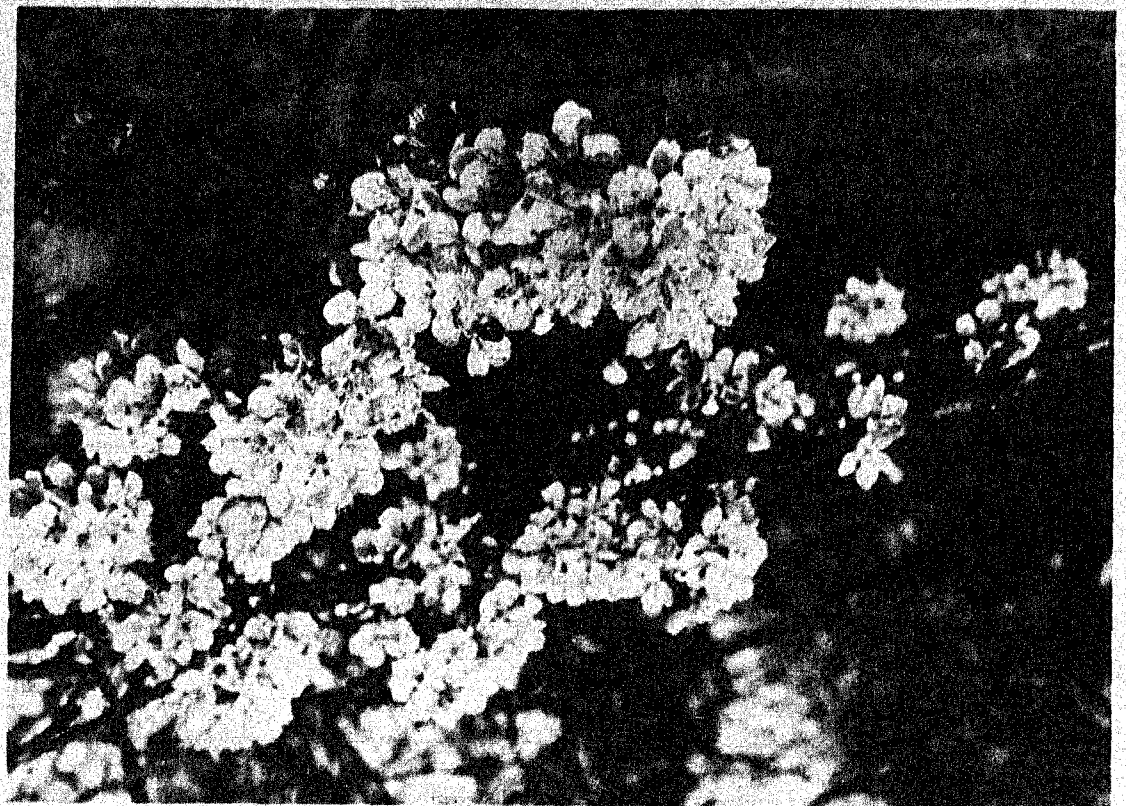
Also welcoming the new baby is a sister, Leann, three years of age.

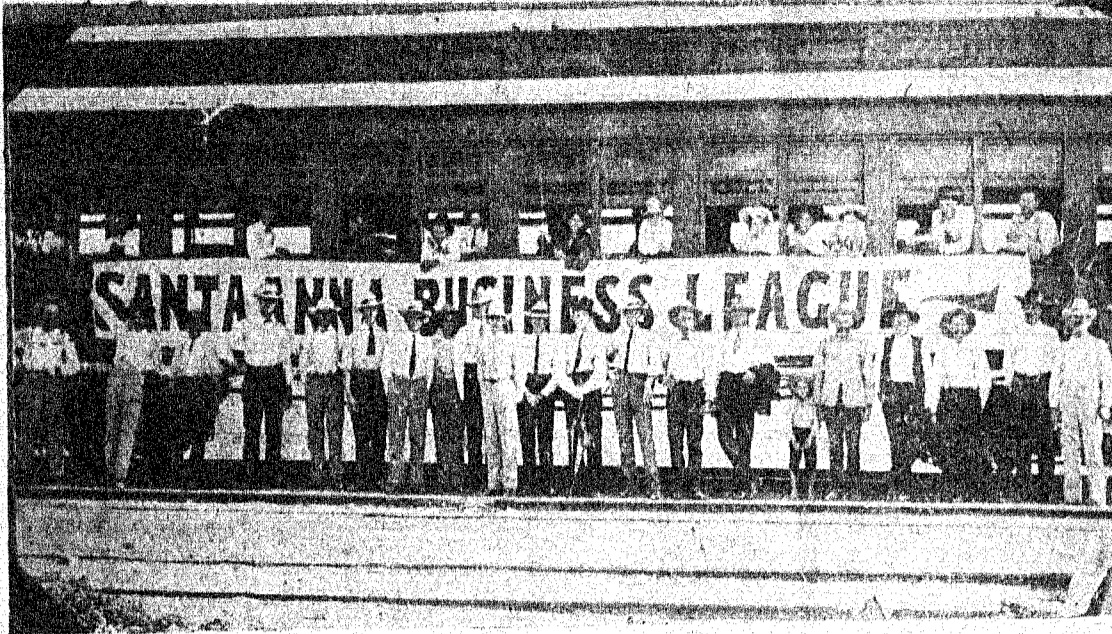

The Santa Anna JHS team has not been chosen, but is expected to be a leader in the district this year with many youngsters trying out for the team.

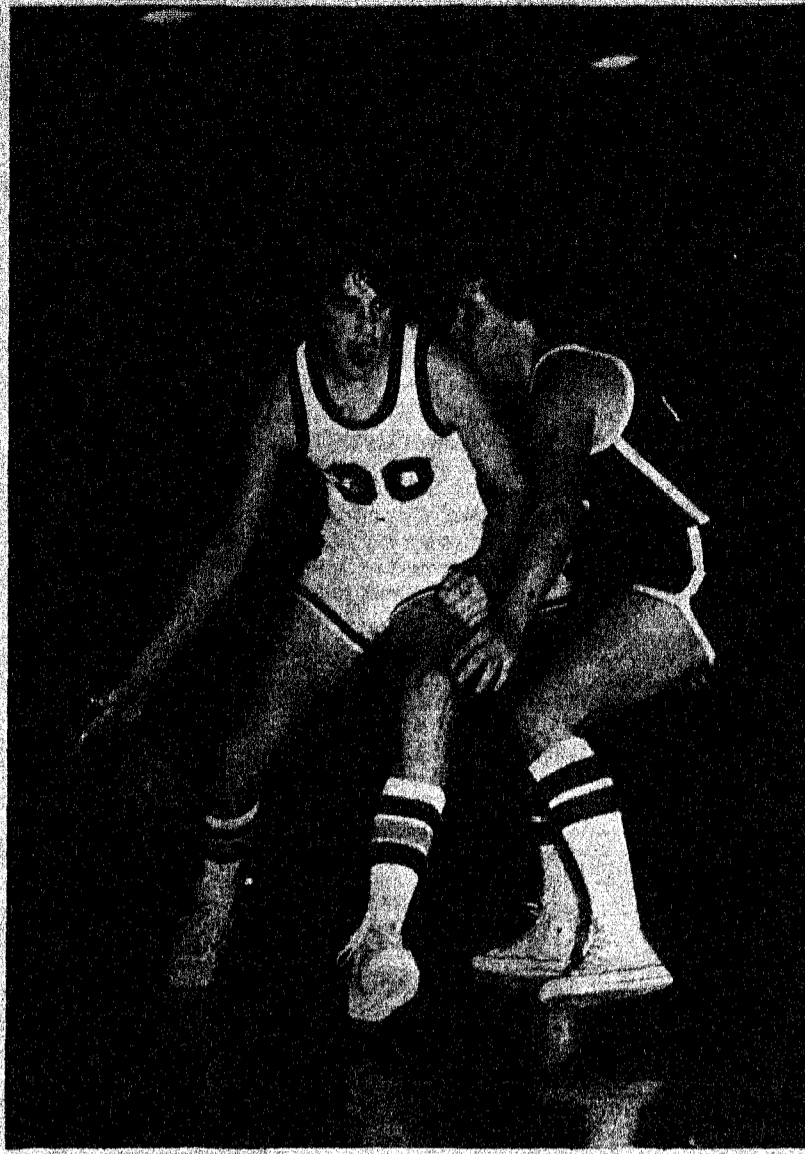
Con-Tex Teams Are Defeated At Regional

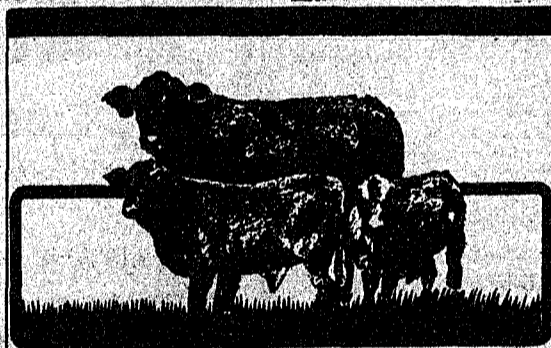
