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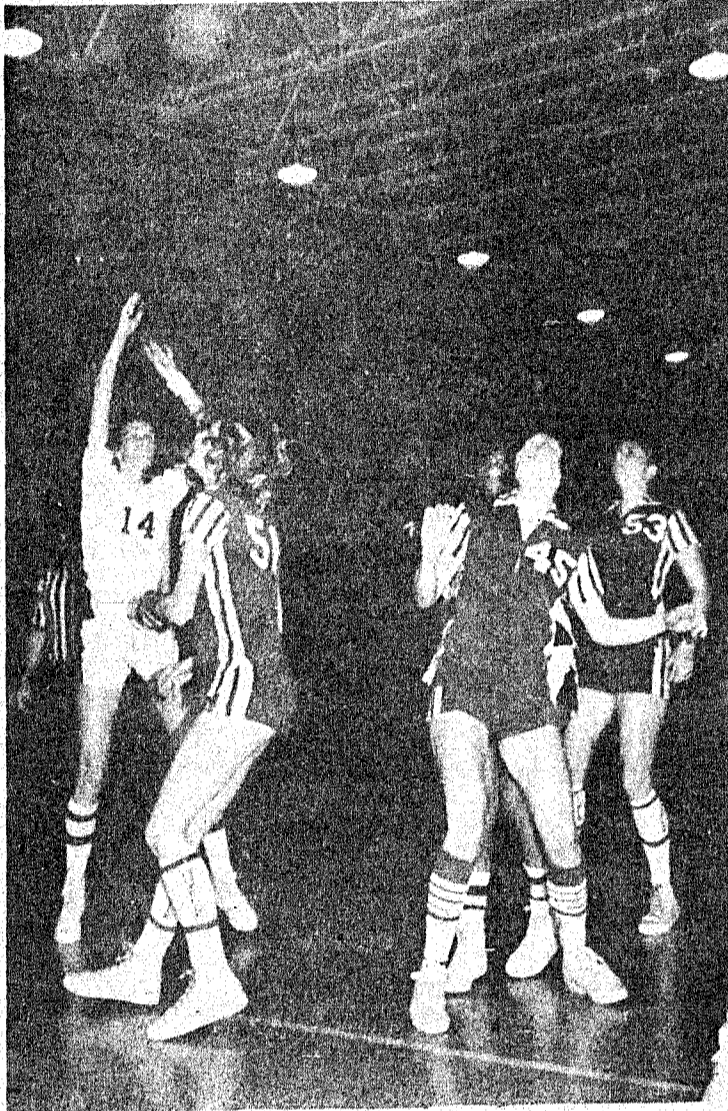
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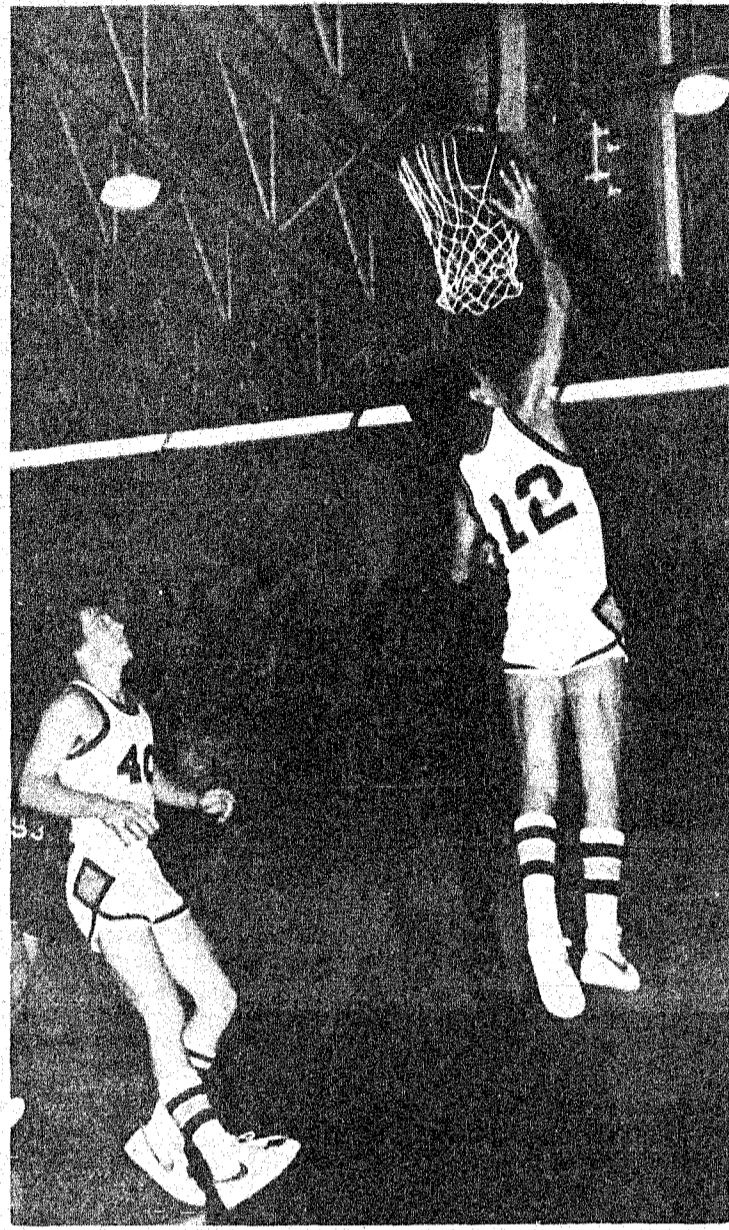

City, County Historical Facts Sought For Coming publication

A family history project for Coleman County has been organized, sponsored by the Coleman County Historical Commission.

The project will be a history of families who have lived in Coleman County, listing names and their birth and marriage dates, occupations and other information of interest. Information on succeeding generations will be included, to the present time.

Estill Allen of Early will edit the publication that is expected to take a year to complete. Information forms are available at various places in the county, including the newspaper offices and Chambers of Commerce. A sample form is also available, showing the way in which the information may be prepared for submission to the editor.

Many counties or communities are compiling a history, and much interest is being shown in the Coleman County project.

According to Mr. Allen, the history is to begin with the first of each family who came to Coleman County, listing the parents of the first couple and as definite information as possible as where they lived. This is followed through from there to the present, or to the time they left Coleman County.

Information will be divided into areas of the county, with family history in Santa Anna and that of the Santa Anna community separate. The other categories will be Coleman; Coleman Central - Northeast; Northwest (Novice); Talpa Centennial; and Southwest (Mozelle).

June 1, 1983 has set as deadline for rural community information, and that for the City of Santa Anna is due by December 1 of next year. Families should choose one member to fill out a form and submit the information so that the book can contain history of each family who has previously resided or presently resides here.

Ralph Terry of Coleman is chairman of the Historical Commission, or more information is available from Mr. Allen at Box 3282, Early, Texas, 76801-0046.

Problems For Cattlemen

Nitrate poisoning, grass tetany and bloat are three major problems in cattle grazing on small grain pastures this time of the year, says a beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Nitrate poisoning comes from high levels of nitrate in plants, mainly during periods of cloudy, overcast weather. Feeding hay or grain to cattle can help along with avoiding high levels of nitrogen fertilizer on pastures.

Grass tetany results from low blood magnesium and can be prevented with a palatable mineral mix of 8 to 14 percent magnesium. Bloat results when an animal can't belch to get rid of stomach gas because it's entrapped in thick, frothy foam. Adding the chemical agent poloxalene to supplements can help. Removing cattle from pastures is also effective.

Faulty Regulators Cause Several Propane Fires

AUSTIN - A combination of freezing weather and improperly positioned regulators on home propane and butane tanks has caused five building fires in the last month and prompted the Railroad Commission's Liquefied Petroleum Gas Division to issue a warning to both LP-gas users and dealers.

Regulators control the flow of the propane or butane from the storage tank to the appliances in a home, stepping down pressures of 200 pounds per square inch to a few ounces. Each regulator has a small vent opening which must be protected from dust, dirt, insects, rain or snow.

If the regulator is not covered or protected, rain may collect in the vent opening and later freeze when the weather turns cold. Freezing rain, sleet or snow can also block the vent. When the moisture freezes, it can disable the regulator, allowing the full 200 pounds of pressure from the tank to shoot to appliances in the home.

A normal 3/4 inch blue flame can suddenly become a roaring two-to-three foot torch, igniting walls, ceiling or anything nearby.

That's exactly what happened in the five building fires recently reported to the LP-gas Division. Four occurred on the same day, November 27, as an icy cold weather front moved through the Panhandle.

Two residences and a mobile home office building in the town of Wheeler went up in flames with one injury reported due to smoke inhalation. A

residence also burned in Shamrock. On December 8, a frozen regulator vent caused a fire which destroyed a mobile home in the Reeves County town of Toyah, injuring one person.

Investigators in each case found unprotected regulators on LP-gas tanks installed with the vent opening pointing up making it easy for moisture to collect, freeze, and block the vent.

With more winter weather on the way, LP-gas Division safety personnel urge everyone who uses propane or butane from tanks to have the regulator checked for proper positioning. Any certified LP-gas dealer can make the check. It's especially important to check older tanks and regulators. Many of the older regulator installations have exposed vents which can freeze easily.

Ideally, the regulator will be located under a protective dome cover on the top of the tank. Exposed regulators should be positioned with the vent facing down and should have a vent assembly or vent suppressor to protect against freeze-ups. Protecting regulators need not be expensive. A slotted can or modified plastic container can provide adequate protection.

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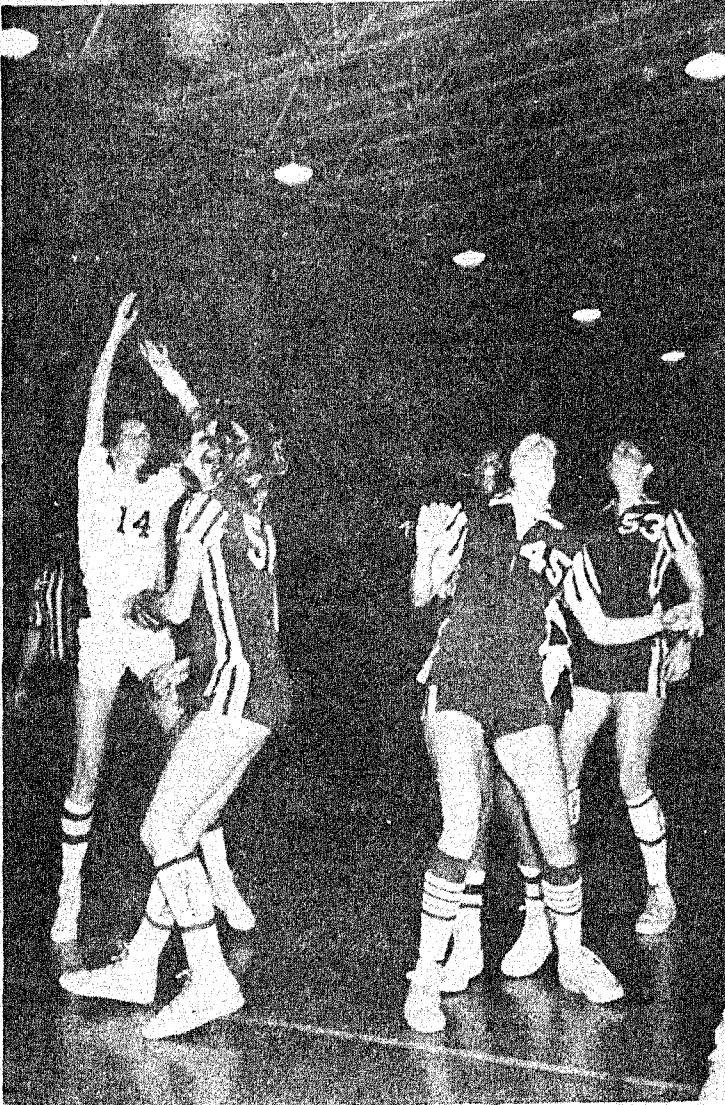
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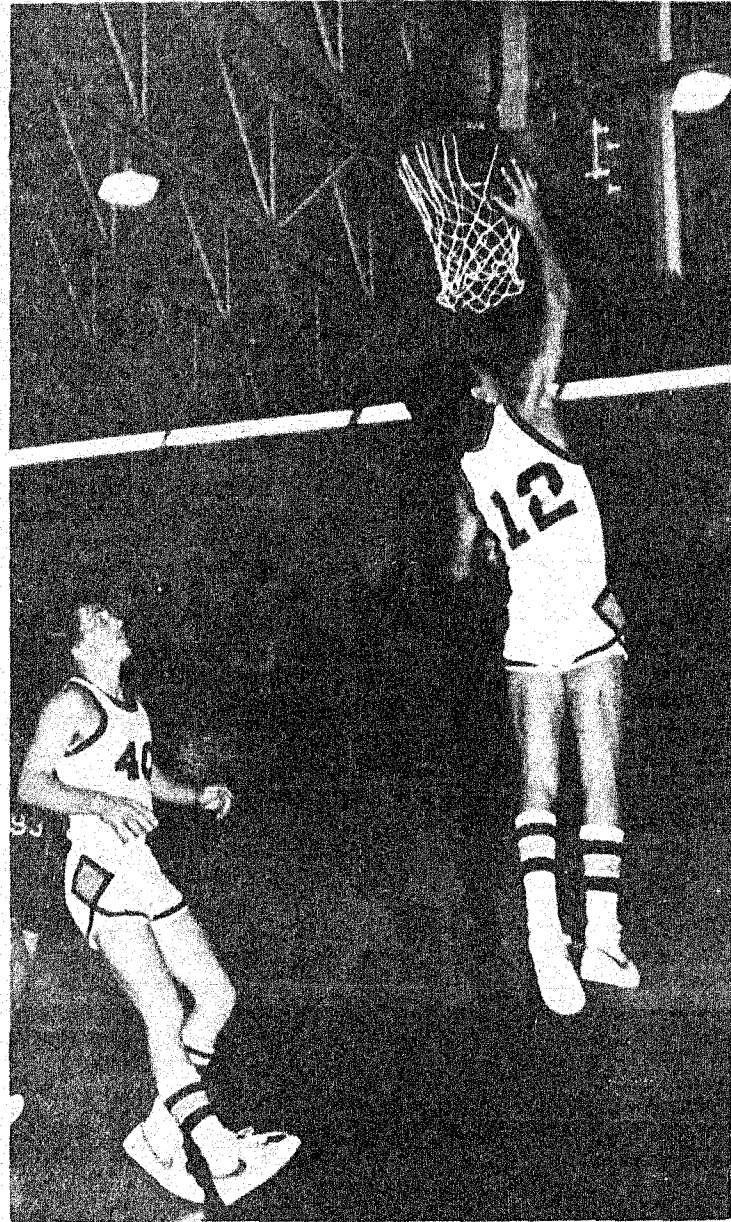

Four-day Weeks Slated For Santa Anna Schools

Santa Anna school officials are trying out a new system this year that may be innovative and prove effective for other small schools.

In order to keep up with classroom work while a large percentage of students participate in track, tennis and other University Interscholastic League events, Santa Anna school administrators have scheduled four-day class weeks during March and April. Each Friday during the nine-week period will be open for participation in the sports and literary events for those involved, while giving other students and faculty members a long weekend holiday.

The new arrangement will begin with the Friday, March 4, holiday. The first weekend in April will in addition have Thursday and Monday dismissed in observance of Easter.

In schools as small as Santa Anna,

classes are often disrupted or must be dismissed when several students are away for events, and the teachers are often involved in the activities as sponsors or coaches. The extra days required by the State Education Agency have been scheduled during the year.

School administrators from throughout the state are likely to be watching the new schedule that may become a pilot project for school calendars.

The long-weekends may be popular with some parents but are drawing some criticism from families where both parents work and child care will have to be arranged each Friday during that period.

Local students will be participating in track meets during March, followed by tennis events and UIL literary contests during April.

Growing Popularity Evident For Microwave Ovens, Co

COLLEGE STATION—"A growing number of consumers now consider the microwave oven a necessity rather than a luxury," says Bonnie Piernot, a family service management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

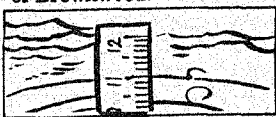
About 15 percent of American households had microwaves by the end of 1979. An estimated 22 percent of households now contain microwaves, reports Piernot.

As the number of dual-earner families continues to increase, so should the sales of microwave ovens and cooking equipment. Added income and limited time available for food preparation are the primary reasons dual-earner families acquire a microwave, says Piernot.

But research by microwave manufacturers also indicates a "psychological" reason for purchasing a microwave oven. According to Piernot, this research shows that working parents are able to provide "homemade" meals with a microwave, thus eliminating a feeling of abandonment or neglect in family members.

A microwave oven may also be purchased so additional family members, especially older children and teenagers, can more readily participate in meal preparation.

"Extension home economists receive a tremendous number of questions from microwave owners and potential

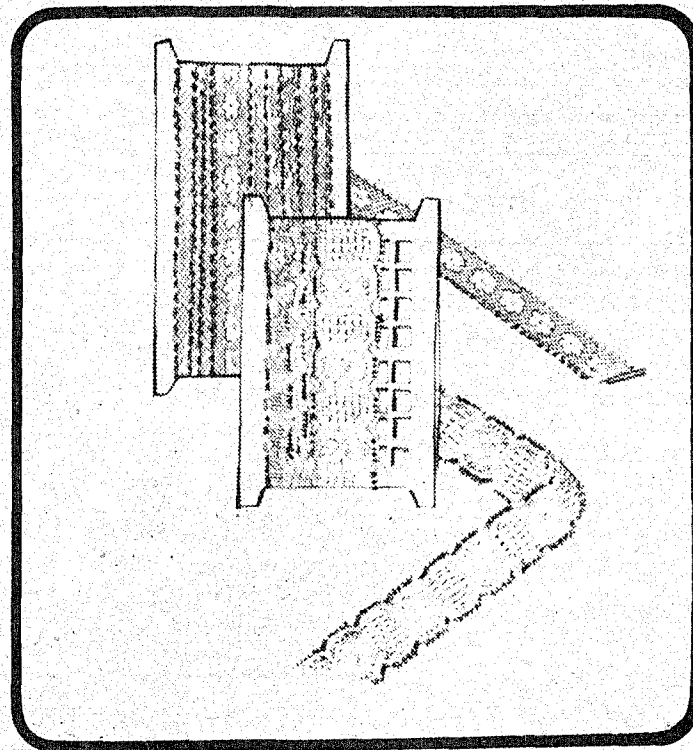

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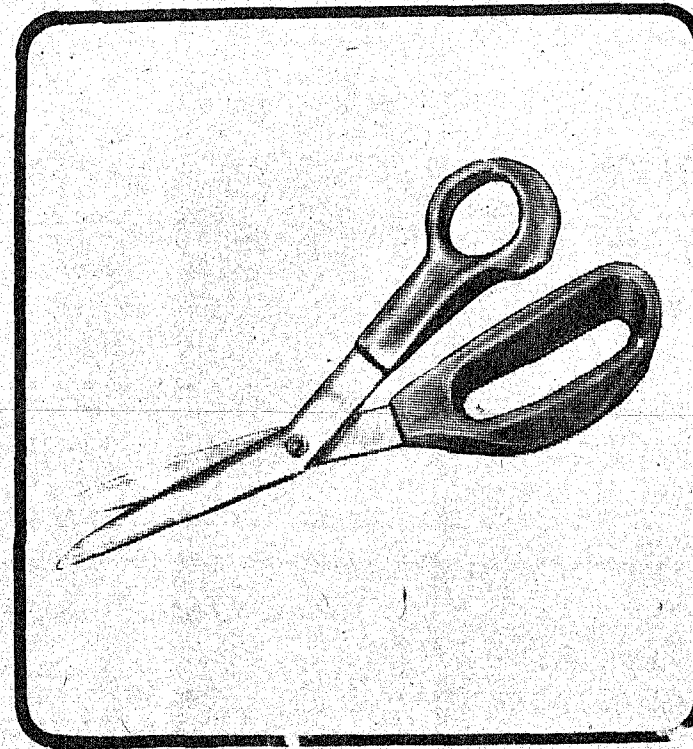

Deadline set March 11 For PIK Program Signup

Farmers have only a few weeks left to sign up for the payment-in-kind program. The signup period ends March 11, and will not be extended.

Farmers will not have the opportunity to change their mind and sign up after this deadline, said Jerry May of the Coleman County ASCS. However those who have already enrolled and those who enroll before March 11 have the option of withdrawing or changing their enrollment without penalty provided it is done before the enrollment ends, he added.

The PIK program is designed to bring supplies more in line with demand to improve the farm economy. It encourages farmers to further reduce 1983 crops of wheat, corn, sorghum, upland cotton and rice from the previously announced acreage reduction and land diversion programs. In return for participating, farmers will receive an amount of the commodity as payment for reducing planter acreage.

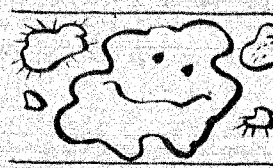
