



on the committee system. Now, the point of the article is the widely publicized vote on the House Floor to bypass the committee system and take up and consider the open container legislation. My position is and has to be, that we have to honor and maintain the integrity of the committee system to preserve the democratic process. While the open container legislation may well be a desirable law for the state of Texas and assuming it would even pass on the House Floor, to circumvent the rules that we operate by would be analogous to giving a baseball player a fourth strike simply because he was a good person and had merit. The point is, you have got to live by the rules even when the rules do not necessarily suit




