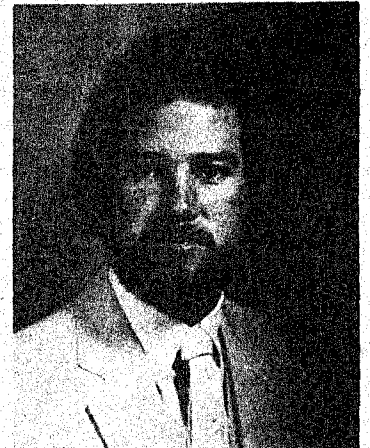
Texas Tech Degree Awarded To Santa Anna Student

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Robinett, David completed the spring semester with a 3.54 grade average.

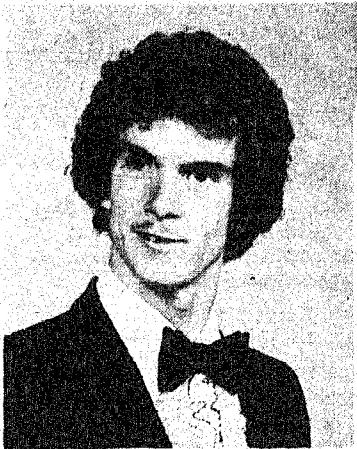

Rev. Clarence Smith will lead the invocation, and Supt. R. C. Smith will present diplomas.

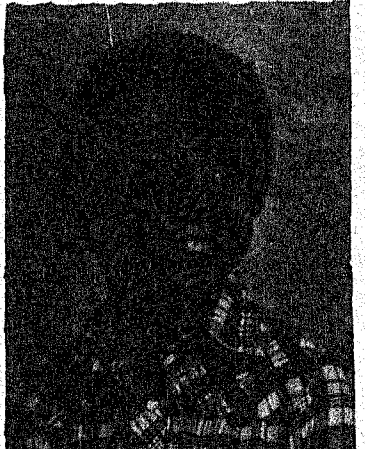

Lone Star Gas Co. Seeks Increase in Santa Anna

Lone Star Gas Co. Manager J. C. Wilkerson on Tuesday filed an application for a rate increase which would raise the average residential customer's monthly bill in Santa Anna about \$3.19 in the winter and 59 cents in the summer. Based on Lone Star's rate application, a residential customer who uses an average of six thousand cubic feet of gas a month paid \$37.39 for gas service in the winter. Under the requested rate, that

same customer would pay \$40.58. Commercial gas customer's rates would also increase under the requested rate schedule.

"Our customers are accustomed to dependable natural gas service," said Wilkerson. "This rate increase is necessary to continue high performance level and for other necessary expenses, such as maintaining and improving the local pipeline distribution system, which are vital to dependable service."

Lone Star's last increase in Santa Anna became effective January, 1979.

"Since that time, every business, including Lone Star, has experienced increased operating expenses," says Wilkerson. "And of course, unlike other businesses that can raise their prices as expenses go up, we must apply to the City Council for a rate increase. No one likes rising prices, but any business must earn enough money to meet operating expenses and still achieve a reasonable profit. Even though our expenses have gone up, Lone Star still has one of the lowest average operating costs per customer when compared with any of the other major gas utilities in Texas."

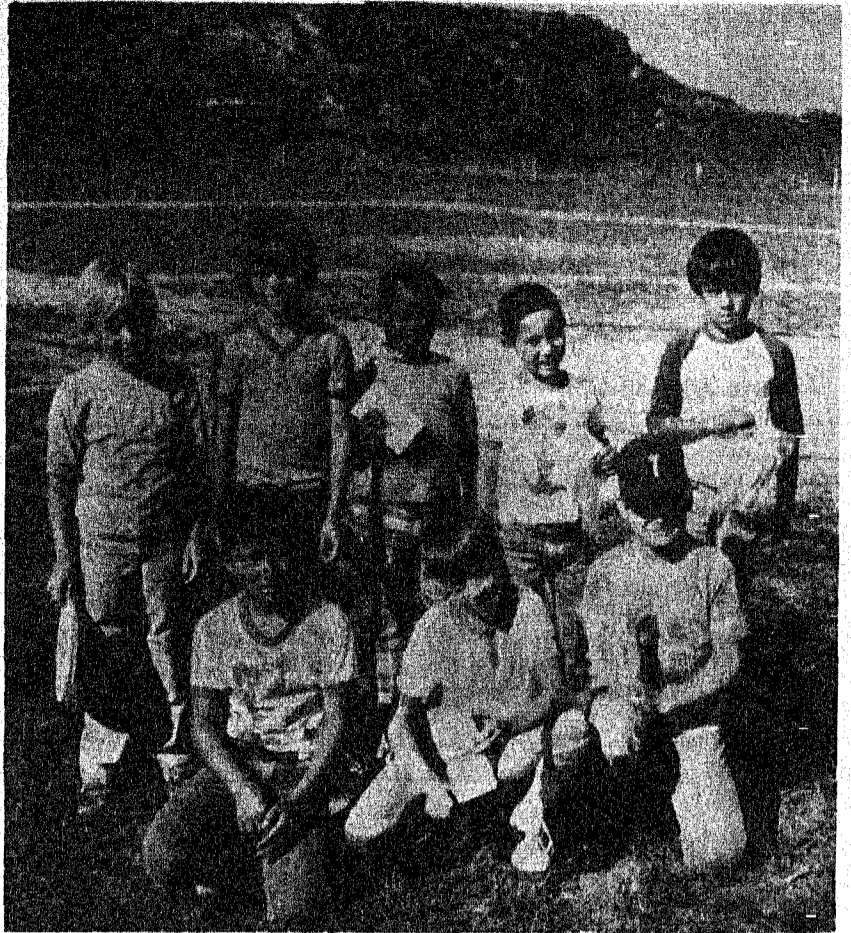
All children selling at least 15 canisters were given prizes, and those selling 20 or more registered for a grand prize drawing held Wednesday afternoon, May 18.

Coleman ISD Voters Reject Bond Issue

Voters in the Coleman Independent School District rejected a \$2.9 million bond issue Saturday, with 392 voting for the measure and 479 voting against.

The proposed project would fund construction of a new elementary school and cafeteria near the present high school building to consolidate school functions to the area near the new high school.

The proposal also would have allowed the district to abandon the old West Ward and Junior High buildings, and move the junior high to the South Ward building at Hufford

Field. Property taxes, school officials estimated, would have risen from the present rate of 81 cents per \$100 valuation to approximately \$1.03 per \$100 valuation.

ISD officials are again facing the problems in the district caused by the condemnation of the West Ward building and lack of classroom space.

Appearance Important for Job Hunting

Dress for Success

"Women applying for jobs need to recognize the importance of proper dress," says Nancy Brown, clothing specialist with Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

This is particularly true for women applying for jobs as secretaries, salespersons or other positions requiring contact with the public, adds Brown. Recent research shows that the more contact with clients is required by the job, the more emphasis is placed on appearance in the hiring decision.

According to Brown, clothing creates immediate impressions about the applicants' economic level, educational level, trustworthiness, social position, sophistication and moral character. These impressions influence the decision to hire or to not hire - often within the first two minutes of the interview.

"A study of hiring agents shows they judge appearance primarily by neatness, ornamentation or jewelry, and the design, cut and color of clothing," says Brown. Most say that grooming is equal to or more important than the clothing worn.

If a hiring agent believes an applicant looks sloppy, he might think that's the

way she does her work. An applicant wearing "wild" style clothing might be considered immature. In general, hiring agents look for people who can represent the firm and project a good image, notes Brown.

"Both employers and employees emphasize that appearance is only one factor in the hiring decision," says Brown. Other criteria include skills, personality, promptness, attendance, cooperativeness, and the ability to handle problems.

Hiring agents also rank attitudes very high, but when forming first impressions, information about attitudes is typically not available. Clothing and appearance is one thing that the job applicant has control over in the hiring situation.

"As more people enter the job market, appearance will become increasingly important, not only in hiring, but in job retention and promotion among equally skilled candidates as well," comments Brown.

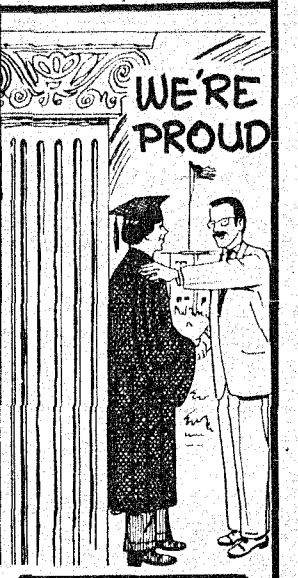

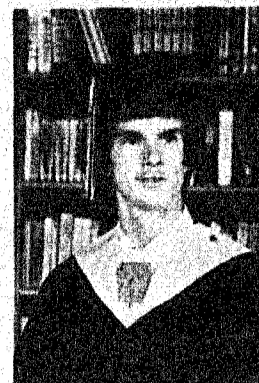

Diversion of Utilities A Penitentiary Offense

Electric utilities in Texas, including West Texas Utilities Co., are taking a tougher stance these days on theft of electricity.

Reasons for the crackdown are a change in the State Penal Code making meter tampering a penitentiary offense and the fact that the cost of producing electric energy has gone up.

"We view any form of stealing electric power as a serious crime," said Don Welch of Abilene, WTU vice president and director of customer services, "because we feel a strong responsibility to protect the interest of our good paying customers."

"It costs money to produce electricity," Welch said. "If one customer manages to get some of it free, the other customers have to make up the difference."

The State Legislature amended the criminal

mischief statute in 1981 to make diversion of any utility service a third degree felony with a possible punishment of a maximum fine of \$5,000 and from two to ten years in prison. The law also allows authorities to make the assumption that the person in whose name the service was last billed is the responsible party.

Convictions have been obtained in several Texas cities since the law was passed, and WTU recently filed charges which resulted in a felony indictment being issued against a customer.

Welch said that meter tampering not only is a serious crime which is becoming more easy to detect, but that it is extremely dangerous.

"Many people do not understand the danger involved," he said. "Property damage, serious injury, or even death can result."

Health Notes....

COLLEGE STATION-With the new year just under way, this is a good time for families to 'take stock' of health habits for all members.

Good health habits are easy to establish and should be practiced all year long, reminds Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, health education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The most important reason for establishing health habits is to improve the quality of life, as well as its length," she adds.

Health experts suggest the following practices as a way to stay healthy:

1. Learn to manage stress and enjoy life more. Emotional and physical stresses should be handled daily. Outside interests and an exercise program help relieve stress.
2. Practice good nutrition - eat three balanced meals a day and try to reduce salt, saturated fat and sugar intake. The average adult consumes up to 100 pounds of sugar a year and high in-

takes cause obesity, diabetes, heart disease and tooth decay. Normal weight should also be maintained.

3. Get regular exercise and proper rest. Consistently walk, jog or do other exercises suitable to your individual needs. Get plenty of sleep in the winter because the body's defenses need to be at their peak, particularly during this season.

4. Avoid substance abuse like smoking and drinking excessive amounts of alcohol - neither is a safe or health habit.

5. Be sure immunizations are up-to-date, including booster shots.

6. Use seat belts when traveling - auto accidents are among the leading causes of death in Texas. Develop a sense of health awareness - learn basic first aid procedures and cardiopulmonary resuscitation. Practice good health habits every day for a happier and more fulfilled life for all family members.

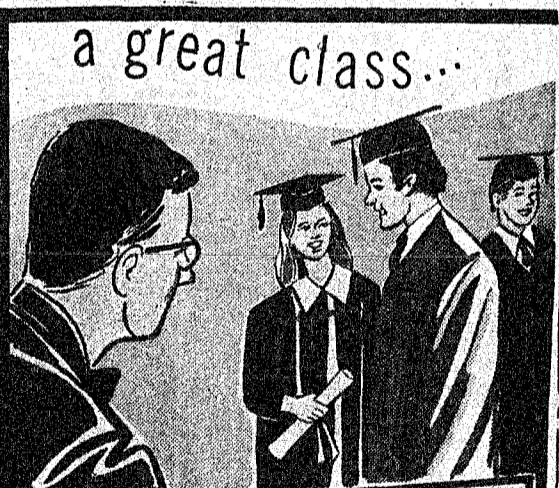

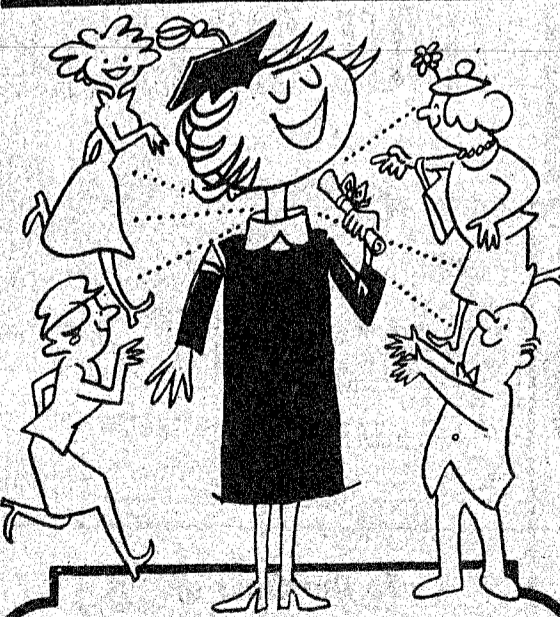

Cheese, Butter Give-Aways

Blamed for Market Decline

COLLEGE STATION- The U. S. Department of Agriculture will be giving away less cheese due to a drop in commercial sales.

In ordering a 52-percent cutback in the cheese give-away program that was

started about a year ago, Secretary of Agriculture John Block cited two reasons - needy people who qualify for free cheese normally buy their own and some people who are not so needy receive free cheese rather than buy it.

"Evidence that the cheese give-away program was hurting cheese sales started showing up during the last quarter of 1982,"

"During that quarter commercial sales were down 8 percent from a year earlier. But the real shocker came last February when commercial sales were down a staggering 29 percent from February 1982."

The USDA has imposed a 50 cents per hundredweight tax on milk products to try to discourage increased production which has been hurting the dairy industry in recent years.

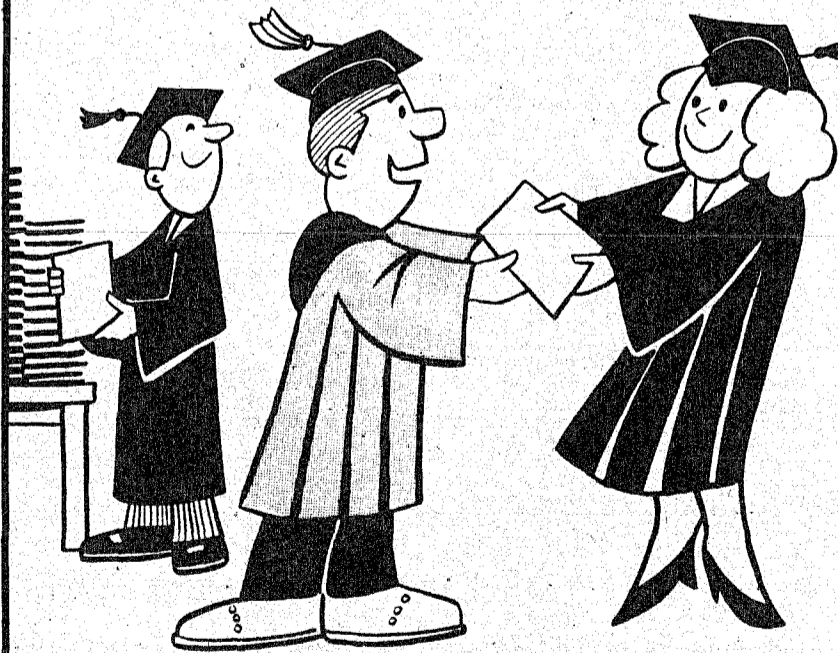

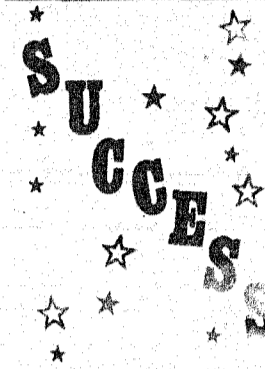

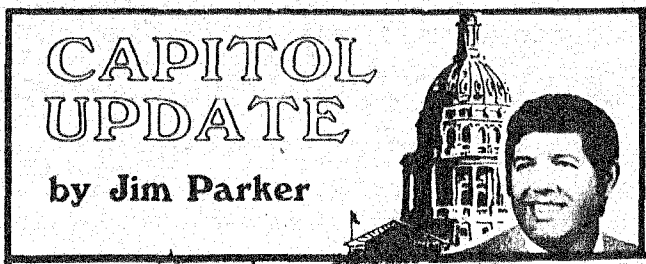

Since my office received such a volume of phone calls and mail on the pari-mutuel betting issue this past week, I feel it is appropriate to once again speak to you on that issue. The pari-mutuel betting bill came before the House on May 18th with both proponents and opponents agreeing that each side would make statements supporting their respective positions on the bill and that a motion to table would then be called for a vote. A motion to table, if it prevails, is equivalent to death of the legislation.

Both sides spoke very eloquently and, in fact,

very persuasively, and then a vote was taken. The vote was 74 opposed to tabling and 72 in favor. Under the Rules of the House a voice verification can be requested and this was, in fact, done. Three members claimed their voting machines did not work. After verification, the vote was 75 to table, 73 to not table, which of course, effectively killed the legislation, leaving us with the significant fact that pari-mutuel betting, at least this biennium, is dead.

While I feel no obligation to explain my vote, you have a right to know how I voted and why. But first let me hasten to say

that I do not perceive the issue as being a vote for or against pari-mutuel betting because, with the referendum provision built in, each or you, who had an interest to go to the polls in November, 1984, could make your own decision as to whether you did or did not want pari-mutuel wagering in the state of Texas. On an issue of this importance I will always be hard pressed to make your decision for you when there is a means readily available for you to make your own.

Additionally, I thought the significance and importance of the issue was such that it needed to be fully debated by all members and all potential good points and potential bad points should be fully explored.

As I am sure you are able to determine from having read this far, I voted "no" to table the legislation, and I honestly cannot tell you that I know how I would have voted after full debate and after examining any amendments that may have been placed on the bill. So you may better make a decision as to how to approach my candidacy in the future, I will tell you that I was leaning strongly in favor, not of pari-mutuel wagering, but in favor of voting "yes" on the bill so the people's voice could be heard through a statewide referendum process.

Many of you from church groups expressed your very strong feelings to me and I am not wholly unmindful of your ability, as so many of you stated, to defeat me in the next election; but I would think even you who were most adamant would not want someone representing you who would crumble and melt away because of pressures that may be brought to bear. While I know that it is impossible to satisfy all of my 95,999 constituents on any given issue, it is my intention to continue to maintain my personal integrity in the face of any conceivable pressure, so that in the future, even if a vote such as this should cause me to fail in my effort to be re-elected, each of you might say that "I sure didn't like Jim Parker, but I really had to respect his integrity."

Thank you for whatever understanding you can extend to me in this most difficult position. See you next week.

Photos or whatever can be used on these pages... it is up to the buyer of the page. These are selling for \$100 per page, \$50 for one-half page; and \$25 for one-fourth page. We are including this type of page in the book due to requests and also to add a means to pay our extra expenses on publication of the book.

We are also selling BUSINESS PAGES... these are histories of businesses that wish to be included in the history book. As this is a form of advertising, we felt that they should be paid for... the prices of these pages are the same as the Memorial Pages. These two types of pages are the only ones that we are charging for; we are also not putting a limit on the length of stories, but reserve the right to edit if they are too lengthy, depending on the final size of the book. We also want to include as many photographs as possible, and there is no charge for photos, either.

The contents of the book is working out to this effect: General History of the County Towns, School and Community history (many of these are inseparable), church histories, odds and ends of our history, family histories, memorials and business pages. There will also be a concise index, list (with addresses) of contributors of stories, and what ever else we feel that the book needs as the book develops.

The deadline for the family stories is June 15. Many of you will meet this deadline, but some have needed more time or have just learned of this project and need time. But the bulk of the histories will be in by June 15, it appears. From time to time, members of the commission that are working on this phase of the book, will be busy proofreading, typing and retyping.

Also, additional stories on churches, schools, etc., that have not yet been worked up will be completed and checked. Hopefully, by early September, all of this work will be completed and by late September the entire work will be in the publisher's hands. He will then set the type, print, and bind the book and it should be ready to deliver during the first quarter of 1984. This is the way it should
