Summer Swimming Lessons Starting Here Next Week

Santa Anna children will again be included in the summer swimming program at Coleman, with transportation provided for two groups during the next two weeks.

Debbie Dean, local chairman, will be driving a bus to Coleman each weekday from Tuesday, June 7 through Friday, June 17, for beginner and advanced beginner students. The bus will leave the local school at 10:45 a.m. The beginners will be in class at the Coleman Municipal Pool from 11 - 12 noon, and the advanced beginners from 12 noon until 1 p.m.

Children planning to attend must have their registration form and release signed before leaving for

class on June 7. The cost will be 75 cents per day to cover the cost of instruction and transportation expenses. At least one adult will be needed to ride the bus each day, and volunteers are asked to contact Mrs. Dean in advance of the day they can accompany the group.

Also on the schedule at Coleman are classes in advanced lifesaving, kindergarten and pre-school classes from June 20 through July 1. Cost will be 50 cents per day for the students, plus 25 cents per day for the adult that is required to be in the pool with each pre-schooler enrolled. No transportation will be provided from Santa Anna for this series of classes.

Ronnie Lane is coordinator of the

Coleman recreation and swimming program and can furnish more information if needed.

Grain Harvest Delayed By Weekend Rainfall

The grain harvest in the community is on again - off again venture, as combines are in competition with the rain showers that have fallen in the area.

The first load of grain brought to the Alderman-Cave Co. elevator in Santa Anna came in Tuesday, May 24, from the Rockwood area.

Ricky Abernathy had the first load of oats from the Phillips place north of Rockwood, testing a fine 36 pounds per bushel. The yield was approximately 38 bushels per acre, according to Abernathy.

The same day a load of wheat was brought in by Freddie Dodson from

the James Eubank place just west of town. The wheat was also of good quality and of good yield. Other grain was brought in at a steady rate through the week where farmers were escaping the rain showers as they fell in different areas.

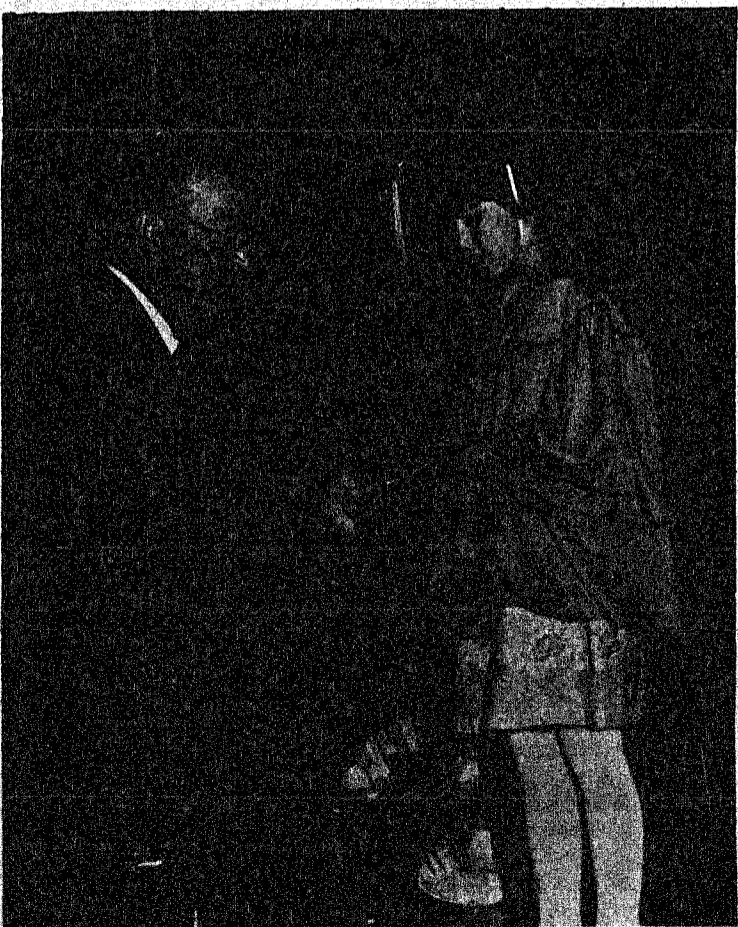
All the oats purchased at the local facility are being trucked to Winters to be processed by the company. Wheat is being loaded into railroad cars for shipment to Galveston for import.

Quite a lot of oats have been harvested at this time, but there is still much of the wheat to be cut as it ripens and the weather clears.

Danny Kellar, who succeeded Wristen as manager of the Cooperative, presented the gifts to the honorees.

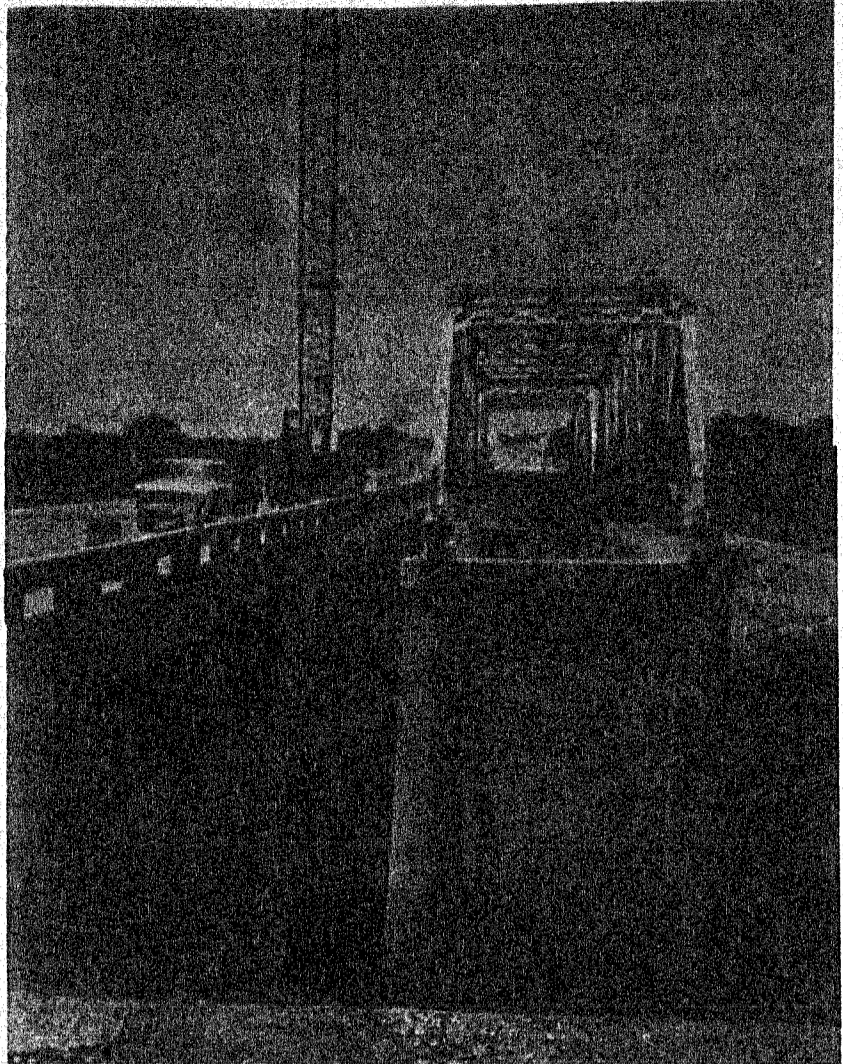
June 1 Rites Are Held For V. Rasberry

50-year-old Structure is Replaced A New Bridge on the River

While the whole world is paying homage to the New York Brooklyn Bridge, with marvelous history of 100 years of service, we are on the Colorado River, three and one-half miles south of Rockwood, on Highway 283, where the "New Bridge" of 1932 is being dismantled, after a mere fifty years of use.

Modern day construction people can't understand how this bridge was built with all the know-how to stand in perfect condition, considering fifty years ago was practically the "Dark Ages," compared to the advanced knowledge of cars, tractors, trucks, men on the moon and now - the

space shuttle.

A huge crane lifts the steel beams on a truck to be salvaged -- they will not be used again on bridges. All goes as scrap metal.

The firm of Allen Keller & Company of Fredericksburg has built the structure. Deltor Kozielski is foreman of all the concrete work.

Superintendent over all of the project is Raymond Duecker; Neil Hudson is Project Inspector. The Engineer of the project is Wesley Heald.

The new bridge is a beautiful structure. Inside measurements are 40 feet wide; the old bridge was 22 feet wide.

There is no steel in the new structure - it is all pre-stressed concrete beams, of two units with 115 feet span and one unit of 120 feet. Length of the bridge is 350 feet long, with concrete railings.

The new bridge is two feet lower than the old one. The beautiful old "senior bridge" is estimated to have 460,200

pounds of steel in the beams and the three overhead spans. The new bridge has no steel in it.

Remember September 1936, when the water got up over the floor of the bridge -- a little over nine feet -- and up to the door knobs of "Movnomor", the little home of Mr. and Mrs. John Hunter on the north, in Coleman County.

Linnie Box was just beginning her 50 years operating a cafe in Rockwood.

We take off our hats to the nice people who have put in so many hours on this project; after working about a year, the tentative date for completion is August or September.

Traffic is now using the new bridge to cross the Colorado River.

These changes will be made beginning with the 1983-84 school year.

The TEA found no evidence of misuse of funds in the Chapter I Program.

The Santa Anna ISD welcomes visits from the TEA. They always furnish constructive criticism that helps the school district move toward a better education for the children.

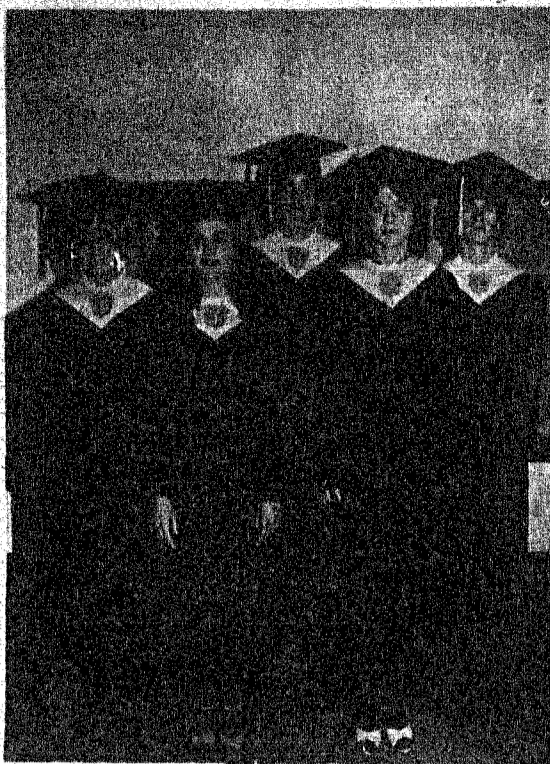

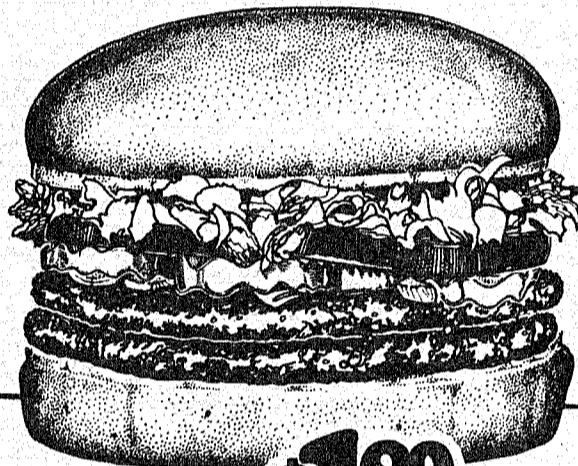

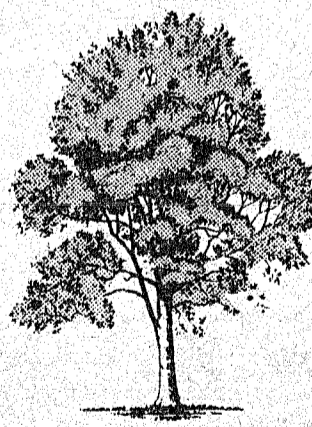

Historical Notes

This week I am not going to talk about the progress of the Coleman County History Book - but next week, I will run a listing of those who are working on various schools and churches. If you would like to write up something in any of these areas, let me know. There are still quite a few schools and churches that need to be done.

Next Sunday a very important event will occur in Coleman. Open House at the new Coleman Library. For many years Coleman has been in need of more space, so the library could reach its full usefulness. Whether you read only fiction, or do research in any field... a library is needed. My particular area of interest is in genealogy and local history, so that area is what I am going to talk about.

One year and a half ago, the Mrs. J. A. B. Miller Public Library was designated a Texas Historic History Resource Center by the Texas Historical Foundation. This was due to the fact

that the Coleman Library had so many Texana books on its shelves, many of which are rare volumes.

The Coleman County Historical Commission is busy preparing a comprehensive book on the entire county and its people... it will be made up of general histories as well as family histories. These family histories are something that can only easily be worked up by that family. Much of the information contained in these stories are of an oral or memory nature, and it is likely that this will be the only place that these will ever be recorded. But this type of book does have limitations. Each of the articles in the book could probably be expanded into a book itself! But due to the size and range of the book, the stories must be told in brief. In some cases the write-up in this book has been condensed from a larger work on that family.

This brings into play an important part of the new library... a county archives. These archives will contain any and all information that can be found that relates to the Coleman County area. Microfilms of our old newspapers, cen-

suses, and tax rolls will be housed here, so that anyone wishing to find out more about their ancestors of Coleman County can do so. Many records are available at the Austin Archives, University of Texas Archives, Fort Worth Regional Branch of the General Services Administration, and others that are not available on the local level. We will try to place as many of these records back on the local level as possible for local research. Many records are mixed with many others, thus making them difficult to locate.

An example of this type of record has been donated to the archives by Randy Briscoe, 4007 Cordova, Austin, Texas 78759. Randy is the grandson of Mrs. J. A. Hunter of Coleman and has many relatives in this area. He is a professional genealogist and historical researcher, and if you need any research help of this nature, contact Randy. His donation to the local library consists of ten different files that he has abstracted and put together from collections at the Texas State Archives and the U. T. Barker History Center, both in

Austin. Examples of some of these files are: tales and sketches of Civil War Veterans taken from FRONTIER TIMES, CONFEDERATE VETERAN MAGAZINE, etc.; newspaper articles of the 1850's, 1860's and 1870's relating to Coleman County (mostly Austin papers); members of the West Texas Pioneer Roll as done by the Fort Worth Star Telegram in the 1930's; Adjutant General's Papers; Texas Rangers Indian Wars Pensions; C. L. Greenwood Collection; Scrapbook of Coleman County obituaries and biographical articles 1931-1940; summaries of the Coleman County Confederate Pensioners; and other miscellaneous records. This type of record will be of great help for anyone interested in early Coleman County... Randy said it took him about six years to accumulate this information from his research.

We are also receiving other donations to the archives, but this one really is a beautiful help.

In case any of you are wondering about the identification of the old school that ran several weeks ago for identification... we are still doing research as it has thus far been identified as the old Voss School and also as the old Brown Ranch School. I will let you know.
