Two Boys Teams Compete This Weekend

SA Leader in Class A Tennis

Competing in the State Class A Tennis Tournament is getting to be a habit for Santa Anna High School entries - and for one of the two boys doubles teams in 1983.

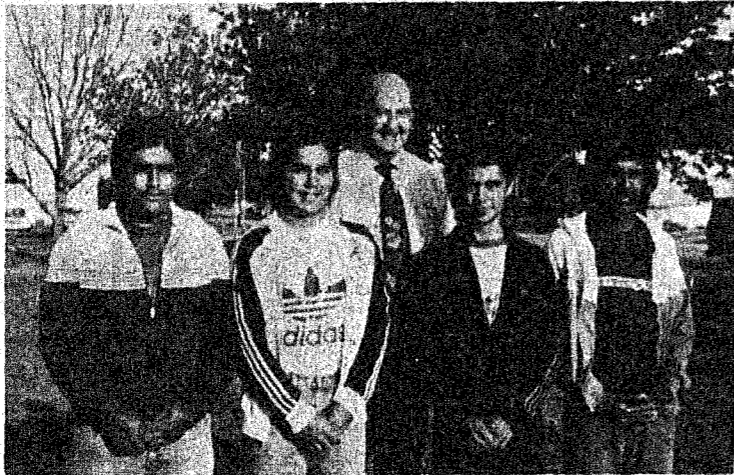
Paul Vasquez and Tommy DeLeon won a place in the state meet last week by defeating their younger brothers, Johnny Vasquez and Chris DeLeon, in the Region II tennis meet in Abilene.

Both doubles teams will be in the state meet this weekend in Austin - the second consecutive year for both Santa Anna doubles teams to advance to the state meet.

At Abilene last Tuesday, Tommy and Paul defeated the Aspermont duo 6-1, 6-2 in the semi-finals, the won over their teammates 6-4, 6-1 in the finals.

Johnny and Chris defeated the Knox City entries in the semi-finals 6-2, 2-6, 7-5.

Mike Hartman, who was teamed with Paul Vasquez last year to win the runner-up spot in the State Meet, lost out in the regional meet Tuesday. Team mate Doug Warnock was

Tommy and Junior Salazar were State Tennis Doubles Champions for 1982.

Coach R. C. Smith has had entries at the State Meet for nine con-

secutive years, and won several championships. Smith was chosen Texas Tennis Coach of the Year in 1982 for his outstanding work with the high school teams.

Paul and Tommy will meet the team from Caddo Mills in the opening round, while Chris and Johnny play entries from D'Hannis. Games at the Intermural Tennis Courts start at 9 a.m.

Semi-final round will start at 3

p.m. and finals will begin Saturday morning at 9:00 at Pennick Tennis Courts at Memorial Stadium on the University Campus.

Karen Smith and Robin Hartman were eliminated from the State Tennis Tournament Friday when they lost in the semi-finals to the Anton entries, 6-4, 6-1. The Anton girls lost to Fort Davis in the finals.

The Santa Anna duo defeated the Hutto doubles team 6-3, 6-4 in the opening match Friday morning.

It was Karen's second trip to the state meet, having played with Juliann Jones last year. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Wetsel.

Robin's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Hartman. Both girls are juniors this year.

Another Santa Anna girl who took part in the State Track Meet last weekend was Brenda Jackson, daughter of Mrs. Judy Jackson, who competed in the long jump event.

Brenda failed to place by just one-fourth inch, with the third place medal won by 16'10". The first place winner leapt 18'2" for the Class A Championship.

Competition was strong in the event, with eight girls from the state competing in the meet.

The new Santa Anna City Park has been officially named, after several months of discussion and selecting from approximately 15 names submitted from local residents.

The park is the Gary James Memorial Park, named to honor Santa Anna's Viet Nam casualty, who died in action May 29, 1967.

The Park Board, with approval of Santa Anna City Council, selected the name as a tribute to the Santa Anna native, the son of Mrs. Madie James.

In a special ceremony Saturday, May 7, Mrs. James and her family, Dixie James Alvey of San Angelo,

Kelly Cammack Malaer and son, Ray and Ann Owen were present with members of the Park Board to designate the facility.

A special dedication ceremony is planned this summer with the public to be invited.

Santa Anna Student to Attend Texas Energy Science Symposium

Science students from across the state will converge on the University of Texas at Austin May 31 - June 3 for the annual Texas Energy Science Symposium for high schools.

The event, in its 23rd year, is expected to attract more than 400

students and their teachers who will hear scientists and engineers discuss energy related topics.

Selected to attend from Santa Anna High School is James Culpepper, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lacy Culpepper, and a senior at Santa Anna High

School. Science instructor Scott Beaver will accompany James to the meeting.

Ten investor-owned companies, including West Texas Utilities Company, are members of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation which jointly is sponsoring the symposium at the University.

Participants will spend two afternoons touring the science laboratories at the University, including those which conduct experiments sponsored by the Foundation in the Thermonuclear (fusion) research.

Charles Wetsel, local manager at the Santa Anna West Texas Utilities Company office, said, "Our company is privileged to help sponsor this event which has proven a great benefit to the young people who have participated in years past."

"By attending, students and teachers will receive first-hand information from some of the most authoritative energy experts in the nation. It is truly an educational experience," he added.

The Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation was created in 1957 for the advancement of knowledge of energy, particularly nuclear energy, through scientific and educational activities. Its research efforts are presently directed towards controlling fusion reactions through programs being carried out at the University of Texas at Austin laboratories with the ultimate goal of using energy from nuclear fusion for the generation of electricity.

A dance Saturday night will be held for those attending, their families and guests.

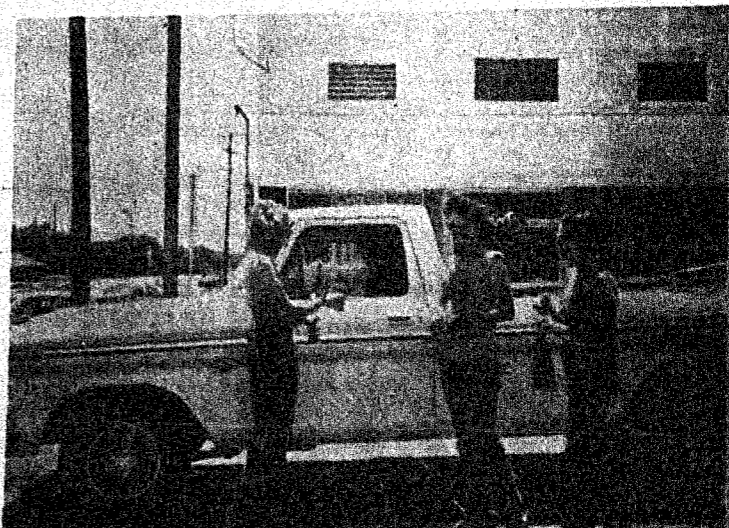
Sunday a memorial service will be held during the morning.

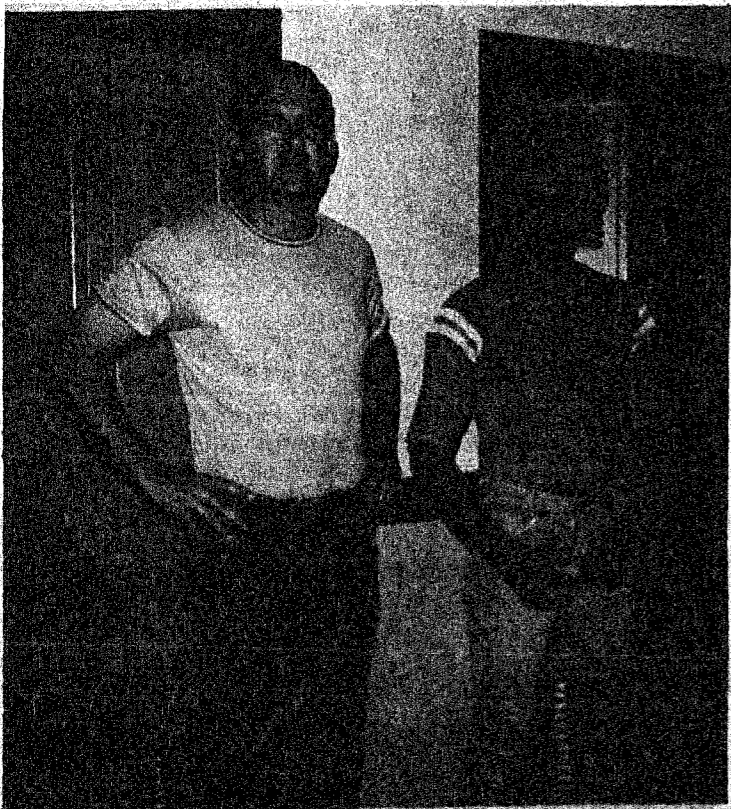

Those making the donations are Tom and Sue Newman and A. L. and Doris (Newman) Freeman of Fort Worth.

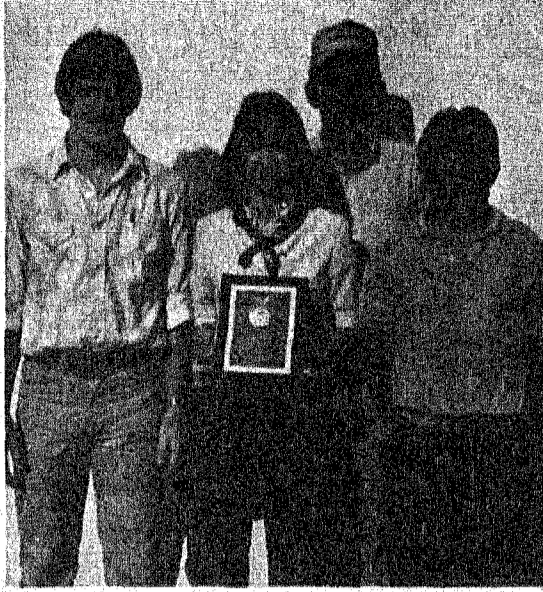
Grass Fires Extinguished Friday By VFD

Santa Anna Volunteer Firemen had a busy afternoon Friday, extinguishing numerous small grass fires along the railroad right-of-way.

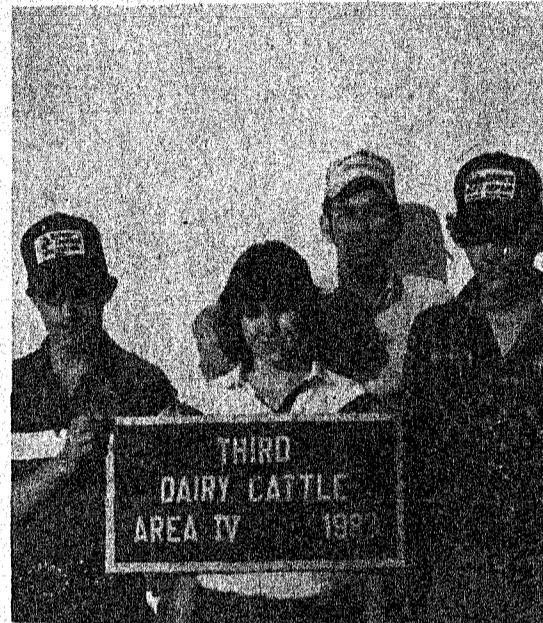

Coleman ISD Slates May 21 Bond Election

Voters in the Coleman Independent School District will go to the polls Saturday, May 21, to vote on a proposed bond election.

The Board of Trustees has proposed the \$2,900,000 bond election to build an elementary school for grades kindergarten through five, and a cafeteria.

The proposed bond election will also provide for some renovation at the South Ward School, which will house the Junior High students upon completion of the building program. The structure was originally built for the junior high, but when the new high school was completed, students were moved to the old high school building.

The old building at West Ward, built in 1908, was abandoned at the beginning of the school year. At that time the second grade was moved to the South Ward campus, creating crowded conditions in both West and South Ward schools.

If the proposal passes and the new building is approved, the campuses at West Ward and Junior High will be abandoned. This would decrease the campuses from four to three and bring about more centralization for all the student body.

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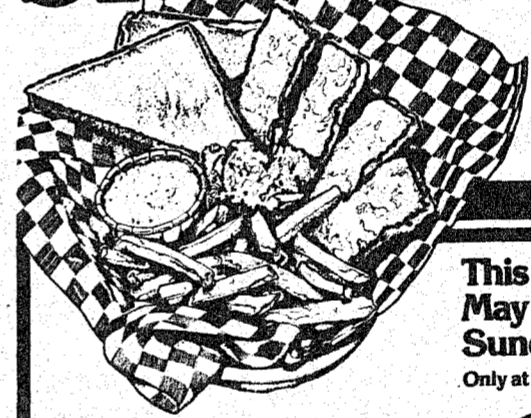

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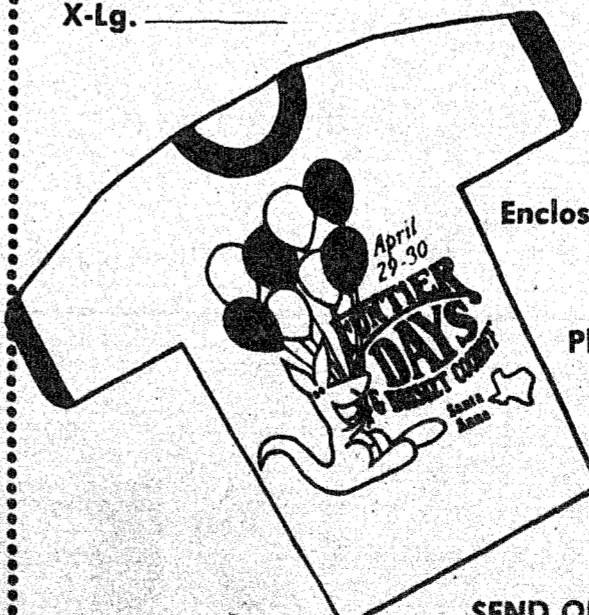
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Santa Anna a Stopping Place for Fields Family

A family of modern-day Gypsies visited our community this week -- traveling through the country by wagon in a completely "laid back" lifestyle.

Mike and Marilyn Fields and their two daughters, Fawn, five, and Sedona, three, are generally enroute to Arizona, taking their time to enjoy the scenery and people as they trek westward.

The young couple traveled to Texas "like anyone else" and were with relatives at Carlton (near Hamilton) while they gathered horses and gear for the trip. A homemade wagon built on a cotton trailer is their "home away from home," pulled by a matched pair of Belgian draft horses they purchased at Weatherford. Also in their remuda are two saddle horses, several Shetland ponies and a small mule.

Fields relaxed on the narrow porch of the vehicle and visited with

passersby as his wife -- in truly women's lib fashion -- went about the job of unsaddling and staking horses in the pasture near the highway.

Listing numerous prior occupations ranging from a fireman and dairyman to farrier and horse trainer, Fields said they decided several months ago to get away from the "Rat race" of business and spend as much time as they chose on the road. They are financed or sponsored by no one, so do not have any schedule or deadlines to meet. Fields picks up aluminum cans for resale -- using a stick from horseback for the chore.

Pony rides and picture taking (with Indian or frontier costumes available) is another source of income for the family. A covered wagon being pulled behind had to be abandoned when it could not survive the long trip.

Mrs. Fields said the most difficult part of the trip has been the hard seat

on the wagon. There are few amenities, with kerosene lamps for light and water in buckets and containers for cooking and bathing.

The couple have met many people and encountered only friendly folks on the trip. They were very gracious, and said anyone was welcome to join them along the way -- as long as they furnished their own food!

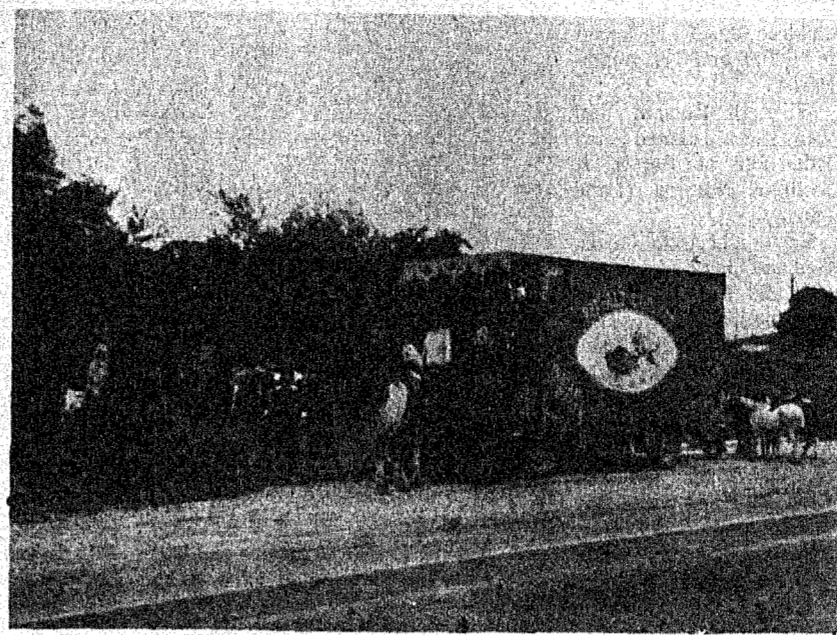
The family spend Monday night at Bangs and Tuesday night at the Co-op Gin lot in Santa Anna, traveling about ten miles per day.

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CAPITOL UPDATE

By Jim Parker



This past week has been the most difficult and frustrating week of the Session for me because of the action of the House in regard to the Appropriations bill. Of course, the Appropriations bill is the legislation that dictates the spending of state dollars over the biennium.

The bill that was passed was totally unpalatable to me for several reasons, all of which I think are valid. In the first place, the bill, and the solvency thereof, is predicated upon three items, at least, that may or may not actually come into being. The items are the \$220M amount derived from a reduction in the state's contribution to the Teacher Retirement System, (I have supported reduction if the funds generated would be used in the education field.); the 'speed up' of tax collections by the Comptroller; and

passage of Senate Leedom's bills increasing fees to users of state services. As I say, none of these enumerated matters may come to pass and I think it is bad business for the State of Texas to spend money they may get.

Another good and sufficient reason for opposition to the Appropriations bill is the fact that because of the change in the local fund assignment formula, local school districts, statewide, will have to make up an additional \$122M out of the only source they can, ad valorem taxes. I cannot for the life of me see why 82 members voted for such a measure, realizing the outcome, but can only conclude that they either did not know what effect it would have or did not care. In spite of the efforts of 50 of us who voted against the Appropriations bill, I fear most members simply did not know what they were

doing. Finally, the Appropriations bill simply is not adequate to meet the needs of the state. It is much like a good, conscientious carpenter who is asked to build a house but is only given three-fourths enough lumber. He can conceivably build the house, but, regardless of how skilled he may be, he cannot do the job he was commissioned to do in a satisfactory manner.

I think I have probably worked harder this past week than any other time in my 38 years and it sure leaves a bitter taste to have worked so hard, talked so long, and tried to move so many people and be ultimately unsuccessful. I take no pride in the outcome but I do have a certain amount of pride in the fact that a number of us worked so hard for what was right, proper and just.

Thanks for all the news given me this week. Looking forward to being with you this time next week.

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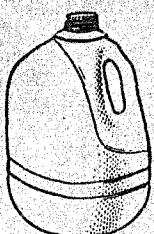
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
