Former residents of the Buffalo Community and former students at the Buffalo School will be meeting this weekend at the Civic Center for their annual reunion and homecoming.

Lonnie Holland of Brownwood, president of the organization, has coordinated activities that will get underway with registration at 9:30 Saturday morning. Visitation and entertainment will be provided during the day Saturday, with sandwiches and other concessions provided by the Campfire Girls at noon and during the day.

A barbecue supper will be served at 6 p.m. that evening, and a dance will follow at 9 p.m.

Sunday activities will begin with a memorial program and meeting at 9:30 a.m. The program will be dedicated to the late Mrs. Tom (Anna Belle) Hays, a former resident and long-time teacher at the school.

The noon meal on Sunday will be catered, and visitation will continue during the afternoon.

Other officers of the organization include Carl Pennington of Bangs, vice president; Sybil Gilliam Nichols of Casper, Wyoming,

secretary-treasurer; and Pete Curry of Lake Brownwood, historian.

Committee chairman are Leland Thompson, arrangements; Odie and Jackie Griffith of Coleman, food; Lucile Wylie, registration; and Adolph Kelley, entertainment.

Former residents have been asked to write a brief resume of their life since leaving the Buffalo community, with these and many pictures and other mementoes to be on display. Also names of those deceased during the past year will be included in the memorial service.

All local people are invited to attend the event and take part in the community and school get-together.

The Buffalo School, formed by the consolidation of several smaller community schools, graduated its last seniors in 1947. The elementary school continued in operation a few more years before consolidating with Santa Anna and Bangs.

Cheese, Butter Distribution Slated Here Next Thursday

Families of low income in Coleman County will again be eligible for free cheese and butter, as another distribution is take place next Thursday, June 30.

Thirty cases containing 180 five-pound packages of processed cheese, and six cases, containing 192 pounds of butter, will be given away here.

The City of Santa Anna will be in charge of the distribution which will

be held this time at the Civic Center (former Armory) at 1 p.m.

Each person getting the free products must furnish a social security number and sign a statement confirming their eligibility. Lists will be kept so that there is no duplication.

The cheese and butter give-away has been one of the most popular programs in many years, and hundreds of local people have benefitted from it.

The Santa Anna Eagles T-Ball team won the County Championship, defeating the Owls and the Colts in their final games. On June 17 they won 25

8 over the Coleman Owls, and Tuesday night defeated the Coleman Colts 21-3. The Eagles ended the season with a perfect 12-0 record.

The two Santa Anna minor league ball teams, the Tigers and the Oilers, will have a shoot-out for the county championship Thursday (today). The Tigers, coached by Lane Guthrie and David Huggins, were undefeated to win the first-half championship, and the Oilers, coached by John Rendon and Dale Bradley, were undefeated in the second half of play.

The two local teams met Monday night in a regular game, with the Oilers winning 23-9 to end the schedule. The Tigers had won over the Oilers earlier in the season.

All local ball fans are urged to be at Little League field at 6 p.m. today to watch the two fine teams. The minor league is for boys aged 9 to 12 who are not in Little League. There are five teams in the county competing this year.

Mets Still Winning

The Mets Little League ball team ended the first half of play in a tie for the championship with the Coleman Giants. The Mets have a season record of 9-3, and in the first half are tied with the Coleman team with 6-2.

The Mets will have their play-off game for the first half title Thursday night (tonight) in Coleman at 8 p.m.

Just into the second half of play, the Mets are 3-1 and are tied with the Dodgers and Giants for the championship.

On Monday night the losers of the Mets-Giants game will play the Dodgers, with the winner of that game to play the first half winners on Saturday, July 2. All games will be in Coleman.

Campfire Entry Included Essay

WORK NOW, PLAY LATER

The following is the essay that accompanied the Camp Fire Girls entry for the Beautify Texas Council contest:

A park for our community. Indeed it was a good idea! A dream of many years is becoming a reality with citizens and organizations working together. Our Bluebird and Adventure groups of Camp Fire wanted to help.

Since our Camp Fire groups are made up of younger children, our thoughts immediately turned to ideas of constructive playground equipment. What type equipment would be enjoyed most by children coming to the park, yet be safe, maintenance free, and permanent? Swings, seesaws, balance poles, triangular tires, and an unusual four slide tower seemed appropriate. Materials had to be located and funds raised in order to carry out our project.

In May 1982, leaders planned a Country Music Jamboree to raise the needed funds. Approximately twenty Bluebirds and Adventurers sold advance tickets door-to-door and also passed out advertisement sheets. Mothers of members baked cakes for an auction at the Jamboree. Ten restaurants, local and out-of-town, donated fifteen meals to be given away in drawings. Three bands, all out-of-town, donated their time and talent. Sandwiches and cold drinks were sold by the children. A successful fundraiser it was. Now we could begin! Our community is small,

about 1500 population, so it was necessary to contact individuals in neighboring towns for materials. We would construct as much of our planned project as we could secure materials for. Companies donated oilfield pipe, power poles, welding machines, winch trucks, paint supplies, and pipe cutting.

Materials were readied, construction would begin in July. There would be enough to complete our project. Fathers of members and other interested individuals donated their time to weld the equipment. It was put in place; leaders, members, mothers, and fathers painted it. Money from the Jamboree bought swing parts, cement, and other items not donated.

This equipment was constructed of materials and in a manner that it would be safe for everyone to enjoy, as well as durable for a long period of time. Maintenance will be limited to mostly painting, which will be kept up by the Camp Fire groups. All equipment was cemented in the ground.

This playground project was completed in September 1982. However, a sandbox of railroad crossties with a shade roof will be added soon. More equipment will be added in time.

The Bluebirds and Adventurers have also been active in other areas of the park. They have planted trees in February and March, 1983; five pecan, one weeping willow, and one fruitless plum. Two rose bushes and two flowering shrubs were planted. In April 1983, we planted a cactus garden in

the park. Local citizens donated rocks and plants. Gravel for ground cover was donated by an out-of-town company. We roamed the countryside for attractive plants growing native.

It is obvious to the community that we not only have a place for children and adults to enjoy, but a realization that through hard work and efforts of the entire community working together, we can make our community a beautiful and better place to live. The values of 'working together to achieve' can also be rewarding to these young people. They can be proud of what their Camp Fire organization has and will continue to add to this community.

We do not have a sponsor, as we strive to be a self-supporting organization through various fund-raising activities.

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County Jail Escapee Captured in Santa Anna

Coleman County and central Texas law officers were busy early this week searching for a County Jail escapee who with two others broke out of the Coleman facility Saturday night.

James Carl Scott, 26, was apprehended about 3:30 p.m. Tuesday in the southwest part of Santa Anna.

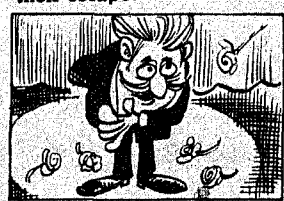
Scott, who was recently indicted for burglary and as an habitual criminal, escaped from the Coleman County Jail along with Harold D. Purcell Jr. and Billy Wayne Slaton, both 18.

Purcell and Slaton were arrested in Coleman about noon Sunday and returned to jail.

The hunt centered in Santa Anna, Scott's home town, and officers knew the young man was in town the day following the escape.

Sheriff H. F. Fenton Jr. said Wednesday morning that Scott will have an additional charge of escape on his record and will be taken before the Grand Jury again.

The three were reported to have cut their way through the floor of their jail cell into the lower level living quarters to make their escape.

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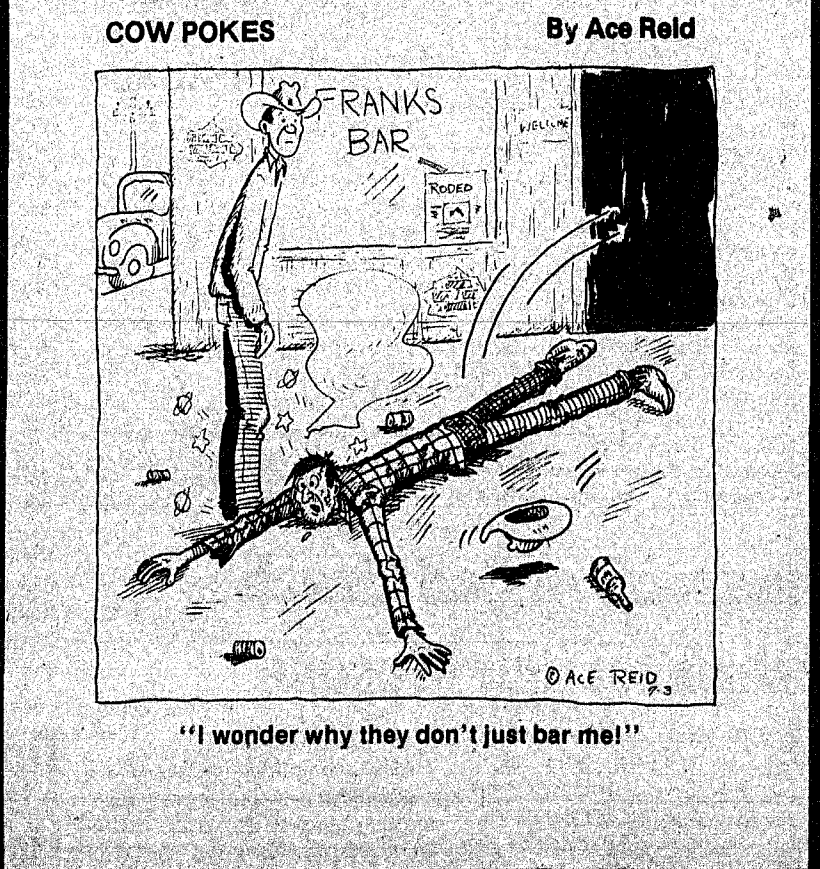
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TABS Test Results Listed For Local School

In February of this year, the Santa Anna schools administered the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABS) to students in the ninth, fifth and third grades as a part of a state-wide program of student evaluation. The tests measure basic skills in math, reading and writing.

The ninth grade math test measures eleven different objectives as well as giving a total test mastery. Eighty percent of the students mastered the math test as a whole. The highest mastery of the individual objectives were 100 percent mastery in add-subtract and multiply-divide; 95 percent mastery in distance-location on maps and interpret charts-graphs; 85 percent mastery on use of decimals and dollar amount-correct change; 80 percent on fractions-mixed numbers and measurement units. There was 70 percent mastery of written problems; 60 percent mastery of ratio-proportion-percent; and 50 percent mastery of personal finance problems.

The ninth grade reading tests measures eleven objectives and shows 84 percent mastery of the total test. Areas of strong mastery are 100 percent mastery in use of reference skills; 89 percent in perceive cause-effect; and 84 percent in follow written directions. There was a 79 percent mastery in sequence events; evaluate information; distinguish fact, non-fact; draw conclusions; and use maps and charts. Seventy-four percent of the students mastered generalizations; 68 percent mastered main idea; and 58 percent mastered parts of a book.

The ninth grade writing tests consists of one part of six objectives and one part in which the student writes a composition. The composition is scored from 0 to 4 with 4 being the best score. Handwriting was also evaluated from the writing sample. One hundred percent of the students mastered both spelling and commonly used forms; 95 percent mastered capitalization and sentence structure; 79 percent mastered punctuation and 58 percent mastered English usage. On the writing sample, 42 percent scored a 3 and 58 percent scored a 2. All the students showed acceptable handwriting.

FIFTH GRADE TEST
On the fifth grade math test, addition showed 100 percent mastery; graphs and division, 98 percent mastery; equivalent fractions, 95 percent; units of

measure and order whole numbers, 93 percent. Subtraction, division and written problems, plus-minus were mastered by 88 percent; geometric terms, figures and place value, 65 percent; and written problems, multiply and divide, 58 percent.

On the fifth grade reading test, 100 percent of the students mastered use context clues; 95 percent mastered use index; 90 percent on following written directions; and 88 percent on recall facts, details and identity of character feelings. Also 86 percent mastered use maps and charts; 81 percent on sequence events, distinguish fact, non-fact, and draw conclusions; 76 percent on predict outcomes; and 57 percent on main idea.

On fifth grade writing test, 100 percent of the students mastered both capitalization and commonly used forms; 98 percent mastered spelling; 95 percent sentence structure; and 81 percent correct English usage. Sixty percent mastered punctuation. On the writing sample, seven percent received a 4; 33 percent a 3; and 60 percent a 2. All of the students showed acceptable handwriting.

THIRD GRADE TESTS
On the third grade math test, 100 percent of the students mastered fractional parts; 97 percent mastered written problems and values of money; 94 percent mastered addition, complete number patterns and multiplication; and 82 percent mastered subtraction. Units of measure were mastered by 76 percent; and 74 percent mastered order whole numbers.

On the third grade writing, 100 percent of the students mastered follow written directions and phonic analysis; 97 percent mastered context clues and recognize words by sight; 94 percent word structures; 90 percent recall facts and details; 81 percent sequence events; and 77 percent mastered main idea.

Also on the reading test, all the students mastered spelling and capitalization; 97 percent mastered correct English usage; 94 percent sentence structure; and 84 percent punctuation.

On the writing sample, three percent of the students scored a 4; 13 percent a 3; and 81 percent a 2. Three percent scored 1. Acceptable handwriting was achieved by 97 percent of the students, while three percent received a hard to read rating.

Former Santa Annan Buried in Coleman

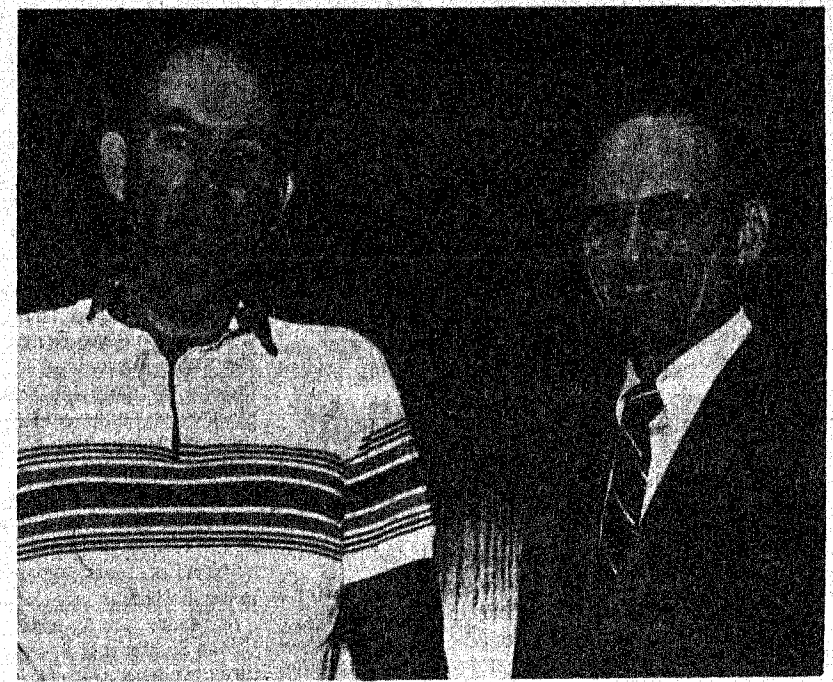
Bill Stiles, 74, of Coleman, a Santa Anna native and former resident of the community, died Thursday, June 16, in Scott & White Hospital in Temple. Funeral services were held at Henderson Funeral Chapel in Coleman Saturday, June 18, with burial in the Coleman Cemetery.

The Rev. Gary Boyd, pastor of Coleman First Baptist Church, officiated at the services.

He was born in Santa Anna March 26, 1909, the son of Adam and Ella (Collier) Stiles and was a graduate

of Santa Anna High School. He married Alyene McElrath March 26, 1935 in Coleman. He was a retired distributor for Gandy's Dairy Products and a member of the Baptist Church.

Green Thumb Workers Cited in Communities

Green Thumb workers in Texas were given special recognition on June 1 when Governor Mark White designated Texas Farmers Union - Senior Texans Employment Program Day in Texas. The special recognition was for the almost 2,000 hard-working older Texans who comprise the Green Thumb work force.

Citing the "meaningful employment opportunities" offered by the two senior employment programs since the early 1970's, the Governor signed a special proclamation during ceremonies at the Capitol.

Texas Farmers Union has sponsored the Green Thumb program since 1970. More than 17,000 enrollees nationwide include 1,059

in Texas. Coleman County has several Green Thumb workers, and in Santa Anna there are three, Letha Martin, Gene McSwane and Omi Slate. During the years the program has been held locally, several more persons have held part time jobs in community and school capacities.

The program places persons aged 55 and older with senior centers, schools, libraries and municipalities to furnish services that would not otherwise be available.

Mike Moeller, Texas Farmers Union president, who attended the signing ceremony, emphasized that the program is a true self-help program designed to serve those who have the most faith in the work ethic and in the nation itself: older workers.

CAPITOL UPDATE

by Jim Parker



Perhaps the second most misunderstood mechanism in state government is the committee process under which both the House and Senate operate. As an example that perhaps could be kept in mind in the course of this discussion - when Governor White went on television toward the end of the regular 68th Legislative session and made certain proposals concerning areas of taxation and the application of proposed new tax revenues to teacher pay, AFDC, etc., three or four of my constituents called or wrote and mildly criticized me for not immediately "voting for the Governor's plan".

Assuming a piece of legislation is favorably passed out of a House committee, it is referred to the Calendars Committee where it may be placed on one of several categories of daily House calendars. (The daily House calendar is the order in which bills are considered and acted upon by the full house.)

Again, however, a bill may be simply ignored and allowed to die because of the time factor. The individual member's ability to move his bill through this torturous process is usually proportional to his seniority and ability to do grievous damage to the individual legislation of persons whose cooperation he must have. Should a bill come out of Calendars and be acted on favorably by the House, it then goes to the Senate to go through generally the same committee process there; and, if successfully voted out of the Senate, would be referred to the Governor. If changes had been made from the House version, the bill would go to a conference committee made up of representatives and senators, to work out the differences, prior to being sent to the Governor to sign into law.

It is to the great benefit of the average Texas that there is almost an infinite variety of ways in which legislation can be killed and that the ratio of bills passed to bills introduced is very low. Most proposed legislation is, by broad definition, special interest in nature and is instituted to address some need, real or imagined, and it is good that most of it is "weeded out" in the course of the committee process.

As with any human endeavor the "rules of the game" are critical and while there exists a much greater necessity that I know the rules than that you know the rules, a basic working knowledge of the system will triple, or more, your ability to intelligently influence our system of government through your elected officials.

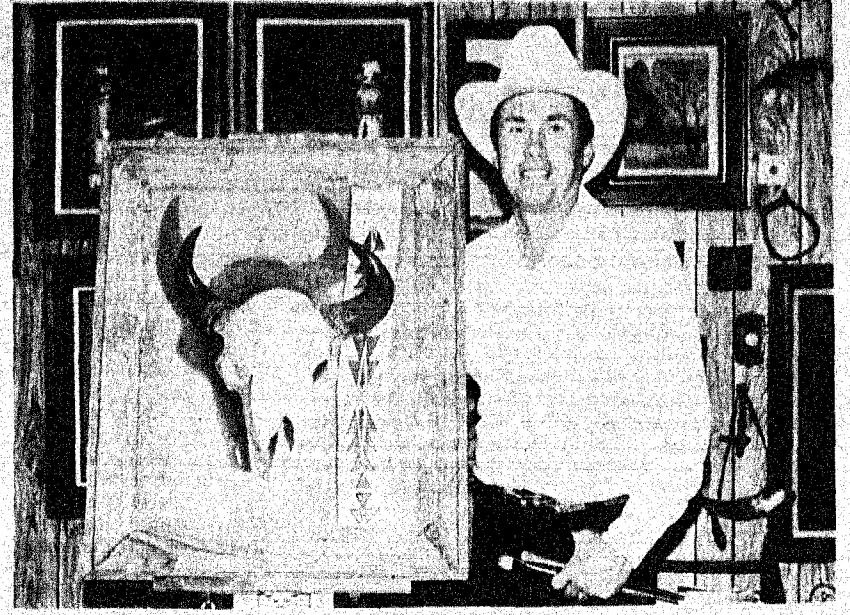

Social Security Notes

Cost of Living Adjustment Delayed

The automatic Social Security benefit increase based on the cost of living, previously effective each July, will be delayed for 6 months, to January 1984 because of a recent law designed to strengthen the Social Security system, Priscilla Ely, Social Security branch manager in Brownwood, said recently.

The purpose of the delay is to save the system money and help it regain its financial strength, Ely said. Largely because of economic conditions in recent years, Social Security has had an increasingly severe financial problem.

The changes in the law are designed to meet the problem both in the near-term and into the years after 2000. Other changes provided additional income to the system. They include:

The Social Security tax rate increase scheduled under previous law for 1985 will go into effect in 1984. The new 1984 rate will be 7.0 percent each for employees and employers, up from the previous rate of 6.7 percent. But, employees will receive a tax credit against 1984 taxes of 0.3 percent, which will be given when taxes

are deducted from wages. In effect, 1984 employee taxes will remain at the level set under previous law.

Also part of the tax rate increase scheduled for 1990 will go into effect in 1988.

Starting in 1984, the Social Security self-employment tax rate will be equal to the combined employee-employer tax on wages. This will be 14.0 percent for 1984. Previously the rate for self-employed people was about 1/2 times the employee rate.

Under the new law, self-employed people will receive a self-employment tax credit of 2.7 percent of self-employment income for 1984; 2.3 percent for 1985, and 2.0 percent for 1986-89. After 1989, these credits will be replaced with deductions designed to treat the self-employed in much the same manner as employees and employers are treated for Social Security and income tax purposes.

A free leaflet, "Social Security Strengthened" is available at the Brownwood Social Security office which tells about all the changes in Social Security.

Almost all Social Security matters can be handled

by phone. Medicare questions or filing of medicare claims can be taken care of by calling toll free 800-442-2620. You may file an application to establish your eligibility by calling 915-646-7533 in Brownwood.
