Activities, Events Planned for All Ages

July 4th Fun Fest Slated

The annual Fourth of July Fun Fest will be held at Coleman City Park on Monday, July 4.

Activities will get underway at 9 a.m. that morning and continue all day. A fireworks display at dark will conclude the event.

Activities on the schedule include a domino tournament for Senior Citizens, tennis meet, swim meet, car bash, dunking booth, balloon both, can crushing, toddler pageant, and horseshoe pitching contests for two age groups.

The adult-child tennis tournament will be held Sunday and Monday, July 3 and 4, with two divisions. The doubles teams may consist of a parent and child, regardless of age difference, but those entering with someone other than their child must have a 20-year age difference.

Entry fees will be \$6 per person. Advance entries are requested by Larry Boubel or Diana Dobbins of Coleman.

Trophies will be awarded winners in each division.

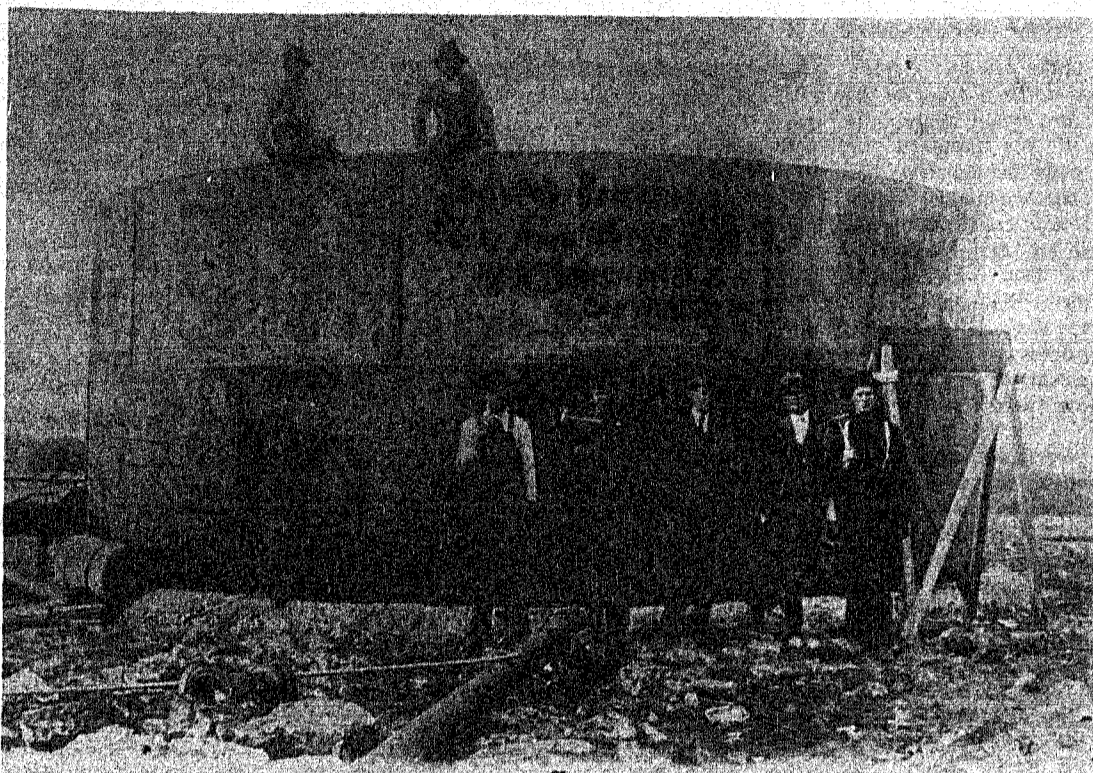

Hamilton Corporation Seeks Lease of Local Facility

An application to lease Ranger Park Inn nursing home in Santa Anna has been made by Texas Life Care, Inc. of Hamilton. The application was made to the Texas Health Facilities Commission, asking the commission to rule a certificate of need is not required for the acquisition by lease of Ranger Park Hospital and Ranger Park Inn, Inc.

Dr. Filemon Cabansag, owner of the facility, said Monday that the

Hamilton corporation owns one nursing home in that city, and is a rather new group. The acquisition of the hospital does not mean that it will be reopened, he said.

Dr. Cabansag said approval of applications by the state commission usually takes about 90 days.

Cabansag will continue to operate his clinic here, with patients requiring hospital care taken to Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital in Coleman.

Subscription Rates Increase

Subscription rates for the Santa Anna News will increase in two categories effective July 1. The new rates will also give only two categories - those within Coleman County and all others.

Subscription rates within Coleman County will increase to \$10.95 per year, and all others (outside Coleman County and outside Texas) will be \$11.95 per year.

The new rates, that amount to less than two cents per copy, will take care of increased postage and production costs.

months remaining on the term, the special election is required by law.

Deadline for filing for a place on the ballot is Wednesday, July 13. Forms for the candidate to complete are available at the office at High School any weekday between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

The place of the election and the election judge will be announced soon.

More Rainfall In Our Area

The Santa Anna area received more rainfall last week, with the official gauge showing one-quarter inch on Wednesday night, June 22.

In some parts of the community, as much as 1.5 inches was reported, benefitting pastures and gardens.

Not all parts of the community received rain last week, and more will be welcomed now that the grain harvest is completed.

More rain fell in the community early Tuesday morning, with an additional .25 inch recorded. High winds accompanied the storm but no damage has been reported.

July Fourth Holiday Set

Monday, July 4, will be a holiday for Santa Anna businesses, and most local stores are expected to be closed for the holiday.

There will be no service at the Santa Anna Post Office that day.

Distribution Slated Today For Cheese and Butter

Families of low income will again be eligible to receive surplus cheese and butter, the local distribution slated Thursday (today) at the Civic Center (Armory) starting at 1 p.m.

To be given away today will be 180 five-pound packages of cheese and 192 one-pound packages of butter, surplus from the government pro-

gram that also provides the dairy products for schools and institutions. Persons receiving the free goods must have their social security number and sign a statement that they are of low income and eligible to receive the cheese and butter. Pat Rutherford, City Secretary, is in charge of the distribution today.

tion on the dangers of driving during the peak holiday periods, hoping to hold the death toll as low as possible, Matthews added. He stated, "We have to have a voluntary compliance of the traffic laws, by the majority of the motoring public in order to be successful in reducing accidents."

"If drivers will just slow down and not drive if they have been consuming alcoholic beverages,

many of the deaths that occur on our streets and highways could be prevented." Captain Matthews concluded.

Joining in the notice is Colonel Jim Adams, DPS Director, who encourages motorists to report drunken drivers to the nearest police agency or Highway Patrol. Additional troopers will be used in areas deemed appropriate during the holiday weekend.

Holiday Safety Urged

Captain G. J. Matthews, Highway Patrol Commander of the Abilene District of Texas Department of Public Safety, said, "Excessive speed and driving while intoxicated will prove to be highway killers this July Fourth holiday weekend. Those two violations of the traffic law will in all probability, account for more than one-half of the estimated 49 traffic deaths during this holiday weekend," Captain Matthews said.

Last year, during the three-day July Fourth weekend, 64 traffic deaths were tabulated by the Texas Department of Public Safety. The lower estimate this year reflects the decline that has been experienced in traffic fatalities in 1983.

The DPS will again be conducting "Operation Motorcade" during this weekend. "Operation Motorcade" is a time when all fatal traffic accidents are reported to the DPS headquarters in Austin so they can be tabulated and information can be released to the news media. This is done to try to focus public at-

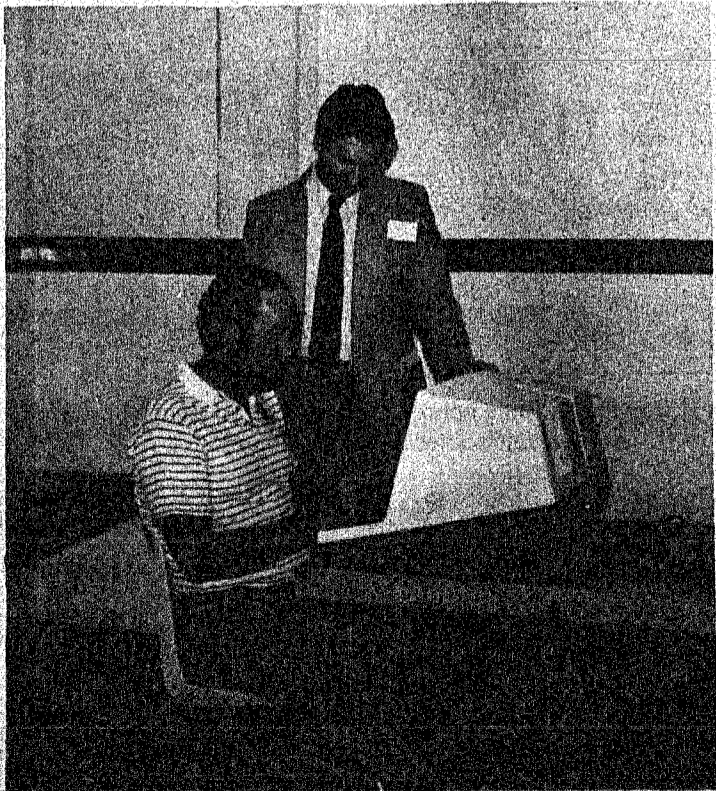
Santa Anna Couple Purchase Local Car Wash Facility

The Switzers will move July 10 to Wichita where

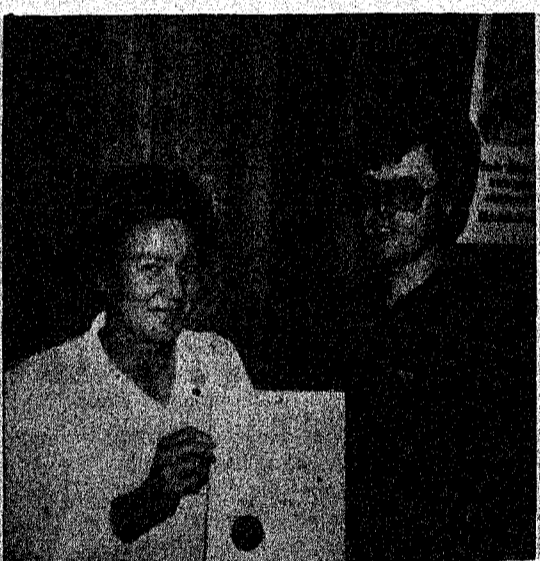

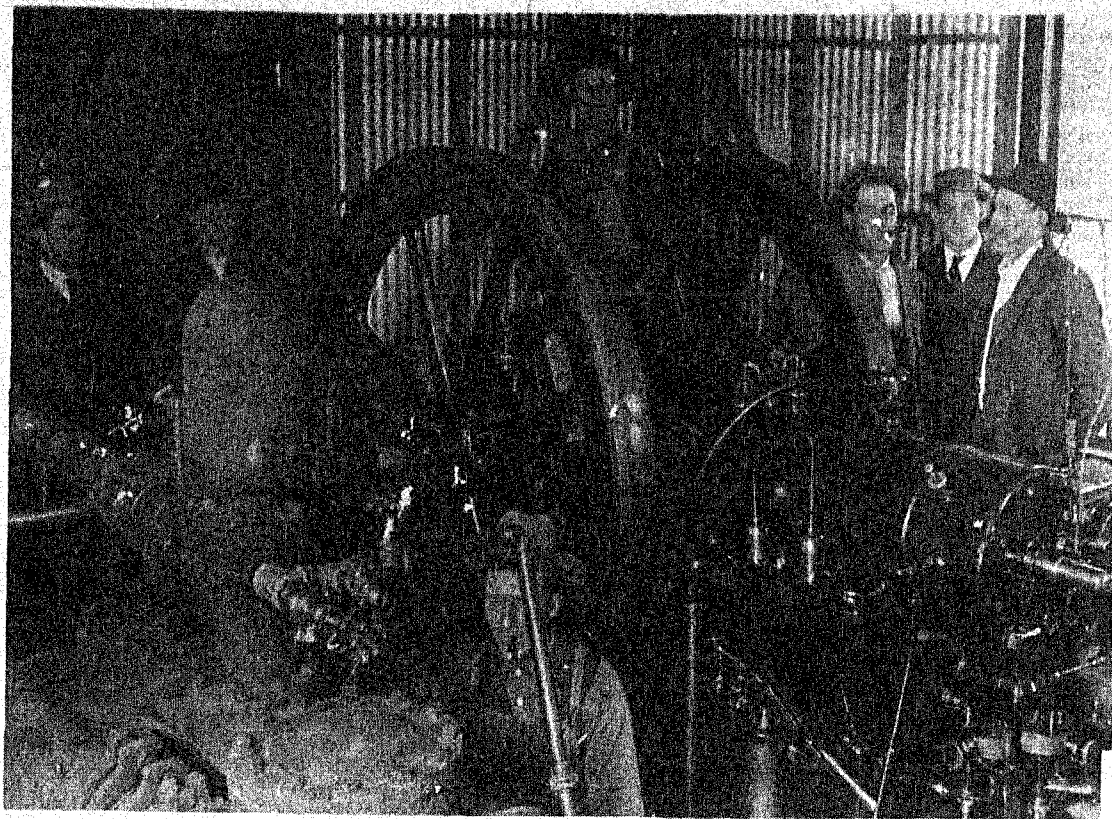

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Social Security Notes

Cost of Living Adjustment Delayed

The automatic Social Security benefit increase based on the cost of living, previously effective each July, will be delayed for 6 months, to January 1984 because of a recent law designed to strengthen the Social Security system, Priscilla Ely, Social Security branch manager in Brownwood, said recently.

The purpose of the delay is to save the system money and help it regain its financial strength, Ely said. Largely because of economic conditions in recent years, Social Security has had an increasingly severe financial problem. The changes in the law are designed to meet the problem both in the near-term and into the years after 2000. Other changes provided additional income to the system. They include:

The Social Security tax rate increase scheduled under previous law for 1985 will go into effect in 1984. The new 1984 rate will be 7.0 percent each for employees and employers, up from the previous rate of 6.7 percent. But, employees will receive a tax credit against 1984 taxes of 0.3 percent, which will be given when taxes are deducted from wages. In effect, 1984 employee

taxes will remain at the level set under previous law.

Also part of the tax rate increase scheduled for 1990 will go into effect in 1988.

Starting in 1984, the Social Security self-employment tax rate will be equal to the combined employee-employer tax on wages. This will be 14.0 percent for 1984. Previously the rate for self-employed people was about 1/2 times the employee rate. Under the new law, self-employed people will receive a self-employment tax credit of 2.7 percent of self-employment income for 1984; 2.3 percent for 1985, and 2.0 percent for 1986-89. After 1989, these credits will be replaced with deductions designed to treat the self-employed in much the same manner as employees and employers are treated for Social Security and income tax purposes.

A free leaflet, 'Social Security Strengthened' is available at the Brownwood Social Security office which tells about all the changes in Social Security.

Children Anti-Child Porn Bill

U. S. Senator John Tower (R-Texas) announced today he has joined in sponsoring legislation to protect children against sexual exploitation.

"Passage of this legislation is critical to counter the growing incidence and severity of child sexual exploitation in this country," Tower said. "This legislation extends to our nation's youth greater protection from the multimillion dollar child pornography conviction," Tower explained.

Under the legislation, stiffer fines and prison terms would be applicable against any person, including a parent or legal guardian, found guilty of employing, using, persuading, inducing, enticing or coercing any minor to engage in any sexually

explicit conduct for the purpose of producing any visual or printed materials.

The first conviction carries with it a fine of \$75,000.00 or up to ten years imprisonment or both; a second conviction would result in a fine of \$150,000.00 or up to 15 years imprisonment, but not less than two years, or both.

"Child pornography is an outrage. Action must be taken immediately to put a halt to this vile business and better protect our innocent children," concluded Tower.

Brown County Grand Jury Indicts Several Last Week

On June 13, 1983 in the 35th Judicial District Court of Brown County, Texas, the following criminal cases were heard:

Nolan Reed Steward, age 30, was convicted of Delivery of Methamphetamine and was sentenced to serve seven (7) years in the Texas Department of Corrections. The case involved the delivery of a large quantity of methamphetamine to undercover narcotic officers at the Brownwood Municipal Airport on December 21, 1982. Steward was represented by Brownwood attorney Dana Smith.

John W. Harvey, age 44, was convicted of Delivery of a Controlled Substance and sentenced to serve two (2) years in the Texas Department of Corrections. Harvey, a Dallas resident, was posing as a medical doctor and psychiatrist while serving as an interim priest at various Episcopal churches in the Central Texas area. In January of 1983, Harvey was employed as an interim psychiatrist at the Central Texas Mental Health-Mental Retardation Center in Brownwood. At the time of his employment, he submitted numerous documentation showing that he was a licensed medical doctor, psychiatrist, and psychologist. Officials at the MHRM center soon became suspicious and after further inquiry, discovered that he was not a medical doctor licensed in Texas. Harvey was then arrested and it was discovered that he was not a medical doctor at all nor was he a psychiatrist or psychologist. The medical diplomas and other documents were all fictitious and Harvey is fact had previously been convicted in the State of Michigan in 1969 for the misdemeanor offense of Indecency with a Child as well as convicted in 1978 in

the State of Wisconsin for Forgery. Harvey had been granted probation in each of these states and was no longer on probation at the time of this offense. Harvey was himself examined by a psychiatrist by order of the court, and was found to be competent. According to District Attorney Steve Ellis, 'I want to commend the officials leading to the discovery of a fraud being perpetrated upon them and the community. Fortunately, through their early detection, no one was injured by any of the actions of the Defendant.' In addition, Ellis stated that: 'Harvey's conviction for Delivery of a Controlled Substance was based upon the fact that he wrote a prescription for an individual for a controlled substance, namely, valium, and therefore it was a constructive delivery of the drug. This delivery was illegal because Harvey was not a licensed physician and therefore had no right to prescribe controlled substances for anyone.' Harvey was represented by a court appointed attorney.

Jewel LaVelle Chasteen, age 37, was placed on eight (8) years felony probation for the offense of Indecency with a Child. He was further ordered to pay a \$1,000 fine as a condition of his probation as well as submit to counseling at the Mental Health-Mental Retardation Center for the duration of his probation. Chasteen, a former Brownwood police officer, will be withdrawing his objections to the City of Brownwood's suspending without pay. As a result of this case, Chasteen will not be allowed to be a police officer in this State or any other state now or in the future, according to District Attorney Steve Ellis. The probation was granted pursuant to the deferred adjudication

laws of this State. This means that if Chasteen does not violate any of the terms of his probation for eight years, the case will be automatically discharged and he will not have a conviction on his record. However, if he does violate any of the terms of probation, he can be sentenced to serve up to twenty years in the penitentiary. The second charge against Chasteen was taken into consideration in assessing the punishment. According to District Attorney Steve Ellis, 'I feel that the punishment in this case is appropriate under the circumstances. The victims were the daughters of the defendant and both wanted their father to be required to obtain counseling. They did not want him sent to the penitentiary. The disposition of this case means that the victims did not have to be subjected to embarrassing testimony otherwise necessitated.' Chasteen was represented by Gary Price, a Brownwood attorney.

Larry Don Johnson, age 38, was convicted of Theft of \$200.00 or more, but less than \$10,000.00, and has been sentenced to serve five (5) years in the Texas Department of Corrections. His time in the penitentiary was probated upon the normal terms and conditions of probation upon condition he pay a fine in the amount of \$1,000 and \$5,000 restitution, \$2,000.00 of which was collected at the time of conviction. Johnson, a Granbury resident, was an insurance salesman and swindled an elderly woman out of \$5,000 in September, 1981. His insurance license has been revoked. He had never been convicted of a felony and was represented by Dana Smith.

The cases were presented by District Attorney Steve Ellis and Assistant District Attorney Fred Franklin. Judge Gordon Griffin was the judge presiding.

CAPITOL UPDATE

by Jim Parker



In the encounters I have had with many of you since the end of the 68th Legislative session, I have noted a good deal of misunderstanding as to pay and benefits afforded a State Representative.

I think each of you should know how much money I am paid and why I am paid the money. As I stated in an earlier article, the first order of business for the 68th session was to give ourselves, as state representatives, a \$1,000.00 per month increase in expenditure monies. I voted against the measure because (1) I felt I could run my office at least as cheaply as my predecessor and (2) I thought it a little hypocritical to give ourselves a 20 percent office expense increase at a time when we did not have the funds available for many meritorious projects that were inadequately funded.

Specifically, each state representative is allowed \$7,500 for the first month of the session; \$6,500 per month for the remaining months of the session; and \$5,500 per month during the interim. These funds are used to pay staff, telephone expenses, postage, and general office costs for

both my Austin and district offices. If I choose to spend state funds to actually set up a district office. Most of the rural representatives and some of the more conservative urban representatives habitually turn back in fairly large amounts of money to the state that they have not used. At this writing I have \$11,000.00 in unused state funds and would anticipate I would at least be about to turn in around \$20,000.00 at the end of my two-year term. The unfortunate part of this is that too many state representatives feel if they have it, they ought to spend it. Obviously, if everyone attempted to operate as frugally as I am, the state would be \$3M better off at the end of my term. Relatively speaking, that is not a lot of money, but "every little bit counts."

While I would at least like to have my expenses covered, I would urge you not to vote "yes" on that referendum issue on my account because I knew what the job paid when I asked for it.

I would like to be paid a much, much better salary, but one of the things that has made the Texas state government one that works is, I believe, the fact that we are not full-time paid politicians, but "plain vanilla" people, just like you, who are compelled by economics to get down here, tend to the business at hand, and get back home to try to make a living.

It is a public service job in the strictest sense of the word and I think it should remain so.

My salary is a flat rate of \$600.00 per month for 24 months and I am paid while the Legislature is in session, for a 140-day session, the sum of \$30.00 per day for expenses. Additionally, I receive mileage, during the session, at the rate of 23 cents per mile for a round trip home and back per week. That is the total pay package and I cannot use any of the "office expense funds for my personal use.

There will be a referendum on the November 1984 ballot whereby you, the voter, can increase the amount we receive daily for expenses to roughly \$75.00 per day. While the cheapest hotel room I could find was \$35.00 a day (within reasonable distance to the Capitol) and

Outgoing president of the Coleman group is Cliff Drinkard.

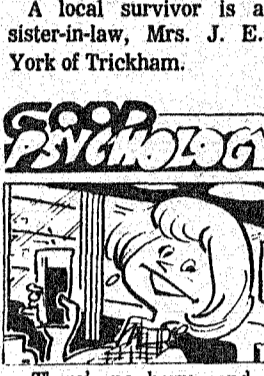

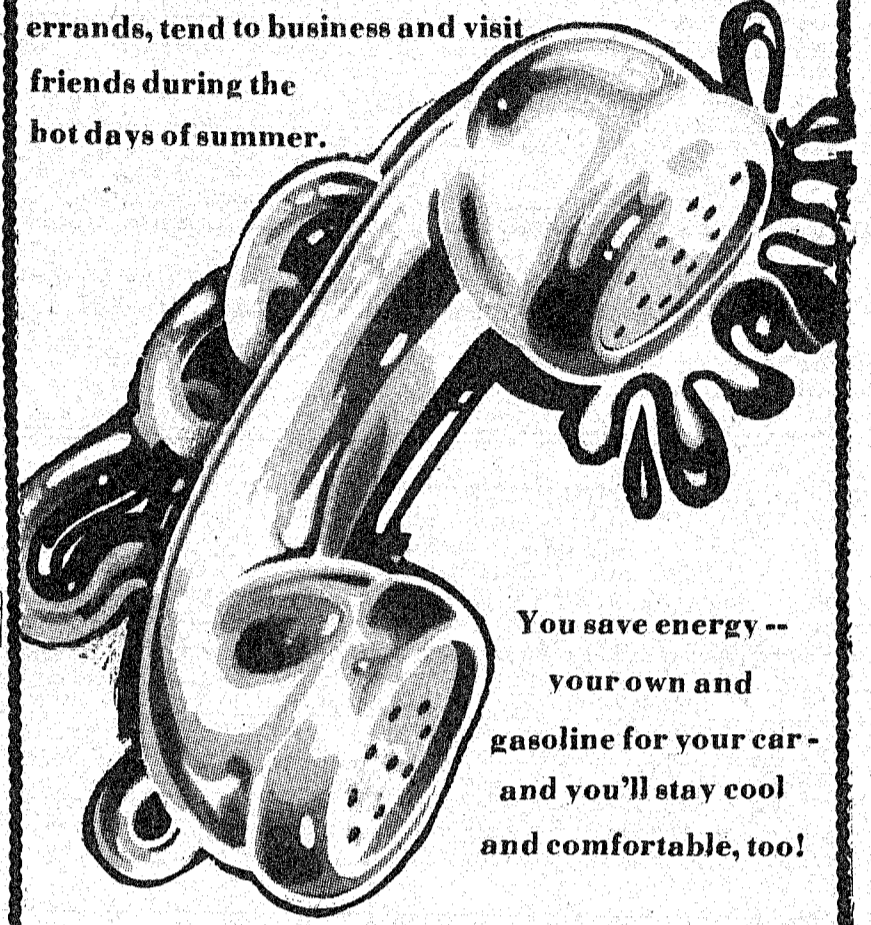

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Button Batteries a Hazard When Swallowed by Toddlers

COLLEGE STATION- Progress is not without its hazards — especially to small children.

The so-called "button" batteries, which power everything from electronic wrist watches to hand calculators and toys, are being swallowed accidentally by an increasing number of small children says Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, a health education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Each year, between 500 and 800 button batteries are swallowed because of improper handling. In the case of toddlers, sheer fascination with something

so small makes it a candidate for a taste test," she adds.

Many batteries make it non-stop through the body's digestive system and little harm results. But those which aren't passed and remain in the body are a threat to health and even life, Shirer says.

Leakage of alkaline electrolytes from a battery can cause chemical burns and internal bleeding, she notes. Young children can become very ill and some deaths have been recorded. Shirer recommends treating button batteries like you would old medicine when it comes to disposal. Wrap and discard them where they are not likely to be found by little hands.

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
