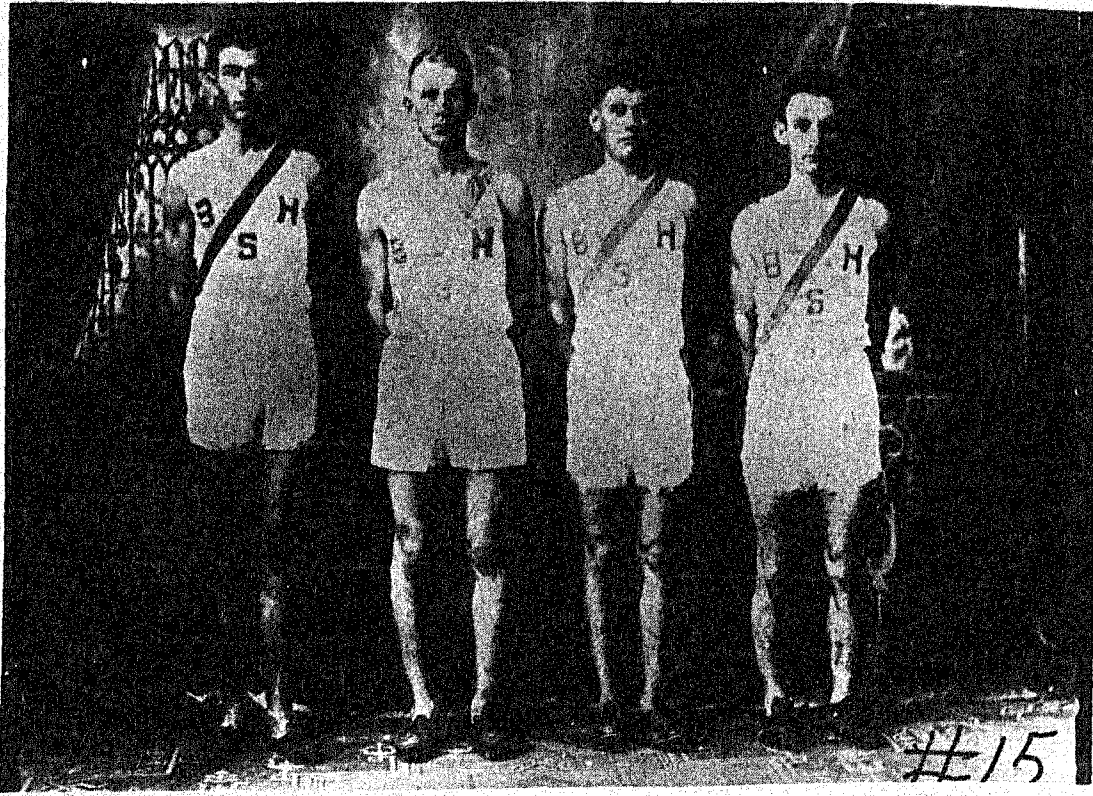

Santa Anna was a busy and exciting place last weekend as the first Funtier Days celebration was held, bringing hundreds of visitors to the community and providing entertainment for people of all ages.

In addition to the other events, contests and activities, the "So You Think You Know How to Barbecue" contest was held. The "Menardville Warriors" won the brisket cook-off over five other teams, judged by three from restaurant ranks - Joe Allen from Allen's Pit Barbecue in Abilene, Wilburn Bible from Windy B.'s of Santa Anna and Foy Knowles from 3K's Barbecue of Coleman. Ricky Ashby, head warrior with the Menard team, has other championships to his credit, including the

World Championship Brisket Cook-off in Pecos last fall. He was winner of the ostrich boots given as first prize.

According to the winner, little is left to chance. Five briskets were brought for the contest and two cooked with his special recipe for five hours. The best of the two was set out for the judges.

Favorite attractions were the armadillo races and muddy pig catching contests. Other events included car smashing, can smashing, face painting, dart throw, bingo, etc.

Entertainment was provided during the day, and the festivities concluded with a dance Saturday night.

The Friday night beauty pageant was well attended, with winners crowned in three divisions.

New Traffic Signal Being Installed

A much-needed change in the downtown traffic signals is to take place soon, according to Texas Highway Department officials.

With the approval of the City Council, a new traffic-activated system is being installed at the downtown intersection, with work to be completed in a week or two.

The new signal will be continually green for traffic on the main highway until a stop signal is activated by vehicles on the north-south street or by pedestrians pressing a button at the intersection.

A crew from the construction company was at work Monday on the installation, under supervision of the Highway Department. The project was approved by the City Council several months ago, and is expected to be a great improvement at the busy intersection.

About 75 Santa Anna children will take part in the event Friday.

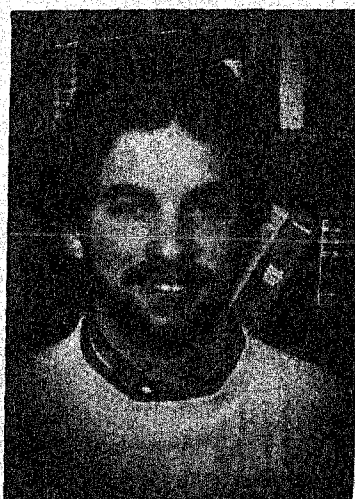
Cisco Native New Manager Of Dairy Queen

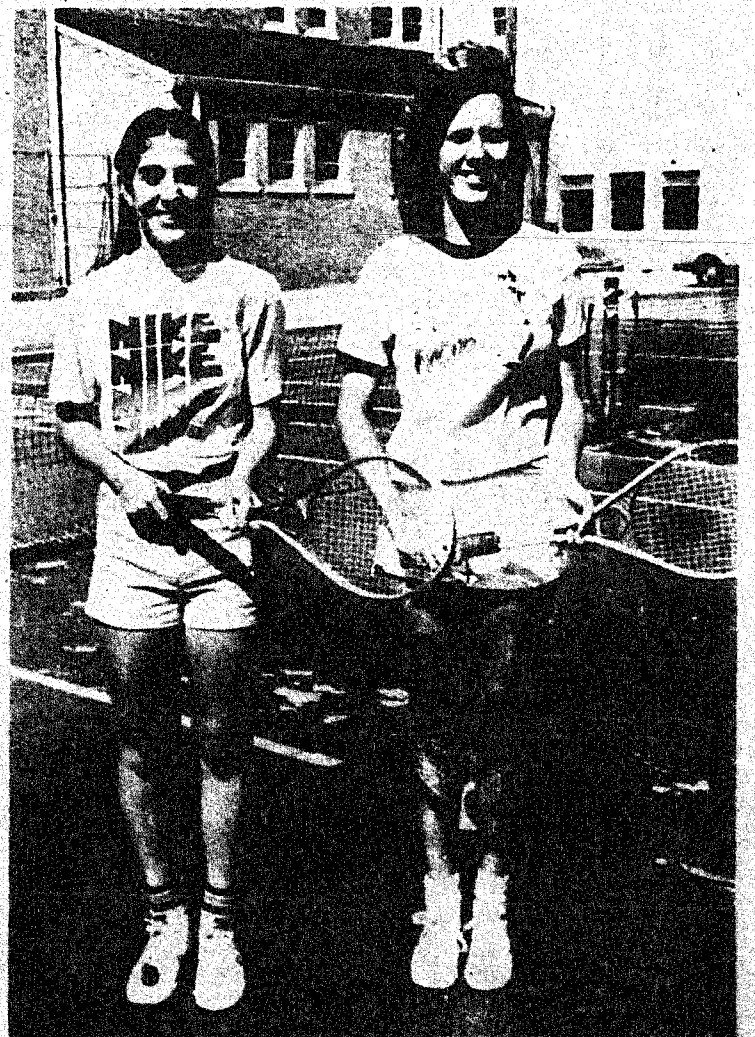
He has been accepted to graduate school at Texas A&M University to study Explorational Geophysics, starting there on July 7. Eubank is the grandson of Mrs.

Brangus Sale Good; Average over \$1,350

The first annual Big Country Brangus Spring Spectacular Sale produced excellent results in Abilene on Saturday, April 30.

The average sale price for sixty-one head of registered Brangus cattle was \$1,359.02. Three bulls sold for \$1,633.33 per head, with the high selling bull going for \$3,000 to Bynum Miens of Abilene. Eleven pairs averaged \$1,650 per pair, with Bill Shelton of Allison, Texas paying \$1,850 for the top selling pair.

Eight bred heifers averaged \$1,350 with Larry Compton of Abilene buying the top in this category at \$1,500.

An outstanding group of thirty-three yearling open

heifers averaged \$1,200 per head with Miens paying \$2,500 to own the top lot.

Volume buyer for the sale was Mr. and Mrs. Shelton who purchased thirty-six lots for a total price of \$45,850.00. Buyer attendance was good and the bidding was spirited.

Janet and Lewis Barker of Coleman had the highest averaging group of ten open heifers which sold for an impressive bid of \$1,170 per head.

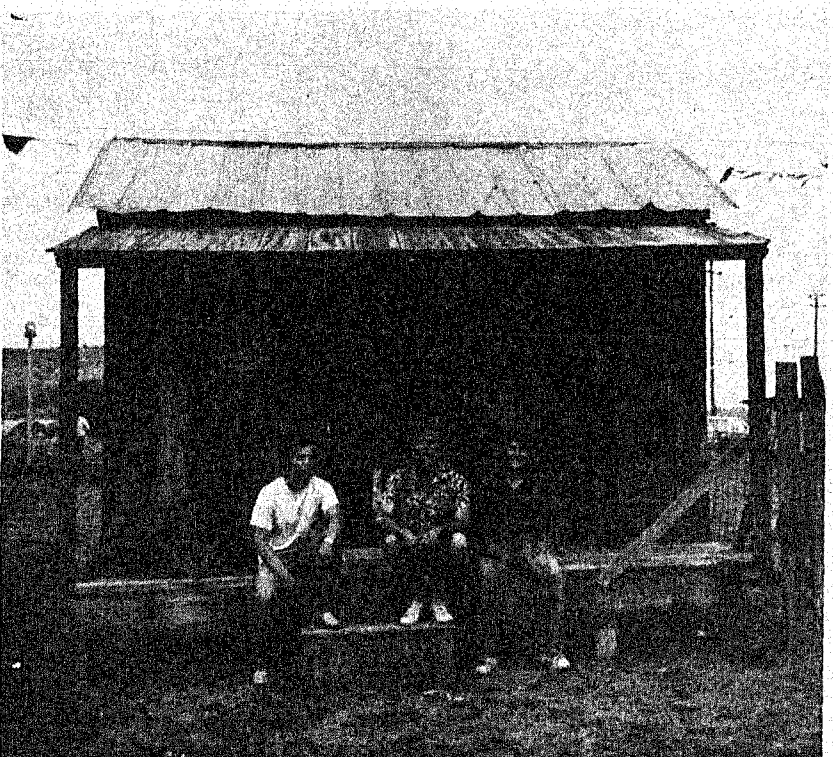

Tractor Accidents Abound in Spring

Tractor accidents abound in spring, with overturns still causing most tractor-related deaths, says a safety specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Use care when operating a tractor on irregular terrain, and beware of sudden bumps due to ruts and washouts. Operate a tractor at a reduced speed on rough ground and avoid quick turns. Never allow riders on a tractor, and wear a seatbelt if your tractor has a rollover protective structure.

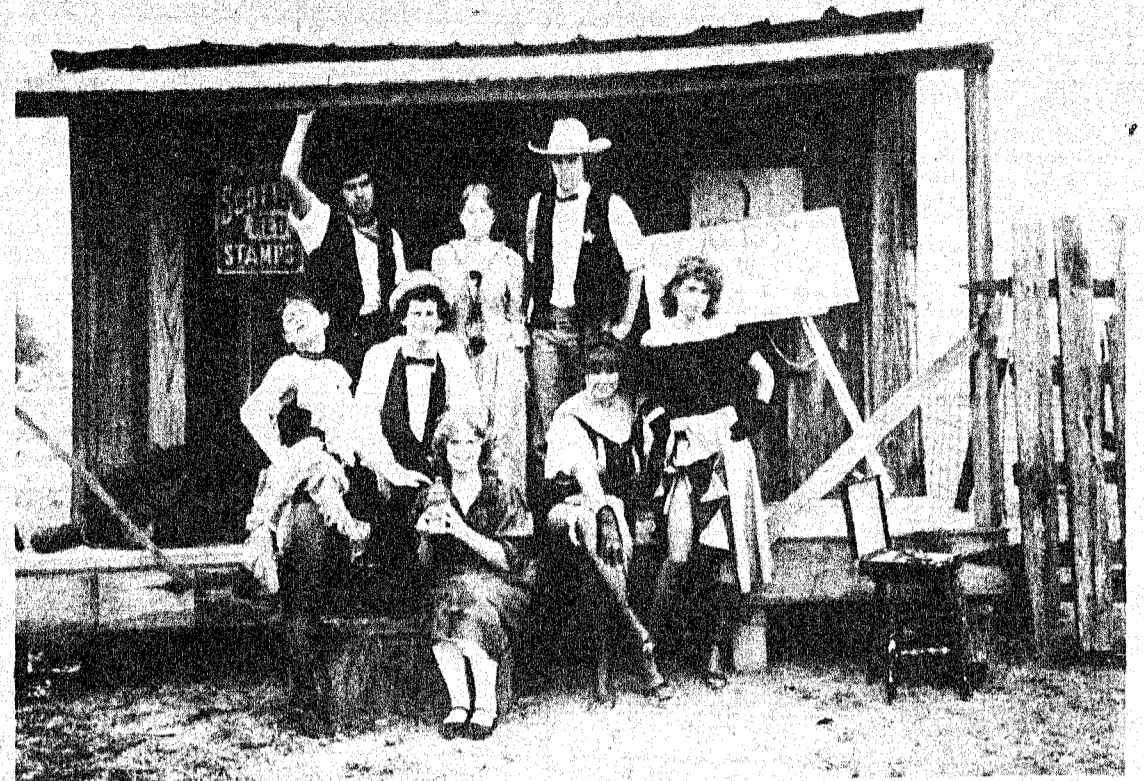

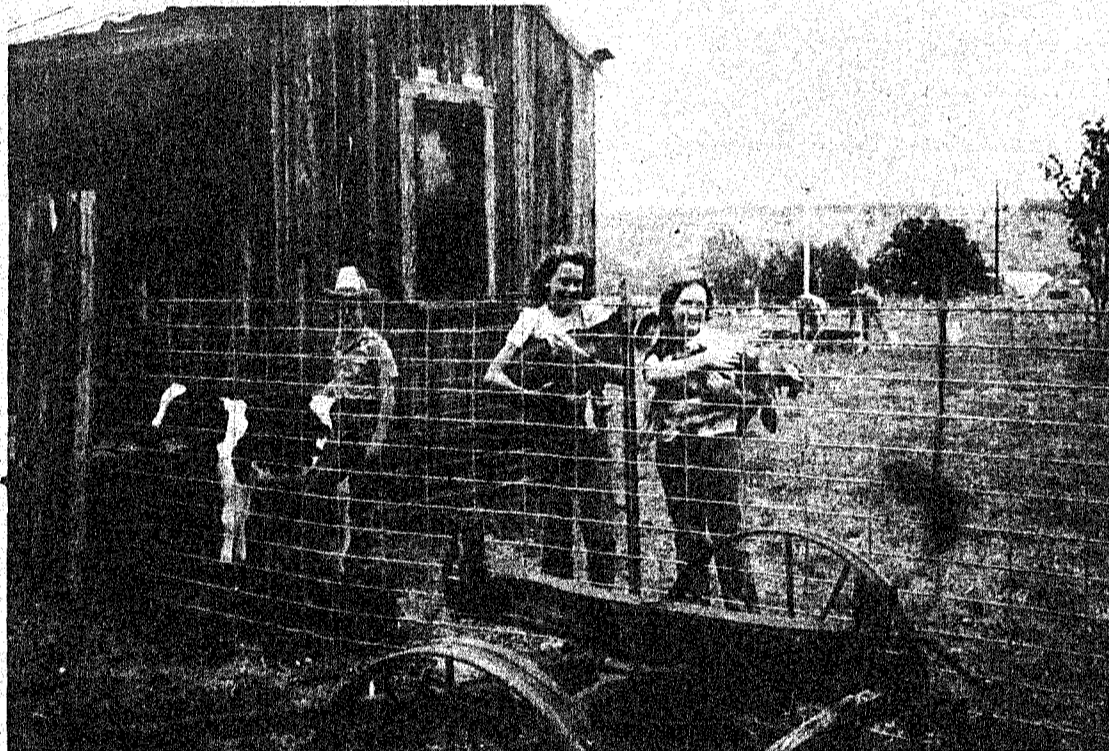

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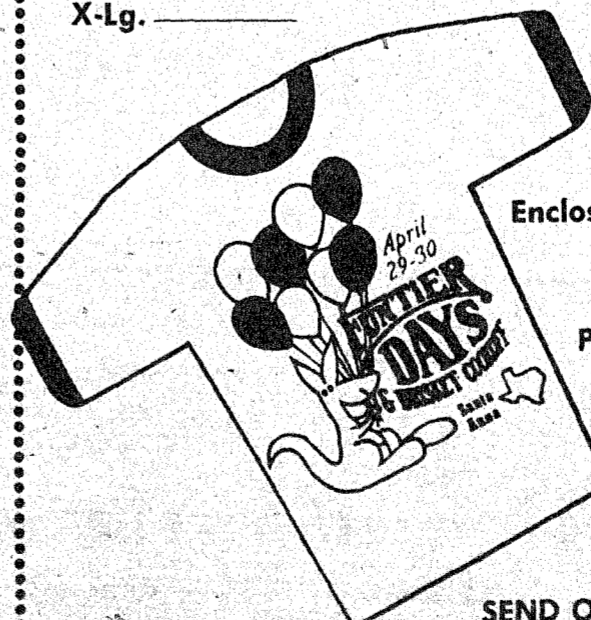

DWI Bill Being Studied

The DWI bill currently being debated in the Texas Legislature includes the elimination of 'deferred adjudication.' The practical effect of deferred adjudication is to allow alleged DWI offenders to continue to drive, serve no jail term, receive no insurance penalty and have no record of a drunk driving offense, says

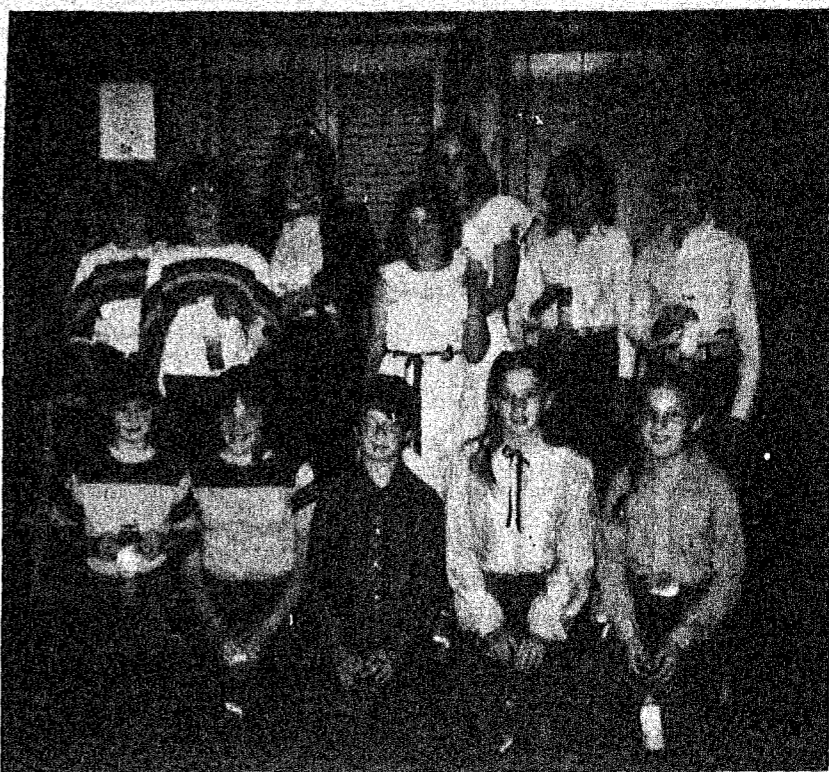
an official of the Texas Safety Association and a safety specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Under the proposed legislation, probation for first offense DWI would still be allowed, but it would be part of a driver's record for future DWI court action.

PEANUT SUPPLIES, DEMAND FAVORABLE

Peanut farmers have the privilege of dealing with a more balanced supply-demand situation than most other farmers, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

This, along with lower production cost, points to an improved profit picture for the 1983 peanut crop. Farmers will again have a national average support level of \$550 per ton for their '83 crop grown under the farm quota poundage program. Additional peanuts will have a support price of \$185 per ton.

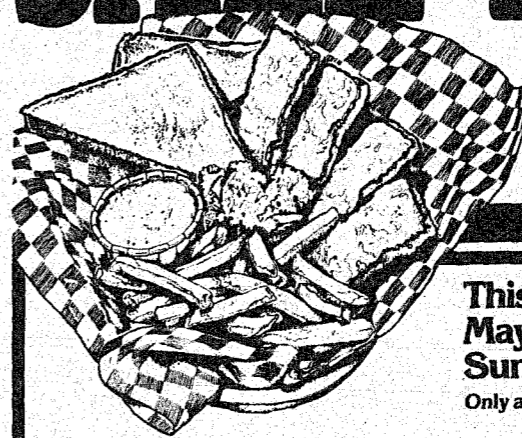

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CAPITOL UPDATE

This week I will attempt to bring you up-to-date on matters that we have discussed in the past, some alive, some dying, and some deceased.

1. The proponents of revision of the Homestead Exemption Law are making every effort to make their legislation more palatable, such as exempting agricultural products, setting minimum amounts a person must borrow to encumber their homestead, setting maximum percentages of evaluation that could be borrowed and all sorts of rights of rescission, "cooling off periods," etc. My attitude on this is a lot like my attitude on turnips: any way you fix 'em, I don't think I'm going to like 'em.

2. The "Barton Plan" (sales tax financing of schools in lieu of ad valorem taxes) has been presented in the Ways and Means Committee and, who knows? The committee has not taken any decisive action in regard to tax measures and it is difficult for me to see any conclusion that can be drawn. Hopefully, even in the short time left, the plan has a good chance. I know it does if it is property understood.

3. The general area of alcohol abuse legislation is in a practical state of flux

in committee, but MADD has been able to get the "big eye" of television cameras on committee members which sure makes a lot of difference in how a person behaves. I think the drinking age and open container legislation will come before the House within two weeks and the sheep will be separated from the goats, depending on your individual perception of sheep and goats. I do not know what DWI legislation will ultimately be offered on the Floor of the House, but a vicious and vigorous fight is almost guaranteed.

4. Horse racing has been reported out of the full Senate with a major change that would require a statewide referendum in the November election. If that passes, and then the local option votes that I have spoken of before will occur. The House version is hung up in committee, but even as I write, there is much scurrying around among members of that committee and a lot of talking in hushed tones. I think it will come out of the committee, make it to the Floor, and be passed by the House. The argument is, if "the people" get to decide, who am I to vote against it?

5. TDC is rolling along collecting \$20,000 a year at the rate of \$400 - \$500 a month

per inmate, but pieces of legislation too numerous to mention here are passing that, hopefully, will trim and maybe lessen the "bottomless pit" effect insofar as state finances go. In spite of space limitations, I have to tell you that I think the best of these proposals is one that would put DWI offenders on the sides of our public streets and highways picking up trash while a big yellow truck which says "DWI Work Detail" watches on. I do not know about you, but I think that the sheer embarrassment of this would have a much greater effect on my desire not to be a subsequent offender than the virtual anonymity of a relaxing three-day jail stay with meals furnished.

6. In conclusion, the Legislature is still moving at an absolute snail's pace insofar as substantive matters are concerned. We stay busy, unbelievably busy, but have yet to address the big issues and only 31 more days to go. Of course, I know that you constituents will be more than happy to spend the \$60,000 per day necessary for a special session for us to do the things we should have done 90 days ago. If there is a next time for me, I will know better. See you next week.

What a busy weekend! The Historical Commission was represented all over the county last weekend - telling everyone who showed interest - about the Coleman County History book, and what they could do to be included in this important volume. Of course, all that you have to do is to have Coleman County roots (even if you have moved from Coleman County or recently moved here), write a history about your family or families during the period that they were here (include photographs if possible), and send it to us at Box 958, Coleman, Texas 76834. If you need to know more about this project, send a stamped, self-addressed envelope to that address for a guide. Also, the book can be purchased on a pre-publication basis for \$42 in Coleman County, or \$45 mailed outside the county.

The commission had representatives at the Frontier Days in Santa Anna, the Silver Valley homecoming and Valera Cemetery workday. Members participating were Judia Gaines, Leona Bruce, Mrs. John Hunter, Vina Bob Gates, Maurine Burroughs, Glynn Mitchell and myself. Even though many people know of this history, we are trying to reach everyone that we possibly can, so it can be as comprehensive as possible. This book will be first-class publication with excellent half-tone reproduction. When you see it, we know you will be glad you went to the trouble to be included and that you purchased copies for yourself and your loved ones.

Remember the DEADLINE for turning in your family history is June 15, 1983... but let us know if you cannot meet this deadline for any reason, and room will be reserved for your history.

SCHOOL, CHURCH AND COMMUNITY HISTORIES

The family histories will constitute a large part of the book. In this book there will also be a general history of the county, histories of all of the schools that existed that can be obtained, histories of active and inactive churches that can be obtained, and histories of all of the communities of the county. Of course, these histories cannot be produced out of thin air, so we are relying on the people that remember these schools and churches to write an account of them, so they can be reproduced in this book and thus saved for our descendants to know about.

It is hard for me to believe, today, that over 70 schools existed in the county less than 50 years ago. And most of the communities of the county had a number of churches, this century, as well as banks, stores, etc. where very little is now. We need to preserve this heritage before all is forgotten. Some school, church, and town history has been written or is being written by various individuals over the county.

Beginning next week, I will run lists of those schools, etc. that we do not have anyone working on. If you can and will write what you know about a particular school, church, town, or even some particular type of history, such as farming in the county, getting to Coleman from the county before cars (and roads) were in general use, or any topic that you think we might like in a history of Coleman County, as we probably will use it. You may be the only one that remembers enough to write a subject. Some records can be found in deed records and old school records at the courthouse, but most will have to come from memory. If you know anything about these areas of history, please help us.

COLEMAN CEMETERY BOOK

The cemetery book of the inscriptions of Coleman County is still being worked on. Many cemetery associations of the county have contributed to this book, but the largest part, will be the Coleman Cemetery and the Santa Anna Cemetery. I have been working on the inscriptions in the Coleman Cemetery for several years, and until you write all of the inscriptions down, you just do not realize the number of graves there. It takes time. We had thought about including the cemetery inscriptions in the Coleman County Book, but the inscription book itself will be quite large, so it will be done in a separate volume. If anyone knows of any cemeteries in the county that we might not know about, such as family plots or the like, please contact me, we may have recorded it, but then, we may not have. Judia and I were shown four new plots (abandoned) that we had not recorded. Norris Calk took us to these cemeteries. Without him, we would never have found them.

At the last meeting of the Historical Commission, it was decided that memorial and business pages will be sold to help pay for any unforeseen expenses on this project. A full page for either of these will cost \$100, 1/2 page for \$50, and 1/4 page for \$25. If you are interested in having a business or memorial page in the book, let me know. The businesses of Coleman County will be contacted, but as we may overlook someone, contact us if you want to have a page. You will be required to put a history of your business on this page, as well as photographs. Straight ads will not be used. Keeping your name before the public is a type advertising, and is a business expense.

The memorial pages can be purchased by individuals, families, organizations, or whatever. You can have photographs of whatever you desire, as well as any printed matter that you wish to include.

Various members of the Historical Commission have given talks at many club meetings, church groups, and other meetings. If your club or groups would like to have a talk about writing a family history, please contact me to set up a date, the sooner, the better.

Other county history books that we have seen have included individuals, families, couples, or several couples (parents, grandparents, etc.). If you would like to look at any sample books that we have on hand, they can be seen at Ralph Terry Studio, 302 W. College.

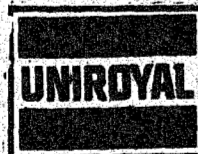

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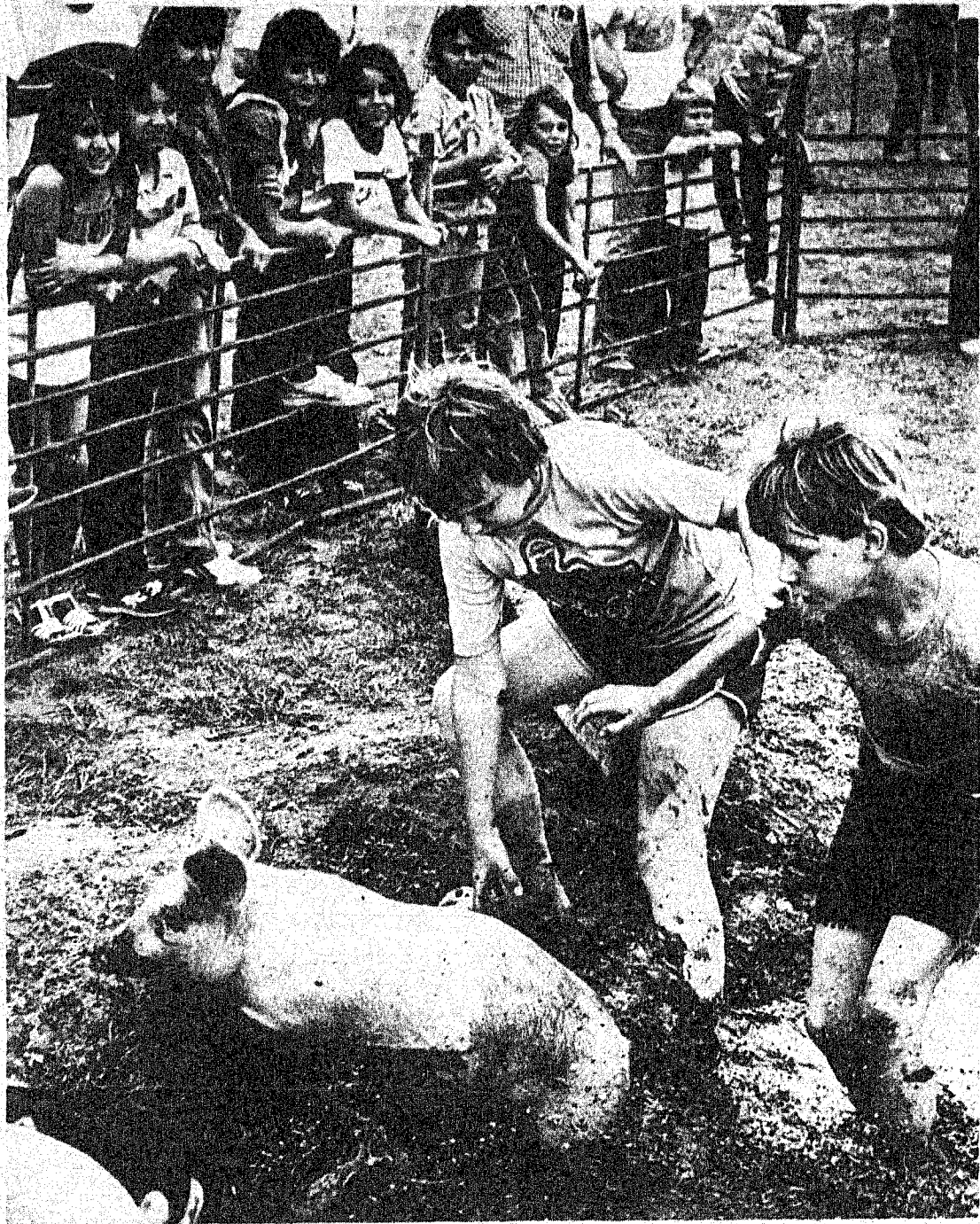
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MUDDY PIG RACE.... Two Santa Anna boys cheered on by friends as they try to catch pigs in mud puddle at Funtier Days last Saturday. The

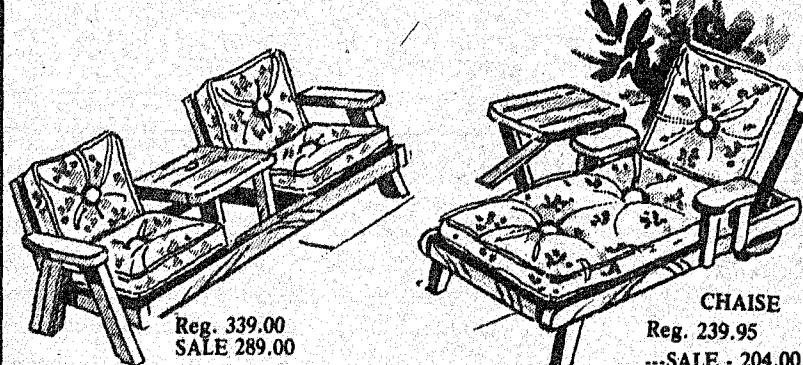
