Three Directors to be Elected

REA Membership Meeting Friday

The annual membership meeting of the Coleman County Rural Electric Cooperative, Inc. will be held Friday night, July 29, at the Rodeo Grounds in Coleman. Registration will begin at 7 p.m., with the business session to be held from 8-8:30.

Entertainment will be from 8:30 until 9:00, followed by a drawing for prizes.

Three directors will be elected at the meeting Friday night. Candidates from Area 1 are Garland Abbey, incumbent, and S. J. Brevard; Area 2, Tom Kingsbery,

incumbent, and P. H. (Mutt) Henderson; and Area 3, Wilma C. Davis, incumbent, and Hugh Don White Jr. of Winters.

E. E. Evans is president of the Cooperative that serves approximately 3,600 customers in Coleman, Runnels and Brown counties. Arnold Fuchs of Rowena is vice president, and Garland Abbey is secretary-treasurer. Other directors are the incumbents mentioned and also Johnnie Henderson, C. B. Tounget, Foy

Tomlinson and Leon Frerich. James Barr is manager of the Cooperative.

Formed in the early 1930's to provide electric power to the rural areas, the local Cooperative now serves customers in Coleman County and Runnels County, and parts of Brown and other surrounding counties.

All members of the Cooperative are encouraged to attend the meeting Friday night and take an active part in the operation of the group.

Brown County Rodeo Opens Tonight in Brownwood

The annual Brown County Rodeo will be held Thursday through Saturday at the Earl Q. Wilson Arena in Brownwood. The event is sponsored by the Brown County Fair Association.

Producing the open rodeo is the Lester Meier Rodeo Company of Fredericksburg. Events include bareback and saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, calf roping, team roping, bull riding and barrel

racing. Howard Stevens of San Antonio will be rodeo clown, and Danny Bell of Austin is bullfighter.

The Thursday evening performance will start at 7:30 p.m., and Friday and Saturday performances will be at 8:00 p.m.

Many area cowboys and cowgirls will be competing in the rodeo this weekend, with capacity crowds expected to be on hand to watch the events.

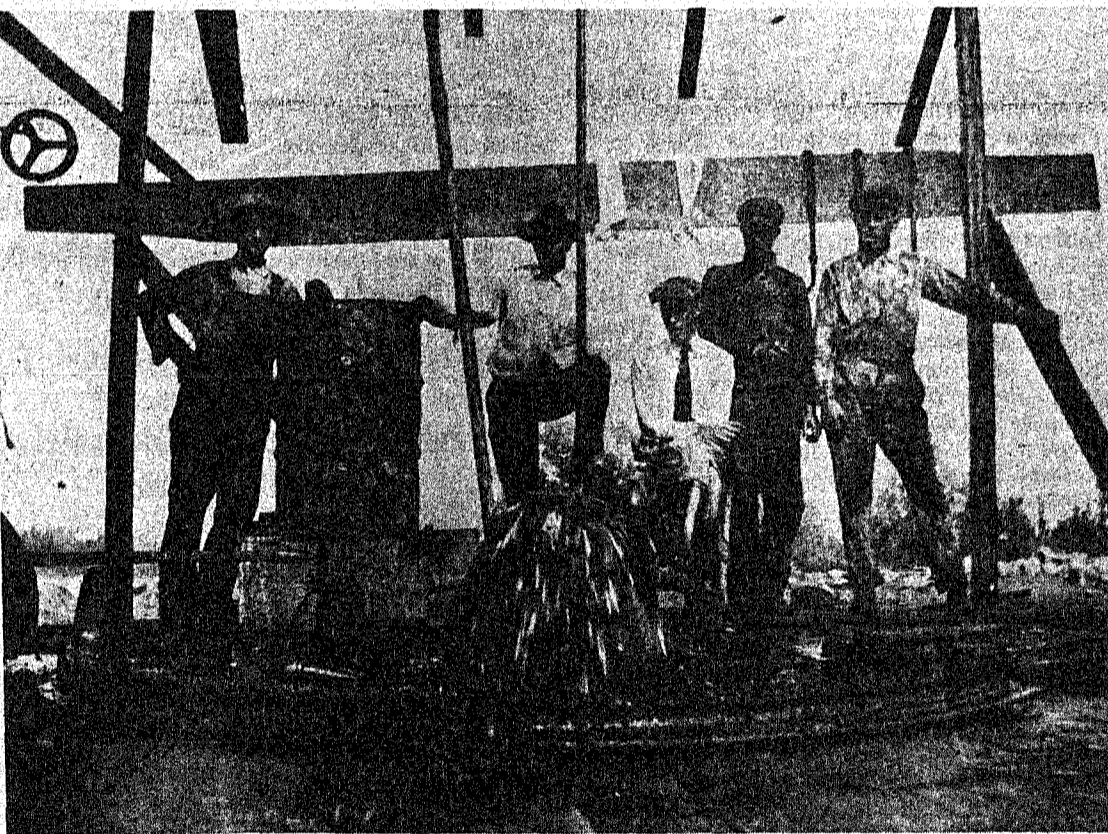
New Business Is Opening Here

Cost of WTU Power Plant Less Than First Estimate

The estimated cost of West Texas Utilities Co.'s Oklaunion Power Station, now under construction in North Texas, has been reduced by \$127 million.

The announcement was made Friday by Durwood Chalker of Dallas, chairman and chief executive officer of Central and South West Corp., WTU's parent company, at a presentation before the Utility and Telecommunications Securities Club of Chicago.

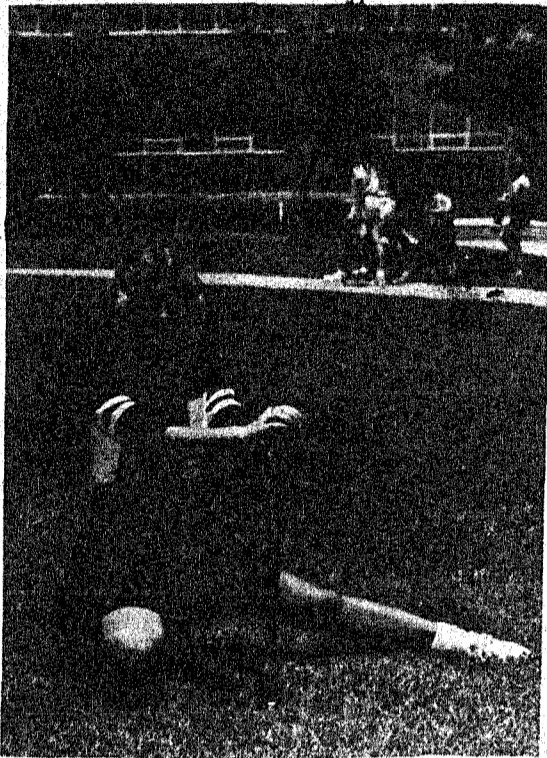
The reduced cost estimate results primarily from being able to negotiate better contracts in today's market with manufacturers and suppliers for practically all of the equipment needed for

Oklaunion, Chalker said. The cost had been estimated at \$525 million a year ago, but is now estimated at \$398 million.

The Oklaunion Power Station will have a net generating capacity of 640 megawatts and will be the first power plant in WTU's system to burn coal as a boiler fuel. The plant is

scheduled for completion in December 1986 and will be in full operation before the summer of 1987.

It will be owned jointly by WTU and two other CSW subsidiaries, Public Service Co. of Oklahoma and Central Power and Light Co. WTU will own 55 percent of the plant and will be the operating partner.

The SAHS junior has been in band since the fourth grade and has had twirling lessons at band camps in recent years. She is the daughter of Mrs. Nancy Bodine.

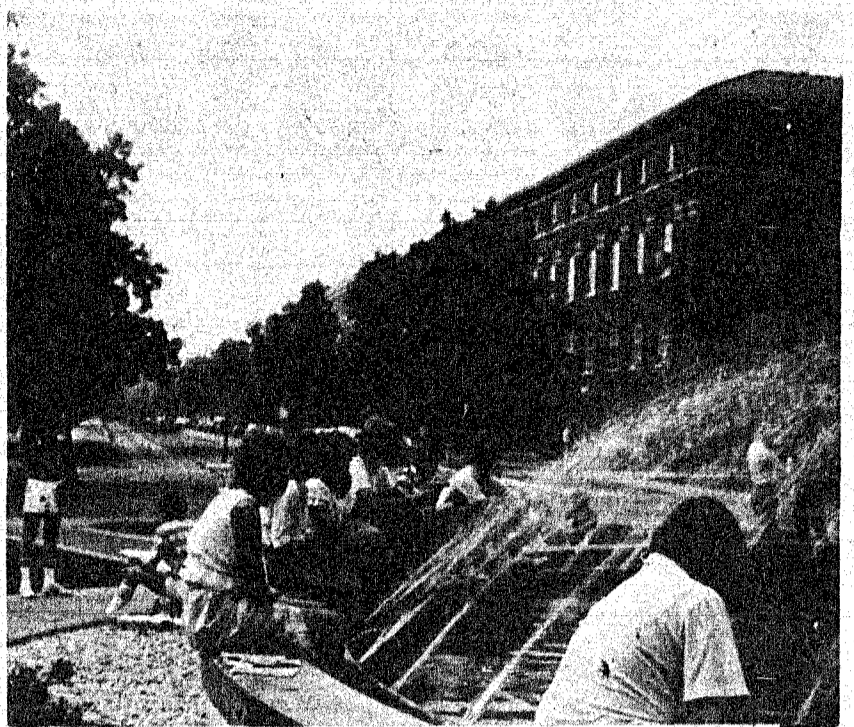
Santa Anna Student Takes Part In National Church Youth Event

A Santa Anna teenager was among the group of Presbyterian young people attending the recent 1983 Youth Triennium at Purdue University at West Lafayette, Indiana. Monique Spillman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Spillman, is a member of the Santa Anna United Presbyterian Church and attended with the Palo Duro Union Presbytery delegation.

The Triennium is held every three years for Presbyterian youth aged 15 to 19. More than 3,800 young people representing every state in the union and 29 foreign countries gathered for the six-day event that featured worship, workshops, fellowship and fun.

Delegates chose from 84 different topics for their workshops and forums. Some of the topics included drug usage, peer pressure, peacemaking, bio-ethics, music, spiritual discipline, prayer and meditation and youth leadership. The workshops were led by experts in the individual fields.

Outstanding speakers at the Triennium included Justice Mrs. Annie B. Jaigge, President of the World Council of Churches; Dr. William Myers of the Chicago Theological Seminary; Reverend Stan Wood, General Secretary-Clerk of the General Assembly, and others.

The 13-member delegation from Palo Duro Presbytery departed by bus from Wichita Falls,

stopping in Tulsa, Oklahoma and St. Louis, Missouri, and other places for sightseeing enroute to Indiana. The Palo Duro Presbytery covers the northwest quarter of Texas, from Wichita Falls to Brownwood, to Lubbock and Odessa.

PUBLIC NOTICE

At the request of the Office of the General Counsel of the Public Utility Commission, the Commission has established Docket No. 5113 to inquire into pressing issues involving the entire telephone industry in Texas. Docket No. 5113 will deal with many issues resulting from the impending divestiture of American Telephone and Telegraph Company and Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

Some of those issues include establishing the service areas of Southwestern Bell after divestiture and assessing the impact on other telephone companies in Texas, including Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc., of current settlement arrangements between Southwestern Bell and those companies.

Additionally, Docket No. 5113 will deal with the issues arising from the Federal Communications Commission's Final Order in Docket 78-72 (the Access Charge Docket) as they impact all telephone companies, including Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. Social Security Notes

GETTING IN TOUCH WITH SOCIAL SECURITY

Each year, millions of Americans contact their local Social Security office. They apply for monthly benefits, apply for Social Security numbers, ask questions, and report events that may affect their payments.

If you need to get in touch with Social Security, you should know 'how' and 'when' to do so. In this way, you can receive the best

possible service in the shortest time.

Most Social Security matters that are relatively simple can be handled by telephone. For example, you may have a general question about requirements for benefits. Or if you are getting checks, you may want to report a change of address or earnings from work.

If your situation is more complex or if you have several things to discuss, however, it is better to visit an office in person. For instance, if you want to apply for monthly benefits or to appeal a decision made on your claim, it's best that you talk directly with a Social Security representative. There are over 1,300 full-time and 3,500 part-time offices to serve you.

Whether you decide to call or visit the Social Security office, you should be aware of the best time to make your contact. The Social

Security people are busiest early in the day, early in the week, and during the first week of the month. Therefore, it's best to call or visit at other times if possible.

Almost all Social Security matters can be handled by phone. Medicare questions or filing of medicare claims can be taken care of by calling toll free 800-442-2620. You may file an application to establish your eligibility by calling 915-646-7533 in Brownwood.

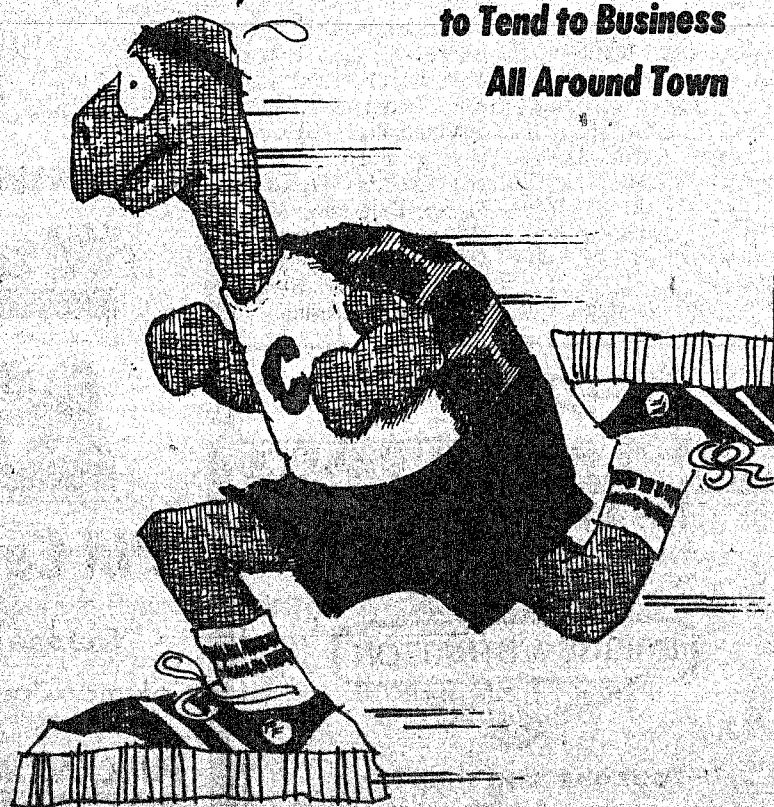

Control of Mesquites Always a Problem

COLLEGE STATION- Aerial application of liquid herbicides can be effective in battling mesquite and associated brush species in late spring and early summer.

"Most ranchers want to apply herbicides during a year they can expect good control," says Dr. Tommy Welch, range brush and weed control specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Thus it's necessary to take a look at weather conditions beginning last fall. Mesquite growth appears to be closely related to climatic conditions which precede the spraying date. Herbicides used to control mesquite and associated brush are growth-regulating chemicals that must be translocated from the leaves to the stems and roots to be most effective.

Soil temperature is also a key to good mesquite control. Best mesquite kill is usually obtained when the

soil temperature at the 18-inch depth at spraying time is 75 degrees F. or above.

Mesquite plants with a large quantity of leaves are ripe for spraying once the leaves are fully extended and dark green in color.

Studies have shown that aerial spraying of herbicides gives average mesquite control when monthly rainfall is average of slightly above average for at least three months before treatment. Highest plant kills occurred when monthly rainfall exceeded the average for six months prior to spraying, while poorest results occurred following conditions when only two or fewer months exceeded the long-term average prior to spraying.

Usually mesquite plants that have fully developed dark green foliage and are past full bloom with small pods developing are in the best condition for spraying.

Three registered and effective herbicides for mesquite control on Texas rangeland by aerial broadcast spray are recommended.



County Historical Notes

Time is about up for the family histories to be in, if you want your family to be included in the history book of Coleman County. August 1 is the FINAL DEADLINE, but since that day falls on a Monday, and my studio is closed on Mondays, your history will be included if it is brought to Ralph Terry Studio or postmarked by the 2nd of August. If you have waited until the last minute to do this project, that time is here. If you send a family history after that date, it will be placed in the county archives and if a second volume is produced someday on Coleman County, these histories could be used in it.

The contents of the family histories has grown to over 600 stories. Because of the large number of histories received, lengthy stories, especially those containing non-Coleman County history are being edited to smaller size. These edited histories (as

well as the unedited ones) will be retained in the county archives for those doing future research. We regret this step, but it is necessary in order to include all of the histories in one volume. At the onset of this project, we stated that we would edit, if necessary. I hope everyone will understand our position on this matter, but we would like to see everyone represented to some degree. Some stories will be longer than others, but this is due in part to the method of writing, as well as size of the family and length of time in Coleman County.

For the most part, everyone has been very cooperative and helpful on this project. Even so, we can't please everyone all the time. We have tolerated complaints from those that feel that one's family history is his own business and no one else's and some folks just lack interest. To these folks, I say that is your business, but why discourage those of us who are working long and hard

to put down a bit of time past lived by our loved ones... information that may never be written down anywhere else. This book will be a treasure for future generations. Now off my soapbox.

We are still lacking histories of many churches, schools, and organizations. Even though we are cutting down some family histories and also some church and school histories, we would like to be as complete as possible. Look for a list of completed school, church, organization, etc. histories in the next edition of the paper.
