The building, attached to the old gymnasium, was built in the late 1950's and has had very little renovation since that time. The gymnasium was remodeled last year.





# **Record Electricity Use Noted** By WTU On Monday, July 25

The fact that hot weather and high utility bills go hand in hand apparently is being proved again by West Texans.

Electric energy usage in the West Texas Utilities Co. system soared to new records within the past two weeks as temperatures throughout the territory hit the 100-degree mark.

A new record was set on Monday, July 25, when WTU customers used 19,286,000 kilowatthours during a 24-hour period. This record was broken the following day when consumption totaled 19,318,000 kilowatthours. The old record was 19,216,000 KWh recorded on July 32, 1981.

The peak demand this 994,000 kilowatts, which was set at 5 p.m. August 27. 1982. Peak demand is the largest amount of electricity being used at any given moment during the day. Highest peak so far this vear was 982,000 kilowatts on Tuesday, July 26.

"We expect the demand to go higher, but we should have no problem supplying our customers' needs," said Don Welch of Abilene, WTU vice president and director of customer services.

"But we do hope our customers realize that the more energy they use, the higher their bills will be,"

WTU's on-system generating capacity currently is 1,059,000 kilowatts. This means that with last year's peak demand the Company had a reserve capacity of 6 percent, while the safe reserve is considered to be 15 - 20

To assure a reliable supply, WTU has contracts to purchase power when necessary from neighboring electric companies until the Oklaunion Power Station comes on line in late 1986. This station, now under construction near Vernon, will increase WTU's generating capacity by about one-third.







# Growing Up at Whon, Texas

(Fourth in a Series)

By Sylvia Herring

Election day was a big day at Whon. Jim Carter was usually the election judge, and when the polls closed, Daddy would often help bring the voting box to Santa Anna. A large board was always hung on the side of the bank building, and results for each voting box were written on it. We always stayed in town until all the returns were in.

REA brought electricity to Whon about 1937. Eddie Paul Voss and his uncle, Roy Voss, wired our house, with the drops costing \$1.50 each. You can't believe how bright our house was that night.

We bought a General Electric refrigerator from George Johnson in Santa Anna, and of course had ice cream that night.

We bought a radio from Sears-Roebuck, and it soon became a big part of our lives. I remember the programs - Pepper Young, Maw Perkins, Stella Dallas. Jack Armstrong the All American Boy, Orphan Annie and Daddy Warbucks, and of course the news.

In 1936 there was a flood on the Colorado River, and we went down to the Rehm place to the new rock house and looked at the river that had risen high up on the bank. I remember Daddy

scolding me because I said aloud that I wished a house would float down the river.

Back in that time, people didn't go to the doctor unless it was a matter of life or death.' I remember in 1934 I fell out of our Ford car just out of Whon, and was bruised and skinned. I had wanted to go home with Edith Ramsey and my cousin, Eva Trull, and was crying so hard I hadn't shut the door of the car. Dr. Williams lived at Rockwood but was pretty old and it was 18 miles to Santa Anna, so anyway my mother and I spent the afternoon with Aunt Madie.

In 1932 my grandfather fell off Aunt Nettie Blackwell's porch and broke his hip. My dad and Aunt Nettie took him to the Sealy Hospital in Santa Anna where an X-ray was made, the first I had ever seen. Grandfather had surgery but died March 31, 1932 and was buried in the Fiveash Cemetery.

I recall Mrs. Ed Spencer had to have an eye removed, and I went with Daddy as he drove Mr. and Mrs. Spencer the 25 miles to Brownwood to Dr. Shelton, an eye, ear, nose and throat specialist. The doctor took the eye out and we brought her right back home. We drove her to Rockwood every three days for awhile where Dr. Williams check-

ed on her. One of the workers got

That, in itself, could save additional dollars by re-

quiring less construction. When we consider diverting drunks from jail, another very important, yet seldom mentioned statistic, is the number of jail suicides. According to one study 86% of those who itted suicide in were intoxicated at the time of death and more than half the suicides occurred in he first 12 hours of confinement.

Recent Supreme Court rulings make local governmental entities liable for damages for civil rights violations. Many believe that a policy of arresting and jailing a public in-ebriate and placing him in a potentially dangerous situation in jail because of his illness is a civil rights violation. As such, should a civil rights suit be filed and won against a governmental entity, the taxpayers could be liable for

massive damages.
Of course, these statis tics and strong arguments lose a good deal fo their ability to convince for those peopel who have been victims of intoxicated offenders. We must ultimately arrive at an official position on the issue of intoxication and criminality that takes victims into compassionate considera-

#### Pre-heating Your Oven Is Found Unnecessary

Researchers at the United States Department of Agriculture's consumer nutrition laboratory compared a variety of foods prepared in preheated and non-preheated ovens and found few significant differences in the quality or size of the items, reports home economist Bonnie Piernot.

The non-preheated ovens required five minutes or less extra baking time than the preheated ovens, says Piernot, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The energy savings from not preheating averaged about 10 percent.

The foods used in the research study included pies, cakes, casseroles, souffles and meat loaves. The dishes were prepared in preheated and nonpreheated standard gas. continuous-cleaning gas, standard electric and self-

cleaning electric ovens. The variability in baking times reported between preheated and nonpreheated ovens was often less than that reported among the different types of ovens, adds the specialist.




